

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MARCH OF EVENTS

Congress Adjournment Achieved by July 15? Capital Hill Leaders Hope for Earlier Close

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—The House and Senate progress on appropriate bills indicates that adjournment is quite possible this year by mid-July. Leaders have set a July 1 deadline but Capitol Hill observers point out that usual last-minute hitches in the legislative schedule make July 15 a more likely date.

The schedule of appropriation bills is the indicator of the length of a session. When these measures get bogged down, then a long session is certain; a fast cleanup means a relatively short one.

Many controversial problems remain. And several of them will, in all probability, be continued to next year. There is no tax fight-and that, too, will help pave the way for earlier adjournment.

The administration health insurance bill, the highway program, increasing the minimum wage, Taft-Hartley Act amendments and aid to schools are all bogged down in committees. The administration, aided by a committee of citizens, is pushing for action on the long-range road building program and chances are good that legislation will

· SECURITY AND POLITICS-The Democrats are getting ready to capitalize on new political issue handed to them on a silver platter by of all people-President Eisenhower.

The issue is that while the Pentagon was clamping down in the name of security the information they can give newsmen, it had okayed use of previously secret military data for use of GOP campaigners for Congress. The material was prepared to answer Democratic charges that Republicans have weakened defense through too drastic spending cuts.

The GOP pamphlet gave out information on several new rockets and rocket engines which newsmen had not been allowed to talk

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson's new information-security assistant, Robert T. Ross, said there were some slips in the document but they were "minor" and did not "amount to a breach of security." He said the document was "on the whole reassuring."

However, President Eisenhower said it was a blunder and contained information he would not have given out. Thus, the Democrats now will contend that Wilson and Ross are actin . : over-tough censors of news but not tough enough on censoring

O BORDER PATROL-The federal government, presumably alarmed over wide open border stretches between the United States and Mexico, is planning a tightening of its Tighten

border patrol. The Immigration and Naturalization service is seeking at least 400 more patrolmen, and calls the need urgent.

The FBI warned recently that it is possible that Communists can illegally enter the United States by posing as "Wetbacks" sneaking across the Mexican border.

However, the Mexican government, which is working with the United States in preventing illegal immigration, reports that fewer people are now trying to cross over. However, the problem of Communists possibly moving in remains as an administration headache.







Flood detention structures prolong stream flow. Deep Creek, in the San Saba-Brady Soil Conservation District, flowed for 4 days following a 1/2-inch rain on April 20. Large rains will discharge from flood detention structures at a much faster rate. For exampe, a 6inch rain on May 17, 1955 caused Deep Creek to flow for nearly two weeks.

There was a heavy flow in the creek for several days but the creek did not get out of banks. If the flood detention structures had not been on the creek, this 6 inches of rain would have passed off down the creek in a few hours. The creek would have been out of banks and many bottom land fields would have been badly washed and a huge silt load would have been carried down the creek to be deposited down the river whenever the water slowed down.

A similar 8-inch rain on Deep Creek in 1938 did cause heavy damage to bottom land along the creek. Some fields were washed off to the depth that they had been plowed. Mr. Thorman of Mercury reported that a cultivator was washed out of

In most cases it will take but a small fraction of an inch of runoff to refill a sediment pool to capacity and cause water to be discharged through the drawdown tube



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

> That's evidence enough why producers can't afford to feed a non-producer, says E. D. Parnell, professor of poultry husbandry at Texas A. & M. College. A four pound non-laying hen will eat about 56 pounds of feed a year, while the same bird that lays 250 eggs yearly will consume about 81 pounds.

> Feed costs make up 60 per cent or more of the total cost of producing eggs, says Parnell. By culling closely, producers can cut feed costs per dozen eggs and help maintain their profits, he adds.

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


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

AUSTIN, Tex. - Beer was tapped for the big pay-off as the Senate rolled out a new tax bill-expected to pour \$108,000,-000 in new money into the treasury in two years.

On the 137th day of on overtime session, the Senate passed a many-changed version of the House tax bill. It left the last say to the House and hoped for a quick wind up.

The bill is expected to produce \$62,000,000 during the next two years, for the general revenue fund. It carried a bookkeeping re-allocation feature which will give this fund \$3,000,-000 more from current taxes Thus it offered the House \$9,-000,000 more than the \$56,000,-000 required to unblock the record billion and a half dollar appropriation bill. It provides about \$44,000,000 in the biennium for highway purposes.

Three round pennies will cary the brunt of the burden of the new tax structure-one cent more on gasoline and cigarettes and a new levy of a penny a bottle on beer.

In this, the sixth main version of a money bill, the Senate swung back to the House's proposal of one cent on gasoline and cigarettes. But the Senate substituted a whopping \$16,000,-000 a year additional tax on beer for the House's \$1,000,000 a year increase on beer and wine dealers' license fees.


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
