## Army To Explain Plan For Land

### Maneuver Rights In Special Meetings

Fort Hood, (Special)—A series of meetings to which area landowners are invited to attend and which will explain the Army's plan to negotiate for maneuver rights will be held during the first week in November, Major General Thomas L. Harrold, III Corps Commanding General announced today.

A large-scale field exercise is planned for early in 1955 but before it can be held the authority to maneuver must be obtained from the landowners.

A large area through which the Army hopes to maneuver includes the counties of Kimble, Gillespie, Mason, Llano, McCulloch, San Saba, Mills, Lampasas, Burnet, Coryell and a small portion of Hamilton.

All meetings are scheduled to start at 1:30 p.m. They will be held in Killeen and Brady on November 2; in Gatesville, Burnet and Lampasas on November 3; and in San Saba, Llano and Mason on November 4. In Lampasas, Burnet, Mason, San Saba, Brady, and Llano the meetings will be held in the District Court Rooms of these counties. The Gatesville meeting will be held in the Gatesville Hotel, and Killeen the meeting will be held in the American Hotel.

The meetings have been set in these cities in order to cover the number of miles landowners may have to travel. Information disseminated at each meeting will be the same, and landowners may at-

## Parcels To Armed Forces Overseas Must Be Mailed Before November 1

Patrons are again advised and cautioned to mail their parcels for members of the Armed Forces overseas before November 1, if they are to be delivered by Christmas, it was announced this week by Lucile Fairman, postmaster.

Parcels to be mailed to Korea, Japan and the Islands of the Pacific should be mailed not later than November 1, and those to be sent to members of the Navy and Marines serving in more distant lands should be mailed much earlier

if they are to reach their destinations in good condition and by Christmas.

Greeting cards should always be mailed with first class postage or Airmail postage and must be mailed before December 1, to be delivered by Christmas.

Be sure to check with your local post office for the correct weights, size and preparation of these parcels for mailing to withstand the long sea voyage, customs and other formalities they must undergo in the countries of their destinations.

## State Capitol News

Austin, Tex.—Widespread interest is gradually being developed in the 11 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted on at the general election, November 2.

No organized opposition has appeared against any of the proposals. However, campaigns are being pushed for several of them.

Reports from over the state indicate somewhat of a draw between active support of various amendments and a general tendency to vote against some or all of them because the proposals are not understood or because of some question as to the results of writing such changes into the Constitution.

Amendments are discussed here in order in which they will appear on the ballot.

### SJR NO. 7

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 authorizes the Legislature to increase State spending for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children, by \$7,000,000 a year.

Comments from some members of the Legislature and other people familiar with the program indicate that if the Legislature appropriates the additional money, new taxes will be required.

Some say that most of the money would be used to add more people to the rolls, rather than providing more money to these now on the rolls.

This amendment also would require the Legislature to enact laws making names of those who receive such aid available to the public. These are fighting words to some people who claim such action would embarrass those now on the rolls and their relatives.

Proponents of this provision argue no one should be embarrassed except those who have children or relatives well able to support them, and that these people ought to be exposed.

### SJR NO. 6

Senate Joint Resolution No. 6, permits a person who has served some time as a teacher

and accumulated credits under the Teachers' Retirement System, and also some time as a State employee, with credits under the State Employees' Retirement System, to count his accumulated credits under both systems in determining his retirement pay.

Apparently but few people would be affected. However some opposition is being expressed by members of both retirement systems to the idea of intermingling the two systems in any way.

### HJR NO. 37

House Joint Resolution No. 37, provides that proprietary employees of the States' subdivisions may be covered by Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance.

Other municipal and county employees may now be covered under that system under an agreement between the State and the Federal Government, and in many cases has been.

But the Attorney General has ruled that the State has no authority to make an agreement covering proprietary employees with out a constitutional amendment.

### SJR NO. 10

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10, would create a State Building Commission with broad authority, subject to Legislative direction, to erect buildings for State purposes.

A State Building Fund would be created by transferring to it the surplus from the Confederate Pension Fund.

The present 2c ad valorem tax provided by the Constitution, for Confederate pensions, returns far more than is necessary to take care of the one Confederate veteran and more than four hundred widows of veterans now receiving such pensions from the State. Therefore the fund is accumulating a surplus of well over \$6,000,000 each year.

