While they rule out the labor party idea, however, these political freely concede that the merger of the nation's two great labor organizations will strengthen organized labor's influence in elections.

They reason that the bringing of the major unions under one leadership will climirate much political disagreement within their ranks and give them a united front to present in elec'ion cam-

However, Washington politicians believe that labor leaders want to keep the present two-party system and feel that they can bring their weight to bear with greater success this way then through a third party.







There should be no such thing "standardized" subject matter. Efforts to make all children learn the same subject matter at the same time and in the same way is undesirable. Life does not require people to be alike; why should the sahool require if. Activities which are purposeless and unrelated or in conflict with the pupil's life or environment may lead to personality disorders. The traditonal curriculum and the traditional grading system condemn too many children to daily failures and frustrations.
