Window Display And Show Card Writing Classes To Start Monday

Advance enrollments are now being accepted for the courses in Window Display and Show Card Lettering which will start this coming Monday, April 30, with classes being held at the Duren Equipment Building.

The two courses, conducted by W. G. Bohannon, Retail Training Specialist of The University of Texas, Division of Extension, are being sponsored by the Goldthwaite Lions Club.

The window display course will be conducted in eight one-hour sessions beginning Monday evening at 7:00 o'clock. The show card writing course will follow the display course each evening, meeting from 8:00 to 10:00 o'clock.

Bohannon will emphasize the importance of good displays as an aid to increased sales and as a good way to improve the over-all appearance of "main street." He says that the proper displaying of merchandise is one of the most neglected phases of retailing. He will stress the need for better lighting, window back grounds and more appropriate arrangement of merchandise in the eight class sessions.

Show card writing students will have an opportunity to secure sixteen hours of intensive training in the art of lettering with the brush and pen. Bohannon says that any person

can learn to letter just as any person learns to write. During the course, enough of the principles of letter construction and sufficient practice will be offered the students to enable them to master the art of handling the lettering brush, Bohannon said.

The two courses will be conducted Monday through Thursday evening for two weeks. All Goldthwaite and Mills County merchants and their employees are invited to take either or both of the courses.

Complete information about the two courses and registration for same may be obtained from Howard Campbell at Campbell Gas Company or other members of the Lions Club.

