## Local Markets

The Sheep Sales on Friday at Mills County Commission Company continues good with a total of 12,400 head passing through the auction ring last week. At the Goat sale on Monday of this week there were 4,000 head sold.

The market price was off slightly on the following classes of sheep: Milk lambs, stocker lambs, yearlings, aged wethers and ewes and lambs, with all other classes remaining the same as the week before. In the goat division all classes showed an increase in price with the exception of Good Nannies which remained the same as last Monday.

The committee announced that there will be no admission charged to spectators and only the regular swim admission will be charged to contestants.

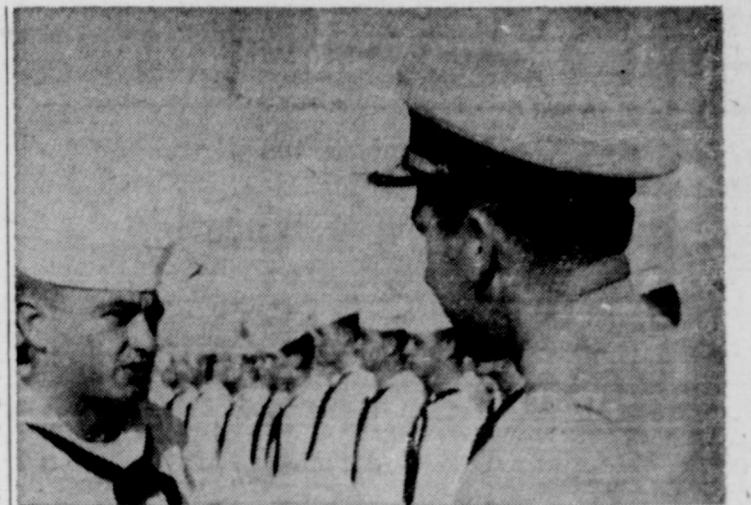

Our local committee provided grocery orders, clothing, medicine, provided emergency transportation to a hospital and sent two boys to camp for our local citizens. Meals, lodging, and transportation were also provided for transients that were in real need of emergency help.

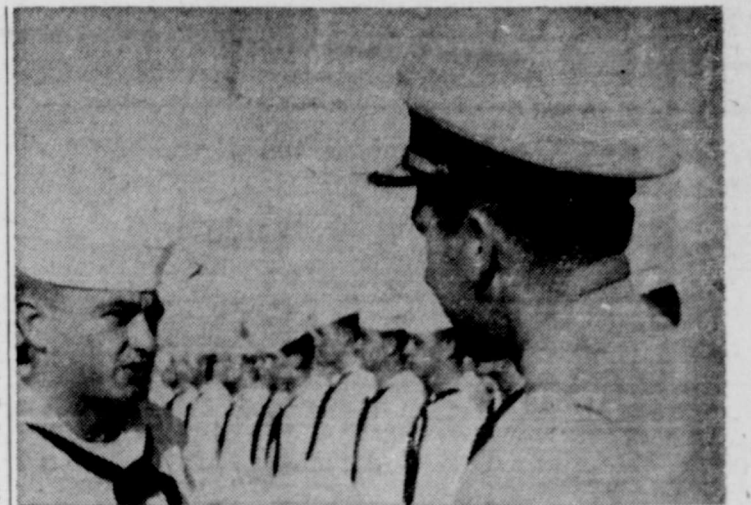

Prospective New Teachers Increased by 10 Per Cent | Nation Still Must Face 86,000 Instructor Shortage

WASHINGTON—A new study by the National Education Association shows that 96,079 prospective new teachers will graduate from the nation's colleges this June, up nearly 10 per cent from a year ago. However, even if all of the June graduates enter the teaching profession there will still be a shortage of 86,000 teachers at the start of the new autumn term in September.

Nevertheless, the National Commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards is encouraged by the new report because it tends to confirm its belief that "teacher supply and demand can be balanced by 1962 if economic gains of teachers continue and if standards continue to be raised."

