Cotton Growers Vote On Marketing Quotas On Tuesday December 14th

Tuesday, December 14, is the day cotton growers will decide whether marketing quotas will continue in effect on the 1955 cotton crop. C. K. McCan, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers. "This is a decision that will affect every cotton grower, and that's why it's so important that each one cast his ballot," the Chairman says. All farmers who grew upland cotton in 1954 will be eligible to vote in the upland cotton referendum.

The referendum will be held in each upland cotton-growing county in the Nation. At least two-thirds of the growers voting

by secret ballot must approve the quotas if they are to continue in effect.

The vote follows the Secretary of Agriculture's proclamation, on October 14, of a national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for the 1955 crop of upland cotton. Such a proclamation must be made under the law. Mr. McCan explains, when the prospective "total supply" of cotton exceeds the "normal supply."

The total supply of upland cotton for the 1954-55 marketing year was estimated in October at 215 million running bales, more than 3.8 million bales above the normal supply of 17.7 million bales. With the supply this large, the Secretary of Agriculture was required by law to establish the national marketing quota at the minimum of 10 million bales.

The large cotton stocks available this year are due principally to a large carryover on August 1, 1954, resulting from the large 1953 crop of 16.3 million bales—the fourth largest of record.

Under a marketing quota program, growers who do not exceed their cotton acreage allotments may market free of penalty the entire production of cotton on the farm; growers who exceed their farm cotton allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 percent of parity on the farm's excess production.

If farmers approve quotas by the necessary two-thirds of those voting, the price support available to eligible growers will be at a level between 82 1/2 and 90 percent of parity. If more than one-third of the farmers voting do not approve quotas, the maximum level of support to eligible growers for 1955-crop cotton will be 50 percent of parity.

There will be a box at Priddy where Community E or Priddy Community will vote. All other communities will vote at the Courthouse in Goldthwaite.

The Polls will open at 9:00 A. M. and close at 6:00 P. M.

Army Engineers Announce Plans For Fence Repair Teams For Maneuvers

FORT HOOD, (Spec.)—The III Corps Engineer section has announced plans for fence repair teams which will be utilized during the maneuver to be held early in 1955.

Company "D" of the 16th Armored Engineer Battalion of the 1st Armored Division has been designed as the nucleus for the fence repair teams. The company will serve as headquarters, supply and administration for the operation.

It is planned to have 3-man working teams with each tactical

Company and to have a 5-man team with each tactical battalion.

The job of each team will be to cut fence and allow tanks, trucks, jeeps etc. to pass through, then to repair the fence on the spot. After the necessary repairs are made an officer will inspect, and notify the land owner.

Postmaster Issues Information On Mail For Christmas Holidays

Postmaster Lucile Fairman believes that with a three-cent stamp your Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people than if they are mailed with two-cent stamps.

"First-class postage," she explained, "is the best Yuletide insurance you can get. With it your greetings will be processed and delivered quicker. And they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it is necessary. This eliminates any worry about whether or not your cards were received. Your own return address on the envelope will help others keep their address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards sent with three-cent stamps may have written messages enclosed, — a custom which we all enjoy."

None of these postal privileges are authorized at the third-class rates. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 3/4" X 4" or larger than 9" X 12" require cancellation by

hand and must carry first-class postage.

Postmaster Fairman urges everyone to tie their Christmas cards in two separate bundles with the addresses facing the same way. Then attach labels marked "ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR OUT-OF-TOWN DELIVERY." These helpful tags are available at the Post Office without cost, and will shorten delivery time greatly.

Parcel post, of course, should be mailed even earlier. The Postmaster recommends December 5 for out-of-state gifts, and December 10 for those with local addresses. But the sooner the better.

Size and weight limitation for parcel post vary according to the place of mailing and destination. In some cases, packages can't exceed 72 inches in length and girth combined, nor 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits are up to 100 inches combined length and girth and up to 70 pounds in weight.

