Uncle Sam Scheduling More Defense Drills Some 30,000 Workers In Autumn Evacuation

WASHINGTON—Look for the government to hold more and bigger defense drills like last June's "Operation Alert," despite all the criticism heaped upon it.

In future exercises, there will be wider participation by federal employees in the evacuation phase, which, incidentally, will become more realistic.

The next test has been tentatively scheduled for October or November. It is likely that about 30,000 government workers will be relocated. Present plans are for some top officials to be hypothetically "killed" during the test, so lines of command can be tried out.

It depends on world conditions whether the Strategic Air Command will take part in the next "Operation Alert."

If peace hopes are still high, the SAC will be kept out of it, because officials will once again want to shy away from creating any impression that the United States is adhering to the "massive retaliation" theory.

The Supreme Court will participate in the next drill, and those members of Congress who are in Washington will be invited to take part.

Congress and the high tribunal were left out of the June test, partly because the Office of Defense had not found suitable relocation centers for them.

VISITORS—There's a chance that the top Soviet leaders may be invited to visit the United States next year if the new era of friendliness between America and Russia continues.

President Eisenhower told his news conference recently that the matter was discussed at the Geneva Big Four meeting but no formal invitations were issued or commitments made.

The Russians presumably suggested to Mr. Eisenhower that he would be a welcome guest in Moscow. It is considered unlikely that he would make such a trip, but he probably would send a top-level emissary.

In fact, tentative plans already are being set up for Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who does most of Ike's world-visiting for him, to visit Russia and other European countries next fall.

If Nixon makes the trip, the United States will, of course, invite the Russian leaders to this country. So, Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev may follow up their spring visit to Britain with a journey to the United States.

TAX DELINQUENTS—The Justice department is attempting to collect a whopping \$39 million plus interest at the rate of \$46,000 a day from some 5,240 delinquent taxpayers.

Assistant Attorney General H. Brian Holland has reported that the department is pressing criminal action against 780 persons accused of violating the nation's tax laws.

During the first half of 1955, he said, the department obtained 389 convictions in criminal tax cases, more than twice the total in 1952, the last year of the Truman administration.

One of the reasons the government is making an all-out crackdown on tax offenders is a desire to sweep every available penny into federal coffers.

The President is determined to achieve a balanced budget next year so the Republicans can go to the country in the 1956 general elections with fulfillment of a top 1952 campaign pledge.

CRASH REVERBERATIONS—The recent flaming crash of an Israeli airliner in Communist Bulgaria brought a new development in intra-iron curtain relations.

Soviet citizens, as well as Americans, were among the crash victims. Moscow, which has taken no part in previous incidents involving planes brought down in Soviet satellite countries, was thoroughly displeased and conveyed its displeasure to the Bulgarian government in no uncertain terms.

In contrast, the first official United States reaction was somewhat milder than usual. The State department described the crash merely as an "unfortunate occurrence."