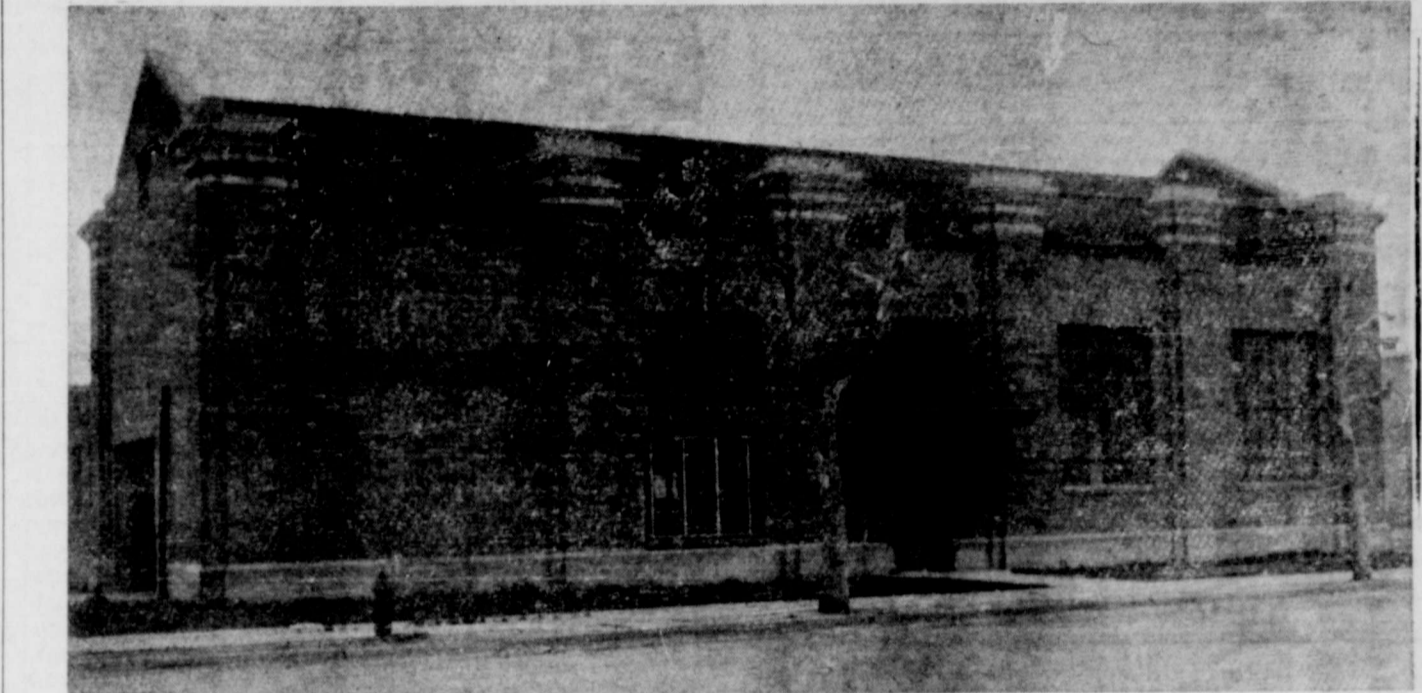

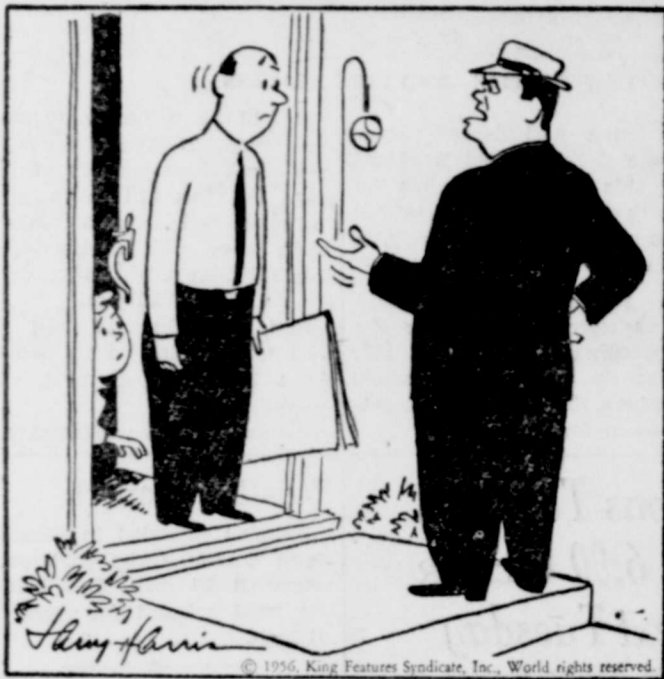

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Ike's Foreign Aid Program Faces Congress Opposition | Administration Must Prove Necessity, Insist Senators

Special to Central Press Association WASHINGTON—The administration is seriously concerned over the chances of getting President Eisenhower's long-term foreign aid policy program through Congress. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who is leading the fight for the program, made a strong pitch for it after his Asian tour.

However, Dulles' words did not carry too much weight with Senator Walter F. George (D), Georgia, chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee. George's reaction was that the administration would have to come to Congress and really prove that the program is necessary.

Chances for enactment of the program were cut further by the position of Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson of Texas.

Like George, Johnson declared the administration will "have to make a compelling case to convince Congress of the need for economic aid and long-term commitments. I doubt whether there is any substantial sentiment at the present time for committing our resources for an indefinite period into the future."

Senator George • THAT KEFAUVER BOOM—The professional politicians aren't as enthusiastic over Senator Estes Kefauver (D), Tennessee, as the voters were in the Minnesota Democratic presidential primary. However, the vote clearly means that the chips are really down for Adlai Stevenson. Once almost conceded the nomination, Stevenson now has his back to the wall.

Washington politics say Stevenson isn't out of the fight yet, by any means, but another sharp setback for him in either Florida or California could spoil his chances.

Kefauver's supporters say that if he can whip Stevenson again in either of the two sunshine states, their man will be a figure to be reckoned with at the Chicago convention.

Kefauver, as "the people's choice," still would stand a chance of getting the nomination at a deadlocked convention—or at least would have enough strength to decide who would get the bid.

• FARM VETO THREAT—The threat of a presidential veto hangs over the farm bill. While congressional farm bloc leaders, named from the House and Senate to the conference committee to whip out the final version, expressed hope their measure would win presidential approval, such an outcome appears doubtful.

The House bill, passed last year, provides for a return to rigid, 90 per cent of parity support for the basic crops—wheat, cotton, corn, peanuts and rice. This proposition is vigorously opposed by the President and the administration on grounds it would call for more production when surpluses of these same crops are jamming warehouses.

The Senate bill, while not calling for 90 per cent supports, included the administration-requested soil bank but provided a series of "gimmicks" to raise price supports to nearly the 90 per cent level. The Senate bill is considered by the Republicans as worse in some respects than the simpler House measure.