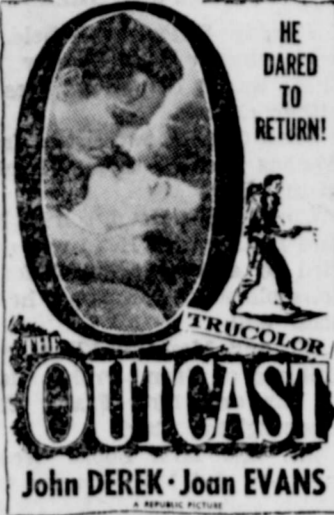

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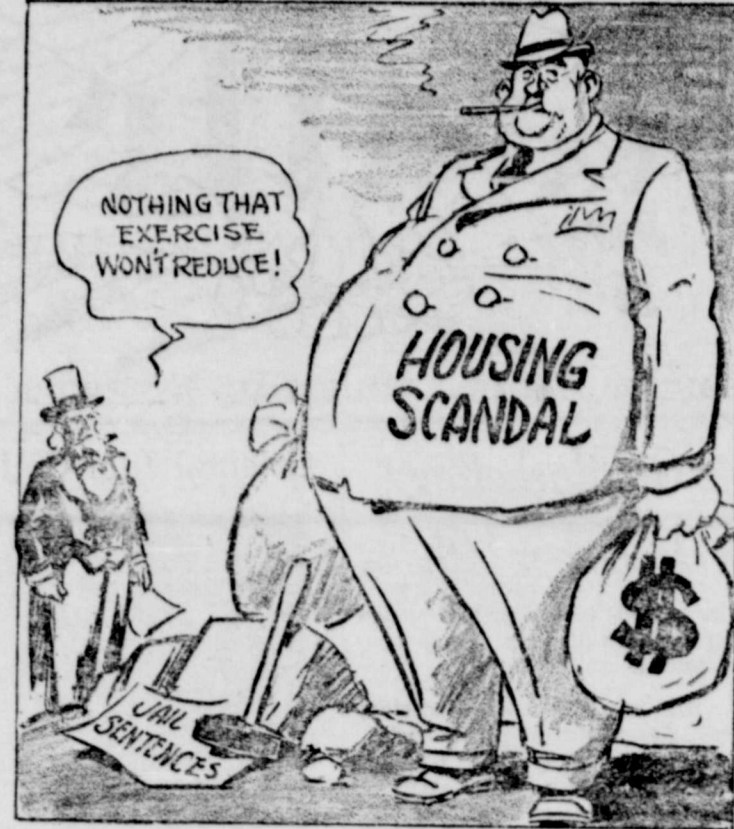

Santa Claus Unpopular At FHA This Season

Chief Issues Statement: No Gifts or Gratuities

Special to Central Press WASHINGTON—Santa Claus will do well to stay away from the Federal Housing administration this year. FHA is making it exceedingly clear that old St. Nick may get the door slammed in his face if he shows up at Christmas with a bagful of gifts for FHA employees.

Not only must all FHA staff members turn down gifts and gratuities under pain of possible job suspension but FHA Commissioner Norman P. Mason says the firms offering the gifts may be banished from the program.

Mason outlined this policy in a recent letter, telling all employees that they "may not, under any circumstances, accept any gift or gratuity, regardless of the value, from persons or firms having official business with the administration."

The FHA commissioner's decision stemmed from charges during the Senate investigation of the agency that real estate interests frequently gave FHA employees gifts ranging from television sets to nylons.

Mason said there will be "no compromise between gifts 'all right to accept' and gratuities wrong to accept." His advice to subordinates: "Don't accept anything."

U. S. APPROVAL MAY LEAD—The United States may be the first of the "Big Three" powers to ratify the momentous Paris agreements signed Oct. 16.

President Eisenhower speeded up the process by deciding to submit the pacts to the special November session of the Senate. While no effort will be made to get the Senate to act before the new Congress meets in January, time will be saved because the Senate foreign relations committee will have the intervening weeks to study the agreements.

With this head start, the committee may be able to complete its work so that the pacts will be ready for Senate floor action early in January. The ratification process in France and Britain is expected to be delayed longer. West Germany likely will act ahead of them, since the pacts give West Germans virtually complete sovereignty as well as bringing them into the North Atlantic Defense set-up.

IKE DISLIKES—The all-out Republican attack made upon W. Averell Harriman, Democratic candidate for governor in New York, during the closing days of the campaign, is reported to have incurred President Eisenhower's displeasure. An associate of the President reports that the chief executive made known his feelings during a trip to New York City prior to the election.

The attacks upon Harriman were made by the Republican gubernatorial nominee, Senator Irving Ives, and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey. The charges involved some of Harriman's financial transactions of 25 to 30 years ago.

According to Mr. Eisenhower's associate, the President commented that he believed campaigns should be more concerned with the issues than with personal attacks on opposing candidates.