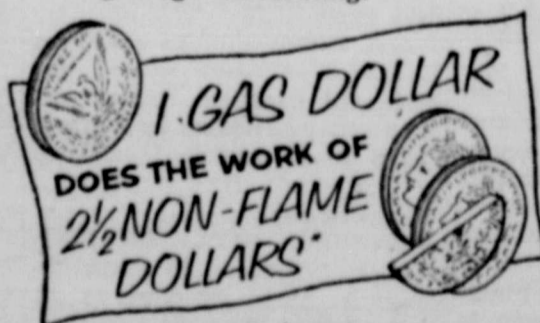

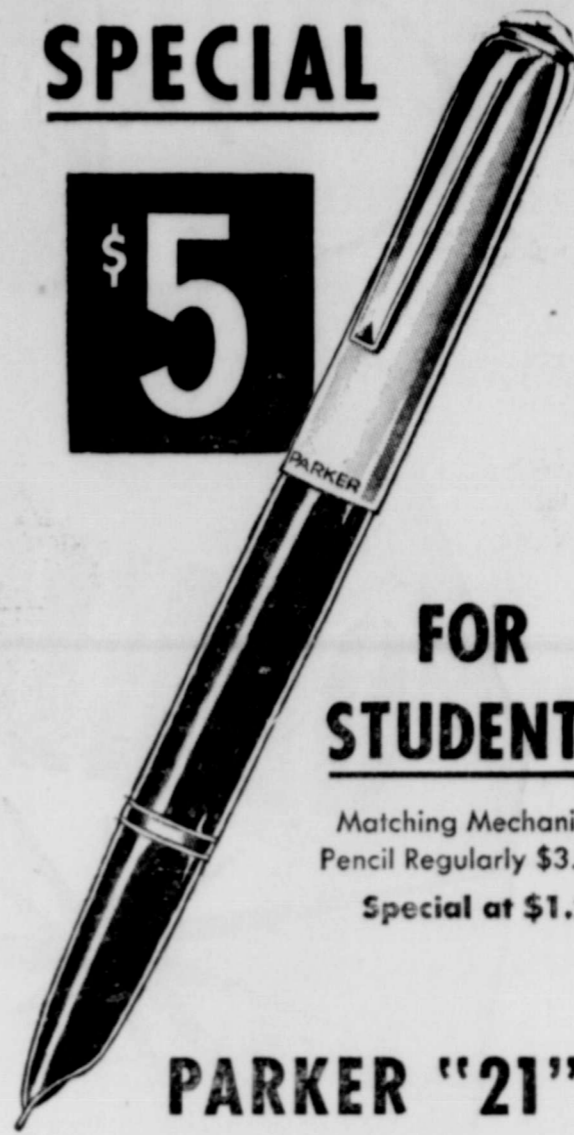

### "Souls In Conflict," Newest Billy Graham Film, To Be Shown Here

"SOULS IN CONFLICT," the fourth motion picture released by Evangelist Billy Graham, this one filmed against the backdrop of his highly successful London Crusade, will be shown in Goldthwaite at 8:00 p. m. in First Baptist Church. All seats are free.

"SOULS IN CONFLICT" is a trilogy, a full-length production in color which documents the

life stories of an actress, a jet pilot, and a factory worker, as they are influenced by Graham's spiritual messages—delivered before audiences numbering as many as 120,000 persons in vast Wembley Stadium.

Since his first major campaign in America, in Los Angeles, California, in 1950, Graham has supplemented his ministry with the coast-to-coast radio broadcast, the "Hour of Decision," over A B C carried by 300 stations here in America and approximately 50 foreign stations.

In 1952 increased use of religious films brought about the formation of Billy Graham Evangelistic Films, Inc. "MID-CENTURY CRUSADE," a documentary of Graham's Portland, Oregon Campaign, was the first production for this new organization. "MR. TEXAS," the world's first Christian Western, which saw 25,000 persons crowd Hollywood Bowl for its premiere, followed, "OILTOWN U. S. A.," a story of the message of evangelism in millionaire circles in Houston, Texas, was the third such film.

Inasmuch as the now historic London Crusade was Graham's most ambitious endeavor, "SOULS IN CONFLICT" is his most important picture. Featured in the cast are Joan Winmill, star of the British TV thriller, "Epitaph for a spy," Eric Mickelwood and Charles Leno. Miss Winmill was one of those who "came forward" in Harringay Arena, later to receive counsel in the interview room from none other than Mrs. Billy Graham.

Donn Moomaw, six-foot-four, 222-pound All-American line backer from UCLA, who turned down a most lucrative offer to play professional football to follow the dictates of his heart in the field of evangelism, is also prominently featured, as is Colleen Townsend Evans, ex-Warner Brothers and 20th Century-Fox player.

"SOULS IN CONFLICT" was produced for Billy Graham by Great Commission Films, Hollywood, in association with Anglo-Scottish Pictures, London. Dick Ross wrote and directed the picture assisted by Leonard Reeve. The special musical score was composed and conducted by Ralph Carmichael.

#### CUTTING FARM LABOR COSTS

The need for whittling down labor requirements in livestock production is a problem facing farmers—particularly small ones—today.

Since the start of World War II, farm wages have quadrupled, and the resultant necessity of cutting back labor requirements has been met, in some areas of farming, by mechanization and modernized methods.

However, livestock labor input has been shortened by only seven per cent during this 14-year period, contrasted with a 34 per cent crop labor reduction.

Large livestock producers have managed to keep ahead in many areas with improved, efficient but expensive methods. Unhappily, the small farmer who has relied in the past on a reserve profit from a sideline in dairying, poultry raising, or some other livestock project finds himself in something of a bind over the labor situation.

