## New Type Credit Available For Financing Soil Conservation Jobs

College Station, (Spec)—A new type credit for financing soil conservation measures will be available to farmers through a recent amendment to the Water Facilities Act. In addition, loans to develop irrigation systems and farmstead water supplies, previously limited to 17 states, are extended to the rest of the nation.

The loan services will be available from the Farmers Home Administration. Applications must be made to FHA county offices.

An outstanding feature of the law is provision for insuring loans made by private lenders. Where insured loans from private sources are not available

## August Issue Of Gulf Reporter Says Marvin Hodges Jr. Is Promoted

According to the Gulf Reporter of August, Marvin Hodges, Jr. was promoted to Senior Professional Engineer in the Construction and Repair Department, effective August 1. He replaced W. S. Reeder. Mr. Hodges received his degree in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Texas in 1944. He joined Gulf in 1946, as a Junior Engineer assigned to the Construction & Repair's training program. In 1947 he was assigned to the Construction and Repair Department as a trainee. He was made Professional Engineer in 1948.

Mr. Hodges has served at the Toledo and Philadelphia Refineries on various construction projects.

Then in another item of the Gulf Reporter, it stated that in May, 1952 not only Spring "was busting out all over" but so was refinery expansion. The big push at that time was beginning

at the Philadelphia refinery. When the call went out for field engineers, Marvin Hodges was one of the three men who headed for the activity area, bag and baggage. The Gulf Company's idea was to build the largest Fluid Catalytic Cracker and the largest Vacuum and Atmospheric Unit in the world today; also make other additions and improvements. The final result was to transform a fairly good size refinery into the largest refinery on the East coast.

When the work program was set up, Hodges was assigned to the new Atmospheric and Vacuum Unit.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

U. S. Forces Undergoing Major Shifts in Far East
Redeployment Includes Air, Army and Navy Personnel

WASHINGTON—Large-scale shifting of United States forces in the Far East is being carried out by the Pentagon. The Fifth Air Force, which carried the burden of the air war against the Communists in Korea, is moving to Japan. Only a small advance headquarters will remain in Korea.

The Army's Second Infantry division is returning to the United States at cadre strength. This means that a hard core of about 1,500 men will return home. Over 16,000 troops previously assigned to the Second will be reassigned to other divisions in the Far East.

Also being redeployed is the 25th Army division, which goes to Schofield Barracks in Hawaii at full strength. Two National Guard divisions, the 40th and 45th, returned to the United States in the spring.

The Navy says new rotational policies and increased periods in which ships can now operate away from port will bring "a great number of men much closer to home." Since spring, the Navy has brought back one battleship and four destroyers to home ports in the Atlantic.

So far, there are no plans to shift Marine forces in the Far East. The First Marine division will remain in Korea. The Third division will stay in Japan.

● BIPARTISANSHIP—There will be no campaign speeches this autumn by top officials of the State department—including the chief of security inspection, Scott McLeod.

Although there have been no written instructions to the 17 officials who hold the politically-appointed rank of assistant secretary, or higher, it is understood that all officials are taking their cue from Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. Dulles recently spoke in glowing terms of foreign policy bipartisanship since 1944.

McLeod reportedly got Dulles' ire up by his Lincoln Day speech-making last February. McLeod assailed the Democrats and brought on a storm of Democratic criticism by those who said a man in his post should remain out of partisan politics.

● GERMANY REARMED—The United States intends to rearm Germany no matter what happens to the European Defense Community Treaty and even if France vetoes German membership in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Administration experts are convinced that, should war come, the free world will lose unless Germany is strong and kept out of Russian hands. For, the experts say, only with Germany's industrial might could the Soviets fight a long war.

Therefore, the United States will not permit French refusal to ratify EDC to stand in the way of building up a strong German army.

● BOOMING COSTS—Senator Edward Martin, Pennsylvania Republican, believes that one of the great dangers this country faces at home is "too much government at too high a cost." He says this applies to state and local as well as federal government.

Martin presents this picture: 25 years ago the federal government cost less than \$3 billion a year. In 1953, the cost was close to \$75 billion. Twenty-five years ago there were 500,000 federal employees. Today there are 2,300,000.

