Lt. Col. Baughan Tells Lions Of Maneuver Claims Settlements

Lt. Col. Baughan of the First Armoured Division of Fort Hood, Texas, told members of the Lions club and their guests that it is the plan of the army that no one shall suffer any loss as a result of the maneuvers planned for this area during the month of February, 1955.

He said that one thousand men are being trained in fence building at the present time with the assistance of civilian advice. These crews will be in charge of making repairs while the 28,000 troops take part in maneuvers covering approximately 12 counties, or an area 50 miles wide and 100 miles long.

A three member claims committee will be stationed in each county so that claims can be made and processed promptly, Col. Baughan stated.

While the actual maneuvers will be conducted from February 2-28 permits are being secured from January 15th, through March 15th. This is necessary for engineering work that must be done in advance and taking care of details after the test.

MARCH OF EVENTS

President to Concentrate On Our Foreign Policy | Diplomatic Post Changes Seen First on Agenda

WASHINGTON—Now that the elections are over, you can expect President Eisenhower to concentrate on foreign policy. Domestic issues will be sidetracked, for instance, until the President can get a better idea of how they will be treated by the Democratic-controlled 84th Congress.

Mr. Eisenhower's first move on the foreign policy front will be to make some diplomatic changes, particularly in the Far East, where he feels some shoring up is necessary.

John Sherman Cooper, the Kentucky senator defeated for re-election by Alben Barkley, seems a certainty for the post of ambassador to India. The President admires Cooper greatly, realizes the New Delhi post requires a man of his intellectual stature and liberal reputation.

Former Army Chief of Staff Gen. J. Lawton Collins is expected to become United States ambassador to Vietnam, where the problem is to keep this casualty of the Indochinese war from going Communist. Collins has already been sent to Vietnam by Mr. Eisenhower to survey its needs.

There may also be a replacement for United States Ambassador to Japan John Allison, and John E. Peurifoy has already been picked as envoy to Thailand.

COLOR—Mamie Eisenhower has yet to decide on the interior colors of the Gettysburg, Pa., home to which she and the President hope to retire some day. However, she told friends the other day that the color of her bedroom presents no problem "because it is always the same color—green."

This was a surprise to some, who thought the color would probably be the same as her favorite hue for dresses—pink. The First Lady said there are still too many carpenters and other workmen around for her to give serious thought to the colors of the other rooms at this time. She said also that she wants to "go slowly" and be sure of all her decisions.

As to furniture, it will be largely a process of "screening" and weeding out what the Eisenhowers have acquired over the years, with possible additions here and there.

Work on renovating the home is not at the point where it is likely the President and his wife can spend Christmas there this year.

UNDERGROUND HISTORY—The Smithsonian Institution reports that much of America's past is buried under its soil and can be uncovered only by skilled archaeologists. The government-operated museum says, for example, that interesting details of colonial life are being uncovered in excavations at Williamsburg, Va.

Thousands of pieces of clay pipes have been found, the Smithsonian says, explaining that "it seems to have been the custom in every household to place in the hallway near the front door a rack full of pipes."

Its report continued: "A guest, as he entered, was supposed to take one and before filling it with tobacco and lighting up, to break off an inch or more of the long, slender stem. In this way, the same pipe could be used by different persons, each of whom would be certain of a clean end to place in his mouth."

The excavations have shed light also on the drinking habits of Williamsburg, a colonial capital which has been restored to its original features and beauty.

The evidence is that the colonials quaffed their wine or ale from glass goblets rather than from mugs or tankards. Fragments of wine glasses show that the goblets were highly ornamental and of such wide variety as to make dining room cupboards eye-filling attractions.

