State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex.— Insurance bills have lagged. Water conservation measures are embroiled in dispute. And virtually no start has been made on a taxing program in the legislature.

As a result, lawmakers are eyeing a possible special session. Theoretical date for such a session is May 11. On that date the legislators' pay for the regular session stops.

It has been suggested that Governor Shivers may have foreseen a bog-down in the regular session, and therefore has not pushed his administration program. During a special session, he would have full control of subject matter which may be introduced.

TAX BILL
Rep. Jerry Sadler of Percilla introduced the biggest tax bill of all.

Promising a lot of controversy, the bill would levy a one-cent per gallon processing tax on all gasoline and distillates produced in Texas. It would: Raise an estimated \$190,000,000 a year, repeal the present four-cent gas sales tax, and head off the administration's two-cent gasoline tax increase.

Sadler said its effect would be to reduce the price of gasoline to Texans three cents a gallon. Sixty per cent of the gasoline is exported, tax-free, he said.

Meantime, Rep. Charles Murphy explained he hadn't yet asked for committee hearing on the administration's two-cent gas tax bill, wanting sentiment to jell.

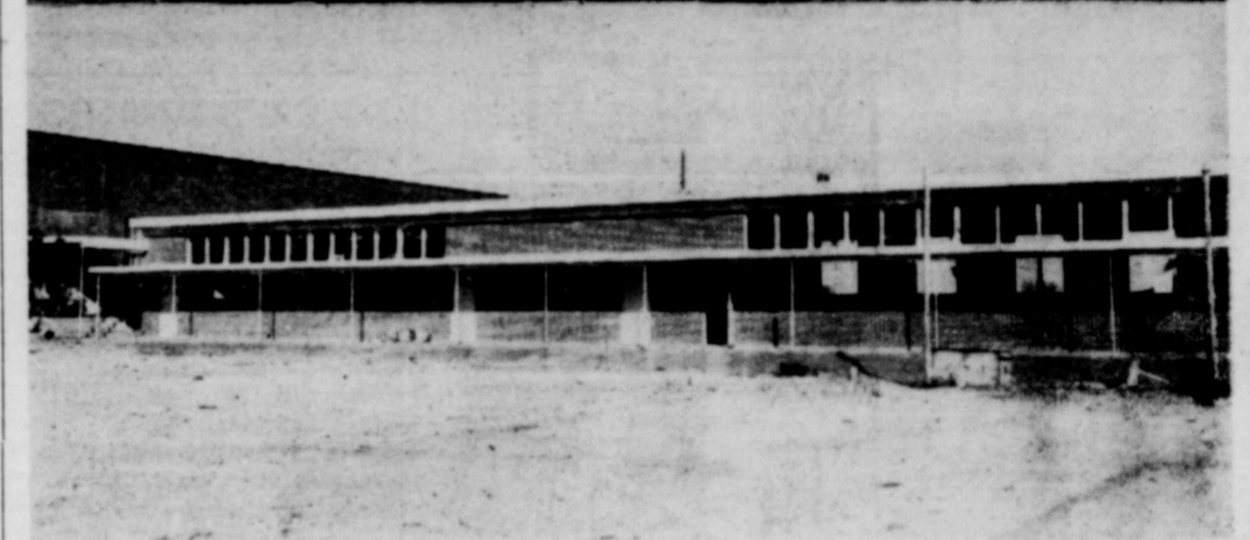
Martin warned that unless the Senate reconsidered and kept his bill alive, all others would be subject to being knocked out on a constitutional point of order.

New School Buildings To Be Opened With Dedication Program And Open House This Coming Sunday Afternoon

The new elementary school and remodeling, improvements and addition to junior-senior high school will be officially opened this coming Sunday afternoon with special dedication program and open house.

Dedication program is scheduled to get underway at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon in the high school auditorium. Open house will follow the program. (See official program on back page.)

Invitations have been mailed to school officials and all present and past board members. Open invitation is extended to all patrons and friends of the district and the general public to attend this open house program which is a milestone in the progress of Goldthwaite Independent School District.

All present and past trustees will be honored during the afternoon program. Another highlight of the program will be awarding a life membership in the Parent Teacher Association. Dr. L. P. Sturgeon, Director of Public Relations, Texas State Teacher's Association, will be the principal speaker for the afternoon program.

The official opening and open house of these improvements and new buildings marks the completion of more than two years of planning and work by members of the board of trustees and school administrators. Plans were first started when patrons of the district approved a \$190,000.00 bond issue to finance a new building program in June 1953.