It is anticipated that if the amendment is adopted, nearly \$3,000,000 will be available for transfer to the new State Building Fund in January of 1955.

This amendment has the support of the State Bar of Texas.

The first building, if the proposal is adopted, must be a State Supreme Court Building and it must be dedicated as a memorial to Texans who served in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

See No Clear-Cut Issue On State of Economy Eyes Are On Buckeye Election for Senator

WASHINGTON—It appears that neither Republicans or Democrats will have a clear-cut issue on the state of the nation's economy, come Nov. 2—election day.

On the other hand, Democrats are using unemployment and a decline in farm income as their talking points.

The conclusion, from a political standpoint, appears to be a standoff. However, the Democrats may benefit from the situation because its axiomatic that those who protest go to the polls and those who are satisfied are inclined to stay home.

● EYE ON BUCKEYE—Political observers looking for trends are keeping their eyes on Ohio. The Buckeye State has not elected a Democrat as United States senator in 20 years.

With the Democrats winning the governorship in normally Republican Maine, the minority party would consider an Ohio victory a real triumph.

The Democrats in Ohio have a strong candidate. He is Senator Thomas Burke, the incumbent. His GOP opponent is Rep. George Bender.

Political experts believe that Burke will need the backing of a strong Democratic tide if he is to return to the United States Senate.

● WINDFALLS—Since the disclosure of scandals in the Federal Housing administration, FHA Boss Norman P. Mason has been getting all sorts of mail. One letter from Louisiana was priceless.

Mason says it was written in "a shaky handwriting, suggesting that the man who wrote it was advanced in years—or covering up his identity." It read:

"Sir—I've been reading about windfalls in the paper. I would like to build about a \$10,000 house and get about a \$2,500 windfall. Please send me instructions how to do this."

Mason said the man signed his name, gave his address and then added the following: "P.S.—Never mind building the house. Just send me the windfall \$2,500."

After reading the letter, Mason wondered whether his hard fight to clean up the FHA is making much headway—at least as far as the home folk are concerned.

● DRAFT SQUABBLE—You can look for a big battle in Congress next year over the administration's proposal to extend the draft law and set up a stronger system of military reserves.

The draft question, with its direct effect on the nation's voters, always provides a lot of fireworks in the House and Senate. This year won't be any exception, despite the turbulent world situation.

After long and heated debate, however, Congress probably will go ahead and extend the selective service law for another year. It is also expected to adopt the new reserve proposal.

The administration's plan, given top legislative priority for next year by President Eisenhower, would compel men leaving the armed forces to join active reserve units.

## LIVESTOCK MARKET NEWS SERVICE

A new market reporting service on livestock auction rings in West Texas will be inaugurated by the Texas Department of Agriculture in Mid-November.

The auction sales report will cover activities at 16 livestock sales each week. Eleven cities in West Texas will be represented on the report.

This new service resulted from a demand from the livestock trade for recognition in the auction ring. Reporting of auction sales in Texas is a comparatively new feature on a state-wide basis. Amarillo was the first to be reported when a similar service was begun early last spring. Previously, the auction sales received only local publicity.

The Texas Market News Service will distribute sales information throughout the state through radio and newspaper coverage. West Texas points where sales will be reported are: San Angelo, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Vernon, Brownwood, Lubbock, Goldthwaite, Lamesa, Colorado City, Eastland and Big Spring.

Mall bulletins will be available to those who request the service. In addition to the auction markets, the bulletins will carry activities at the livestock centers in Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston and Kansas City.

Livestock auction reporting is one of many services offered by Texas Market News, a branch of the State Department of Agriculture. The division also reports prices on poultry and eggs, fruits and vegetables, rice, pecans and turkeys.

Persons interested in the livestock bulletin are advised to address their request to John C. White, Commissioner, Texas Dept. of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin.

