## Sheriff Stubblefield Asks Motorists To Cooperate In Safe Driving Move

"S-D (Safe Driving) Day, sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety," says Sheriff Stubblefield of Mills County, "has been set for Thursday, December 1, 1955."

Sheriff Stubblefield points out that this year, as last, the purpose of S-D Day is to prove to people everywhere that motorists and pedestrians can reduce accidents by their own actions. "The challenge to Mills County residents," adds Sheriff Stubblefield, "will be: Not a single traffic accident during the 24-hour period... in daylight or darkness."

"It is the moral and civic responsibility of every highway user to accept this challenge," continues the Sheriff. "If we of Mills County can show that by safe and sensible driving on S-D Day this year we can not only accept, but overcome this challenge we will have taken a major step towards greatly reducing the traffic accident toll in Mills County."

"In 1951 after 50 years of automobile history the one millionth traffic death was recorded in the United States. At our present rate," says Sheriff Stubblefield, "only half as long will be required to kill the second million."

"Our own traffic death rate must be reduced and residents of Mills County can, by a concerted effort, and with the highest regard for safe driving principles and the highway code, show their willingness to cooperate."

Sheriff Stubblefield reminds all motorists that excessive speed is responsible for the majority of traffic accident fatalities and asks all drivers in Mills County to drive within the established speed limits on highways and in restricted areas. "To disregard this maxim," the Sheriff adds, "is to exhibit a selfish and irresponsible attitude by placing your own and the lives of our fellow men in jeopardy."

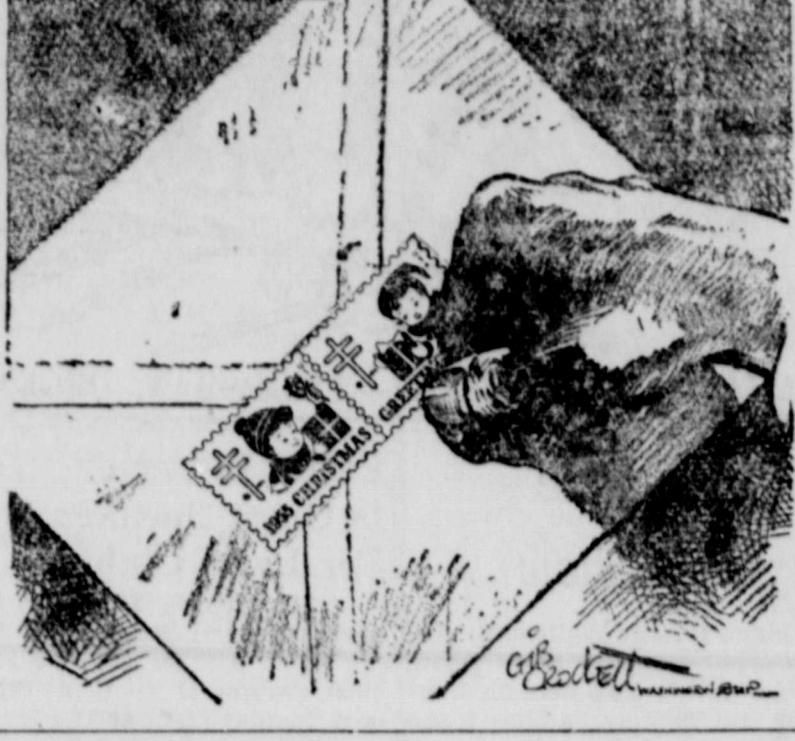


Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Latin America's Voice in United Nations Vital U. S. The 29 Latin American nations form almost the deciding bloc at the United Nations, and their votes are vital if the policy of the West is to continue to prevail.

Johnson (D), Texas, has been given the green light by his medical advisers to resume his leadership post when Congress convenes in January. VIC'S... SOLILOQUY

This week we are presenting here a guest editorial which has been passed on to us by Norman Duren, chairman, Mills County Chapter, Red Cross Blood Program. Mr. Duren and his co-workers are working many hours in their efforts to promote the blood program in Mills County. They need the cooperation of citizens if the program is to continue to be successful.