Pride and joy of the building program is the new Elementary Building which is located on 75 acres of land which was purchased by the district at a cost of \$14,000.00. The new building consists of 16,587 square feet of floor space and 5,522 square feet of covered walks. The building with equipment cost \$128,506.56. The building has twelve class rooms, cafeteria, visual aids room and offices.

A wing was added to the junior-senior high school to house the science and homemaking departments. This extension with equipment cost \$39,312.35. Along with the new wing the junior-senior high building was redone inside and out. The roof repaired, walls

waterproofed, interior replastered, remodeled and redecorated with new lighting. This program cost \$3,166.00. Members of the faculty and board of trustees extend a cordial invitation to everyone to attend the open house program Sunday afternoon.

Public Schools Week Is To Be Observed Here

Public Schools Week in Texas is to be simultaneously observed in the Goldthwaite Public Schools beginning with the School Dedication Program, Sunday March 6 and continue in effect through March 11. During the week every school patron should put forth an effort to visit our schools at least once. "I like for patrons to stay through our lunch hour and eat with us," said Superintendent Jones. Registration booths will be set up for those who visit during the week and especially on Sunday. It is the hope of school officials that every patron of the District will visit schools. 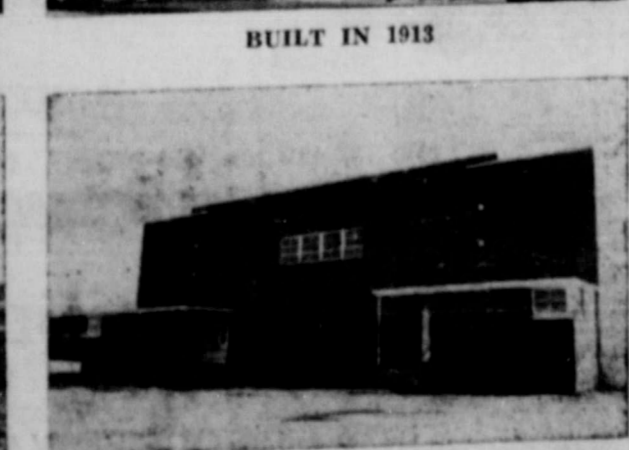
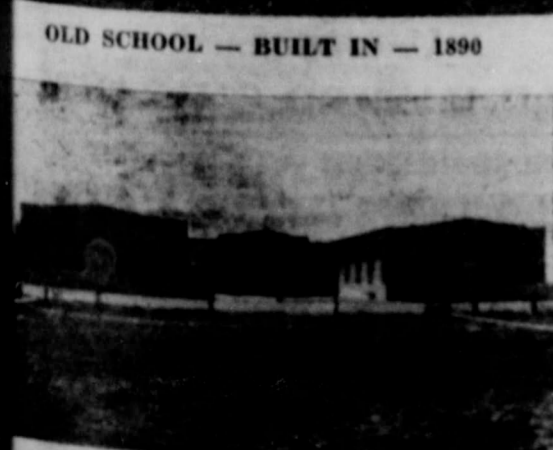
Red Cross Fund Drive Underway

