Contract Let For Mills County Highway Project

A contract for 21 miles of construction on State Highway 16 in Mills and San Saba Counties has been awarded to a San Angelo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission. Angelo Construction Company submitted the low bid of \$127,282.89 on the project. Construction of Asphalt Concrete Pavement from Colorado River bridge, Northeast to Goldthwaite; from San Saba, North to Mills County line and in San Saba between Commerce Street and U.S. 190 is expected to take 75 working days, according to Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

Glen Trotter, Resident Engineer at Goldthwaite will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

County And State Taxes Unpaid As July 1 Go On Delinquent Roll

Mills County State Bank, county and government offices will be closed. The Post Office will be on regular holiday schedule, with window service one hour during the morning and all regular mail dispatches will be taken care of. There will be no rural route deliveries.

John E. Pollock Is Found Dead Near Mullin

John Edward Pollock, 37, of Brownwood was found dead Saturday night two and one-half miles southeast of Mullin in a ditch just off U.S. Highway 84-183 pavement.

Sheriff Stubblefield said the Chevrolet panel truck that Mr. Pollock drove for Mrs. Howard's Bakery of Brownwood stopped in an open field more than 300 yards away after running through two fences.

According to Sheriff Stubblefield Mr. Pollock apparently was killed instantly when he fell from the truck as it swerved sharply to the right, as indicated by tread marks on the pavement.

Mr. Pollock stopped at Durenville for gas at 9:00 p.m. and his watch stopped at 9:15 and his body was found 30 minutes later.

Funeral services were conducted in Austin Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brownwood, Tuesday at 4:00 o'clock with burial in Greenleaf Cemetery.

AUSTIN, Tex.—A court battle seems imminent to decide if counties must put the states rights referendum questions on the Democratic primary ballots.

Two "liberal stronghold" counties—Harris and Bexar—have said they will not. County committees denounced the referendum as "appealing to Ku Kluxism for a campaign of hate."

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd ruled to Jefferson County officials that putting the matters on the ballot was mandatory, and that penalties were provided by law for failure or refusal.

State Executive Committee members certified placement after receiving a petition signed by 153,000 voters—more than required by law. Voter opinion is sought on three questions—school integration, intermarriage of Negroes and whites, and interposition.

HOPE FOR TOURIST LODGES—New hope for early action on the building of tourist lodges in state parks was presented at the State Parks Board meeting.

During the last session legislators approved \$25 million in bonds for construction of resort hotels in at least six state parks. In past weeks interested groups over the state have become impatient to know why the bonds haven't been sold and the building program launched. Delegations from three towns came to Austin to ask.

Board Chairman Andrew M. Housley told them the Chicago bonding firm which has the contract has so far failed to sell one bond or find a responsible company to operate the property.

Former State Sen. Howard Carney, one of a group from Atlanta, announced that the Fred Harvey Co., a big nationwide firm, had expressed interest in building lodges in Atlanta State Park, Eisenhower State Park at Lake Texoma and Inks Lake State Park.

Carney predicted construction could begin by September with completion one year later.

STATE MAY BUY ROAD RIGHTS—Relief is in sight for Texas cities and counties which have been unable to finance right-of-way for desired new highways.

For nearly 30 years the State Highway Commission has authorized use of state funds for highway construction only if the cities and counties purchased right-of-way. In populous areas cost of needed land frequently ran into millions. During the past year Dallas and Harris counties failed in financing attempts.

Now the commission has announced the state will start paying for right-of-way under the new federal highway aid bill. Final congressional approval will launch a multi-billion-dollar interstate road building program for which the federal government will pay 90 per cent of the costs.

Commission Chairman E. H. Thornton Jr. predicted, however, that state right-of-way buying would not begin for some time. First funds will be used for projects where road rights have already been secured by local agencies.

City Utilities officials last Friday afternoon distributed a circular asking all city water customers to discontinue watering gardens and lawns until further notice.

The notice was delivered to city residents after the demand for water kept increasing to the point where some residents on higher places didn't have any water during certain hours of the day and the water supply dropped to the point where there was insufficient water for adequate fire protection.