HURRICANES—The Weather Bureau's chief forecaster, E. M. Vernon, reports that the practice of calling hurricanes by the names of girls may be changed because of the fury of some women. Vernon says the matter of names will be up for discussion at the bureau's annual conference on the reporting of hurricanes which will be held early next year at Miami, Fla.

According to Vernon, "some people are indignant" about using female names for hurricanes of violence that cause death and destruction. On the other hand, he admits that other people feel that the use of women's names is a good idea.

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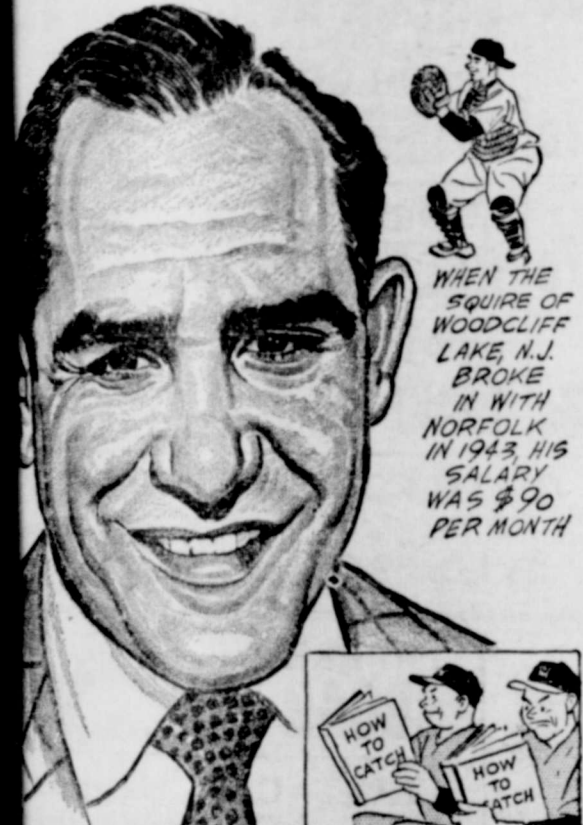

Emergency Feed For Breeding Ewes Proves Satisfactory In Experiments

COLLEGE STATION.— Pricklypears, singed and chopped, and supplemented with alfalfa hay and cottonseed meal proved satisfactory as an emergency ration for ewes. This conclusion was reached by research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station after a 213-day drylot feeding trial at the Sonora station, beginning in September 1953 and ending in April 1954.

One hundred Rambouillet ewes were divided into five equal lots for the trial. Other emergency roughage rations which also proved satisfactory, the ewes were bred and lambd successfully, included three parts ground cotton gin trash and two parts alfalfa hay and fed with molasses and supplemented with cottonseed meal or a combination of cottonseed meal and urea. Alfalfa hay fed alone and a

combination of Johnsongrass hay, alfalfa hay and cotton seed also were satisfactory rations.

Because sheep cannot easily get the large leaves of pear in their mouths, and too, there is some danger of their developing the "pear eating" habit, the singed pear were chopped before being fed.

The ewes were fed a daily ration of 34 of a pound of alfalfa hay; 11.49 pounds of singed chopped pricklypear and 35 pound of cottonseed meal. The feed cost for 100 ewes on this ration figured \$3.92 a day. This compares with \$6.52 for those receiving alfalfa hay alone; \$5.51 for those getting gin trash, alfalfa hay, cottonseed meal and molasses; \$5.38 for the lot fed alfalfa hay, gin trash, cottonseed meal molasses and urea and \$6.33 for the lot getting alfalfa and Johnsongrass hay and cottonseed.

The research workers conclude that several roughages or roughage combinations properly supplemented can be used to maintain breeding ewes. The price factor, they add, and the convenience of feeding should be considered in determining the ration to be used.

Egg Producers 1955 Outlook

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)— The outlook for 1955 is favorable for egg producers who sell on a graded market. But with expected lower seasonal prices, many backyard poultrymen may reduce or curtail production next year.

Based on the price prospects and trends in recent months, the natural tendency of farmers will be to raise fewer replacement chicks in 1955, says John G. McHaney, extension agriculture economist.

Production for the first six months of 1955 is already "made" by the number of hens and pullets now on farms. After mid-1955, the volume of eggs largely depends upon the number of chicks started during the first half and saved for replacement.

Eggs will be plentiful during the first half of 1955, even more so than now, McHaney predicts. Prices paid to producers in March and April may drop below the levels of the same months in '54, but can be expected to improve again in the fall of 1955.