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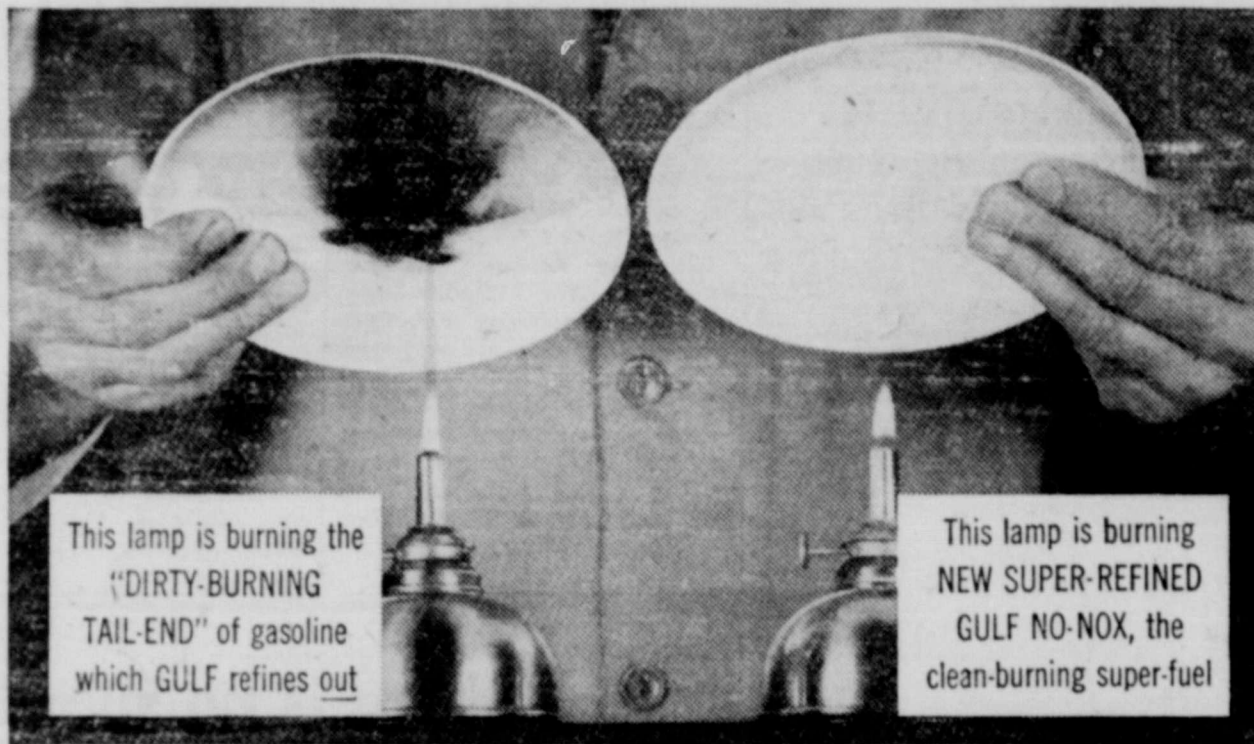