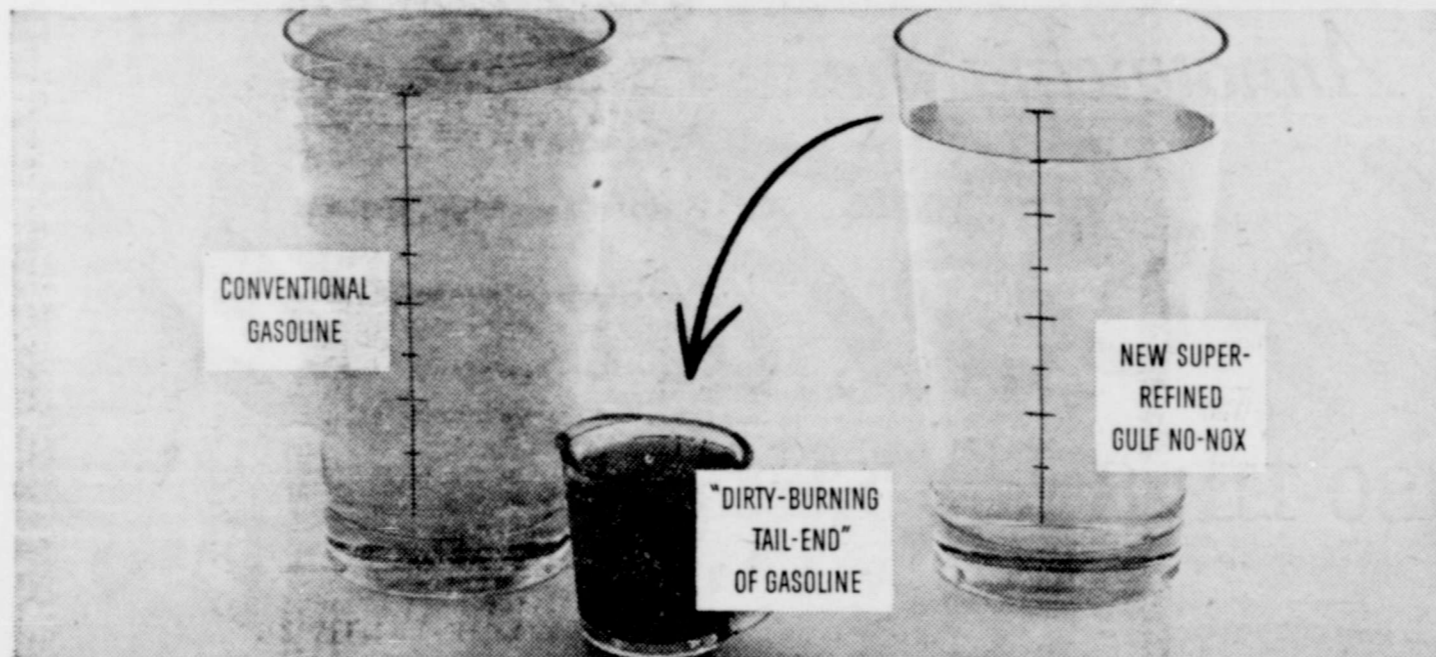

Pvt. Mosier entered the Army last June.