Thus, any compromise appears certain to fall far short of administration wishes. Although faced with a possible loss of many votes in the farm belt, the President is almost certain to veto the measure unless the House-Senate conferences back down from their stand on rigid supports.

Mrs. N. Franco of Redwood, California is here visiting in the home of her father, Mr. C. D. McLean.

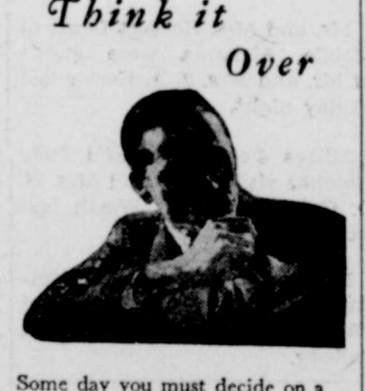

"Dear Mr. Allen: "On behalf of the Secretary of Department of Commerce and the Chief of the Weather Bureau, it is our privilege to present you a token of appreciation for long and faithful service as Weather Observer. The enclosed emblem represents 20 years of unselfish weather service to your community, state and nation."

"You have added valuable data to the store of climatological information by keeping accurate records in all kinds of weather. "We are grateful for your diligence over the years and it is a genuine pleasure for us to know that the young men are safe."

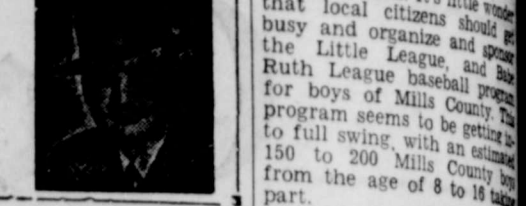

BIKE SAFETY WEEK

The importance of "Bike Safety Week" which was observed in the nation last week, can be judged by statistics. Each year more than 400 children die in bicycle-auto accidents and another 25,000 are injured. Basic bike safety rules include: Obey all traffic signs and regulations; walk the bike across heavily traveled streets and roads; never ride two on a bike; use the proper lights at night; keep the bike in good mechanical condition; stop and see that the streets are clear before riding out of alleys or driveways or from behind parked cars.

Let's get such life-saving rules as these across to every bike rider, not only during Bike Safety Week, but during every week of the year.

The boys will meet Saturday afternoon at Goldthwaite Municipal Ball Park during April and May with regular play to start in June.