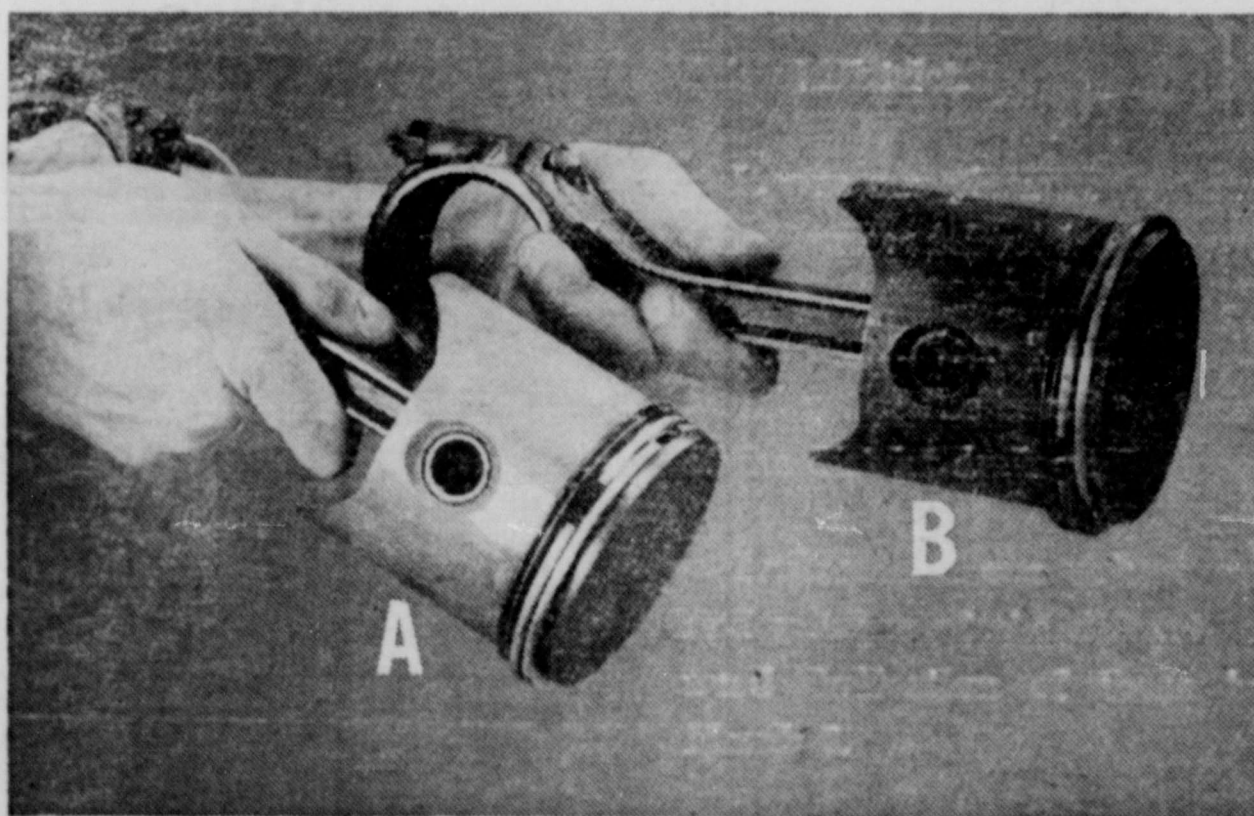

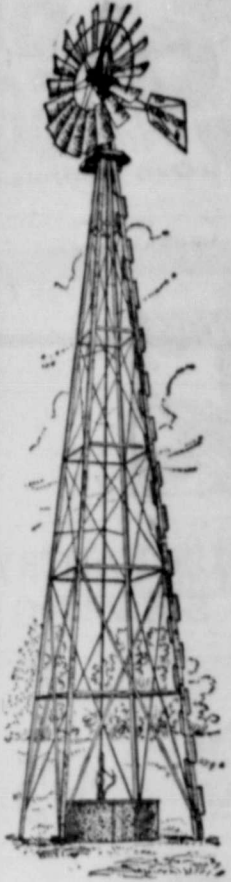

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH
REPORT FOR 1954
(FIRST IN A SERIES OF FOUR)

THE BROWN-MILLS SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT IN ACTION: The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District is a legal subdivision of the State of Texas. It was organized by the local landowners in 1940. It is operated by and for the landowners. The business of the District is managed by five locally elected, landowning supervisors. The District furnishes technical assistance and guidance in conservation problems. The locally elected supervisors insure that the guidance and assistance meets the needs of the land and the needs and desires of the local people.

The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, along with many others, was organized to assume the primary responsibility for local soil, water, and plant conservation on the land. The District provides leadership to local people in soil, water, and plant conservation by helping plan programs, by obtaining information, procuring the services, and doing the things that citizens, working alone, could not do for themselves. The District provides a recognized centering point and clearing house in the locality for carrying forward advanced agricultural programs as they are in the best interest of soil and water conservation and proper land use. The District provides a practical medium through which the influence and assistance of landowners, local business men and professional interests can be brought to bear in an effective, constructive manner.

Landowners after voting to establish a district under the state law, elected five landowning farmers and ranchers as District Supervisors to handle the business of the District. Neither the State nor Federal Government controls these supervisors. These men give their time unselfishly and are not on a salary. They represent the landowning cooperators in the District in the vital work of soil, water, and plant conservation.

District cooperators are local landowners and operators who have requested assistance of the District in planning and carrying out a sound soil and water conservation program on their farms and ranches. One thousand, five hundred and eighty-two landowners and operators in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are district cooperators.

SUPERVISORS OF THE BROWN-MILLS SOIL CONSERVA-

TION DISTRICT: The following land owners make up the Board of Supervisors for the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District: J. Hobert Priddy, Rt. 1, Mullin, Chairman; W. M. Hancock, Zephyr, Vice-Chairman; G. G. Goss, Rt. 1 Rising Star, Secretary; Anson Oden, Rt. 3, Brownwood, Member; David Watters, Moline Rt., Goldthwaite, Member.

CONSERVATION INVOLVES MANY PEOPLE: The conservation of our basic resources of soil, water, and plant is a problem of prime importance. The magnitude of this problem has been especially apparent to farmers and ranchers of this District during these drought years. Concern over this problem has not been confined to farmers alone. Business and professional men too are becoming more and more concerned. Everyone agrees, and the drought has emphasized, that agriculture is the foundation of the local, state, and national economy.

The concern of landowners and operators for the conservation of these resources is reflected in the amount of technical assistance that has been requested through the Agricultural Conservation Program. Even though landowners and operators have suffered financially this year, nevertheless, more miles of terraces and more farm

ponds have been built than in the three previous years. To the Supervisors of the District this can mean but one thing. Landowners and operators are very concerned with the conservation of their soil, water and plants. They are making plans and doing their best to carry them out.

