## COCKRUMS ATTEND FRIGIDAIRE SHOW

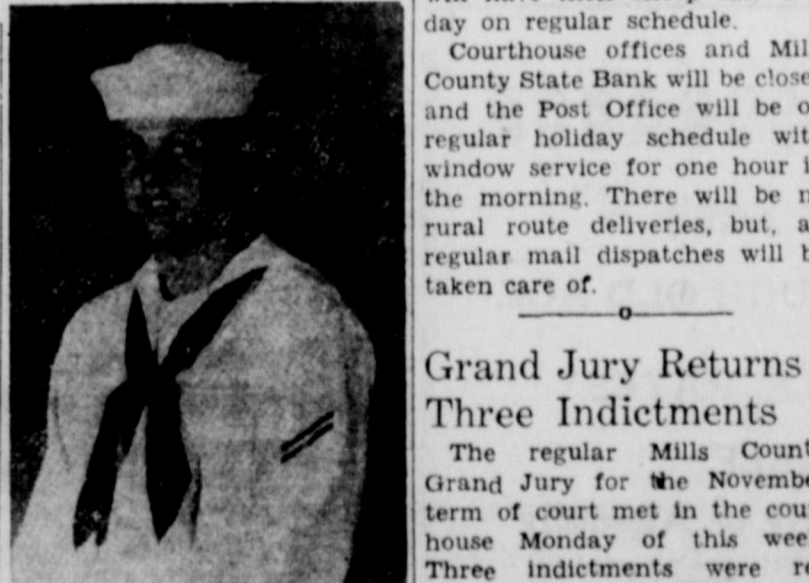

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Housing Officials Peeved Over Russ Tour Brushoff Seems Nobody Told Them Of Soviets' Study Trip

WASHINGTON—Housing officials are privately sizzling over the 10 Russians who are taking a one-month, coast-to-coast tour of American housing projects.

The Russians—all officials of the Soviet government—were invited on the trip by the National Association of Home Builders. Trouble is, NAHB worked quietly with the State department on the project. Nobody told Housing Administrator Albert M. Cole or other government housing officials about it.

In any event, the tour of the Russians, which is designed to improve relations between East and West, seems likely to add a little to the strain between government housing officials and the industry.

HEART RESEARCH—Congressmen will be giving a further look next January at suggestions that the best way to combat mounting heart disease in this country is to do research in other lands.

Dr. Paul D. White, President Eisenhower's heart specialist, raised the point at a hearing earlier this year. He said other countries "which cannot afford to live the way we do" have less heart ailments among their population.

Dr. White said the standard of living is pretty much on one level in this country. Other nations have sharper differences and for this reason offer a better opportunity for research on heart ailments.

The specialist told Congress that public health officials have done little study of the problem abroad because they fear criticism for using money for travel.

Now that the President's illness has dramatized the need for heart research the chances are improving for further funds for study abroad.

BRAZILIAN FRIENDSHIP—American policy makers are sure of continued Brazilian friendship despite the final outcome of the important elections recently held in that nation.

Although the official results were not yet in it appeared certain that a former Brazilian state governor, Juscelino Kubitschek, was the certain victor. He had the support of the mass of the followers of the late President Vargas, who committed suicide when the army tried to oust him.

More important, Kubitschek had the support of Brazilian Communists. However, State department officials are sure he will try to maintain close ties with the army and may eventually have to crack down on local Reds.

The keystone of Brazilian foreign policy has been to maintain close ties with the United States, and it is doubtful whether the army, which always plays a steady role in Brazil, would allow any chief executive to veer away from that policy.

WATER PROBLEMS—Rep. Harold C. Ostertag (R), New York, says five thousand American GIs in Greenland are surrounded by water, but have difficulty in getting a drink. "It's all frozen," explained the congressman following an inspection trip to the Air Force base at Thule. "Ice and snow have to be melted to provide water."

Ostertag said the men get their milk from a "mechanical cow," a machine operated by a private concern, which mixes a powder and a fatty substance, producing bottled milk. "I tasted it," he told newsmen, "and I couldn't tell the difference. It tasted just like real milk."

Times sure have changed since 1887, or, at least so it would seem after looking over the Mills County tax assessment roll for that year.

Clyde Cockrum was displaying a copy of the tax roll of 1887, which was listed as Mills County, formerly a portion of Lampasas County, one day last week.

Some items of special interest, with regard to changing times and conditions, were the listing of horses, mules, and bugles and wagons.

At that time twenty head of horses was a real treasure. Horses were assessed at a variety of valuations while cattle seemed to be listed pretty much at \$5.00 per head.