By the old hand-milking method, it requires an average of 61.7 man-hours to produce \$100 worth of milk. That labor cost can be cut by 20 per cent if milking machines are used.

In hog production, size of the herd makes the big difference in labor required. That's because a large herd can use automatic feeders and waterers economically, whereas small herds can't. In Texas, labor input per \$100 of pork products amount to about 25 man-hours. And there's quite an investment involved in hog-raising.

Probably more has been done to mechanize the poultry industry in recent years than any other single phase of livestock raising. Production-line broiler raising takes 5 to 15 hours of labor per 100 birds, whereas the less-routinized raising of chickens to the same age for laying flocks takes 25 to 35 hours.

Very few of these labor-saving devices are practical unless they can be applied to large numbers because of initial cost. And many small farmers have neither the space required nor the capital for investment in a

large number of animals.

Our agricultural researchers are working to find a solution to the problem, for only as a farmer is assured of an income on such assured commodities can he feel safe in continuing his perpetual game of chance with nature; a crop success or failure.

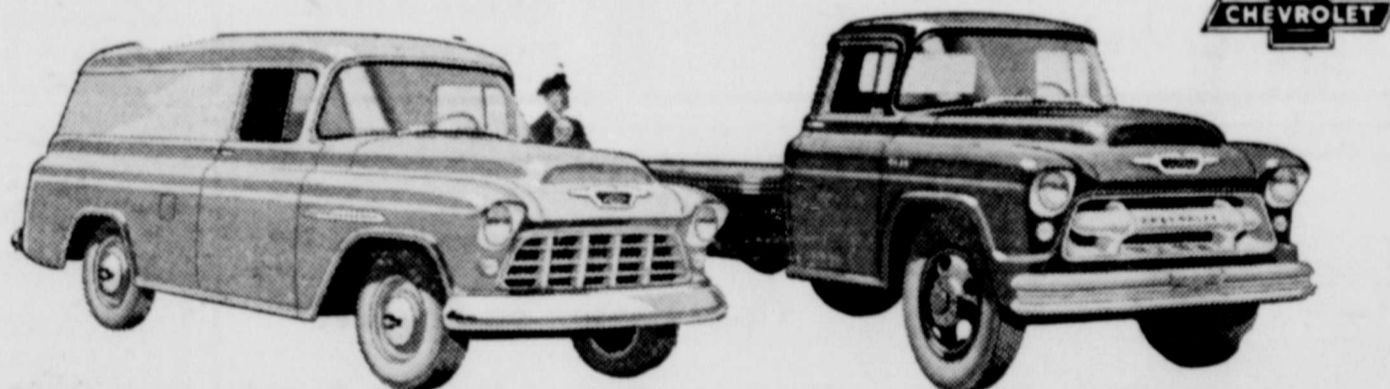

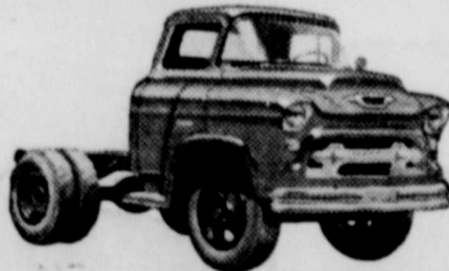

### Social Security Information As Effecting Farmers And Farmhands

A person who is hired to do farm or other agricultural work can generally tell whether his cash wages count toward his social security. However, a farm owner has several things to consider before he can tell whether his earnings can be counted.

For instance, the mere ownership of farm property does not mean that your net earnings from the property can be credited to your social security account. It is necessary that you actually engage in the operation of the farm. This you may do alone, or under a partnership or joint venture arrangement. You may operate the farm

with or without hired help. If, as an owner, lessee, or sharecropper, you actually engage in the operation of the farm, you are a self-employed farmer for social security purposes, and your net earnings of \$400 or more in a year for any year after 1954 can be credited to your social security account.

On the other hand, if you own a farm but rent it out on cash or share-crop rental arrangement, your income from that source cannot be counted as self-employment earnings for social security purposes. In such cases, the earnings the farm owner derived from the farm property are considered to be rentals from real estate. This is so, whether the rental is paid

to him in cash or in a share of the crop. Earnings from the rental of real estate of any kind are not earnings from self-employment for social security purposes (unless you are a real estate dealer). Of course, you may rent part of your farm lands, and actually operate other parts of them yourself. Your income from that part which you yourself operate will count as earnings from self-employment.

