See Tax Reductions Given O.K. in 1956
McCarthy Pals May Ask Flanders Censure

WASHINGTON—Congress probably will accede to President Eisenhower's request to postpone excise and corporate tax cuts scheduled for April 1, but you can be sure some tax reductions will be voted in 1956.

● ANOTHER CENSURE?—A big question on Capitol Hill is whether a move will be made by supporters of Senator Joseph R. McCarthy to have the Senate censure Senator Ralph E. Flanders, after the new Congress convenes Jan. 5.

After the vote on McCarthy was over, however, they showed signs of lingering animosity toward Flanders and that is why a possibility exists that they might try to get back at him later.

The Vermont Republican was the sponsor of the resolution which sparked the censure movement. Prior to that, he had made several speeches critical of McCarthy—in one likening him to Hitler.

It is for these appellations that the motion for censure might be made—since McCarthy's conduct was "condemned" on the grounds that he had used offensive language about his colleagues.

● RED COMPETITION—The Agriculture department's top expert on Soviet Russia reports that the Soviet Union may become a major competitor of the United States in the world grain market as the result of a drive to boost production of wheat and rye.

Lazar Volin, a special assistant in the Foreign Agricultural service, explains that the Soviets have launched "a program for a huge expansion of grain acreage."

Volin says: "Already Russia has a long, though uneven, history of one of the world's important exporters of small grains; and an increase in its acreage, if carried out, may make it even more of a competitor with the United States in the world market."

Volin points out that the Soviet government has ordered farmers to have 70 million acres planted into wheat by 1956, while in the United States production this year has been cut back to 54 million acres.

Volin comments: "The conclusion is unavoidable that the new program is extending grain production into a risky zone, where unstable yields and frequent crop failures may be expected."

"The Kremlin apparently is willing to gamble, banking on the fact that with favorable weather, as in 1954, good crops may be grown on this land when it is brought back into production for the first time."

**TODAY'S Menu**  
Excellent Desserts To Make in a Hurry

By ALICE DENKHOFF  
TIME for another helping of jiffy desserts, using packaged or bakery cake as the basic ingredient.  
For example, top pieces of simple pound cake with slices of blushing pink cinnamon apples and a fluff of meringue.  
For 4 portions of this dessert, combine 1 pt. water, 1 c. sugar, 1 stick cinnamon and 8 drops red coloring; boil for 10 min. Add 1 pt. sliced apples and simmer 10 min. or until apples are soft.  
Have ready 4 1-in. slices baker's pound cake, and arrange apples on top of each cake slice in overlapping rows. Beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Add 2 tsp. sugar gradually, continuing to beat until mixture stands in peaks. Spread meringue around sides of cake, leaving top uncovered.  
Place on cookie sheet and bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 5 min., or until meringue is lightly browned.  
**Frosted Strawberry Cake**  
Frosted Strawberry Cake is a real quickie, but you'd never guess it! A nice choice for an impromptu party, or a dessert bridge, the recipe is for 12 portions.

Combine ½ pt. heavy cream, whipped 2 tsp. sugar and ½ tsp. vanilla extract. Cover top and sides of a baker's angel food cake with the whipped cream. Refrigerate until ready to serve.  
Have 1 pt. strawberry ice cream (packed in round carton) and at dessert time, remove carton from ice cream, slip the ice cream cylinder upright into center of cake.  
**Coconut Sundae**  
To make 4 good sundaes, combine ¾ c. white or gold cake crumbs and ½ c. shredded coconut. Place on cookie sheet and toast in 350° F. oven for 10 min. Cut 1 pt. vanilla ice cream into 4 slices and top each slice with cake crumb mixture.  
Now that strawberries are out of season, use frozen berries for another angel cake dessert.  
For 8 servings, slice 1 large baker's angel food cake in horizontal halves. Cut one pint brick lemon sherbet into 4 equal slices and arrange between cake layers. Cover top of cake with ½ pint heavy cream, whipped. Slice and serve immediately, topping each slice with crushed strawberries. Takes ½ c. fruit in all.