The increased demand for water is due to the extreme dry weather during the past several weeks.

Notice delivered to residents regarding the water situation reads as follows:

"We can not keep pace with the excess use of water that as usual accompanies the dry hot weather. Until further notice every one will please discontinue watering lawns and gardens. This curtailment is necessary to insure fire protection and provide a supply sufficient that those residents on high places will have any water at all.

"The production of water is remaining constant even though we know that the general water table is falling each year since the drought began. It is naturally not known what the long range forecast may be until the condition is improved we must conserve the supply. We hope no one will be too badly inconvenienced and we thank you for your cooperation."

JULY FOURTH COMING UP
In 1903 there were 466 fireworks deaths in the United States. Last year there was only one. Quite a record of progress.

Back in 1903 a rather ridiculous looking machine was just sputtering into being. Last year that machine—evolving from the ungainly horseless carriage into the sleek and powerful modern automobile—claimed 407 lives during the Fourth of July holiday.

Thus the net gain in our efforts to avoid holiday self-destruction seems to be about zero. Yet there is a lesson to be learned here.

Fireworks deaths on the Fourth have been almost eliminated because thinking persons revolted at such senseless killing, and state by state the sale and use of dangerous fireworks were prohibited.

No one, of course, is advocating that the sale or use of automobiles be banned. But we strongly urge the outlawing of their misuse.

Most people want to use their cars safely. But in every society there is always a minority of reckless and irresponsible drivers who turn a deaf ear to all appeals for prudent and commonsense behavior.

It is for this group that the National Safety Council and the International Association of Chiefs of Police have jointly recommended a rigid law enforcement policy by all police agencies during the Fourth of July celebration.

We strongly support this recommendation. A traffic accident emergency faces this country, with a new all-time high death toll in prospect. It is time to stop temporizing with this problem. The Fourth of July holiday is a good time to start getting tough.

Inside WASHINGTON
MARCH OF EVENTS

Will Iron Curtain 'Melt' Away Within 12 Months?
U. S. Officials Optimistic; See Big Thaw in Cold War

WASHINGTON—Some government officials are predicting that Russia's Iron Curtain will have melted away almost completely by this time next year. They cite these developments as signs of a big thaw in the cold war:

The Kremlin's invitation to the United States to send high-level representatives as guests at the Moscow aviation-day celebration.

Reports that members of the United States Joint Chiefs of Staff will be invited to visit Russia, with Defense Minister Georgi Zhukov and other Soviet brass returning the visit later this year.

The announced intention of Pan American Airways to open regular service to Moscow.

Indications that Russia will be invited to send a cruiser to participate in the international naval display to be held at Hampton Roads, Va., next year in connection with the celebration of the 350th anniversary of the Jamestown colony.

A brisk demand for "package tours" of Russia being offered by United States travel agencies with the promised co-operation of the Soviet government.

A relaxation of Russia's rigid restrictions on circulation of United States propaganda publications in the Soviet Union.

● **FARM ECONOMY**—Farm leaders outside the Agriculture department who advise officials on research policies, believe the time is now ripe for a scientific study of basic economic problems affecting farmers. One of the top priority subjects cited by the department's research policy committee is a "study of the effects of farm prices on production of agricultural commodities."

The administration, of course, maintains that the flexible or "sliding scale" price policy is the best program feasible for the nation's farmers at this time. The Soil Bank is designed to supplement this.

Critics maintain, however, that there is no economic evidence to substantiate reliance on flexible supports and not even much interest by the department in finding out what the facts really are. It seems doubtful that such a study will be launched before election-time. However, if the pressure is great enough, the department may agree to a top-level research job on the over-all economic problem.

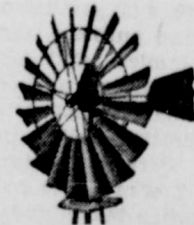
● **DEMOCRATIC INFIGHTING**—It looks as if the efforts of top Democratic party leaders to preserve party unity until the August convention in Chicago will come to naught—because of what appears to be hasty action by the national chairman, Paul M. Butler.

