

Congress Won't Raise Postal Rates in 1956

**Elections Prevent Chance** Of Increase Next Year

Special to Central Press Association

WASHINGTON-You can safely bet that Congress won't raise postal rates either this year or next despite the administration's insistence that the post office department must increase its revenues. The administration proposal to hike the three-cent, firstclass letter rate to four cents and the six-cent air mail postage to seven cents is just as dead as last year when Congress rejected it.

in postal rates is still a long, long way off.

No action on a rate increase is scheduled for this session. And, with the elections coming up in 1956, there is no chance of action then either, Such a move is regarded as political suicide in an election year. Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield, who

seeks higher rates to cover the postal service's innual operating loss, made a new plug for them when Eisenhower signed the postal pay bill. Summerfield said that the \$166 million annual

cost of the 8.1 per cent pay raise made it more imperative than ever that the Post Office increase its revenues. However, his appeal fell on deaf ears in Congress. Legislators say that any boost

· SCIENTIFIC DEMANDS-Officials are becoming increasingly alarmed over the government's difficulty in trying-to recruit physicists, engineers, chemists and other scientific personnel into federal

Although these jobs pay well, they are not being filled rapidly because the apparent fear by some scientists that they will be gagged by government security regulations. They supposedly fear being barred from discussing topics necessary to permit the exchange of ideas in their fields.

A recent case in point are the eight out of 10 scientists who ducked out of a panel discussion on radioactivity because security prevented them from talking about something they were not sure was classified or not.

• OPERATION ALERT-The government's latest "Operation Alert" test of civil defenses is being heavily criticized as "worthless."

Critics point out that little was learned from the practice dispersal which the public is not already aware of. They see the major civil defense need as less apathy and more interest, arguing that makebelieve "games" will only sooth public fears about the real danger. However, even these cries have helped alert the nation to a subject which will get greater airing in coming months.

· VACCINE PROBLEM-Don't think that the troubles of the Salk die vaccine program are just about over. Government health officials frankly are fearful that there may be many more snarls in the

They realize that the number of polio cases will continue to mount as the peak of the polio season approaches and that

by mid-summer, many hundreds of vaccinated children may contract the disease. Won't 'Take' Government officials say this won't be because of any imperfections or faults in the vaccine-at least

they hope not. What they want the public to realize In that the Salk shots do not provide complete immunity against polio. The truth is that the vaccine won't "take" for a number of children, and immunity is not complete until a youngster has had all three shots required in the innoculation process. > 2. They voted to admit Negro undergraduate students, beginning with the September, 1956 term, in the main university; and at the Texas Western College branch in El Paso, this September. Admission to all other branches will be in September of 1956.

3. They also visited to set up restrictions on all admissions, on examinations and based scholastic requirements, effective in 1956.

UT regents also refused to reconsider their earlier rule which banned from the campus automobiles owned by freshmen and sophomore students.

#### INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE REAPPRAISES

Texas public schools which admit Negroes will not be barred from Interscholastic League activities next years.

This ruling, made last week by the league's executive committee, resulted from a petition from the El Paso system regarding its status. El Paso plans to desegregate next Fall.

Interscholastic League's constitution, framed before the U. S. Supreme Court's ruling aginst school segregation, limits membership to "any public white school.

#### INSURANCE RATES LOWERED

Large industrial plants in Texas were promised lower fire nsurance rates when the Insurance Commission adopted a new rating plan "for highly protected risks."

Praising the recently enacted insurance code, the commission said it is "one of the best in the nation" and every loophole in Texas insurance laws "has been closed.