**Clarence Faulkner Is Featured In Wrangler On 25 Years With Shell**

According to an article appearing in The Wrangler, Shell Oil Company publication, Clarence Faulkner, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Faulkner of Goldthwaite, was featured on his completion of 25 years service with Shell. The article is as follows.  
"It was 25 years ago December 30 that C. E. Faulkner, oil pumper in the Odessa Production Division, went to work for Shell at McCamey, Texas. Starting as a mechanic, Clarence has had a variety of jobs during his quartercentury with the Company. He has spent his entire career in West Texas, with the exception of a few months in Hobbs.  
"Clarence was born and educated in Goldthwaite, Texas. After working for Shell at McCamey for two and one half years, he spent a brief period at Iraan with Shell Pipe Line Corporation, then returned to McCamey for seven years as lab-

orer and roustabout, truck and tractor driver, and mechanic.  
"In December, 1939, he was transferred to the Company garage at Hobbs as a mechanic for about seven months. He then went to Goldsmith, Texas, for nearly three years, working as a roustabout, gang pusher, repairman, oil pumper, welder, and tractor driver.  
"Clarence moved to Odessa in April 1944, as an oil pumper and gas engine repairman. He has been a full-time pumper since early 1948 and is currently working on the Witcher Lease northwest of Odessa.  
"He and his wife, Lela, are parents of three children, Robert, Raymond and Ann. Personal tragedy struck the family in October, 1952, when Raymond who will be 16 next month, suffered a polio attack. He was completely paralyzed for many months while a patient at the Warm Springs Foundation at Gonzales and although somewhat improved now, he is still confined to bed at home, where he is doing his best to keep up with his school work.  
"Robert, 21, is a junior at Texas Tech, where he is studying chemical engineering. Ann, 6, is in the first grade.  
"Clarence used to fish a lot before Raymond became ill two years ago, but he doesn't have much time for hobbies any more."

### COTTON BURRS RELEASED FOR FARM LAND USE

An easier method of cotton ginning trash treatment against the Pink Bollworm has been approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture, making cotton burrs more readily available for return to the farm for use as fertilizer and feed.

Many gins in Texas previously have been forced to burn burrs because treatment methods were too slow or necessary equipment too expensive. This prevented farmers from being able to use burrs on the land where they are aids in preventing soil blowing, or erosion during heavy rains. In addition, it deprived the farmer of an element which adds valuable organic matter to the land.

Untreated cotton burrs have their disadvantages, however. They provide the ideal hibernating place for the Pink Bollworm. Just a few hundred of these worms carried to a farm in gin trash could infest and ruin hundreds of acres of cotton in one season.

Recent experiments show that gins equipped with a single "chopper" fan could achieve

and effective kill of bollworms in the waste burrs. The fan is installed near the outlet where trash is blown from the gin. Burrs treated in this manner are "safe" for return to the farm in any area of Texas.

A number of devices were tried but many of them proved to be inadequate or impractical. The single-fan installation will be a boon to gins which cannot

afford the more expensive devices and methods. Gin trash which is blown from the gin untreated still must be burned or given other approved methods of treatment before it can leave the yard. It would be to the farmer's advantage to make certain any trash he carries away from the gin yard has received proper treatment. This normal precaution could save an untold amount of cotton.

## Experience Unit Is Being Used By Teachers For Purposeful Learning

The Experience Unit is being used by some of the teachers in Mills County in an effort to make learning in school more purposeful. This is not a method of teaching where the child plays and the teacher hopes he learns something. It is a topic of study that the children plan and carry out cooperatively. Each child is allowed to look for information and carry on activities which are suited to his interest and ability. During the development of the unit there is a time for the basic reading program and for drill in the fundamentals. The drill is meaningful and enjoyable. This is the kind of learning that stays after examination time.

The third grade children, Mrs. Euna Barnett's room in the Goldthwaite School completed a unit of study on the post office before Christmas. The unit was introduced by a trip to the post office where the students learned many things and found an interest in knowing more about the organization. Later M. Y. Stokes came to the room and created more interest with facts about the organization, the work of the mail carrier and the care of rural mail boxes. A film strip showing the development of the postal system, and the immensity of the present postal set-up completed the background for the study.

Students build their own post office of cardboard, painted it and raised the U. S. flag in front of it. Gene Gray acted as postmaster general. Children look turns so that each had opportunity to sell stamps, stamp letters, separate letters into local and out of town stacks, and other duties. About \$2.00 worth of stamps were sold and change was made.

This unit particularly emphasized arithmetic. The children saw the meaning and the necessity of learning the multiplication tables. Nine times three took on new meaning when applied to letters and stamps. The language arts and social studies activities were in the stories written and told, in finding information in reference books, and in learning to spell the words used in the unit. The art activities were the posters announcing postal service and wrapping service, the making of Christmas cards and envelopes. The patriotic activities included the raising and lowering of the flag over the post office each day, the pledge of allegiance to the flag and the singing of patriotic songs.