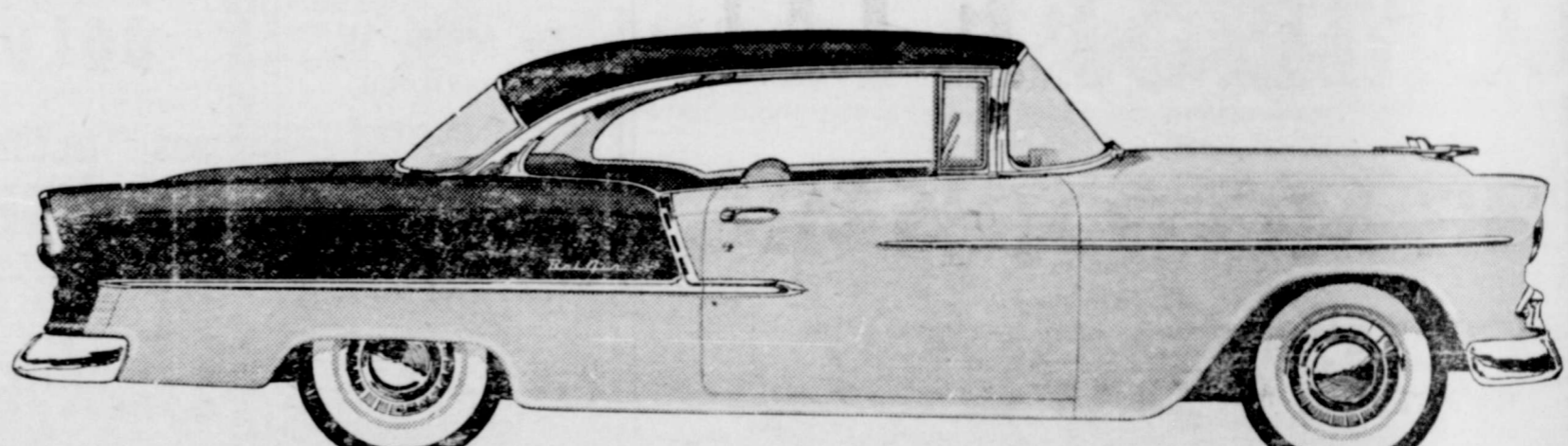

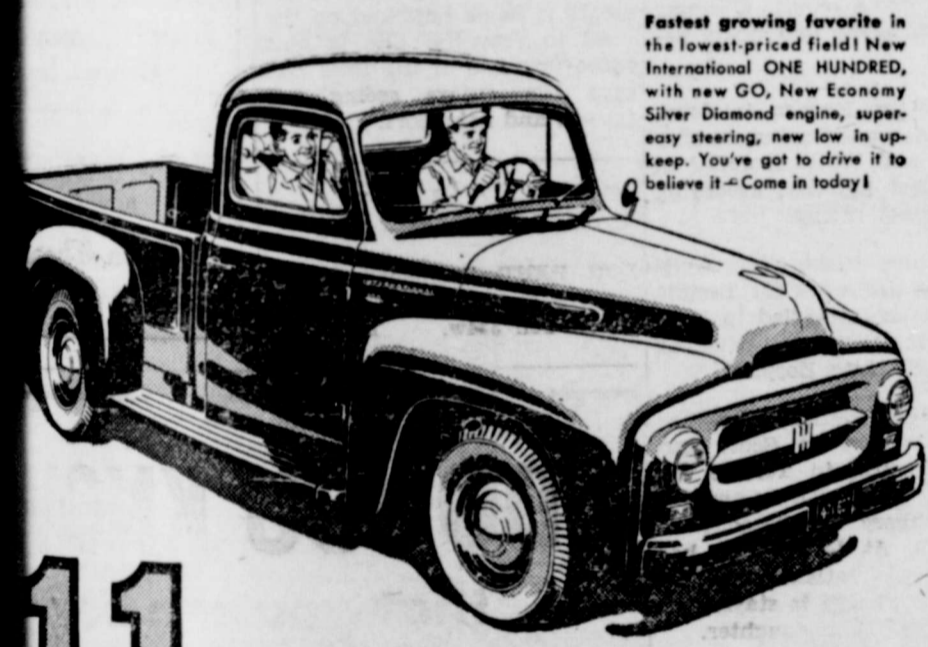

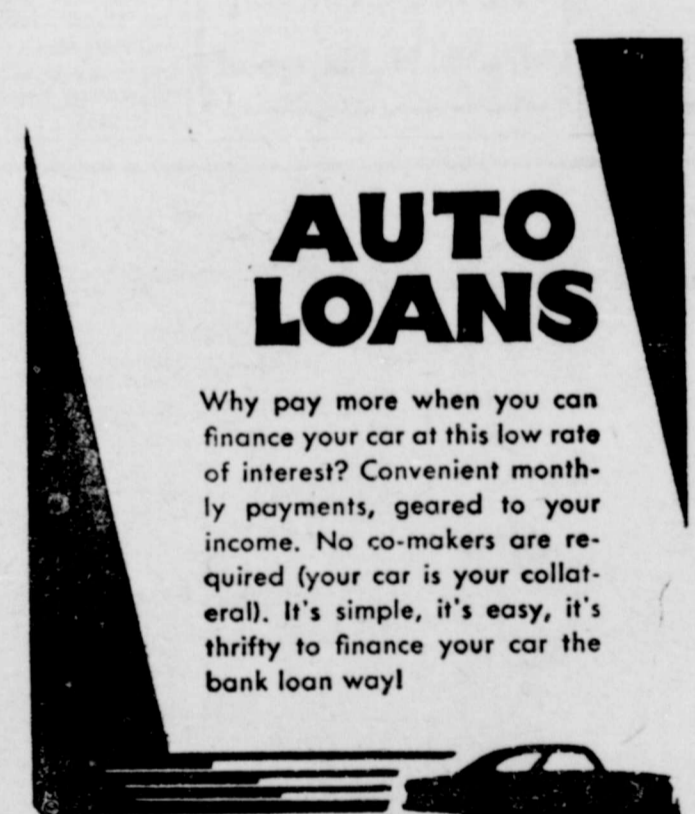

of members of the Legislature to \$25 per day for the first 120 days of any session.
Texas Constitution now provides \$10 per day for the first 120 days and \$5 per day thereafter.
There is strong support and little or no opposition to this increase in pay, which most people think would about cover legislators living expenses while in Austin.
Included in the same amendment is authority for the Legislature to set salaries of the Governor, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Secretary of State, and Commissioner of the General Land Office.
The Governor's salary is now set by the Constitution at \$12,000, the Attorney General's at \$10,000, and the other four officials involved are paid \$6,000 a year.
Under this amendment the Legislature could not reduce salaries below these amounts, but could set them at higher rates.
Opinion does not appear to be so nearly unanimous about this part of the proposed amendment. Some people are troubled by the apparent power of the Legislature to change the salaries at will, and they

point out that the Federal Constitution and many other state constitutions prohibit a change in salary during the term to which an official has been elected.

SJR NO. 14
Senate Joint Resolution No. 14, prohibits use of the credit of the State or any grant of public money for construction, maintenance or operation of toll roads and turnpikes.
Purpose of this amendment is to write into the Constitution a prohibition now contained in the law, but which could be changed by future legislation.
It has the support of the Texas Good Roads Association and many other people particularly interested in the State Highway System, and no known opposition.

HJR NO. 16
House Joint Resolution No. 16, would require women to serve on juries.
There are only five states including Texas which do not permit jury service by women.
This amendment would require women to serve under the same rules for jury service as apply to men. It has the active support of many women's organizations.

SJR NO. 4
Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, has to do with the terms of elective district, county and precinct offices. It would change all of those which have two-year terms into four-year terms.
It has the support of the County Judges and Commissioners Associations of the state, and the organizations of many other county officials.
The terms of a great number of district, county and precinct offices would be changed immediately if this amendment were adopted. Other such offices are designated to change