Also encouraging is the evidence that raised standards of certification are proving to be an incentive rather than a deterrent in attracting new teachers. The number of well-qualified, adequately-prepared elementary school teachers, for example, continues to increase each year. Figures in the new study from states reporting on elementary school teachers in service show that only 46 per cent were college graduates in 1949. The level today stands at 67.7 per cent.

Over-all standards and the quality of college preparation for teachers are also improving. The new report shows that 62.2 per cent of the teachers prepared in 1955 graduated from institutions accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Despite the increased numbers of prospective teacher graduates this June over those of a year ago the immediate outlook for filling the teacher-shortage gap is still gloomy. The NEA estimates that 85,000 teachers will leave the profession this year. This points to the continuing problem of finding more effective methods to retain qualified teachers in our schools.

THE REPORT POINTS out that many of the teachers who will leave "will be among the best in the fields of greatest shortage," such as chemistry and biology.

Moreover, it adds that "the sheer financial loss in the existing routine—recruiting, preparing, inducting into service, then quickly forfeiting the fruits of these costly efforts—is scarcely equaled anywhere in American occupational life."

"In truth," it continues, "increased efforts to retain good teachers can strike a telling blow at the teacher shortage. Improvement of standards of admission to teaching is one imperative step. This must go forward on a statewide basis, but each locality has an inescapable responsibility: most of the vital remedies must be found and applied in the local districts."

THE 1956 CLASS will include 38,731 college graduates prepared as elementary school teachers—5,192 men and 33,539 women. This total is up 2.7 per cent from the 37,712 members of the class of 1955 who prepared for elementary school teaching.

This slender increase, however, is not at all commensurate with the increase in enrollments due to hit the elementary schools next September.

The 1956 class will also include 57,348 graduates prepared as high school teachers—30,195 men and 27,153 women. This total is up 15.4 per cent from the 49,697 members of the class of 1955 who prepared for a high school teaching career.

NEA officials feel that the general increase in those preparing to teach is encouraging. But, they emphasize, this will not in itself wipe out the acute shortage of qualified teachers.

During the closing weeks of the past school term Supt. H. Earl Culp, of Priddy Schools, received a most interesting letter from a former student. He passed the letter on to us along with the following comment—in part: "Does Honesty Pay? I am enclosing a letter that I received a few days ago. This happened to me twice in 30 years . . . how much happier I would have been had I known who wrote the letter . . . I believe that this should be printed in our Mills County paper and also in Bethany, Oklahoma, where the letter was mailed from."

The letter which Mr. Culp received was addressed to the Priddy School Superintendent and is self explanatory. We are presenting it here as follows:

"Dear Sir: "About 12 years ago as a student in the seventh grade of your school I failed to pay for about two meals that I ate in the cafeteria.

"As I was reviewing my past life, I recalled the incident. "Since the incident occurred, I have confessed my sins and found Christ as my personal savior. While I know that He has forgiven me of all my sins, I feel it is my duty and obligation to make right as far as possible all the wrongs that I have done.

"I recall the government was helping the school's lunch program and each meal only cost 7c to the student. My indebtedness is 14c.

"While restitution for that small amount may seem funny or unnecessary to some, I want

to do it and so I am enclosing the sum of 25c that will more than cover the amount. Signed—Yours In Christ, A Former Student."

There is also a P.S. to the letter which reads as follows: "If you are not saved you can be and know it.

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins;" I John 1:9.

"And Hereby we KNOW that He abideth in us, by the SPIRIT which he hath given us;" I John 3:24."

What a testimony for Christ.

Double Dividend Dishes

By ALICE DENHOFF

DESSERTS that please the eye as well as the palate pay double dividends. One way to achieve a pretty picture is to use red maraschino cherries. When these bright bits of cherry red are found peeking out of a sweet, you're sure the dessert will please the family as well as guests.

Cherry Banana Superb really tastes as good as it looks.

To serve 4, peel 4 medium-sized bananas, cut lengthwise in halves. Arrange 2 banana halves in each of 4 individual serving dishes. Brush with 1 1/2 tsp. melted butter and tsp. lemon juice. Bake at 350° F. 10 to 15 min. or until just tender. Combine 1/2 c. peach preserves, tsp. grated maraschino cherries (about 15 cherries) and 2 tsp. lemon juice. Mix well. Top each banana with some of the cherry mixture and sprinkle with chopped walnuts to suit. Bake 5 min. Top with whipped cream and, if desired, cherries.

