THERE ARE NO FREE LUNCHEES

(From HORIZONS, published monthly by Abilene Christian College, edited by Don H. Morris, president.)

"It would have been better if Karl had made some capital instead of writing about it."

The mother of Karl Marx, radical father of socialism and author of the COMMUNIST MANIFESTO, is reported to have spoken the above words while Marx was making his tirades against private ownership and free business.

The trouble about the Marxian doctrine, responsible for many of the world's woes today, is that it contradicts the eternal principle that there is never a condition where one receives something for nothing.

The well-known fable of the King who decided to teach his people a lesson in economics is remembered here. He assembled his top economic advisers and asked that they prepare a statement on economics which he would in turn present to his people and which would develop a virile people and a strong nation. Months later his advisers came together with a ten-volume lesson comprising thousands of pages. The king was disappointed, for the treatise was far too intricate and too involved for the people to understand. He then dismissed all but five of the experts and charged them to reduce the lesson into a smaller unit to be presented to the subjects of the land.

The result of the labors by the five was a single volume of one hundred pages. The king was still dissatisfied and chose three of the five to reduce the one volume into a statement of a page or less that could be presented as a lesson in economics which he wanted his people to have.

One of the men reduced the one hundred pages into one page. The second man distilled it even further so that only one-half page was required. But

the third man led the nation he expressed the fundamental principle of economics and living in only five words. His five words were: "THERE ARE NO FREE LUNCHEES."

How can we find fault with this simple and realistically expressed principle.

The sooner all understand that society cannot give a man what it does not first take away, the sooner the more our problems, government otherwise, will be solved. The principle has to do not only with national affairs, but with community life and daily life. I cannot expect my town to be a happy one, my town to be a growing one, or my nation to be a peaceful one unless those who live each of these units of society realize that there are no free lunches; that another cannot carry my load, and should pay my way without my making an effort myself.

Everything worthwhile has a price. That price is not unreasonable. Each of us gets actively what he pays for. The fanatical dream of Karl Marx was not practical. He would destroy Christianity, business, the profit motive, would transgress the one failing law of economics of life.

How wise was his message. "It would have been better if Karl had made some capital instead of writing about it."

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH By CHARLES HAENISCH

Jack Williams, who lives three miles south of Indian Creek, has begun leveling a forty acre field according to a conservation plan developed with him by Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the Brown Mills Soil Conservation District.

Mr. Williams is replacing an old system that was not working properly. Plans are to complete a portion of the new system in the near future so he can begin applying water to it.

E. H. Haggood, near Big Valley, is also in the process of leveling twenty-six acres of pecan orchard that he plans to irrigate.

J. H. Priddy plans to plant more blue panic grass this spring. Hobert, who is a supervisor of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, is well satisfied with the amount of grazing his grass furnished last summer. When asked how he liked the grass, he said, "It will be ready to graze this spring long before other summer grazing crops. I like it well enough to plant more of it this spring."

Blue panic is fast becoming an important grass for the farmers and ranchers of this district. It and other deep rooted perennial grasses will furnish grazing year after year and will also build up the soil faster than any other method. Hobert plows his grass with chisel type plow to get more water in the ground. He also plans to cultivate the grass this summer to control weeds.

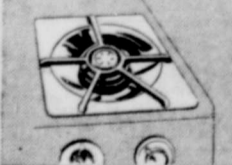

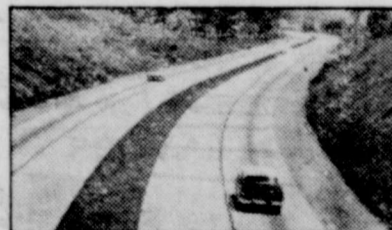

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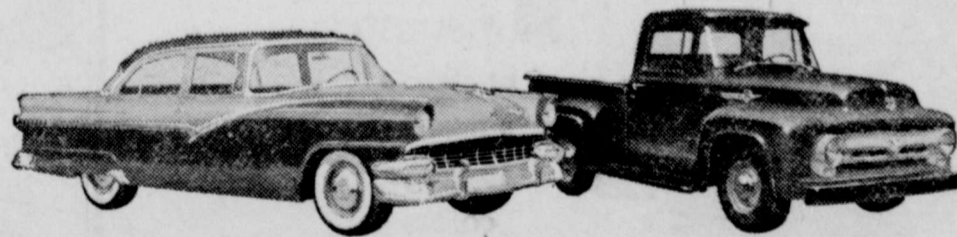
