



When such press conferences will begin neither Hagerty nor other members of the White House staff will venture to make any guess. However, that it will be well in advance of the next presidential election is regarded as a certainty by those in position to speak with authority

The advisability of broadcasting and televising the presidential press conferences has been debated by White House advisors and Republican leaders since President Eisenhower was swept into office in 1952. In this way, it was felt, the party could best cash in on his great personal popularity

A favorable decision has been held up by technical and political considerations. The industry, fully aware of the benefits it will derive from this radical innovation, is confident it can solve all of the technical problems. The television cameras are silent, but those of the newsreels make a lot of noise. The present plan is to conceal these cameras behind slits in the wall.

The industry expects soon to produce a micro-James C. Hagerty phone no bigger than a matchbox. Hidden on his desk and with nothing to obstruct his view, it is

thought that President Eisenhower will then be able to talk in the casual, intimate, informal manner in which he always appears at his bes!

Republican leaders have given the political considerations the most careful study. The possible advantages and disadvantages have been weighed from every angle.

"IF THE PRESS CONFERENCES are televised," says Hagerty, "there'd always be the danger that the national committee-be it Democratic or Republican-might plant certain questions to be asked. Knewing that these conferences would be televised, there would be this temptation. There would be the possibility of turning the press conferences into political circuses-and that would be highly undesirable.

What effect will televised press conferences have on the newspaper representatives, knowing their every word and action will be observed by millions, including the publishers who pay their salaries?

The President now enjoys the most pleasant relations with the Washington correspondents, including the representatives of his most partisan opponents. Will television in any way change these press relations

While Hagerty made no mention of these considerations, others have raised the question of the possibility of some of the now anony. mous White House correspondents developing into actors for television and radio. Will any of them be tempted, as have some politicians, to "ham it up" before the cameras and microphones? . .

A CAREFULLY PLANNED and complex operation is behind every broadcast of the chief executive. "The networks have a committee of haison men in Washington, with a new chairman every three months," Hagerty points out. "I keep him informed of important White House events to be covered either live or by tape or news-Networks and

reel and tell him what day and hour we would like reserved for us. I give him from one to three weeks' White House notice, except in emergencies."

The network men then contact their home offices Co-operate and find out what time the chains have available. Then the White House makes its choice.

"We haven't as yet hit on a workable formula for handling the press conferences," Hagerty concludes. "However, in view of the meny technological advances being made, we shall. In fact, some of the President's answers to questions of White House reporters are actually on the air today. The fact is that we have released more tepe recordings of the President's spoken words to radio and telecision than any other administration."

Gathering eggs at least three times a day is a necessary practice in the production of top quality. The longer eggs stay in the nest after they are laid, the more they deteriorate. Commercial producers often collect eggs at 10 a.m., 12 and again at 4 p.m.