Cherry Pineapple Pudding is another fine dessert.

To serve 8, cream 2 tsp. butter or margarine and 3/4 c. confectioners' sugar together until light. Add 2 egg yolks, one at a time; beat until smooth.

Combine 1/2 c. heavy cream, whipped, 1/2 c. drained, chopped maraschino cherries (about 20 cherries), 1 c. drained, canned crushed pineapple and 1/4 c. chopped walnuts.

Crush 12 graham crackers and spread 1/2 of crumbs over bottoms of serving dishes. Top with egg mixture. Top with another 1/2 graham cracker crumbs, then top with cherry mixture. Sprinkle with remain' g cracker crumbs. Chill thoroughly.

Different and Delicious

No need to peel and prepare fruit for this marmalade, which, by the way, is different and delicious.

Drain-syrup from 2 (#1 1/2) can pears. Dice pears. Wash 1 orange, quarter and remove seeds. Grind orange through food chopper.

In a heavy saucepan, combine the chopped pears, orange, 1 c. canned crushed pineapple, 3 c. granulated sugar and 1/4 c. lemon juice; stir well. Place over low heat, stirring occasionally, and cook 30 min. or until mixture is thick. Add 1/2 c. maraschino cherries which have been chopped (about 20 cherries). Pour marmalade into hot, sterilized jars or glasses and seal immediately with hot paraffin.