Chairman Butler accepted the resignation of William N. Roach, the party's convention manager, after what was reported to be a "hot personal battle" between the two men.

The dispute reportedly started over Roach's request to bring his secretary to Chicago soon to work on convention arrangements and also included various complaints party members have had with Butler. The veteran convention manager then submitted his resignation and the chairman promptly accepted it.

Many top-level Democrats strongly protested the hasty action. When rumors started flying that Roach was joining the staff of New York's Gov. Averell Harriman, a contender for the Democratic presidential nomination, the issue indicated deep divisions within the party.

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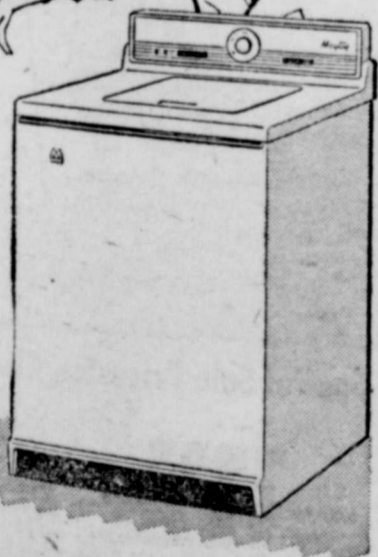

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Texas Deer Count In Hill Country Counties Shows High Herd Total

AUSTIN, (Spec.)—Calculations from incomplete studies in selected Hill Country counties indicate that estimates of Texas deer population will have to be slanted sharply upward.

Also the investigation shows deer mortality from drought, over population and parasites through last winter aggregated many thousand in four counties alone.

These tentative deductions were disclosed by the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration of the Game and Fish Commission on the basis of census data prepared under direction of Bob Ramsey, wildlife biologist assigned to the state's principal deer range in the Edwards Plateau region.

Estimates heretofore made of the total state deer population have set the figure at just short of half a million, mainly white-

tails. But the seven Hill Country counties, used for the herd counts, reflect a combined population of almost four hundred thousand deer before the last hunting season.

The Assistant Director said that regardless of the final totals "it is obvious that we are not harvesting as many deer as we should." He said extension of the experimental antlerless deer hunts is one sound management way the herds can be reduced to the carrying capacity of the land.

The investigations were centered in Kerr, Llano, Mason, Gillespie, Medina, Blanco and Sutton counties where the Commission has regulatory responsibility to regulate harvests on the basis of existing current conditions. But the first four named counties bore the concentrated studies since records from previous herd counts were available there.

PETTY GRAFT IN THE FARM INDUSTRY

Petty crime pays off in Texas. At least, for a small percentage of scheming opportunists it does! These men make thousands of dollars operating outside our state agricultural laws and then pay small fines for doing business illegally.

The trouble is with some of our laws as they pertain to farm nursery stock and seed sales. The laws are good — offering adequate protection to buyers and sellers — but the penalties for violation are too light.

State inspected and tagged seed is a case in point. The Texas Seed Act provides that each bag of seed offered for sale must be properly marked as to its quality and content on the tag to let the buyer know what he is paying for.

An unscrupulous operator can mislabel his seed bags, changing a high price for what is actually an inferior and cheap product. The penalty for this action is a nominal fine.

If the seller violates the law on a large scale he can make tremendous profits. The only recourse the law has is to fine him for each illegal sale — a lengthy and expensive proposition, even if it can be proved.

The end result is that small fines serve as a nuisance to legitimate businessmen who accidentally violate the law and only slap the hand of schemers who operate on the outer fringes.

A goal of the Texas Department of Agriculture is to correct this inequality in the next session of the Legislature. For first offenders, the penalty will remain about the same. But for repeated violations, the dealer "should have the book thrown at him".

In the meantime, a drive by agricultural inspectors is underway to offer as much protection as possible to prospective seed buyers. Known offenders of the seed act are being subjected to a "harrasive campaign", to discourage the illegal sales. Fines are being levied fast

and frequently.

