

InsideWASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Ike's All-Out Campaign For Republican Congress See President Worrying Over Possible Demo Win

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON-President Eisenhower has apparently embarked on an all-out campaign to elect a Republican Congress, and GOP leaders are much happier than they were a short time ago.

There is increasing indication that the President is becoming more worried about the possibility of a Democratic majority in both houses next year. At first, he showed not too much concern about consequences of a split government-or felt it was his province to talk in a partisan campaign involving only congressmen. Mr. Eisenhower intended to make only a few refer-

ences to GOP contestants and concentrate on a "high-level" campaign, urging people to vote and

calling attention to his over-all program. However, the President's recent California speeches sounded a new note-and he is apparently going to make more of a fighting campaign in behalf of his party's nominees. He has also been mentioning individual candidates by name.

Thus, the President may have taken a cue from Vice President Richard M. Nixon who said the Republicans are "running scared" this year.

• DEMOTED-Though the President is rated as popular as ever with the American people, he has lost much ground with at least one organization.

The Custom Tailors Guild, in choosing its annual list of the 10 best dressed men in America, quietly dropped the chief executive from its list. However, the Guild did again include his brother, Dr. Milton Eisenhower, for top sartorial honors.

Quite discreetly, the custom tailors cited no reason for their decision. They pointed out, however, that Dr. Eisenhower and comedian Bob Hope were the only two on last year's list who are playing a return engagement in the select group

Incidentally, the choice as best dressed man in "public life"-the slot for which Ike was chosen last year-went to one of the President's earliest and staunchest supporters, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, in 1954.


· EXPENDITURES-The administration is out to make more savings in the budget-in hope of achieving a balance between income and spending, a goal long-sought but still put off to the future.

Orders, reportedly sent to all department heads, have called for drastic trimming in a drive to achieve a balanced budget. This, however, may mean a cut in jobs. The administration experts, however, hope that a big part of spending cuts can come from elimination of

many government functions which can be transferred to private firms. This drive will run into the same opposition that has already been injected into the election campaign—a charge that the government is engaging in a "give-away" of its lands, functions and know-how for benefit of private capital.

Unless there is a slash in the number of federal employes, or a drastic cutback in the government's nonmilitary functions, the only way important economies can be effected is by trimming defense. The armed services, however, find that many things-including the proposed stepped-up reserve program and develop-

ment of Atomic Age weapons-will cost more, not less. Actually, the government has cut expenditures considerably, but the budget balancing is still far away because taxes also have been reduced. No increase in taxation is looked for, so the budget must depend on control of spending.



The new loan program was made possible by legislation recently passed by the 83rd Congress. (Supervisors in 17 Western States add "which greatly expanded the water facility loan program.")

Soil and water conservation loans may be made from funds supplied by private lenders and insured by the Government or from funds appropriated by Congress. Loans from appropriated funds will be made only when insured funds are not available. Loans, either direct or insured, will only be made when the applicant is unable to obtain the credit he needs at reasonable rates and terms from other sources. The Farmers Home Administration is authorized to insure loans up to a total of \$25,000,000 each fiscal year. In addition, for fiscal 1955, the Congress appropriated \$11, 500,000 for this type of assis-

Applications for all loans, insured or direct, will be made at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration located at Lampasas, Texas.

The 3-member county committee of the Farmers Home Administration will certify the eligibility of applicants. Applications from veterans will receive preference in processing.

Loans will be made to carry out only the types of soil and water conservation practices that are in accord with the recommendations made by the Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service.

This bold stroke caught the drouth states unaware. It happened just at a time when representatives from 15 states, including Texas, were in Washington seeking to obtain a simple and more practical plan of relief for grass-starved livestock. The plan submitted by the states was turned down by aides of the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture and the rail cut was interpreted as an opportunity to reduce federal participation in the drouth program.







Agriculture Department Sets 62c As Wool Production "Incentive Price"

rantee wool growers an average average wool government will of 62 cents a pound on the 1955 not buy wool. wool clip, up 16.5 per cent from

The new "incentive price"is 106 per cent of the current cent of parity maximum allowed in the new wool act which was the support level requested by wool grower representatives.

The departement said the 62 ents a pound price "should stimulate production toward" 300 million pounds of wool a year. It also said the price is "consistent" with available wool tariff receipts which will be used to pay the subsidies.

Under the new wool act, Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. centive" price at a level between 90 and 110 per cent of parity in order to assure production of 300 million pounds of wool annually. Wool production, down 40 per cent from 1942, is currently about 230 million pounds.

The new mohair incentive price will be 70 cents a pound or 91 per cent of the current mohair parity, the department

The law allows the mohair price level to vary as much as 15 per-cent above or below the comparatives level. Last week's mohair price was near the minimum of that authorized range, though 9 per cent above the support price for the current

The wool incentive price compares with 53.2 cents a pound, 90 per cent of parity, the government is currently paying on 1954 clip wool under a loan and ourchase agreement program.

For example if the incentive price is 20 per cent above the average price, each producer's incentive payment would amount to 20 per cent of the net sale value of his wool.


Meantime, the depatment assured growers that through May, 1955, none of the 110 million pounds of wool now owned by the government will be sold at less than 103 per cent of the 1954 wool support loan rate plus sales commission.

It said this policy should assure the industry that federal wool stocks will come on the market only at prices high enough to protect growers in selling the balance of the current year's wool clip at prices above the loan rate.

The department said after May, 1955, it will "continue to follow a policy of" orderly marketing" since it will be in the interest of both the government and producers under the new wool act.