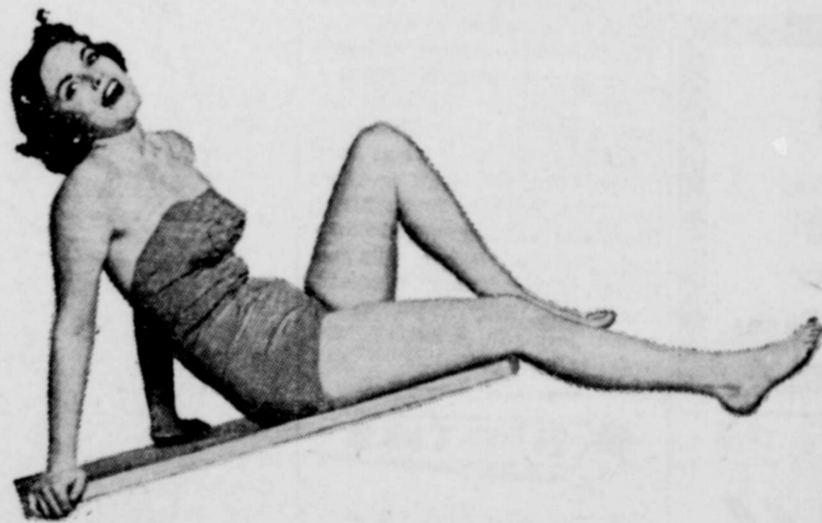

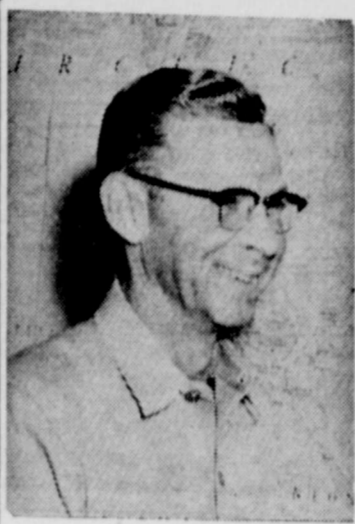

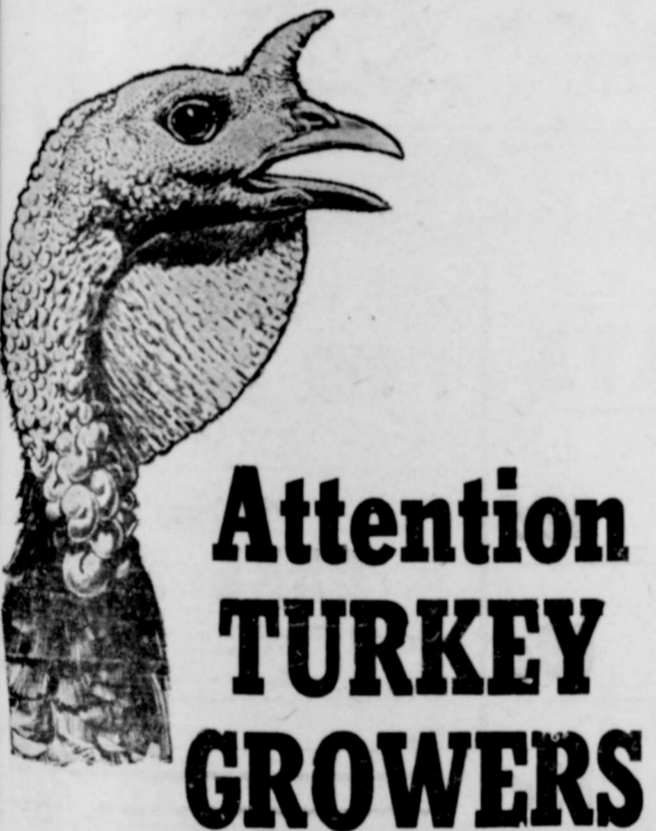

### Navy Recruiter Plans Enlisting Complete Company From This Area

Boatswain's Mate First Walter L. Holcomb, USN, the local Navy Recruiter announced plans to recruit a complete company of Brownwood Area men for service in the Navy. The special company would enlist under the banner "Mesquite Company". They will travel together, do recruit training together at San Diego, California, and return home on leave together after nine weeks of recruit training.

Every able-bodied young man faces a military responsibility upon reaching his 18th birthday. Recruit Holcomb explains that a voluntary enlistment for four years in the Navy will satisfy all of the active duty requirements and then two years in the in-active reserve, to satisfy his military responsibilities. If he desires to postpone his military service in order to continue in school, deferment is possible in some cases. The local Navy Recruiter will be glad to explain this since all young men are encouraged to go on to college if possible. If a man is not eligible for deferment, Recruiter Holcomb feels that nowhere are there greater opportunities to continue general and specialized

training than in the Navy. In fact, most of the men who will make up the "Mesquite" Company, will be High School Graduates, and thus be eligible for assignment to schools even before they are sworn into the Navy.

Recruitment of special companies from local areas is nothing new, and has proved to be an excellent policy. The "Texan" Company, composed of young men throughout Northeast Texas, and enlisted into the Navy at Dallas on April 24th, augmented the Navy's strength by 96 men. These "Texans" will be back in Texas on leave around July 4th.

### Social Security Cards Urged For Part Time Workers

Many school students and housewives plan to work in jobs covered by Social Security during the summer. These part-time workers will need social security cards, according to Mr. James B. Marley, District Manager of the Austin Social Security Office.

Mr. Marley urges all persons who plan to work during the summer and who do not already have social security cards to apply for them immediately. Those who have lost their cards should ask for duplicates. Persons having social security cards at the time they file their applications for jobs will secure employment quicker. Many employers will not hire employees unless they have in their possession social security cards issued in their correct names.

Persons living in Austin may visit the Social Security Office located at 1107 Guadalupe Street and apply for their numbers. Those residing in or near other towns may go to their local post offices, secure and complete an application, Form SS-5, and mail it to their nearest Social Security Office.

The amount of benefits to which a wage earner or his survivors may be entitled will depend on the amount of wages posted to his old-age and survivors insurance account. A social security account cannot be set up for an individual until he gets a social security card.

### Marketing Practices Are Important To Profit Angle For Egg Producers

COLLEGE STATION, (Spl.)—Egg producers can realize more net profit year-in and out by selling their product on known grade standards and to a buyer who will pay the highest average price each year in relation to cost of selling.

Some producers selling direct to consumers, points out F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, receive a higher price per dozen but because of marketing cost their net is less than could have been obtained from other sources. Too, adds the specialist, many producers believe the higher their take of the consumer's food dollar the better their profit. This isn't necessarily true. The limiting factor may be the production that can be moved.