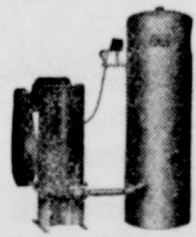

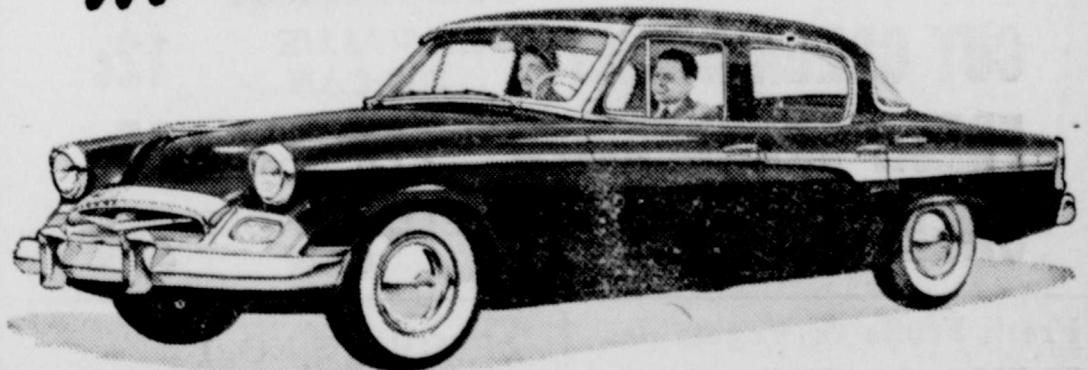

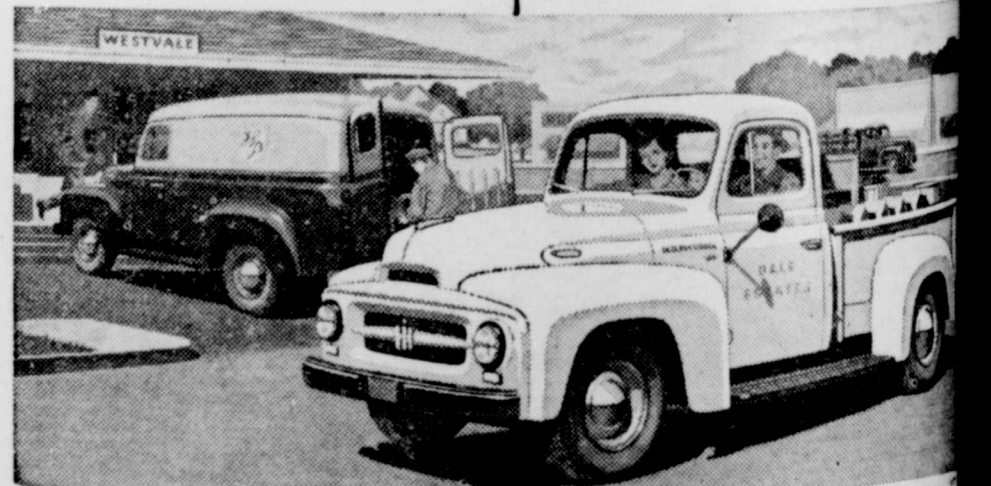

News About Social Security

The opportunity to participate in the social security program is offered clergymen after 1954 due to the Amendments. Clergymen, Christian Science practitioners, and those members of religious orders who have not taken a vow of poverty, may now, at their own individual election, be covered by social security under the same terms as self-employed persons.

To obtain coverage, the individual minister, Christian Science practitioner, or member of a religious order must file a certificate with the District Director of Internal Revenue indicating his desire to come under the law.

In general, he will have 2 years in which to make his election, but once made, it cannot be revoked. The clergyman must continue to report his earnings and pay the social security tax for every year in which he has net earnings of \$400.00 or more from services performed in the exercise of his ministry, or in the duties required by his order.

Although many clergymen and members of religious order may actually work as employees of a church or organization, their salaries will be considered self-employment income for social security purposes. The church or institution with which they are associated will not be involved in any way.

PROPOSED COTTON REDUCTIONS

Cotton farmers will decide Dec. 14 whether they want to accept the acreage controls proposed for the 1955 crop.

In previous years, when farmers were asked to choose between low parity and unrestricted production or a high parity level and crop quotas, they have voted to accept the controls. They seem to feel that less cotton and reasonable assurance of a fair price is the better deal. If they follow the same pattern this December, then next year's crop quota is scheduled for a drastic reduction.

The Secretary of Agriculture has ruled that the cotton acreage will be cut back 15 percent in 1955. This means only 18,113,208 acres can be planted as compared with the 21.4 million acres allowed this past season. The quota is the very bottom figure allowed by farm law.

A minimum quota next year may work a great hardship in areas where cotton is the main cash crop. In some sections of Texas, cotton is the primary agricultural commodity. No other crop offers comparable income. As a result, the gross profits from cotton can drop 15 percent in those areas.