State governments 25 years ago cost about \$2 billion a year; the cost has now reached \$12 billion. Cost of local governments during the same period soared from \$5 billion to \$11 billion.

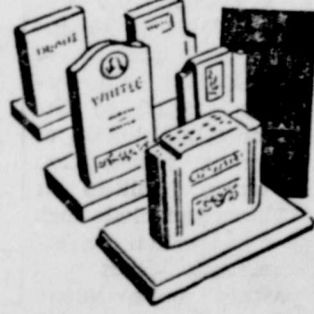
Mrs. Mary Whitehead and family of Priddy left Wednesday morning for Amarillo where they will make their home.

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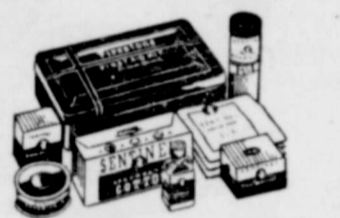
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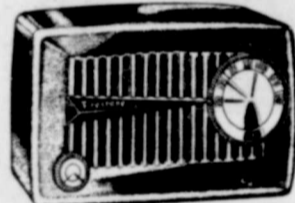

"And," she added, "the scientists say the desert is moving eastward." But perhaps if the cycle turns and rainy years set in to make up for all these dry ones, the scientists will say, "The rainy seasons are moving westward."