For example, a producer through direct sales may be able to dispose of the production from a 1,000 hens at a profit of \$2.50 per hen and get about 65 percent of the consumer dollar. On the other hand, by selling to a buyer for resale to consumers he could move the total production from 2,000 hens at a profit of \$2.00 per hen. The total net income would be much larger from the larger unit even though the percent of the consumer dollar retained would be less. The big difference comes in the greater opportunities for sales.

Many services must be rendered for consumer and producers and these services mean greater

sales and increase the possibilities for added income to producers. Business firms are largely responsible for both the increased sales and services, says the specialist. In most cases, producers should remember that the best income is derived from selling to a buyer who has the highest yearly average paying prices for all eggs sold.

Current receipt selling normally brings less than when eggs are sold on grade. This is especially true if the producer is selling a high percent of grade A quality eggs. Current receipt eggs bring less because the buyer has no assurance of quality or size. Producers who have above average eggs get less than their eggs are worth while those delivering lower quality eggs receive more than their eggs are worth.

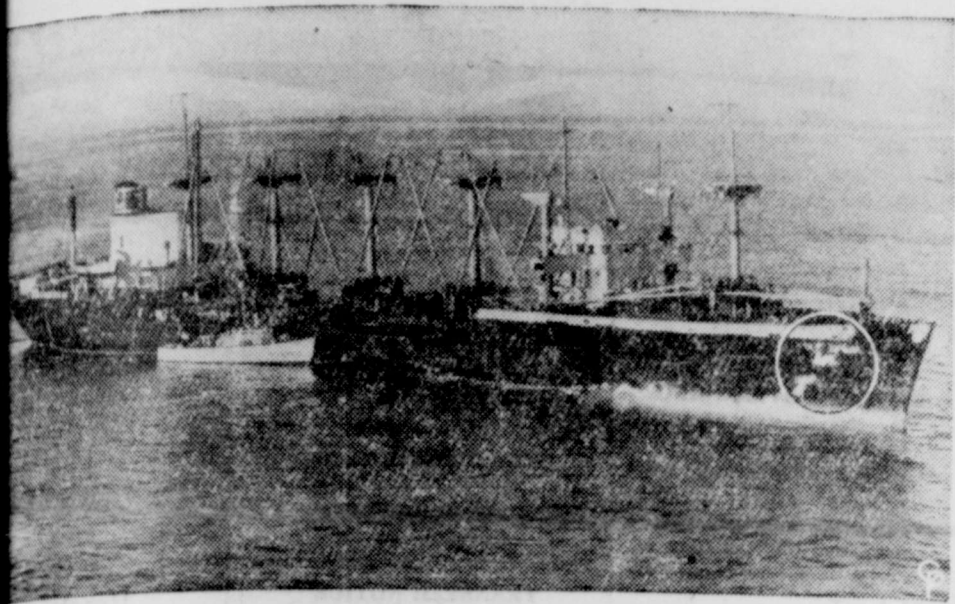

**PARENT PROBLEMS**  
Why Is Child Fearful?  
By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.  
THE young child, like the primitive peoples, like you and me, may have strong fears about all sorts of things he does not understand. During the summer many little children will be frightened by thunder and lightning.  
These fears arise from sudden shock or surprise, particularly when he is alone. The fears of the tot described in the following letter may seem a bit curious. But you can easily imagine how they may have begun and think of commonsense measures for correcting them.  
A New Jersey mother writes: "I have a problem with my 2-year old son.  
**Afraid of Storms**  
"Last summer he was very much afraid of thunderstorms. For the first two weeks, I had to stay with him in his room until he went to sleep. Then he got over that, but wouldn't look at the moon when he was alone. Then it got to be the clouds during the day. Now, for the past few days, he won't stay in his room alone or go out in the yard alone. He is afraid of the sun and screams until I come out and stay with him.  
"I do hope you can give me some idea what to do for him. I never scare him by telling stories of bogey men and such and I can't understand why he should be so afraid of anything in the sky."  
"Also, he has always been a very poor sleeper. He awakens once or twice during the night, crying for his bottle. Giving it to him seems to comfort him and helps him to go right back to sleep.  
**On the Go**  
"He is always on the go during the day—never sits down to read, etc., always thinking of something new to do. He eats well and naps for an hour and a half every day."  
This was my reply: You seem to be so sensible and kind with him that I think you are on the right track. Just do one thing more—find ways to get him to enjoy with you the clouds in the sky and the moon and stars. It may take a long time.  
**Highly Nervous**  
In the meantime, you can assume that he is highly nervous. Anything you can do in general to provide a calm and serene atmosphere should help him. And he needs to be with other little children who enjoy seeing the heavenly bodies.  
I wish you would write and tell me of your progress. I am sure you are going to help this little child.