In addition, wide publicity is being given to cases filed in court on offenders who have been fined repeatedly on other occasions. This is one of the best methods to discourage such operations.

Legitimate dealers have requested this "clean-up campaign". They know that sellers and buyers suffer equally from such disregard of the law by a small percentage of "petty grafters".

As we came back from town Thursday, we stopped to see Mrs. Effie Egger. She has just recently remodeled her house, while there I did my first talking over the new phone system.

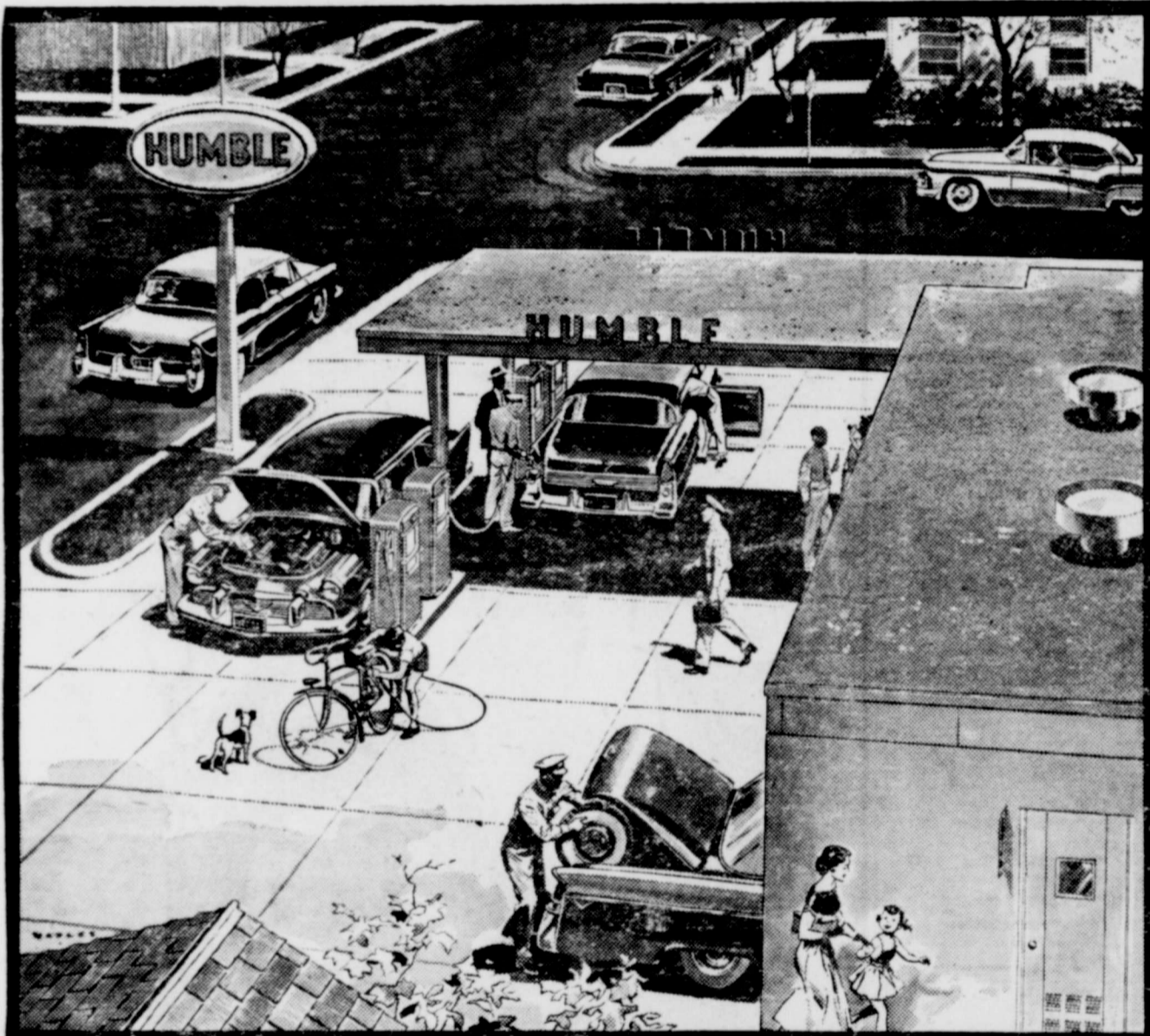

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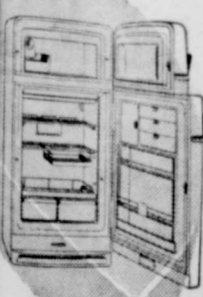
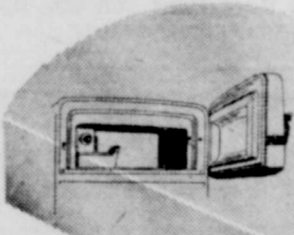

THE IMMINENT EXPLOSION

AUSTIN, TEXAS

A tremendous explosion occurred at an industrial plant in Big Bend county. You learn it resulted in \$500,000 and five lives lost. A man worked at that plant. recall that on several questioned his loyalty.

That recollection might aid the police in an apprehension, although it won't bring to life those men whose right to live was the same as yours.

Espionage, sabotage and subversion are police problems. Problems of the local level as well as of the national level. The illegal activities of the subversive affect every citizen and every walk of life. They affect the peace and dignity of the state. They disrupt the economy and destroy social harmony.

The subversive will incite riot, foment friction and hatred between races and social classes. He will agitate strikes, denying you essential commodities and services. He will instigate violence in strike action. He will employ theft, extortion, vandalism, and even murder for the advancement of the "cause" to which he is dedicated.

In the use of his major weapon, propaganda, he will deliberately warp the mind of the youngster, turning him against God, country and family. He will strive to shake your confidence in your government. He will endeavor to render impotent your police and your courts. He has no regard for truth and fact.

The tactics result in the violation of our penal code. They are inimical to the individual and collective welfare of our citizenry. The police are pledged to enforce our penal code and to protect the citizenry. Now they must add to their ever increasing daily duties the protection of the public against this type of offender. They need your help. They need it before the "explosion."