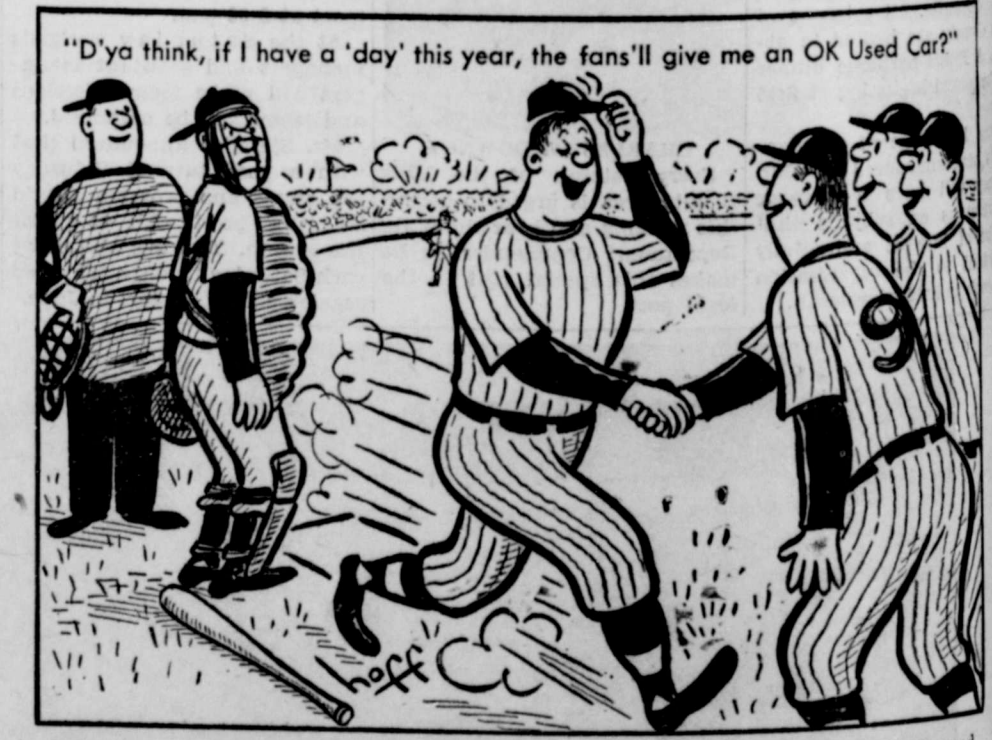

Sherry Darlene Heatherly is the winner of the Bausch and Lomb Honorary Science Award medal for Goldthwaite High School this year, it has been announced this week by James W. Bowman, science teacher at the school. Sherry achieved the highest scholastic record in science subjects during her high school course.

The Honorary Science Award Medal was instituted in 1932 and is presented in thousands of secondary schools throughout the country to the senior with the greatest science aptitude and highest scholastic average. This is the first year the award has been made in the Goldthwaite High School. The Bausch and Lomb Science Scholarship Program was established in 1944 and now provides three scholarships with a value of \$3,200 each. Only winners of the Science Award Medal are eligible to compete for the scholarships.

During her high school career, Sherry maintained a 96.33 average in all her science subjects.

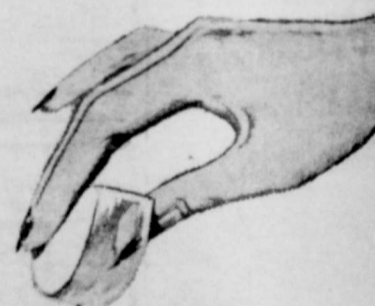
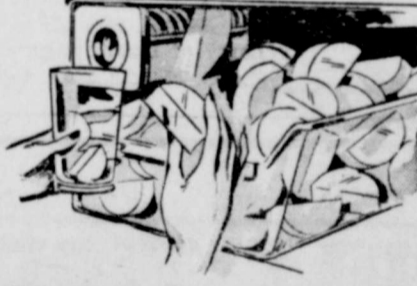

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

By CHARLES HAENISCH

Thirty members of the Goldthwaite Lions Club heard Mr. Howard Boswell, Executive Secretary of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors, discuss the importance of the agricultural industry to the people of this area. He told the group that the job of conserving and preserving our three most important resources, soil, water, and plants was not only the job of the people on the land but was a cooperative job that involved all the people.

Figures quoted from the 1954 Department of Commerce census for the Mills County portion of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District showed the vast industry we have here in the form of agriculture. Boswell pointed out that each person in the area was affected when the agricultural production decreased. The same is true when the production is increased. With an increase of two dollars per acre from the use of soil, water, and plant conservation measures; a yearly increase of approximately \$348,000 could be expected. Each person in the area would benefit through this increase.

Mr. Boswell presented the program on an invitation from the supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District.

Many farmers and ranchers in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District have been requesting information on the planting and growing of Blue panic grass. This grass is an introduced perennial grass that has proven to be well adapted to this area. Cooperators planting this grass have been well

satisfied with the production received from it.

For best results approximately one to one and one-half pounds of seed per acre should be planted in 36 to 42 inch rows. The planting date is at hand. Blue panic can be seeded from now until early summer. Seed should be covered about one-fourth to one-half inches deep.

Those planting blue panic in the past have found it to be well suited for a grazing crop, a hay crop, or used in a rotational system.

For more information on this grass contact the supervisor of your zone or your Soil Conservation Service technician.