## Management Of Summer Pastures Largely Determine Productivity

STATION. (Spec.) used for dividing the pastures. This method of grazing keeps the plants vigorous and the rest periods permit them to build their root systems.

If forage production gets ahead of the animals, use the surplus for hay or silage. Few Texas beef or dairy operators ever get excessive feed reserves on hand, says Trew but many failures result from inadequate reserves.

Mowing is an important part of pasture management for it will control weeds and small brush and keep the plants growing and producing nutritious forage. When forage plants approach maturity, their protein and mineral content drops, fiber content increases and they become less palatable.

Without adequate fertility to produce good growth, other management practices are wasted, says Trew. A ton of grass hay contains about 30 pounds of nitrogen, 10 pounds of phosphoric acid and 30 pounds of potash. A ton of legume hay contains about 30 percent more of these nutrients, points out the specialist. A soil test will show how much and what kind of fertilizers are needed.

Finally, Trew points out that cattle grazing on lush, fast growing pasture need some dry hay. Such hay should be available either in hay racks or strips can be mowed in the pasture and left for the cattle to pick up as they need it.

### AN EARLY SEASON GLANCE AT COTTON

Cotton prospects are very much in doubt in some areas of Texas this spring where farmers are plagued with either too much or too little rain.

"Too much rain" is only a temporary condition of course, but it occurred in one area where extreme drouth prevailed only a few miles away. It was in the "hardship zone" between San Antonio, Laredo and Corpus Christi—a 17-county region that has been subnormal in moisture for nearly seven years.

Bee, Live Oak and McMullen counties are examples where drouth has made the cotton outlook negative this year. Bee County has a cotton allotment of 15,000 acres and, until a few days ago only 9,000 had been seeded. Many of these were planted on a "risk" basis and about 3,000 may never come up unless rain is received immediately.

In Live Oak County, only about 2,500 of the 20,000 cotton acres allotted had been planted the first of May and many of these allotments were returned for redistribution over the state. McMullen County has had less than one inch of rain since Jan-

uary 1st. One 15.1 acre plot of the 1,500 allotment was sown by May 1st.

Around Nueces County with Corpus Christi as the county seat, much of the cotton already planted was washed out by recent heavy rains. Counties to the north and northwest had the same problem.

These counties are not typical of the state, but each area has its own problems. Moisture is badly needed in the dry-land farming sections of the Panhandle and West Texas where farmers soon will be planting.

Estimates of the cotton traditionally are released about the first week in August. A revised version of the 1955 crop was released this week which placed Texas production at 4,039,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight. Value of the 1955 lint production amounted to \$611,388,000 based on the average price of 30.3 cents per pound for the season.

Cottonseed from the 1955 crop amounted to 1,687,000 tons or 2 percent above the 1,647,000 tons of 1954. The increased production was more than offset however by lower prices with value of cottonseed last year amounting to \$77,433,000 or about three-fourths that of the year before.

## Mills County Service Establishments Show \$174,000 In Receipts For 1954

Receipts of 25 service establishments enumerated in Mills County in the 1954 Census of Business amounted to about \$174,000, according to a preliminary report covering service trades, published by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. The combined yearly payroll of the county's service establishments was \$21,000. They reported 24 employees of whom 18 worked fulltime in the pay period ending nearest November 15. Proprietors actively employed in the operation of unincorporated businesses numbered 27.