Another interesting feature of that tax roll was noted by this writer. A number of citizens were listed as having money. Listing money on the tax roll seems to have become outdated during the years. Anyway, items of from \$5.00 to \$500.00 were listed on the 1887 roll as "Money

On Hand." The first one in the book listing money was the amount of \$5.00. Turning through a number of pages two listings were noted where the amount was \$500.00. That was real "Money On Hand" in those days. Just think how far that would go, as compared with prices and buying power of the dollar today.

I well remember when I was a little feller sitting on a box full of corn cobs by the Home Comfort kitchen range in our four room farm house watching while the tax man was getting details from Dad for the tax roll. We lived fourteen miles out in the country and when anyone from town came by to see us naturally we all sat up and took notice. This tax man would list land, livestock machinery and before he got through he would always wind up his work by asking the question: "How much money do you have in the bank?"

Don't get me wrong, either. That was a long time after 1887, because I didn't make my appearance in this world on the bleak and dreary Kansas plains, until many moons after that.

EXPECT THE UNEXPECTED

The first recorded traffic death in this country was a pedestrian struck after he had alighted from a street car, according to the Texas Safety Association. And pedestrians have been getting themselves killed by automobiles ever since.

You'd think that in the many years automobiles have been part of the American scene, pedestrians would have learned to live with them. But statistics prove they haven't.

Last year 7,900 pedestrians were killed in traffic.

What's the reason behind this whole distressing problem? There are many reasons, of course. Some of them involve the pedestrians—others involve the driver—most of them involve carelessness on somebody's part.

But one fact looms large in any study of pedestrian accident fatalities—a great many pedestrians killed each year are non-drivers. They are unfamiliar with the limitations of the driver and his car.

This fact gives both drivers and walkers a valuable clue on the prevention of pedestrian traffic deaths.

Because of it the driver should expect the pedestrian to have faulty judgment in estimating the speed of an automobile, in figuring how well the driver can

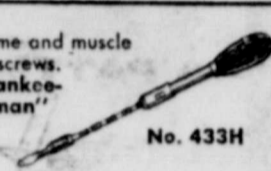

### ANTIBIOTICS IN AGRICULTURE

Use of antibiotics in production and marketing of meat animals may have a profound effect on Texas livestock industry. Definite proof has been established that use of certain of the "wonder drugs" can do everything from bringing more pigs per litter to keeping beef, poultry, fish and even whales fresh.

In tests using aureomycin feed supplements, growth of pigs has been improved an average of 36%. Similar benefits are gotten from use of this antibiotic in beef cattle, sheep and dairy cattle. This could mean a tremendous saving in feed and labor costs, since animals would get to market sooner. Use of the feed supplements also has resulted in a saving of about 20 lbs. of feed per 100 lbs. of gain due to increased efficiency of food utilization.

This speeded-up growth is probably brought about as antibiotics keep down germs of some diseases, create good conditions for organisms which produce vitamins, suppress intestinal germs which compete with the animal for vitamins in its food, and regulate important growth functions in the animal body.

### DELAYS FOOD SPOilage

More pigs per litter can be produced when the mother sow's diet is supplemented with aureomycin during pregnancy. Although the number of embryos and birth weight of pigs could not be increased by using the feed supplement, it is known that more pigs are born live and an "inborn" resistance enables more of them to survive until weaned.

Remarkable results have been

found in preserving meat with aureomycin. Such action of antibiotics in keeping meat fresh longer is to prevent formation of spoilage bacteria for a longer period. It is not a substitute for refrigeration, but a supplement to it.

The ratio of antibiotics used in most of these processes is very small. If these tests situations can be considered an accurate measuring stick for the world livestock industry, then a dramatic increase in the world food supply is possible.

Lieutenant Utzman's unit, the crack 77th Special Forces Airborne Group, marked its return with a parachute drop over Fort Bragg, N. C., its home station. The troops had undergone training in living behind enemy lines and mountain survival.

Lieutenant Utzman, last stationed in Korea, entered the Army in 1946. He holds the Army Commendation Ribbon.

### Farmers Are Urged To Apply For Social Security Identification Number

Many farm employers in Mills County have not yet applied for an identification number, according to James B. Marley, manager of the Austin, Texas social security office.

Mr. Marley explained that any employer of agriculture labor, including cotton ginners, custom harvesters, labor contractors (crew leaders), and other farmers, who pays one or more employees at least \$100 cash wages during the entire year, is required to register for an Employer's Identification Number. This is necessary, he said, so that the proper forms may be mailed the employer for reporting the social security tax on his farm hands at the end of

the year. The Employer's Identification Number is not to be confused with the individual's social security account number, which is needed by both farm hands and self-employed farmers.

Mr. Marley stated that agricultural employers can get an application for an employer's number from the County Agent or by writing the Social Security Administration, Austin, Texas.