The children received information willingly and with enjoyment. They learned through reading, seeing, listening, writing, speaking, and through activity and movement. The children really "lived it up."

## New Development In Farm Ownership Plans Are Announced By FHA

Building improvement loans faster service in getting approved and processed some of the new developments in the farm ownership program carried on by the Farmers Home Administration. W. Cole, the agency's county supervisor serving Mills county, said this week. Insured loans advanced by banks and private lenders are being made to a greater extent.

The building improvement loans made available only to an adequate farm but needs only, is for the farmer who construct or repair essential buildings. Loans can be made to build or remodel farm dwell-

ings, barns, milk houses, or other outbuildings needed to carry out sound farm management practices.

The agency supplements rather than competes with private or cooperative credit. No farm ownership loan of any type, or loans for soil conservation or farm operations can be made to farmers who are able to get the necessary credit from other lenders at reasonable rates and terms.

Other types of farm ownership loans include: 1) farm purchase, for renters, sharecroppers, or farm laborers—usually veterans or other young farm families—who are ready for farm ownership; 2) farm development loans for farmers whose farms need, for example, such land developments as pasture improvement, gully filling, reorganization of field and fencing, and some repair or remodeling of farm buildings; and 3) farm enlargement loans for those who need more acres to make their farm efficient.

Farm ownership loans are amortized over a 40-year period except building improvement loans which may be for 5, 10, 15, 20, 25 or 40 years. Farm ownership borrowers may make repayments at any time, and interest is charged on the outstanding principal balances. Borrowers are required to refinance their loans as soon as they have accumulated enough

equity to qualify for private or cooperative credit.

Farm ownership loans are made primarily from funds advanced by private lenders and are fully insured by the Farmers Home Administration. Insured loans are made for not more than 90 percent of the fair and reasonable value of the farm. Investments by private lenders in this program are increasing.

Direct farm ownership loans from appropriated funds are made only when eligible farmers need to borrow more than 90 percent of the value of the farm. Most of the applicants in this situation are young veterans wanting to become established as farmer owners.

As a means of speeding up services to farm families and cutting costs at the same time, appraisers who are also qualified as county supervisors are located in county offices throughout the State. They are more accessible for appraisal work than were the more limited number who formerly were stationed in the State Office.

Elimination of a triple agreement that required signatures of the insured lender, the borrower, and a representative of the Farmers Home Administration has helped speed up loans. Discontinuing other forms and fees found to be unnecessary also helped.

Farmers apply for loans at the county Farmers Home Administration office, located at the Briggs Building, Lampasas, Texas. Applications are referred to the agency's local county committee. This 3-member committee decides on the applicant's eligibility for the loan. Committeemen for Mills County are: Edgar L. Burkett, Delmer J. Geeslin and Ewell H. Priddy.

Veterans with farming experience have preference. In determining eligibility the committee considers character, ability, and whether the applicant and his family are likely to succeed on the farm they have in mind or with the improvements they intend to undertake.