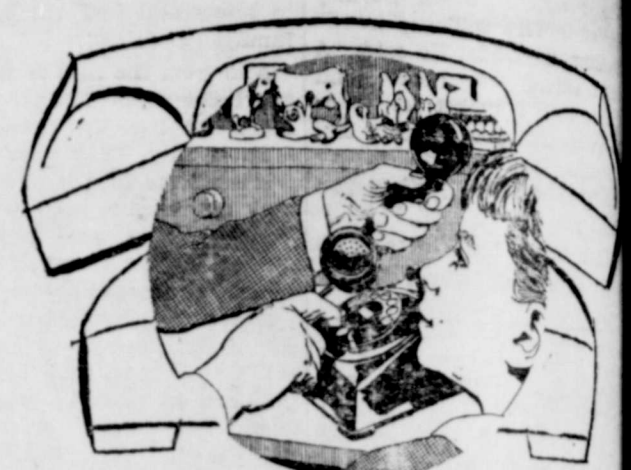

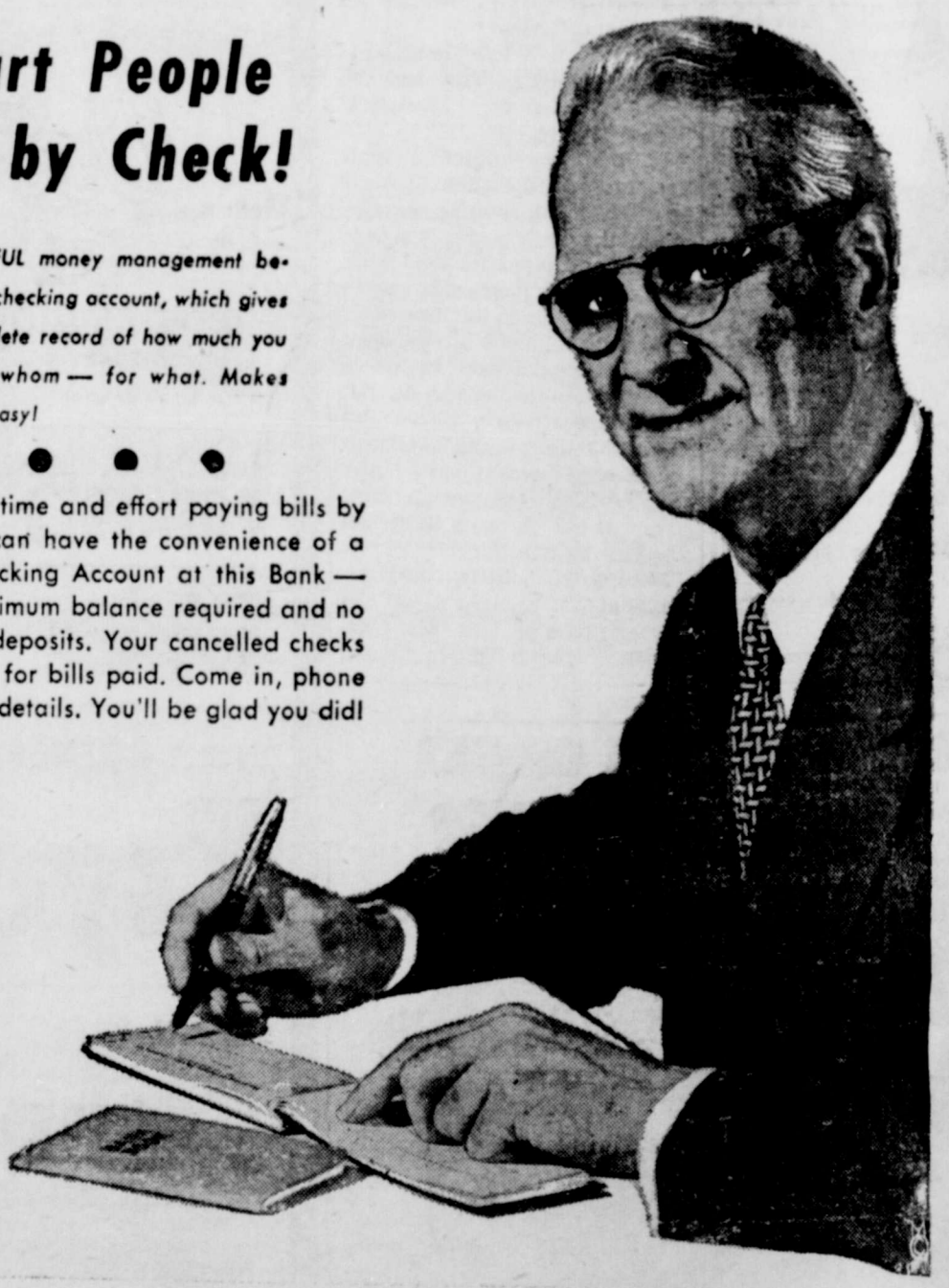

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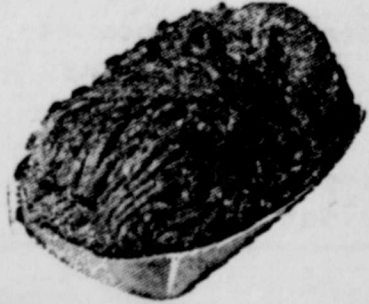

### COTTON PRICE OUTLOOK

Cotton growing is always a gamble. But if the Texas farmer can afford to gamble a little more than usual this fall, then he may find the odds for getting a good price are better now than anytime since 1950.

Drouth and limited cotton acreages have cut 1954 production prospects down below the amount expected to be used by domestic and export consumers. As a result, cotton farmers may find they have a "sellers market" for the first time in four years. This could be especially true of better grade cotton.

Domestic and export demand for cotton is expected to exceed the predicted 1954 crop by nearly 2 million bales. Total U. S. production is forecast at about 11,832,000 bales. Consumption is predicted at 13,700,000 bales. If this holds true, then textile mills may have to buy from Commodity Credit Corporation reserves to meet their needs.

A farmer with a new crop of cotton has a more desirable product than this stored surplus.


Furthermore, the interest and storage charges on CCC reserves should tend to make manufacturers seek out the new crop first.

The spread between this year's crop and the expected demand may become even wider. Texas production on Sept. 1,

was estimated at 3,375,000 bales compared to 4,317,000 last year. But the drouth is deteriorating dry land cotton rapidly and this figure is already out of date. There is no accurate way of estimating just how much less the crop will be.

In such a situation, cotton prices could ordinarily be expected to firm up to between 38 and 40 cents before the year is out. The dollar wise farmer, then, should seek out the very best market for his cotton and not be over anxious to sell too quickly unless it is really necessary.
