
Howard Hoover extends an invitation to folks from this area to visit their show rooms and see the new models.

Local Markets To Be Included In Auction Sales Report By Department

Livestock auction ring sales in Mills County are a feature of a new state-wide market report now issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture at Austin.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White selected 16 auction sales in eight West Texas cities for the experimental news project. Data from the sales will be distributed by radio and newspapers. Daily bulletins are available to interested persons.

West Texas points covered in the report are: Lubbock, San Angelo, Abilene, Eastland, Brownwood, Wichita Falls, Vernon and Goldthwaite. Reports will include sale information on cattle, hogs, sheep and goats.

Midland Man Is Held Here After Priddy Business Houses Burglarized

A 38 year old Midland man is being held in Mills County jail on a burglary charge. Bond has been set at \$5,000.00, in Justice of the Peace court. He was picked up by officers, early Tuesday morning after he had entered Marwitz Drug Store in which the U. S. Post Office is also housed, at Priddy, Texas.

He was surprised by the owner of the establishment, who made a trip to the store about 2:30 a.m., while working on the knob of the post office safe. Mr. Marwitz immediately called Mills County sheriff, C. F. Stubblefield who alerted officers in surrounding counties. The man was

picked up shortly afterwards and brought here.

According to Sheriff Stubblefield the man, who has previously served three terms in the state penitentiary, also burglarized seven Priddy business establishments last Sunday night. From reports money and tools were taken from these establishments.

Brownwood police officers and members of the sheriffs' departments of Comanche, Hamilton, Lampassas and San Saba counties were alerted and took part in road blocks with Mills County officers after the matter was reported.

Rainfall measuring from three to seven inches covered most of the Mills County area last Sunday, according to reports from various sections of the county.

Rain started falling in Goldthwaite at 4:00 a.m. and continued until nearly one o'clock in the afternoon. Official report shows Goldthwaite received 3.11 inches. This brings the total for November to 3.96 inches.

Big Valley Community reported a five inch rain while Chappel Hill community reported 3.8 inches and Star 4.3 inches.

Center City reported six inches while the community about six miles East of Goldthwaite on the old Center City highway reported seven inches.

Reports from the Priddy area showed they received two and three-quarter inches of rainfall.

Only area reporting light rainfall is that of Ebony and the extreme western part of the county. Ebony received one half inch according to reports.

Mollie reported 4.5 inches and Scallorn near 6 inches while Ridge reported 1.60 inches.

News About Social Security

Over 2 million additional farm and ranch workers are brought under social security beginning January 1, 1955.

HIRE FARM AND RANCH WORKERS
 A person employed on a farm or ranch, or who works in any other kind of agricultural enterprise (except the production of gum naval stores) after 1954 will get social security credit for his work for each farm or ranch operator who pays him \$100.00 or more cash wages in a year. Under the old law, only regular full-time farm work could be counted.

The Austin social security office has a new pamphlet explaining this added feature of the 1954 Amendments to the social security Administration, Austin, Texas and ask for your free copy of pamphlet "Farm Families."





Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH

At the last regular meeting of the Brown Mills Soil Conservation District Supervisors, J. H. Priddy was elected chairman to serve for the coming year. The new Vice-Chairman will be W. H. Hancock and G. G. Goss will serve as Secretary.

The water problem in Texas can be summed up this way: there's enough water in the state even if it doubled its population next year, but the Gulf of Mexico gets most of it.

Naturally, rain is the original source of water, but for practical purposes here are the three sources: (1) underground water, the kind you drill for and pump out; (2) surface water, the water that leaves your land and runs down the stream; and (3) the rain that falls on your land and stays there.

The underground water supply is an unknown factor, but the supply is not unlimited as in the case of oil. As for surface water a lot more is known about that. By surface water, you understand, is meant the water

that flows down the streams, not the water that soaks into your ground, especially ground that has been conditioned with legumes.

Texas uses about 7,700,000 acre feet of water a year, according to reports of the Reclamation Bureau for 1952, of which 3,700,000 is under ground water, and 4,000,000 from surface water.

How much surface water do we have? Normally the rivers of Texas discharge 53 million acre-feet into the Gulf each year. Not all this is available to Texas and we know too that the discharge in drouth years is much below this average. The fact remains however, that a lot of water goes into the Gulf of Mexico each year that could be put to beneficial use.

Naturally nobody supposes all this water will ever be used or should be, and if it were, the mouths of the rivers of Texas would be awfully dry. But nonetheless Texas has enough water—but Texans don't.