A four percent increase in egg production this year in Texas has not kept pace with production in other regions but

there's no cause for a high percentage reduction of layers on farms in areas where graded markets are available, the economist says.

A group of self-employed professional people make up a part of the 10 million more persons who can begin earning social security protection as of January 1, 1955.

People who work for themselves in a professional capacity (excluding lawyers, physicians, dentists, osteopaths, veterinarians, chiropractors, naturopaths, and optometrists) now have social security coverage on the same basis as a person self-employed in a trade or business.

Specifically, these newly covered categories include professional engineers, architects, accountants and funeral directors.

What you should do if your work was brought under social security by the 1954 Amendments and you do not have a social security card, is ask your local postmaster for an application (Form SS-5) fill it out in typewriter or ink, sign the application, and mail to the Social Security Administration, Post Office Box 1149, Austin, Texas. The Austin office can also replace misplaced or lost cards. Just ask them for a duplicate.

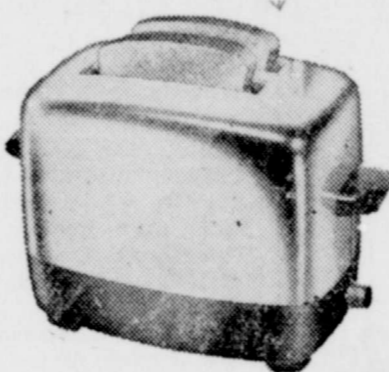
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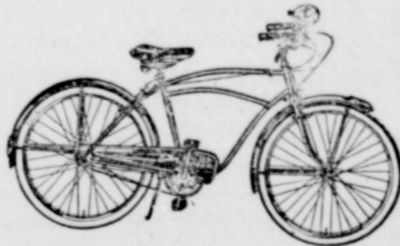

It is of little concern to the people of El Paso, Dr. Callero, noted historian, says the average rainfall here is 5 in. Here do not expect rain. Dr. Callero says Juarez is the original Paso Del Norte—the Pass of the North. In 1959 it will be 300 years old.