DON'T LET GEORGE DO IT

There is always a certain satisfaction in dropping the roundabout, tactful approach to hit straight from the shoulder. It is, however, a departure so unpalatable to so many people that it is generally adopted only when the importance of the subject reduces the protests of damaged egos to the dimensions of a whimpering child who wanted his pill sugar-coated. It is a step not to be taken lightly or without due regard for the repercussions which usually follow unadorned truth. But certainly the safeguarding of human life justifies any unpleasant after-effects.

For years, the Red Cross has pleaded and cajoled with the able-bodied adults of this and other communities to become blood donors. Their approach has been almost too tactful and unassuming, considering what it is they are asking and that they are not asking it for themselves. Fortunately, for those people who have a sense of responsibility toward their fellow man, no more direct approach is necessary. There are not many of those people, but there are not enough to supply all the blood needed to carry out the merciful work of the blood program.

There are just too many other people who follow the line of least resistance—let George do it. It is they who mumble excuses, or fail to appear at a bloodmobile at their appointed time. It is also they who would denounce the Red Cross, the local hospital, and the world in general the most loudly if there were not blood on hand to save the life of a member of their family.

There are still others who can be labeled potential blood donors. They are the persons who need only to be made aware of the tremendous scope and great needs of the blood program to become regular blood donors. It is our purpose now to present some straight facts in an effort to promote understanding of the blood program on the part of the people it has been established to serve, and upon whom its success depends.

The Central Texas Regional Blood Center should have at least 12,000 pints of blood annually to meet emergency blood needs in 18 different counties. The ratio is based on population figures of 375,000 for the region. Chances are that right now there is someone in our own hospitals who owes his life to Red Cross blood. Not only must a large quantity of blood be collected each month, but its collection must be geared to the continuous needs of blood. It defeats the very purpose of the blood program if there is extra blood available one day and none for the next three days. In an effort to keep blood supplies steady, Red Cross bloodmobiles are scheduled well in advance and the collections at each, estimated wherever possible. It is quickly apparent what happens when a bloodmobile unit is canceled, or a quota is not met. The entire region suffers a lack which must be measured in terms of human life and human suffering. The whine of an ambulance siren in the middle of the night can be a dreadful sound when there is no blood on hand to meet the emergency.

## Time To Start Christmas Mailings Says Postmaster Lucile Fairman

"It's time to start those Christmas mailings!" Postmaster Lucile Fairman warned today in launching her "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign.

On the Calendar, Christmas is only one month away and everything at the Post Office is ready for the flood of mail which is expected to smash all previous records.

So get out your Christmas card list and carefully check thru it. Make sure that each address includes the full NAME, STREET, AND NUMBER, CITY, ZONE AND STATE. Then pay a visit to the post office and pick up your stamps—(Use 3c stamps on your cards for FIRST CLASS service)—and ask for your copy of "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing."

On your way back home pick up a supply of heavy wrapping paper and heavy cardboard boxes, some strong twine and heavy Kraft adhesive tape.

And remember that all parcels should be mailed by December 10th.

Greeting cards mailed with 3c postage may be sealed, may contain writing, will be forwarded or returned without charge.

Those mailed with 2c (circular or 3rd. class rate) are handled as circular mail and may NOT contain any writing other than your name and address, they may NOT be sealed, will NOT be forwarded and will NOT be returned.

AND—something new has been added:— Beginning November 28th, you may enclose writing—even a letter—in your Christmas parcel by pay-

ing the appropriate postage on the letter and marking on the parcel—"Letter enclosed." The postage for the letter plus the postage for the parcel will be placed on the OUTSIDE of the parcel and the package then dispatched to its destination.

