

Administration May Profit by Indo Peace Unsatisfactory Truce Still Is Good Politics

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON-The Eisenhower administration may profit politically from the Indochina truce-a type of peace it did not

want and vigorously criticized in advance of the agreement. Yet. Republican orators can be counted on this fall to emphasize that there is no war in the world now and point out that President Eisenhower was elected with his promise to end the fighting in Korea. On the other hand, if plans seriously considered earlier this year

to rush United States planes to the aid of Dienbienphu had been carried out, the result would have probably proved costly to GOP congressional candidates.

Republican Senate leader William F. Knowland of California has strongly denounced the settlement in Indochina. Yet, it may turn out thatbecause of the cease-fire-he will retain his post of majority leader instead of stepping down to the minority role.

Victory for Republican candidates in a few close states will retain a margin of control for the party and it may well be that peace now may give the GOP this victory.

The division in the Senate now is 48 Republicans, 47 Democrats and one Independent.

• STRATEGY FOR WAR-Military experts reject the wishful thinking that neither side will want to be first to use atomic weapons in any new war-and that, therefore, the atomic and hydrogen bombs will never be dropped.

These experts have come to the conclusion, sadly but firmly, that a third world war will begin with a nuclear or thermonuclear assault, not on cities, but on military forces. The enemy will aim at wiping out all effective resistance at the source, and will try to take over the cities intact. With this in mind, the experts think it would be useless for the

free world to plan on a quick mobilization to take place right after a war starts. They say that the issue will be decided on the basis of the armed forces which are ready-and are able to survive-the initial onslaught.

Military leaders say we must make the necessary plans immediately and, at all costs, must not sit back and wait for a war to start to think about getting ready to fight it. That, they say, would be much

· SAME TUNE: NEW ARRANGEMENT-The Pentagon's new plan to draft men for service, both active and reserve, had a familiar ring on Capitol Hill and opponents of universal military training immediately began to bristle.

John A. Hannah, who has bowed out as the Defense department's manpower chief, indicated that the proposal will be ready for detailed submission to Congress soon after it reconvenes in January Of course, by that time the temperament of the legislators may

have been completely changed by the November elections. But up to now neither GOP nor Democratic administrations have been able to convince Congress that UMT is desirable.

Plan Sounds This time the Eisenhower administration probably will avoid calling its plan universal training as such,

although Hannah said it would apply to all youths in the eligible age There seems little likelihood that one of the strongest foes of UMT, Rep. Dewey Short (R), Missouri, will change his mind between now

and January. And if the GOP wins in November Short will continue as chairman of the House armed services committee which must clear the legislation the Pentagon and the White House want.

#### PRECAUTIONARY USE OF INSECTICIDES-HERBICIDES

A word of warning to farmers who spray their own fields: Never use the same equipment for applying herbicides and insecticides without a thorough cleaning between jobs.

In the long run, it is actually better to use two sets of equipment. Many farmers fail to recog-

nize the killing power of herbicides on broad leaf plants. The chemical 2,4-D is especially Lowerful. It does an excellent job on weeds-but its effects are just as potent on your cash yielding row crops.

Even a very small residue of 2.4-D will remain in your spraying equipment from one season to the next. If an insecticide is mixed in the taks, that leftover bit of 2,4-D will still be enough to cause serious damage to the crop.

Near Round Rock, Texas, this year, a farmer sprayed his entire cotton crop with the same equipment he used to kill weeds around the barn and house. Even though he had cleaned the tanks, the residue was enough to blight his field. Fortunately, he still had time to replant his

Cases like this are frequent and thousands of dollars are lost each year. In other instances, herbicides are carelessly applied, resulting in exten-





In fact, figuring the public debt on the same basis that has been used in the past, it now stands at the highest point in our history.

The present Administration adopted a different method of figuring interest on saving bonds, entering on the books only the current value of the bonds. In the past the debt was figured on the basis of the bonds' maturity value. This is a legitimate bookkeeping method, no doubt, but it may have caused people to believe mistakenly that the national debt has been reduced in the last two years. It hasn't.

Incidentally, the only year in which the United States had no Public debt was 1836.