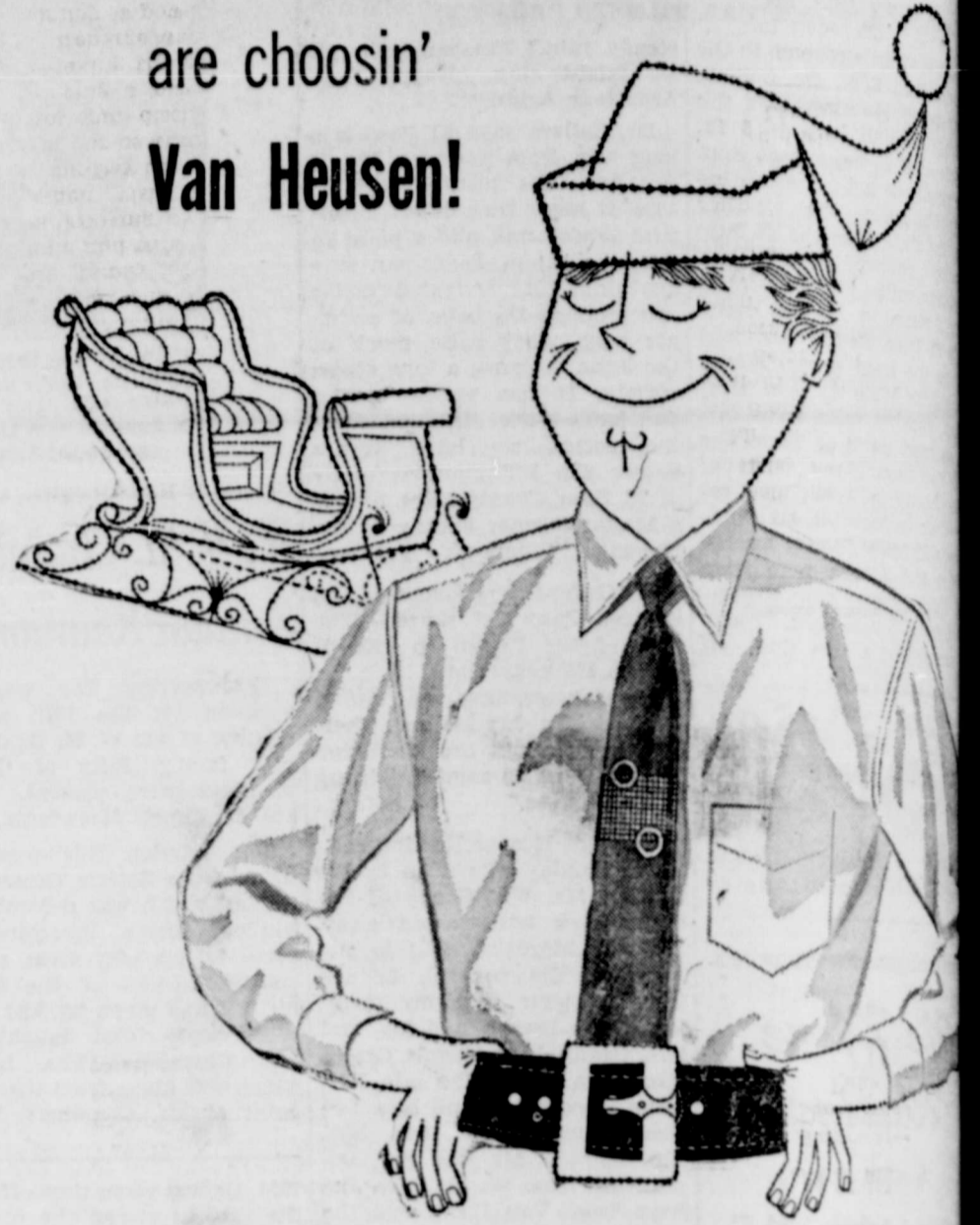

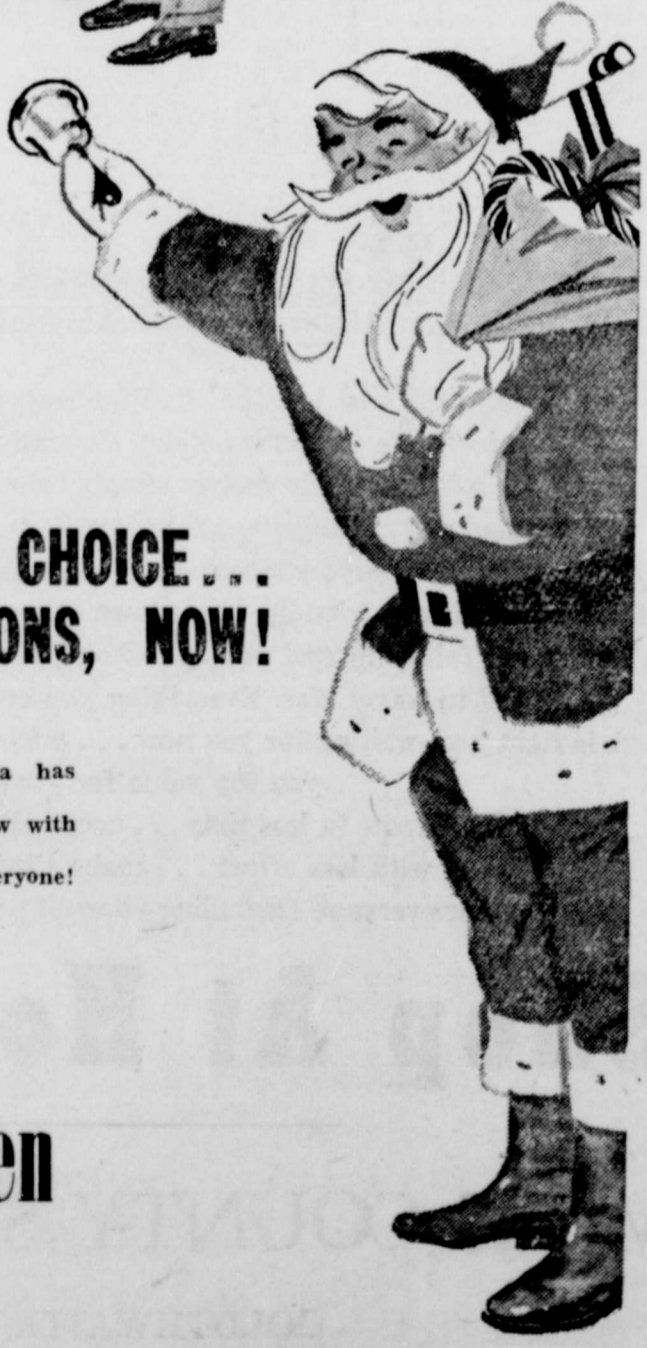