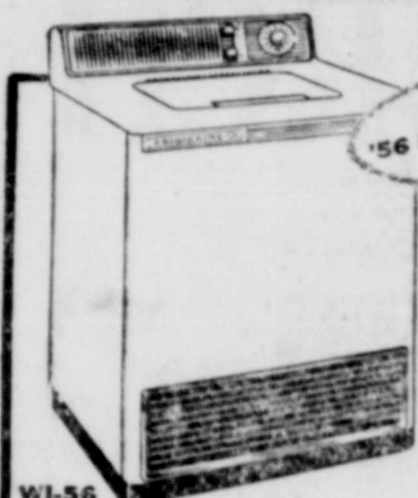

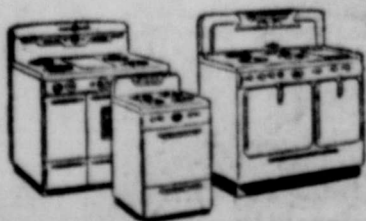

## Time To Start Christmas Mailings Says Postmaster Lucile Fairman

"It's time to start those Christmas mailings!" Postmaster Lucile Fairman warned today in launching her "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign.

On the Calendar, Christmas is only one month away and everything at the Post Office is ready for the flood of mail which is expected to smash all previous records.

So get out your Christmas card list and carefully check thru it. Make sure that each address includes the full NAME, STREET, AND NUMBER, CITY, ZONE AND STATE. Then pay a visit to the post office and pick up your stamps—(Use 3c stamps on your cards for FIRST CLASS service)—and ask for your copy of "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing."

On your way back home pick up a supply of heavy wrapping paper and heavy cardboard boxes, some strong twine and heavy Kraft adhesive tape.

And remember that all parcels should be mailed by December 10th.

Greeting cards mailed with 3c postage may be sealed, may contain writing, will be forwarded or returned without charge.

Those mailed with 2c (circular or 3rd. class rate) are handled as circular mail and may NOT contain any writing other than your name and address, they may NOT be sealed, will NOT be forwarded and will NOT be returned.

AND—something new has been added:—Beginning November 28th, you may enclose writing—even a letter—in your Christmas parcel by pay-

ing the appropriate postage on the letter and marking on the parcel—"Letter enclosed." The postage for the letter plus the postage for the parcel will be placed on the OUTSIDE of the parcel and the package then dispatched to its destination.