Because it is an additional police duty, the President of the United States in 1939 requested all law enforcement agencies to cooperate with the federal government in matters of internal security — subversive activities. This request has been reiterated in succeeding years. Since then, and to the present day, your State Department of Public Safety, Sheriff's departments and your constables have complied with this request.

In 1947, Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., the director of your Texas Department of Public Safety, foresaw the continuing spread and growing threat of communism, and recognized it as a police problem. Without additional appropriation he established a special detail working out of his office, and assigned that detail to the gathering of information and evidence of subversive activities in the state of Texas. He further assigned it the duty of developing liaison in this field with local police agencies in order to provide them with a central source of information exchange to better protect their interests.

In 1951 the legislature created the Internal Security Section, a division of the Department of Public Safety, as a specialized unit in this field of police work. In 1954 Colonel Garrison caused his department to conduct a Subversive Activities Control School; the first of its kind to ever be held in this country. This school, originally designed for the training of its own personnel, was expanded to invite certain local law enforcement agencies to enroll specially selected men. Thus, several of our police departments now have personnel trained in this type of police work.

It must be realized that Texas is of strategic importance in any defense measure. It is constantly expanding industrially, militarily, and it is an international border area. It must further be recognized that Communism, though not the only subversive factor, is the enemy that constitutes an immediate threat.

Tightly organized and disciplined, Communism is allied with a foreign and hostile power; a power that has found that through the Communist movement, it does not have to rely upon those of its own nationality to undermine its enemies. In all

countries its followers are constantly schooled into a political and socially perverted frame of mind.

Our constitution provides us with the means of peacefully and legally bringing about any revolutionary changes desired by the intelligent will of the people. It provides safeguards against changes desired by the totalitarian and tyrannical minded minority. But these safeguards are

futile if the people do not understand and cooperate with the agencies created to secure these safeguards. Help them before the "explosion."