Establishments providing personal services numbered 9 and reported receipts of \$61,000. Establishments primarily engaged in automotive repair, parking and other automotive services numbered 5 and had receipts of \$33,000. Establishments listed as "all other services" in the preliminary report numbered 11 and had receipts of \$80,000.

"Personal services" group includes such businesses as barber

and beauty shops, cleaning and dyeing plants, laundries and laundry services, garment alteration and repair services, funeral services, photographic studios, shoe repair shops and shine parlors, as well as other personal services.

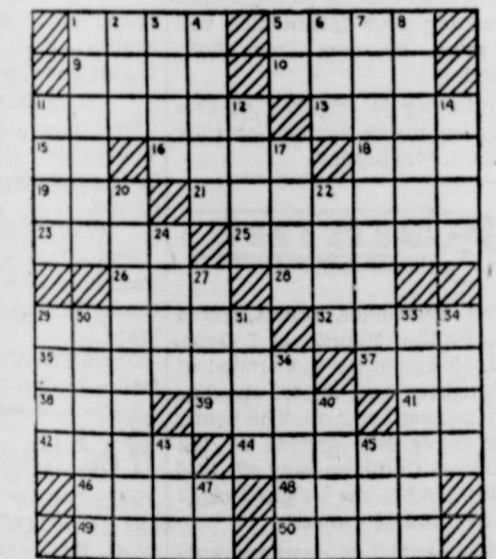

AUSTIN, TEX.—Record turnout at this year's precinct conventions produced a surprising by-product—a flood of suggestions for election law changes.

County convention resolutions sent the Secretary of State's office reflect interest at the grassroots in giving more power to the people and less to the pros.

Ector County Democrats charged the party has become "of . . . by . . . and for the politicians." They passed a resolution to prohibit any officeholder, state or federal employe from being a national convention delegate.

Yoakum and Harrison County conventions recommended preferential primaries for presidential nominees.

A number of resolutions were aimed at forcing conservative Democrats into becoming Republicans. Two counties, Swisher and Wilson, resolved that voters be required to register party preferences when they pay poll taxes.

Gray County Democrats also took a dim view of present procedures. Something is wrong, they said, when admitted Republicans are so scarce they can hold "precinct conventions in a telephone booth," yet carry the state in a general election.

AMERICAN GUARANTY CLEARED — Two Austin corporations, American Guaranty Underwriters and the Karisch

Co., have been cleared of charges of violating the state securities act.

In an agreed judgment, the firms were absolved of any wrongdoing.

The judgment directed American Guaranty to refrain from re-selling its own stock. It also was directed to call in, and require payment within 60 days, loans made to Aviation Finance Co. and Metropolitan Finance Co., both of San Antonio.

There was no allegation of insolvency involved.

Calvin C. Huffman, Austin attorney, is president of American Guaranty. He is a former newspaper publisher from Eagle Pass.

STATE MAY SUE SALESMEN — Civil recovery suits may yet be filed against the salesmen of the Certified Drafts of the defunct US Trust and Guaranty Co.

At the request of the Insurance Department's liquidation division, the attorney general is preparing a ruling on the legality of such suits.

Testimony from buyers would be the basis of charges.

INSURANCE DEADLINE NEARS — Some 120 insurance companies have yet to meet the legal requirements for annual permits to do business in Texas.

The Insurance Commission has indicated that it will take prompt action toward closing the firms that fail to make the June 1 deadline.

The firms include 20 stock life insurance companies and 100 mutuals of various sorts. Most are small concerns.

Procedure calls for a show-cause order and a hearing in each case. This will require some 30 to 60 days.

DEFENDS U.S. SUPREME COURT — The U.S. Supreme Court, a frequent target of criticism, has a defender in Austin Attorney Everett Looney, immediate past president of the State Bar of Texas.

Looney declared, in a speech before the Dallas Criminal Bar Association, that such attacks by politicians are "heresy without equal in our history." He said "the number one scapegoat of American politics, the one safe target of the vilifiers, the rabble-rousers, the washed and the unwashed mongers of hate, is the federal judiciary."