Some government planners will work hard to make the 15 percent reductions "stick" in cotton planting despite any opposition which may arise to the program. Economists claim that the 1954 crop was far larger than expected when the first production estimate was released in late summer. Any more cotton will be a drag on the market, they claim.

It is true that original 1954 estimates were very low. Subsequent increase in estimates proved this—and incidentally made it extremely difficult to plan any sort of orderly marketing system. Critics point out, and with some justification, that if estimates are to be made at all, they should be reasonably accurate if the industry is to benefit from them.

At this point, acreage controls appear to be the most logical choice in the December election. With the recent shift in power in Washington, then it is fairly certain that cotton acreages will be somewhat increased. Many areas of Texas will welcome such an increase.

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

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH
Maintenance of conservation measures applied to the land is an annual concern of the co-operators of the Brown-Mills Conservation District who

are carrying out a permanent conservation program. After each practice is installed it must be reapplied or maintained each year. After the recent heavy rains in this area, terraces that had

not been properly maintained were broken. The breaks in these terraces caused severe erosion in the field. Plowing, cultivating and sowing should be done in such a way that the capacity and shape of the terrace is increased and improved. Any breaks or weak places in the terrace should be filled as soon as they are discovered.

A rancher is faced with the problem of maintaining and improving a good grass cover on his rangeland. In many instances this involves changes in management. Rangeland can be maintained by leaving approximately 2,000 pounds of cover on the land.

Fields that have been planted to cover crops should be reapplied at least once every three years. This tends to keep the amount of organic matter in the soil the same. Where the per cent of organic matter in a soil is extremely low, many cooperators find it profitable to plant a cover crop on a field two years in succession. This improves the tilth by adding organic matter to the soil.

Farm ponds, diversion terraces, and waterways come in for their part of a maintenance job. A little attention each year can insure long life where neglect allows the measures to become ineffective.

Many farmers and ranchers in the District are working toward the completion of their conservation plan on their farms and ranches. During the past week a terrace system was laid out by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service on Emil Schuster's farm near Priddy. A pond for livestock water is now being constructed on J. M. Mays' farm in the Pleasant Grove community.

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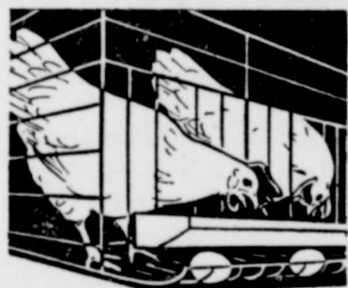


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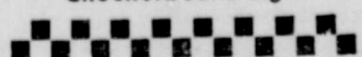

Low-Calorie Desserts For the Overweight
By ALICE DENHOFF
THE most beautiful season of the year with its feasting, parties, company and get-togethers, both scheduled and impromptu, means extra vigilance on the part of wasteful watchers. So this may be the best of all times to offer some recipes for desserts that are both delicious and low-calorie, too.

An Old Favorite
Lemon Snow first, the recipe for 6 portions. Only 96 calories per serving.
Soften 1 p. (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin in ½ c. cold water. Let stand 5 min.
Combine ½ c. sugar 1 c. hot water, ¼ c. lemon juice, tsp. lemon rind; stir until sugar dissolves. Add softened gelatin; stir until gelatin is completely dissolved. Chill until slightly thickened.
Pour ½ c. water into 1-qt. bowl. Sprinkle ½ c. nonfat dry milk powder over surface of water. Beat with rotary beater or electric mixer until stiff, about 8-10 min.
Whip slightly thickened gelatin mixture until frothy. Fold in whipped nonfat dry milk powder mixture. Pour into molds or individual serving dishes. Chill until firm.
A Custard Dessert
A low-calorie boiled custard, served over a pear or peach half

is a dieter's special. It is tasty, high in nutritional value, and low in sugar and fat.
Combine 3 slightly beaten eggs, ¼ c. sugar, ¼ tsp. salt and 2 c. water in top of double boiler. Sprinkle ½ c. nonfat dry milk powder over surface of mixture; beat with rotary beater until blended.
Cook, stirring constantly, over hot, but not boiling water until mixture coats a silver spoon. Chill immediately.
Serve 3 tsp. boiled custard over the fruit. Makes about 1½ c. custard, and the calorie count is 32 per serving.