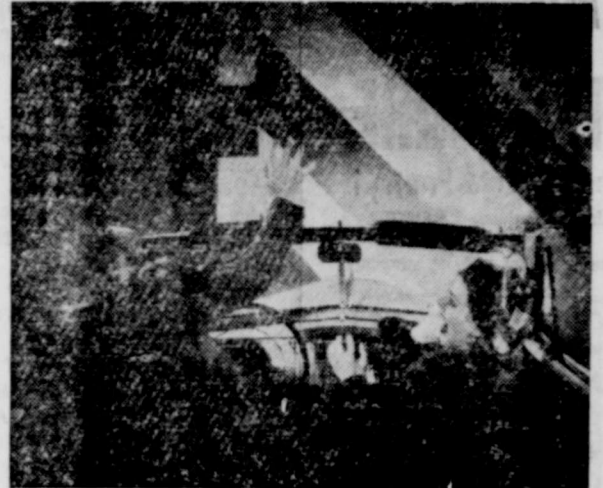

IMPROVED COTTON PRODUCTION

Cotton production and processing is moving into the jet age.

Within a short time, nuclear energy radiations may be used to give cotton a new versatility and improve its textile properties.

This project is just one of many new developments now planned by state and federal cotton research agencies. Goal of this research is to find and create new uses and demands which will put a new sheen on "King Cotton's" slightly tarnished crown.

Future plans were laid for cotton during a research and marketing advisory meeting in Washington last month. The committee, composed of leading agriculturists from over the nation, set a course of action that includes all phases of cotton handling, including production, utilization and marketing.

Rated high on the list were experiments on irrigation of cotton grown in humid areas, improved weed control, better processing methods for cottonseed oil and meal and other work to reduce costs of cotton production. Any savings effected will give a needed shot in the arm to this white crop, notorious for its expensive growing and harvesting methods.

The Gulf Coast area of Texas will be the site of research to study irrigation in humid areas for more prolific production. At the same time, mechanical and chemical weed control studies will be conducted to determine best methods for various localities.

The pink bollworm, Texas' most serious cotton pest, is on the list for advanced research, as well as cotton breeding to improve fiber quality and increase growing efficiency.

New uses for cotton must be developed also. Development is planned on cotton-filled plastic laminates for industrial uses, and stretchable cotton yarns for socks and other knit wear.

These are but a few of the plans outlined by the committee. Cottonseed and related by-products are due their full share of attention. Progress reports on research data will be made available to the industry as they become available.

College Graduates Entering Certain Professions Are Covered With S. S.

Thousands of college graduates entering certain professions are now covered by the social security law, and will be required to report their earnings from self-employment for 1955, it was pointed out today by Mr. James B. Marley, district manager of the Austin social security office.

It is important for graduates who will be self-employed accountants, architects, funeral directors, and professional engineers to understand that if their annual net earnings from covered self-employment are as much as \$400 in a year, such earnings up to \$4,200 in a year must be reported at the time they file Federal income tax returns. These returns are not optional and must include an annual report of self-employment income up to \$4,200 in a year and must be filed not later than April 30, 1956, it was explained by the social security official.

Many professional people do not know that social security credits are based on earnings from self-employment and Federal old-age and survivors insurance benefits are figured on such credited earnings.

In addition to paying monthly retirement checks to eligible persons at age 65, the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the social security law give protection to the families of insured professionals who die at any age, Marley emphasized.

In order to make complete and proper income tax returns under these circumstances, a social security number is required by self-employed persons filing such reports. An application for a social security account number card may be obtained at your social security office or your local post office. If someone has worked previously on a job covered by social security, he must continue to use the same account number. However, if he has lost his old card, he can get a duplicate containing the same social security account number by filing an application at the post office or the social security office.