Looney accused critics of the court of creating a "climate of frenzy" and "hysteria" which threatens to destroy the American system of justice. He charged that political agitators who preach disobedience will reign supreme if the court is dislodged from its supremacy as the arbiter of law and order.

LAND BOARD GETS REFUND — A refund of \$3,060 has been made by Robert Lee Richey of Harrisburg, Pa., to the Veterans Land Board. He also promised an additional \$10,000. The two sums represent commissions made by him for selling Zavala Co. land under Texas' GI program. His father, H. Lee Richey, made the appraisals on the land.

In forwarding the money, Richey wrote that "A serious question has arisen as to the propriety of my commission on these sales to the land board," hence the refund.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd said, as to the commission, "There is no allegation of fraud involved."

ANTI-TB WAR LAUNCHED — A 10-year "total war" against tuberculosis is under way in Texas. There are 20,000 active cases in the state, not including an estimated three per cent of the wetbacks who enter the state illegally.

Strategy was mapped in Austin by some 300 health experts and laymen. They met under auspices of the Texas Tuberculosis Association.

Out of discussions came 20 recommendations for "killing the killer" included were (1) intensified efforts to find and treat tuberculars, (2) increased aid to dependents of TB victims and (3) more incentive to medical personnel to work in TB hospitals.

MORE VACCINATIONS URGED — Widespread inoculation to prevent a major polio epidemic is being urged by the State Department of Health. Polio cases for 1956 already total 257. This is an increase of 62 over this time last year. Peak outbreak usually hits Texas in July and August. Only one-third of those eligible for Salk shots have received them.

SHORT SNORTS — Charles K. Devall, publisher of the Kilgore News-Herald, was elected president of the Texas Good Roads Association at its annual meeting in Austin. He succeeds Fred

A. Wemple of Midland . . . A survey of highway needs and problems is under way by the Texas Research League. One phase of the study is the future role of counties and cities of providing adequate highway facilities . . . Herbert O. Paul of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers is the new chairman of the Texas Joint Railway Labor Legislative Board. He succeeds veteran Joe T. Steadham. Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen . . . Young Democrats of Texas have elected Rep. Edgar Berlin of Port Neches as their state president. 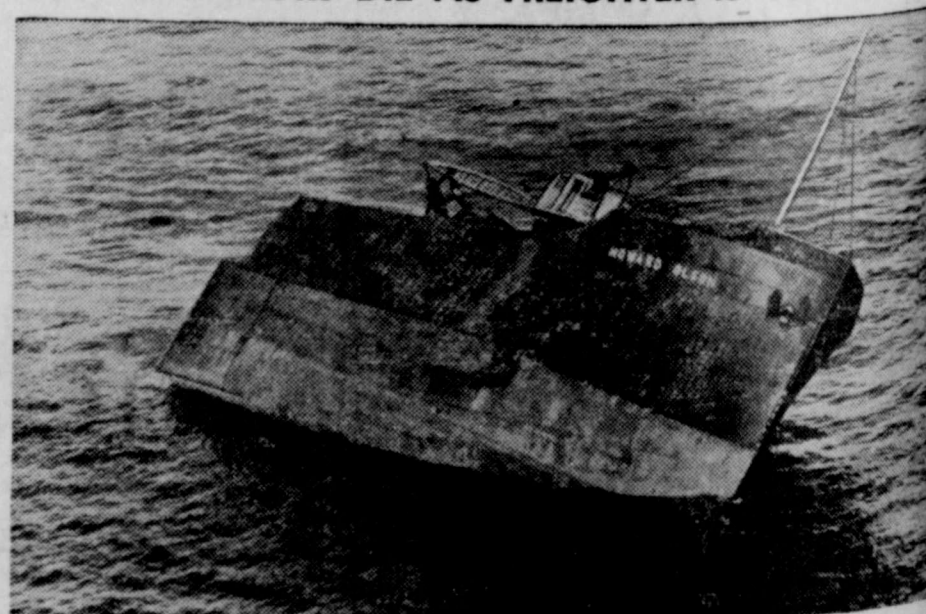