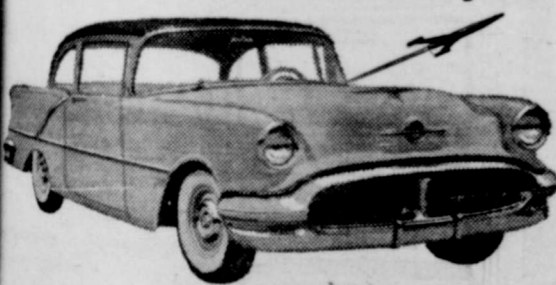

It was for \$1,175,804 in paving. Unless a steel shortage develops, completion of the \$58 million road is expected on schedule by July, 1957. It will be Texas' first toll road.

MORE SALK SHOTS—The U.S. Public Health Service released 229,599 shots of Salk polio vaccine for use in Texas.

Texas Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle advocated removal of the voluntary age re-

strictions on use of the vaccine. At present, vaccine is available only to children under 20 and to expectant mothers.

Meantime the State Health Department sent a four-man team of experts into the Brownsville-Matamoros area to study the threat of yellow fever. The department said "the inexorable advances of jungle yellow fever from Panama toward Mexico and the Gulf Coast of the United States is causing qualms of uneasiness."

IMPROVEMENT IN ORDER—State Auditor C. H. Cavness suggested in an audit report on the Insurance Commission that this big state agency improve its personnel methods. He said he found the commission's rental contract for space in an office building owned by an insurance company "not out of order."

SHORT SNOTS—Texas Law Enforcement Foundation's \$40,000 "Travelab" will begin touring Texas next fall. A 55-foot "rolling classroom" on newest crime detection methods it is designed to further the foundation's program of enlisting citizen support for good law enforcement. . . Despite reduced purchaser nominations, the Railroad Commission increased the allowable Texas crude oil production for July by 70,973 barrels over June, after four successive monthly cuts.

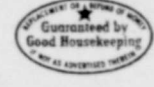

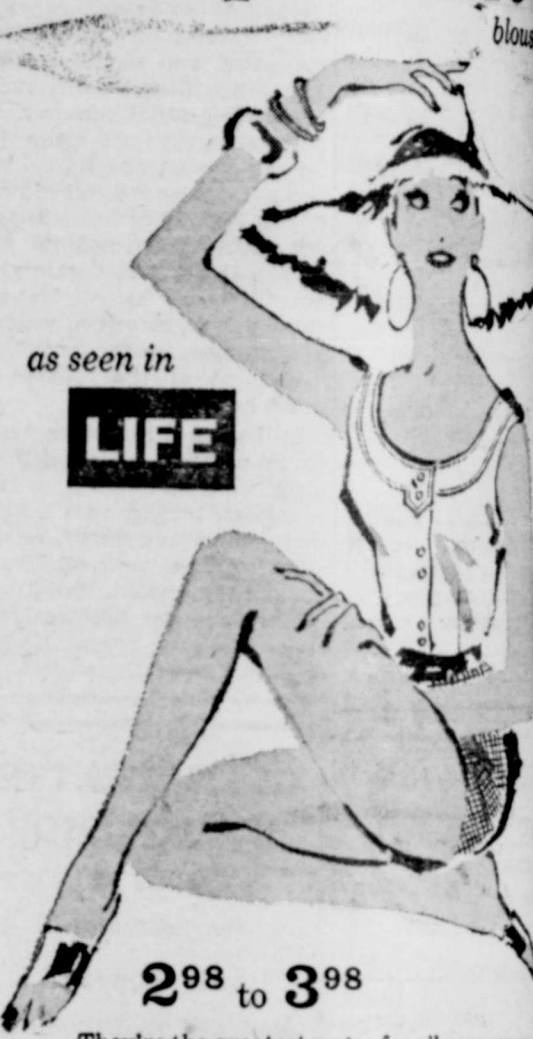