Apple Whip
Apple Whip, 6 servings at 100 calories a portion is our next suggestion.
Soften 1 p. (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin in ½ c. cold water. Let stand 5 min. Heat 1¼ c. apple juice and ½ c. sugar to boiling point. Add softened gelatin; stir until mixture dissolves. Chill until slightly thickened.
Pour ½ c. water and tsp. lemon juice into 1-qt. bowl; sprinkle ½ c. nonfat dry milk powder over surface of water. Beat until stiff, about 8 to 10 min. Fold whipped nonfat dry milk mixture into slightly thickened gelatin mixture.
Pour into molds or individual serving dishes.

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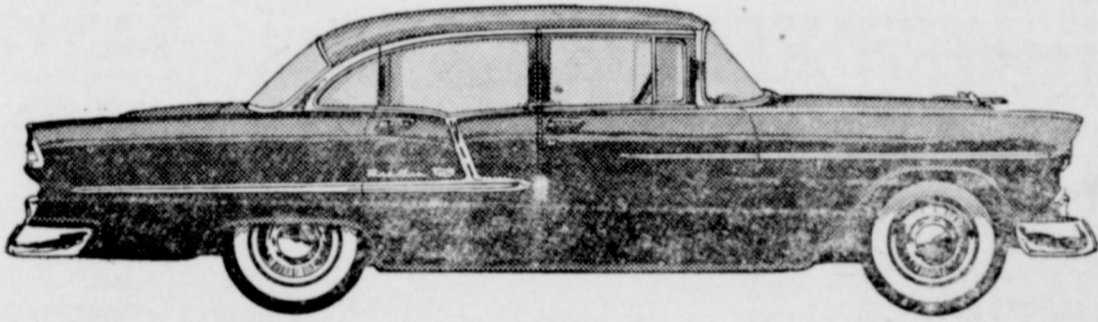

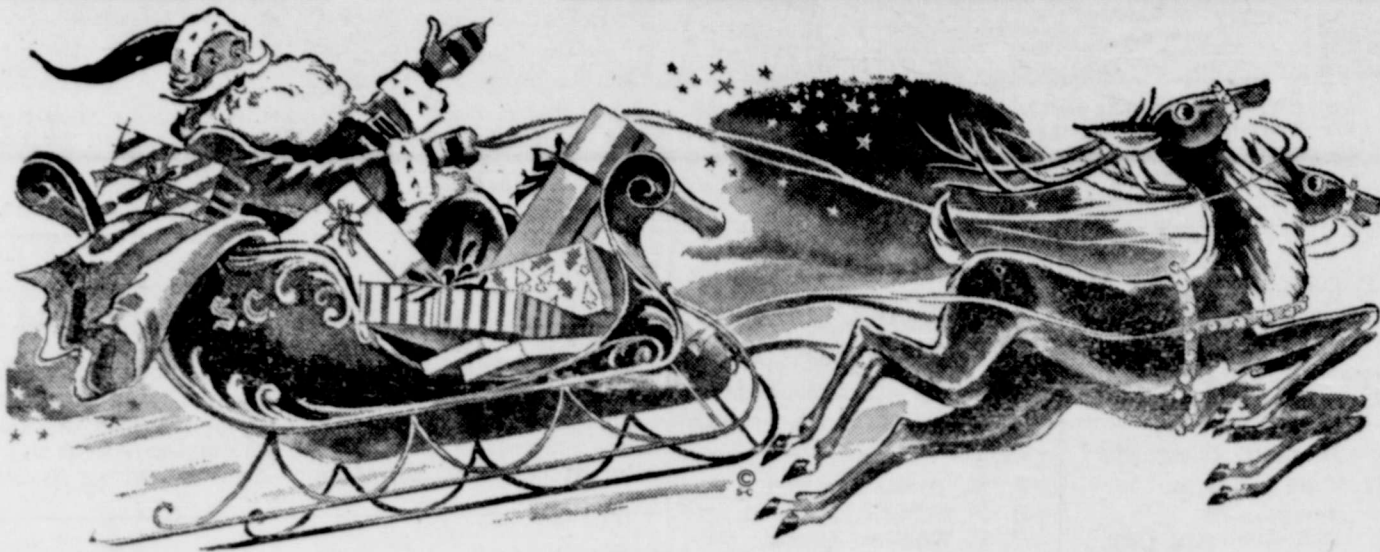
