




In Dallas she was also active in the Highland Park Methodist Church and was a member of the Dallas Writers Club and the Democratic Women of Dallas.





the President's demands for revision of the Taft-Hartley law, Hawaiian statehood and an 18year-old voting age.

If the Democrats pick up seats in the House and Senate, the outlook for all three measures will be Burks of Trigger Mountain Comeven dimmer than this year when they were bottled up by Congress.

It was the Democrats who led opposition to all three proposals. They especially are reluctant to tighten up on the Taft-Hartley law in view of organized labor's support of their party, and they won't accept Hawaii as a state unless Alaska is also admitted to offset any GOP gain.

There has never been much enthusiasm for the 18-year-old vote proposal among members of Con-

gress, Democrats and Republicans alike. There is no indication they will change their minds on that score. *

While the bill was being handled in Congress, Democrats argued that it was designed to aid "big business" and that individuals would suffer, because they should have received a larger share of the tax relief

The administration, however, is lining up arguments in behalf of the new measure. Its spokesmen will contend that: 1-Many provisions of the new bill give individuals more breaks than were given business. 2-The bill hit corporations hard because it extended the present corporate income tax rate at 52 per cent instead of letting it drop back to 47 per cent. 3-Such provisions as were designed to aid business were aimed only at ending such things as double taxation and confusion resulting from conflicting past tax rulings.

• HOOVER HELPS - Former President Herbert Hoover may not know it but he can take part of the credit for Congress having passed a measure to outlaw the Communist party. It stems from the speech he made on his latest birthday in which he slapped at the Democrat party for having tolerated the infiltration of subversives into government ranks.

Democratic leaders fumed but kept comparatively quiet while laying plans to halt this type of attack on them. They moved swiftly, suddenly and drastically when the Senate took up legislation to bar Communist-infiltrated labor unions from having bargaining rights.

Senator Hubert Humphrey, a Minnesota Democrat running for re-election, introduced an amendment which would have made it a crime to be a member of the Communist party. Why go about the problem piecemeal?, he and his supporters argued.
