Bill Aimed at Alger Hiss Rare Type of Legislation U. S. Travel Expenditures May Exceed \$25 Billion!

WASHINGTON—The bill recently signed by President Eisenhower which will prevent convicted perjurer Alger Hiss from getting a federal pension is a fairly rare type of legislation but by no means

It fails of uniqueness for two reasons: 1-Although aimed primarily at Hiss, the legislation goes much farther and prevents payment of federal benefits to a wide range of other persons who commit felonies of one kind or another. 2-At least one other bill in comparatively recent his-

tory was aimed specifically at one person-and That was the so-called George bill, laid before

Congress in 1944, to make it clear that the person who sat in the late President Roosevelt's Cabinet as secretary of Commerce would not also head up the multi-billion Reconstruction Finance corpora-

Jesse Jones of Texas had headed both Commerce

However, there was violent disagreement between him and FDR and, after the 1944 elections, Mr. Roosevelt named Henry A. Wallace to take Congress was determined, because of Wallace's meager experience

in high finance, to keep him out of RFC. The George bill solved the problem as far as Capitol Hill was concerned. Wallace was confirmed as secretary of Commerce. Someone else was named to head RFC. TRAVEL MONEY-One unheralded influence that is helping busi-

ness this year is a widespread travel boom. Travel experts reveal that spending by Americans for travel this last year is running at a new all-time high. It is five to seven per cent above last year.

As a result, total expenditures this year are expected to exceed \$25 billion. That includes tickets, accommodations, hotel and restaurant charges, and other costs incidental to travel. Most of the travel is for vacation and pleasure, although a sizeable chunk is purely business. Out of the total, about eight per cent is foreign. Spending for travel abroad this year is 10 to 12 per cent above

1953, enjoying a bigger spurt than domestic travel. A basic result of the travel boom is a spectacular rise in construc-

tion of new facilities to accommodate travelers. Resort hotels and facilities are going up all over the country, and motels are springing up along all heavily-traveled traffic arteries. The trend in motels is toward the bigger and swankier projects, equipped with air-conditioning and everything that is modern. Thus, the average motel project investment has jumped sharply.

In some areas, the motel business is harassed by the construction of big toll turnpikes, which leave the motels along what used to be the main highways high and dry. However, new motels are appearing near the turnpikes.

• D. C. MOVING DAY ?-To Rep. Frazier Reams of Ohio, the community known as Washington, D. C., is "one of the most beautiful cities in the world and one of the worst governed." His solution:

Give the District of Columbia back to the state of Maryland. Reams, the only Independent in the House, points out that the executive power of the district is in the hands of commissioners appointed by the President. Congress passes all its laws and the

President appoints its judges. Reams calls this inefficient and unsatisfactory. Says System However, he admits that things weren't any better before 1874, when residents of Washington did have Unsatisfactory

the right to vote. Several types of government were tried-at one time, the district even had its own legislature and a delegate in Congress—but none-of them worked.

The Ohioan comes to this conclusion: "... No government for the District of Columbia will be satisfactory until the area is retroceded

## Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

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FARM FIRE PREVENTION

Fire is still one of the mostly costly drains on a farmer's in-

Last year, fires cost the American farmer an estimated \$139 million in property loss alone. And more than 3,000 farm people died as a result.

The week of Oct. 3-9 was designated as National Fire Prevention Week. The Texas farmer owes it to himself and his family to safeguard farm life and property.

The minimum of fire-fighting equipment on a farm should include: . An adequate supply of water available in any season of the year; approved fire extinguishers conveniently placed near all hazardous locations such as the barn, machine shed and gas and kerosene storage tanks, and a garden hose or filled water barrels and buckets strategically located.

Also needed are safe ladders long enough to rescue persons from the highest farm roof top, a back-pack pump, fire swatter, wet brooms or wet burlap bags to fight field fires.

Does all this sound overly cautious? It shouldn't! Below are nine major "hot spots" or Miss Vicki Koleber and Ralph main causes of farm fires. And every Texas farm is endangered by at least one, and probably

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