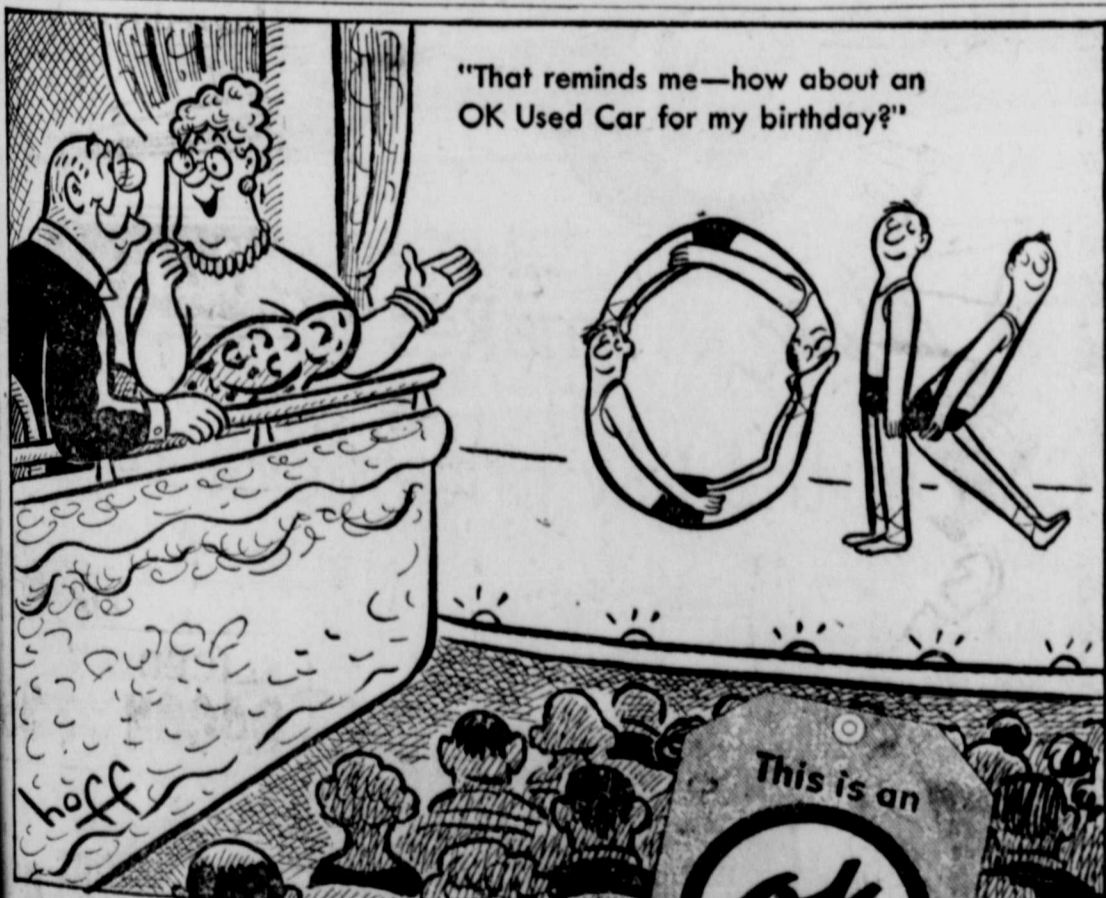

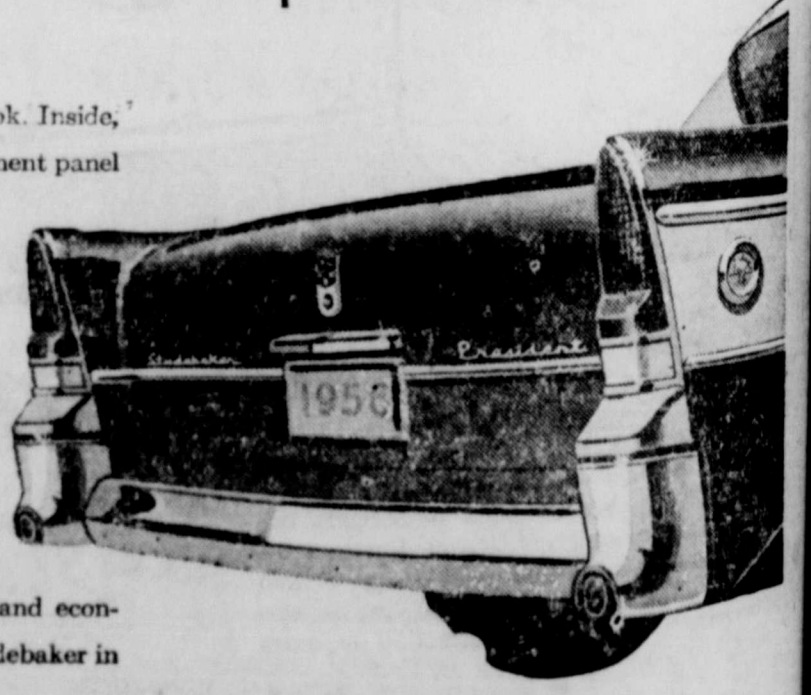

## Clementine Wilmeth Briley Writes of Her Temporary Home In El Paso

Suppose most people know Fort Bliss is located at El Paso. But I didn't know until last week that it had been there for over one hundred years and that it was named for Colonel William Wallace Bliss, a man called "one of the most brilliant scholars to grace the American continent" and "one of the most illustrious generals in the history of America."

In New York in 1815, he was appointed to the United States Military Academy from Hampshire as a boy of 13. Graduated at 17 with a cadet's rank in the class of 1833. He was considered a prodigy at the academy, and his classmates called him "Perfect Bliss." The name was given him later by the Taylor family. He was stationed in the infantry most immediately after his graduation was sent into field duty against the Indians. In the space of seven years he had risen to the position of chief of the 2nd Capt. Bliss accompanied General Zachary Taylor to the Grand Council of Indian Affairs in Oklahoma, a meeting called to insure peace between the white men and the Indians. From then on the history of the brilliant young Bliss followed the career of the general. "Old Rough and Ready" from the Mexican War. President's desk in the White House. 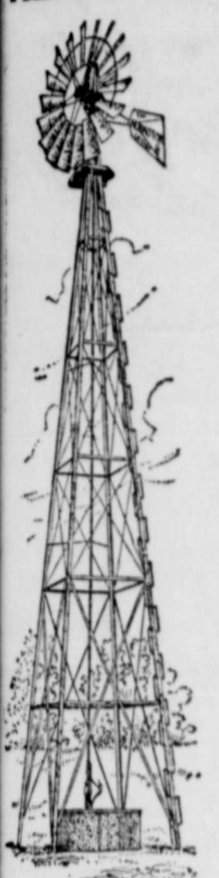

