

Four 'Freshmen' Solons Only Eight New Faces To Be Found in Senate Lower Chamber Graduates Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON-There are only eight new faces in the Senate for the 84th Congress. This is due not only to the fact that many incumbents won re-election, but also because a number of the "freshmen" were sworn in during the special censure session in November.

The freshmen to be seated in January were Senators George Bender (R), Ohio; Richard L. Neuberger (D), Oregon; Gordon Allott (R), Colorado; Carl T. Curtis (R), Nebraska; Thomas E. Martin (R), Iowa; Patrick V. McNamara (D), Michigan; Clifford P. Case (R), New Jersey, and Strom Thur-

mond (D), South Carolina.

• NO POSTAL BOOST-President Eisenhower's enewed request for an increase in postal rates doesn't stand much more of a chance in Congress this session than it did last year when the legislators overwhelmingly rejected the plan. The Democrats, who now control both House

and Senate, are dead set against the idea of boosting the three-cent regular mail postage to four cents and raising the air mail rate from six to seven cents an ounce. There is also some strong Republican opposition

to the proposal, although many GOP members will support the proposal because it bears the administration's endorsement Defeat of a postal rate increase may again block a wage boost for the nation's 500,000 postal workers. Congress okayed the pay raise last year, but Mr. Eisenhower vetoed the boost because it was not

tied to a rate hike. The situation hasn't changed any. Congress is still willing to raise the wages of postal workers and the President still thinks it can't

be done financially unless rates are increased. • NEW FIGHTER-The Strategic Air Command soon will get a new fighter plane designed to give the United States a further jump in its

air race with Russia. The new plane is the McDonnell F-101A Voodoo, a sleek job that was built to meet the Air Force's requirements for a long-range

The sweptback wings have a span only slightly longer than the F-86 Sabrejets, but the ship is almost 30 feet longer. The new fighter carries most of its large fuel load in the fuselage and can carry extra fuel externally, making it able to escort strategic bombers or carry atomic weapons. The Air Force has not yet released performance figures on the Voodoo, but observers estimate its speed in the 800-

• FEE OR FREE?-The Federal Communications commission may be taking action early this year on the knotty problem of subscription television-the formal name for "pay as you go" video.

Several promoters of the idea are pressing for quick approval of the novel system, designed to supplement normal commercial broadcasts paid for by sponsors and the Ask Quick

broadcasters. Approval of Under the subscription plan, the home viewer would pay to see special programs of his own choice. Ad-

vocates of the idea say that a "boxoffice in every home" could finance many programs which could not be duplicated on a sponsored basis.

First, however, the FCC would have to decide what to do about the historic policy which has kept broadcasting programs "free" and available to everyone who owns a set. The best guess is that the commission will ask all segments of the

ndustry to comment on the plan before any final action is taken.

Tax Proposals continue on the penny basis set by Gov. Allen Shivers' program. His twopenny gasoline tax hike, good for \$60 million a year, was introduced earlier by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston.

Rep. W. G. "Cotton" Kirklin of Odessa introduced the other Shivers' bill, the one-cent cigarette levy, good for \$15 million a year.

Rep. Curtis Ford of Corpus Christi offered the familiar penny-a-thousand-feet natural gas dedication tax bill. He figured it would bring in \$33 million

And, Rep. Jerry Sadler of Percilla dropped in a penny-a glass, \$3.30 per barrel, beer tax, estimated to produce \$16 million

BILLS IN THE HOPPER