The problem of conservation has not been confined to individuals. There are many groups that are concerned with the overall problems of conservation. The Supervisors of the Brown-Mills District greatly appreciate the assistance and support given by these groups. This assistance has not only been in sponsoring tours, field days, projects, etc. but these groups have gotten on the ground with the District Supervisors, County Agents, the Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service and others to develop programs and plans that will fit the needs. These groups are looking forward with us to the day when the drought will be broken. They wish us to know what will need to be done to rehabilitate the stands of grass in the pastures and to build up the fertility and moisture holding capacity of our fields. They wish us to know that those things that will return, as soon as possible, our agricultural economy to a strong, stable foundation. Those things that will strengthen that basic foundation of all agriculture, soil, water, and plants.

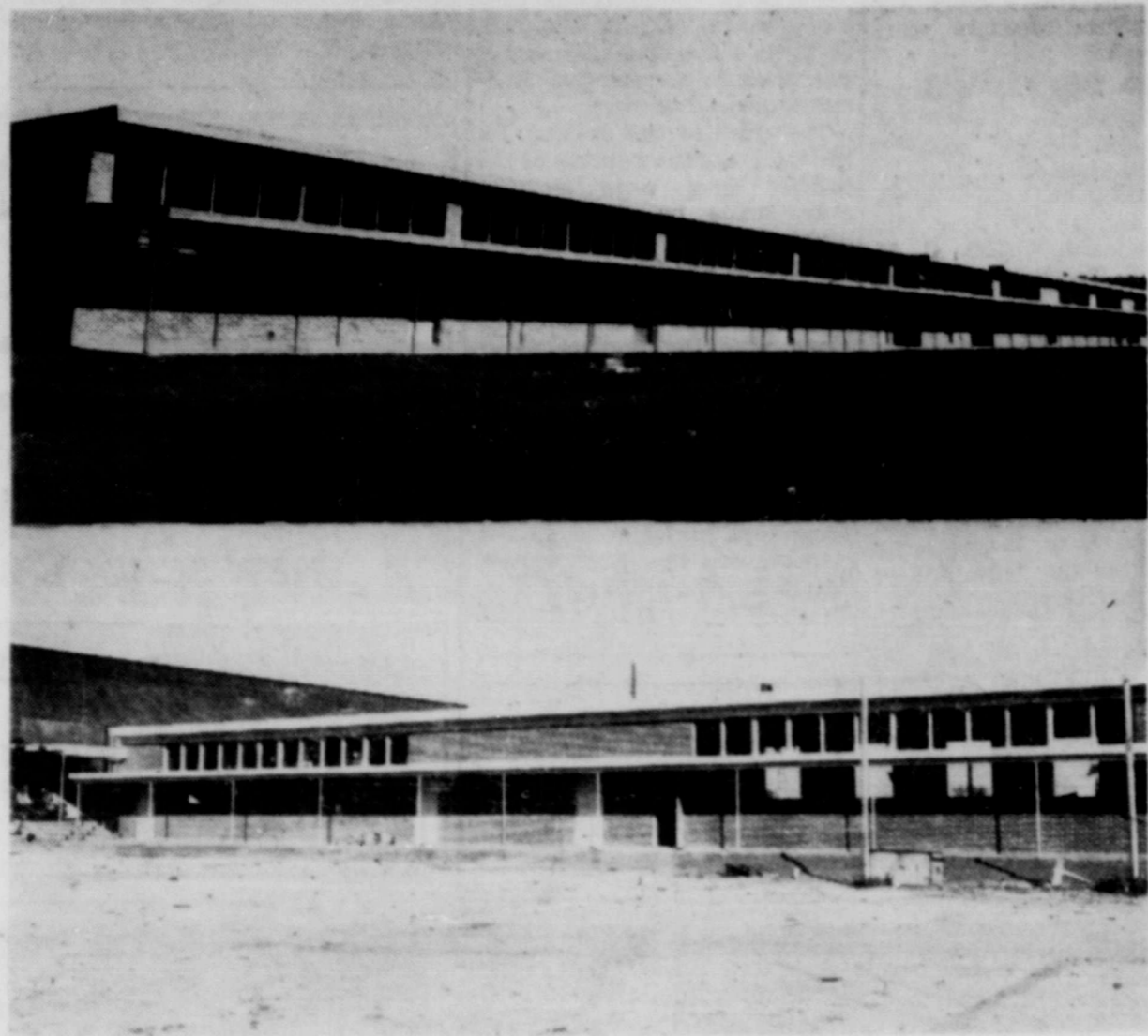