### A MOUNTING FIGHT AGAINST THE PINK BOLLWORM

More Texas farmers than ever before are rallying against the worst of all cotton insect pests — the pink bollworm.

The Plant Quarantine Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture has had excellent cooperation with growers during this season.

In areas of the state where infestation has not been sufficient to force stalk destruction deadlines, many people have asked for voluntary plow-up dates. In the control zones of extreme southern and southeastern Texas where infestation is most serious, stalk destruction deadlines have all been met with very little dissension, and good cultural practices are being followed.

### VALLEY ESCROW PROGRAM SET UP

In four Rio Grande Valley counties where the pink bollworm menace is a serious threat, cotton farmers recently voted 2 to 1 in favor of an escrow program designed to assure compliance with stalk destruction rules.

Under terms of the program to become effective during the 1956 season, cotton farmers in Hidalgo, Willacy, Cameron and Starr counties will post \$7.50 for each bale of cotton ginned to be put in the escrow fund. Growers who fail to meet the cotton stalk destruction deadline will be required to pay for plow-up of their fields from their escrow fund, in addition to penalties previously prescribed by law.

The First National Bank of McAllen, successful bidder to hold the multi-million dollar escrow fund, will return all money remaining in escrow to the growers 30 days after the plow-up deadline. The only deduction will be 6 cents per bale to the bank for salary, material and service costs.

I am personally very pleased to see this exerted effort being put forth by our Valley farmers to make their cotton insect-free.

### NEW INSECTICIDE DEVELOPMENTS

Experiments with a new chemical which promises to be even more effective than DDT in combatting the pink bollworm are being held on test plots over the state. The new chemical, Bayer No. 17147, is also believed to be effective against the boll weevil, whereas DDT is successful against pink bollworms only. It is also probable that fewer applications of the Bayer phosphorous compound would be necessary than the periodic treatments required when DDT is used.

With such intensive research on insecticides, compliance with

our vital pink bollworm control regulations, and — most important — the full cooperation of Texas farmers, this threat to a major Texas cash crop will eventually be ended.

### News About Social Security

When the "disability freeze" provision became a part of the Social Security Act, it offered, in many instances, substantially increased benefit amounts to disabled persons meeting the requirements. Until the freeze provision became operative, a worker who had no earnings for a prolonged period because of disability might find his social security benefits cut down considerably or lost completely by the time he reached 65 and was otherwise eligible to collect them.

Under the new "disability freeze" provision in the law, a worker who has been totally disabled for 6 months or more with a disability which is expected to continue indefinitely, can apply to have his social security record frozen as of the time his disability began. Then when the time comes for figuring up the monthly benefits payable to him at 65, or to his family in case of his death, the years he has no earnings because of his disability are not counted against him.

The more than 1,500 old-age beneficiaries throughout the nation receiving increased monthly benefits since last June dramatically illustrate the value of the freeze provision of the law. The average increase for this group is \$11. Ten to twenty-five dollars is not unusual.

Beneficiaries receiving increased checks today were those who

filed applications for the disability freeze between Jan. 1 and July 1 of this year. Old-age insurance beneficiaries who meet the requirements and apply before July 1, 1957 to have their earnings records frozen will re-

ceive any increase due in their benefit amount retroactive to July 1955.