If you are a farm operator and also have self-employment earnings from a non-farm enterprise covered by the law, the earnings from both enterprises up to a total of \$4,200 in a year can be credited to your social security account. For example: If, in addition to operating a farm, you also operate a store or filling station, your combined net earnings from both activities can be credited to your social security account.

Moreover, if, in addition to operating a farm, you also work part of the year in employment; for wages, you will get social security credit from those earnings, too. In such cases, the wages will count first, and you will report and pay the social security self-employment tax on only enough of your farm earnings to bring the combined total for the year up to \$4,200.

As I said at the beginning of this article, a farm operator need not be a farm owner. He may be a lessee or a renter on either a cash or share of the crop basis. In my next article, I shall discuss the share-cropper as a self-employed farmer under social security.

### Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

year deferment can do to your depleted range—many farmers and ranchmen—Brown-Mills Soil Con-

servations District are discovering.

A number of cooperators took advantage of the deferred grazing practice under the AC program this year. As a result of this deferment many of the desired grasses are appearing in their pastures.

Sam H. Rahl, cooperator of the district, is finding this to be true on his pastures. In observing Sam Henry's range recently a large area of Big bluestem was found. This grass is scarce in pastures, becoming extinct under the least amount of overuse. Mr. Rahl is sold on deferred grazing. He explained that when he began the deferment most of the pasture was bare. After

only one year of deferment Big bluestem, Indiangrass, Little bluestem, Sideoats grama, White triodia, Canada wildrye, Silver bluestem, various dropseeds, and many others of the more desirable grasses were in abundance.

For those who have been deferring their rangeland this year, we would like to pass on this one word of caution. To produce a good seed crop you should continue your deferment until the seed have fully matured or until the first frost. At the present time most of the grasses are beginning to seed and by turning in on the pastures now would eliminate all chances of producing a seed crop.

\*\*\*\*\*  
Cover crop planting time is just around the corner. Cooperators of the district who plan to plant their cover crop this fall should begin making their preparations now.

Three important things that should be now in preparation for fall sowing are:

1. Decide on the variety of legumes to plant and locate the seed.
2. Locate the kind of fertilizer you will need.
3. Get grain drill in working order or make arrangements for the use of a drill.

By doing these three things now time will be saved when you begin sowing.

### Farmers And Ranchers Should Plan Now For Winter Legume Plantings

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.)—Farmers should be making plans now for the seed and fertilizers which will be needed for winter legume plantings. In most areas of the state, says Ben R. Spears, extension agronomist, the best time for fall planting is from mid-September to early November.

For fall plantings in the East Texas Timber area, Spears recommends hairy vetch, Single-tray peas, Austrian winter peas and crimson clover. For the southern half of the area, the less winter hardy common and Williamette vetches and Dixie Wonder peas are also adapted.

For the Blackland, Grand Prairie and South Texas regions, Spears suggests Hubam and Madrid sweetclovers because of their deep root system for soil building and ability to reduce the damage from cotton root rot. The clovers can be fall planted from Waco south but north of this line should be spring planted, says Spears. Hairy vetch and winter peas are also adapted to the regions.

For the West Cross Timbers area, hairy vetch is the most dependable legume. However, winter peas and the sweetclovers are also adapted.

For the High Plains and the El Paso and Pecos Valleys, the principal adapted legume is alfalfa under irrigation. The biennial sweetclovers, hairy vetch and Austrian winter peas can also be grown if irrigation is available.

Finally, Spears suggests that the local county agent be con-

tacted for details on legume varieties as well as on fertilizing, inoculation and seeding operations.

### News About Social Security

Thousands of self-employed professional people do not know that they and their families will benefit from the Social Security Act. Since the beginning of 1955 this law extended protection to self-employed accountants, architects, funeral directors, and professional engineers.

This means that any group without social security account numbers should obtain one as soon as possible. Net earnings of as much as \$400 and up to \$4200 in a year must be reported in conjunction with filing Federal Income Tax Returns every year after 1954.

It is important to realize that in addition to providing for retirement at age 65, the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the social security law give protection to the families

of insured professionals who die at any age.