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

The Texas Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors is having a meeting in Waco Thursday, October 28th (today). All persons interested in the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Program has been invited to attend.

to four-year terms in 1956 so that, while all of them would be four-year terms after 1956, only about half of them would appear on the ballot every two years.

Wording of this proposal has resulted in confusion as to its effect on the terms of representatives in the Legislature. Many lawyers are of the opinion that the proposal would require four-year terms for members of the House and other lawyers have said that at least it presents a problem which can only be solved by court interpretation.

SJR NO. 2
Senate Joint Resolution No. 2, would authorize creation of county wide hospital districts in Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Harris, Jefferson and Tarrant Counties.

The amendment is premissive and, if adopted, would not create any such districts itself. It simply provides that the property-owning taxpayers of the named counties can vote on such a proposal at a later date.
An active campaign for this proposal is being carried on by a statewide committee composed of mayors, county judges, members of hospital boards, and prominent citizens of the counties involved and some from other parts of the state.

HJR NO. 10
Members of the armed forces of the United States or component branches would be allowed to vote under House Joint Resolution No. 10.

They would be required to pay their poll taxes and could vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

HJR NO. 8
The last proposal on the ballot will be House Joint Resolution No. 8, which is a permissive type of amendment allowing taxpayers in counties of less than ten thousand inhabitants to vote on the question of whether they would prefer to have a separate fulltime office of tax assessor-collector.
Duties of the tax assessor-collector are now performed by the Sheriff in these counties.

The purpose of the meeting will be to discuss the problems involved in applying such a watershed program. Last September 28th, application for planning assistance on the Bennett Creek Watershed was submitted by the District Supervisors, County Commissioners Court, and the Goldthwaite Lions Club to the State Soil Conservation Board.

J. H. Priddy, David Watters, John L. Patterson, Jim Soules, and Norman Duren plan to attend this meeting. Information concerning this type of program will be discussed.