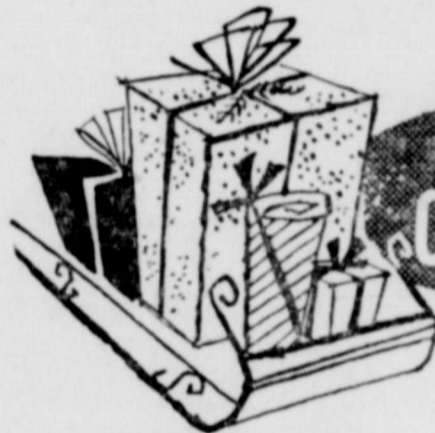

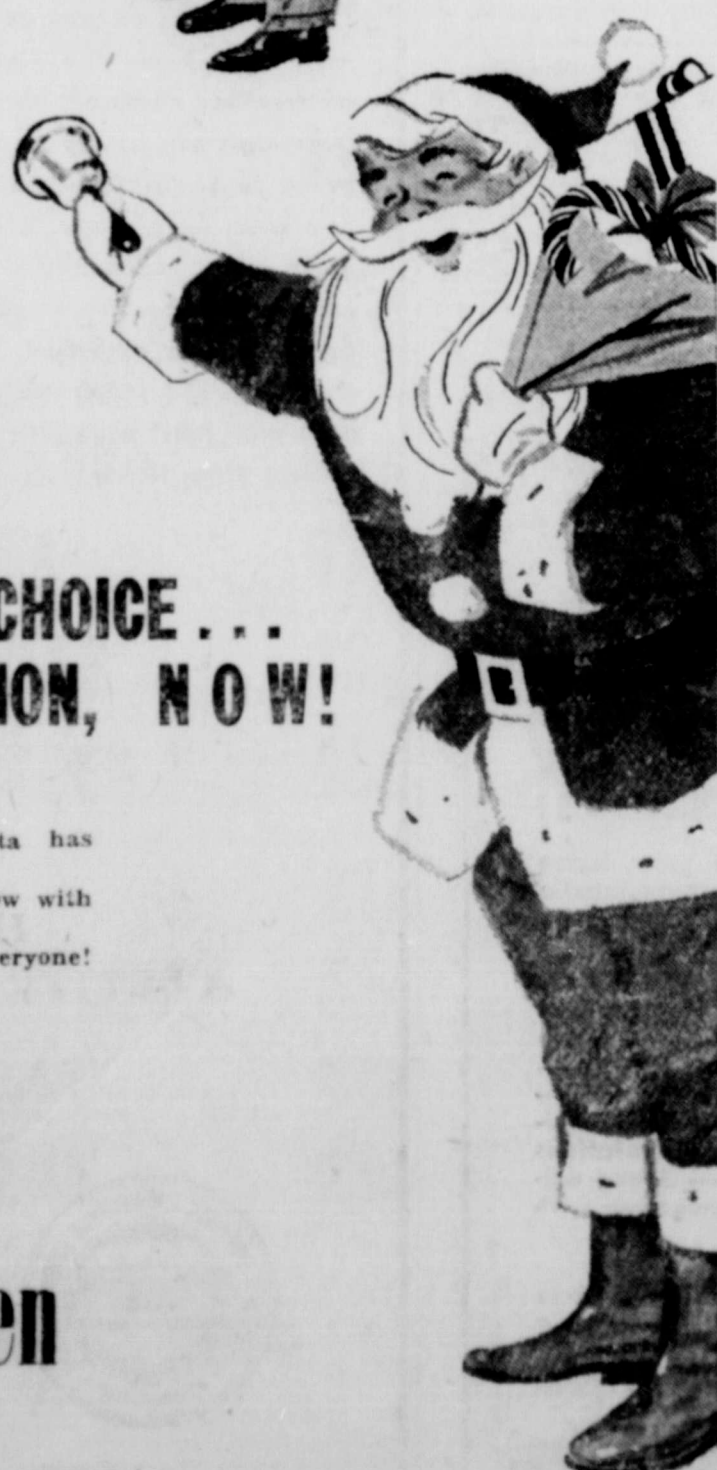

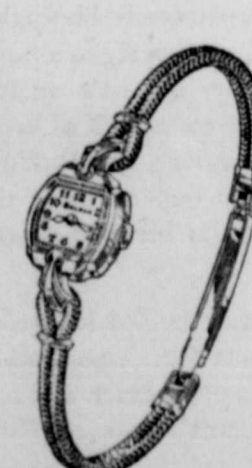