Applications for social security account cards and booklet 35, "Your Social Security" may be obtained from your Austin social security district office.

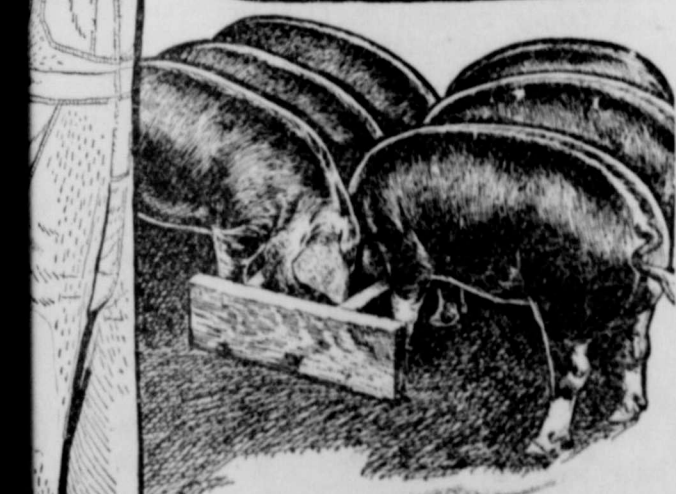

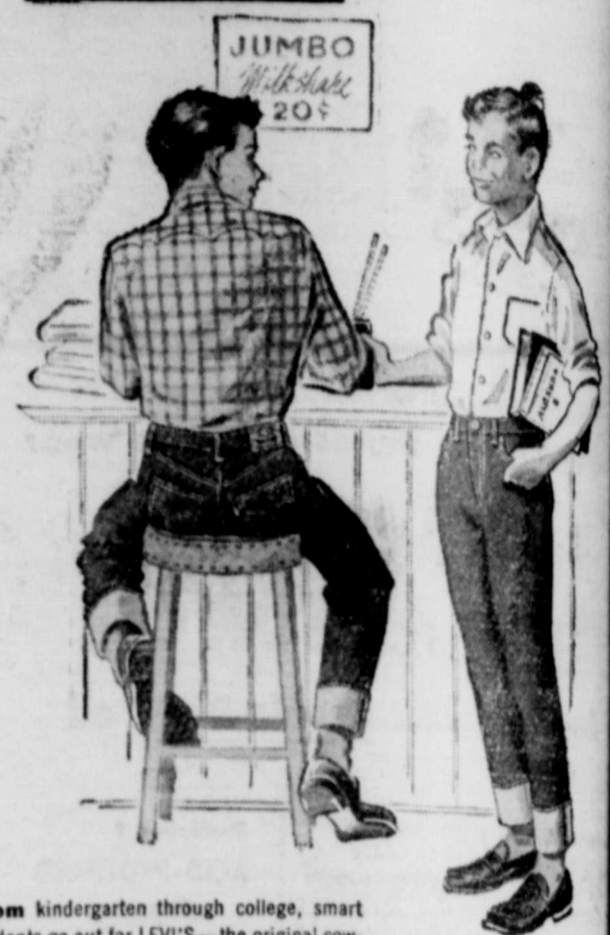

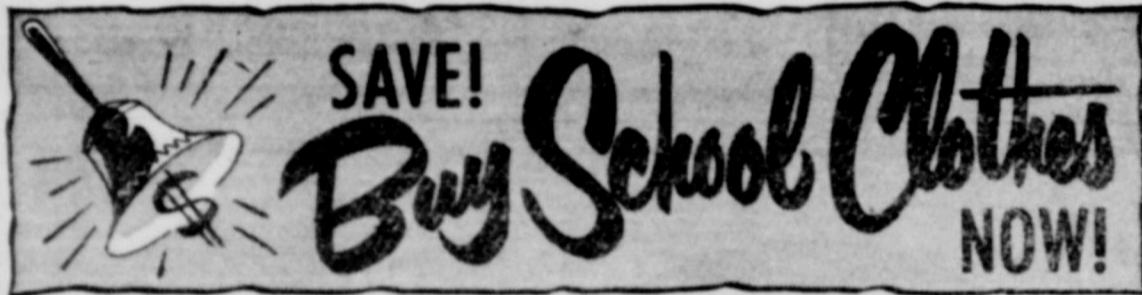