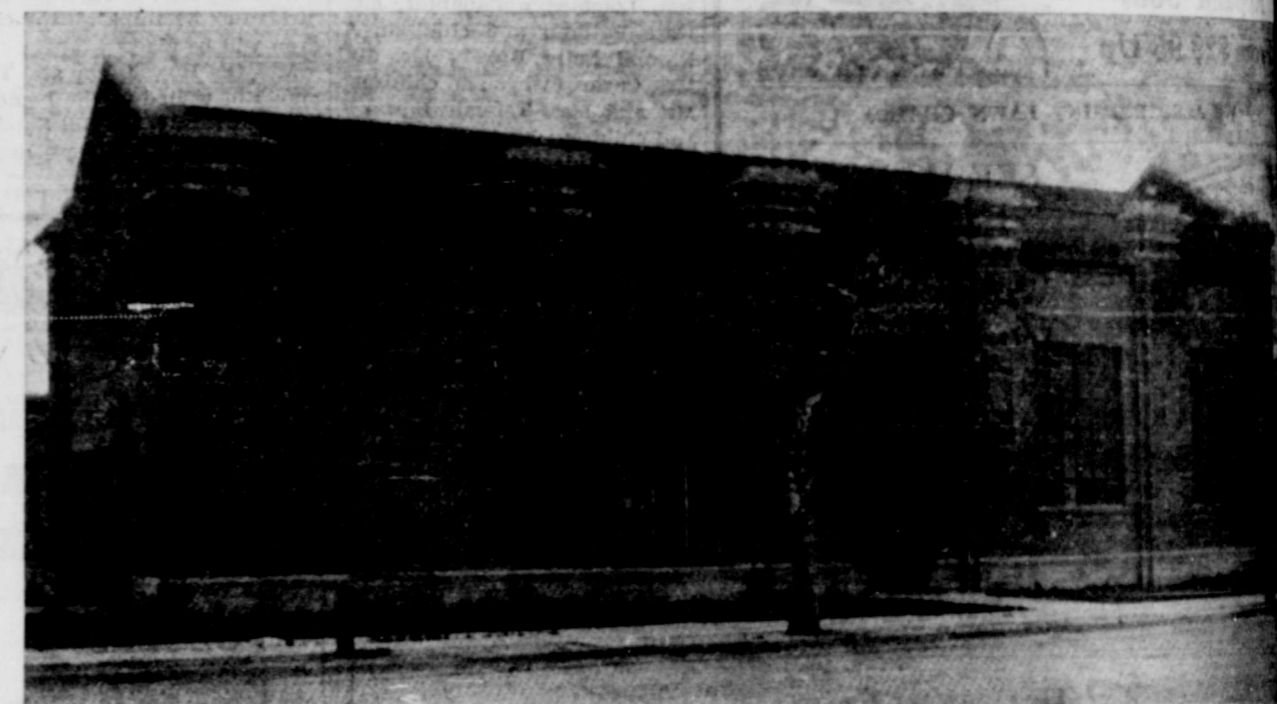

Forces Reserve Has Program Simplified Young Men Of Texas

General Griffing, speaking in connection with Military Reserve Week (April 22-28), pointed out that the U. S. Army is implementing a program designed especially for the youths of America. This program permits a young man to fulfill his military obligation while completing his education or working at his civilian job.

Here is the way it works—he joins a Ready Reserve unit or a National Guard unit. He can finish high school (if he doesn't reach the age of 20 first), then

go on six months active duty for training. He is then prepared for his Ready Reserve service.

Normally he will have seven and one-half years left. During this seven and one-half years if he trains satisfactorily, he will not have to worry about a draft call. In most instances he can train with a unit right in his own home town. The only time he is called away from home is for two weeks each summer to attend training camp. All of this is designed to interrupt, to the very smallest degree, his higher educational pursuits or his civilian occupation.

"Every young Texan should think very seriously about his future military obligation," General Griffing pointed out. "If he doesn't, Uncle Sam is likely to point a finger at him sooner or later. He should consider this program from a standpoint of how it benefits him as an individual. But most important of all he should consider it from a patriotic point of view."

They understand and see the immediate need for a strong and ready reserve.

"Now is indeed the time for every young Texan to come to the aid of his State and his Country," General Griffing concluded.

CAFE CURTAINS

The trend for cafe curtains has found favor with many homemakers. Women like the fact that they are easy to make, easy to hang and easy to wash and clean. Also, they allow easy control of light, air and privacy.

Cafe curtains are suitable for any room in the house provided the windows have horizontal divisions, or are otherwise suited. Usually, they are simply tailored; however, ruffings, bandings or trimmings can be used to give a dressier effect. Most commonly used types are hung on rods by means of loops or rings fastened to the points of row of inverted scallops.

Usually cafe curtains consist of a pair covering the lower half or two-thirds of the window with matching or contrasting valance at the top of the window. However, another pair of curtains made exactly like the lower ones may be hung from a rod across the top of the window. This version can be used without shades. For ease in opening and closing the

top tier and to save wear and tear on the curtains, make a tape of matching material and sew it to the first ring to be pulled toward the center.

These curtains may be of very sheer materials and used with or without side draperies,