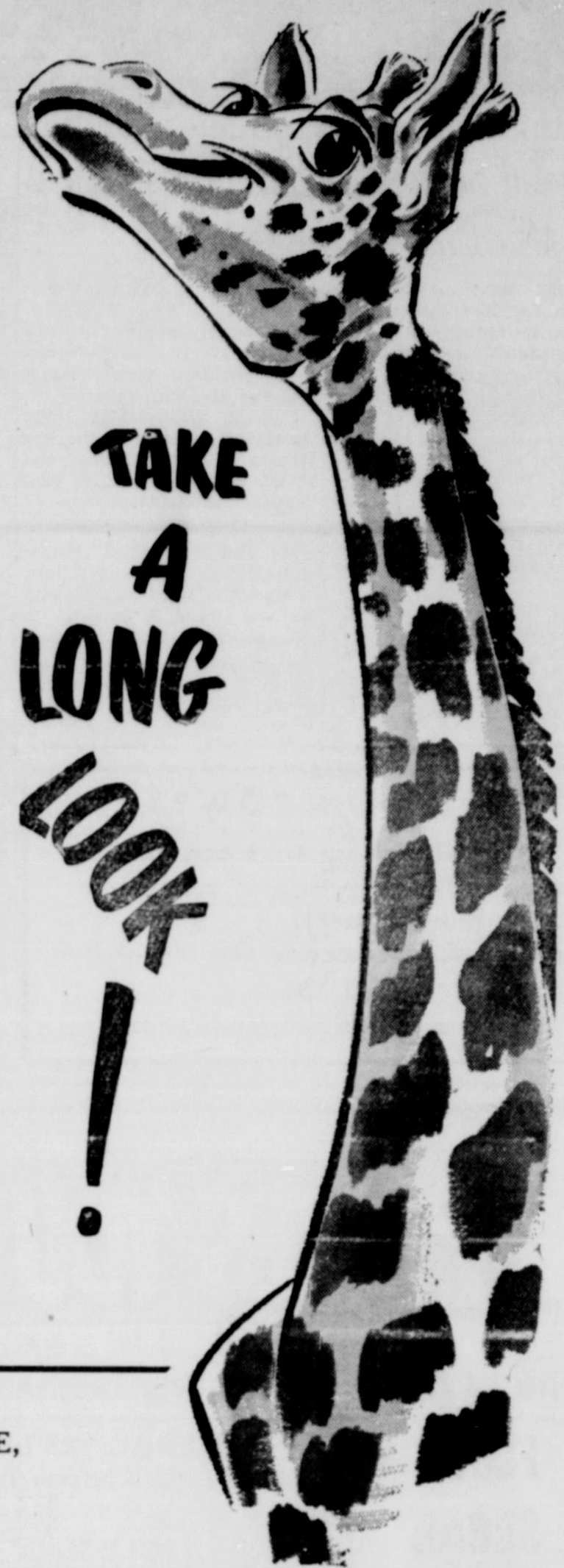

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Help Shy Child Learn To Get on With Others

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

IF you or I, in childhood, ever felt rejected by playmates, we can understand the eight-year-old boy and the mother who writes about him from her home in Ohio:

"I have two boys, five and eight. The younger one gets along with everyone, but the older boy doesn't seem able to make friends at all. At recess, he runs home to tell me that no one will be his partner. He's a quiet boy who just loves to read and be read to. I've taught him to hit only when hit. But he won't hit back at all. The children push him around, and throw his hat in the mud, and he does nothing back.

**May Affect Entire Life**

"His daddy shames him, but I don't think that will solve his problem. I do so want him to be liked, but I don't know what to do. It hurts me to picture him playing alone at recess. I was a lonesome child myself, and I know how it feels to be left out. He and his brother get along fine and have a great affection for each other.

"Please help me to help this boy. I believe being rejected by other children lasts all your life, because to this day I can be in a roomful of people where everyone is talking and I sit like a lump."

Here, in part, is how I answered her:

This older brother may suffer some because his younger brother has so many friends. Anything you and Dad can do to help the older boy feel more worthwhile should help.

Naturally, the father is discouraged at seeing his boy not stand up for his own rights. But Dad should know that shaming the lad for cowardice won't help him.

The boy is already ashamed. He just doesn't know how to overcome his fears of the other boys. Certainly Dad should not urge the lad to stand up against an assailant quicker and larger than himself, but to venture a stand when he feels his chances would be at least even or better. Also, Dad might give this boy some good pointers in self-defense, or have a more skillful person do so. Anyway, the boy may gain most through learning skills which other boys would admire. Dad should make things and do things for fun with this son and go places with him, attracting some of his group to join in these activities with him.

**Avoid Self-Pity**

Because of your deep sympathy for this boy, you may incline to show too great concern about his plight and encourage him in self-pity. In some way, you need to help him see that he must try to change himself rather than to change the other boys, if he is to be accepted by them. These other boys may not place so great value on his excellence at books. He needs also to excel at games of skill, and in the rough and tumble of the playground.

Lampasas— 960 applications, 10,915,230 pounds.

Mills — 1063 applications, 16,391,038 pounds.

Burnet — 864 applications,

14,404,245 pounds.

County FHA Supervisor, Aston W. Cole, states that it is the responsibility of the FHA Committee to determine eligibility and amount of feed allocated each applicant for feed. Their responsibility ends with proper notification to the applicant. Both hay and grain is available under the Emergency Feed Program.

The Texas State Department of Agriculture has the responsibility of assisting the eligible applicant to the extent of 1/2 the Rail Road freight cost paid by the applicant. In the case of grain, purchase orders are issued by the ASC which entitles the farmer to \$1.00 per cwt on purchase of grain.
