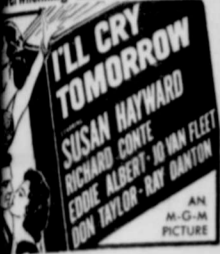

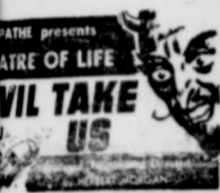

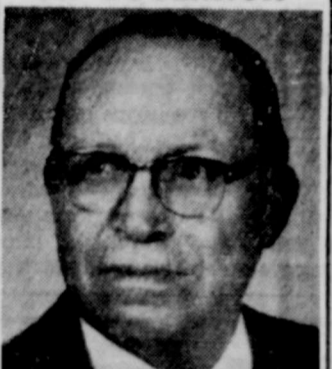

FHA Loans \$111,040.00 To Local Farmers During Year Ending June 30

Farmers in Lampasas, Burnet and Mills Counties obtained loans totaling \$111,040.00 through the Farmers Home Administration during the year ending June 30, Aston W. Cole the agency's county supervisor said this week.

Repayments on loans outstanding during the year totaled \$125,762.57.

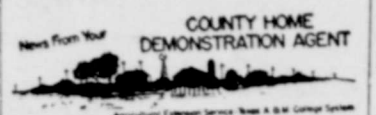
The agency has advanced credit to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, equipment, livestock, and other farm operating items needed to place farms on an efficient operating basis to buy and improve family-type farms and to meet emergency needs.

The local Farmers Home Administration committee must approve each loan application

before funds can be advanced. The committee determines all loan applicants' eligibility and certifies the value of farms to be purchased or improved if those actions are involved. It also makes recommendations on loan approvals and servicing actions.

Applicants are approved as eligible only if other lenders cannot adequately supply their credit needs and only if prospects are favorable for their being able to improve their farming and repay their loans.

Families are expected to refinance their loans with other lenders as soon as they are in position to do so.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Utilization of crop residues now pays big dividends on crops that follow.

Farmers of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are preparing land now to be able to catch and utilize any summer showers that might come.

Fields that are left "slick" catch and hold very little moisture. On the other hand, these same fields, when prepared by leaving crop residue such as wheat and oat straw, Johnson-grass residue and any other plants that might have grown on the field at or near the surface,

can trap and hold any moisture that might fall.

By chiseling to allow the water to get into the soil and leaving these residues on the surface to reduce the evaporation during these hot summer days, moisture can be stored for longer periods. When land preparation starts for winter small grains, keep in mind the more litter on the surface the better the chances for a grain crop on a minimum amount of rainfall.

In most cases it is not the amount of rainfall we get that produces a crop; it's the amount we hold that counts.

A little planning now in handling crop residues could mean the difference in a good grain crop and a bad one.

Several cooperators with the district, plan to try for the first time seeding Blue Panic in the fall. This grass if seeded from mid August to mid-September could furnish a great deal of supplemental grazing early next year. By seeding it in the fall it is felt that the seed may come up to a stand before the ground crusts over. For further information on these fall seedings, contact the S. C. S. technicians in the county Courthouse.

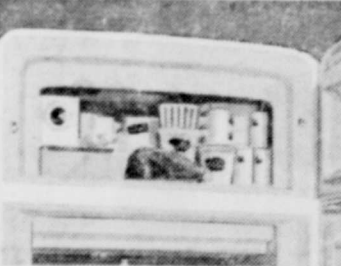

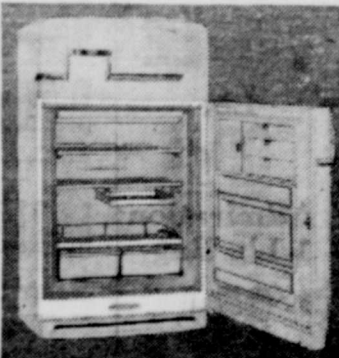

FARM SAFETY WEEK

Farming is a dangerous job. So dangerous that nation-wide attention is being focused on the problem by declaring July 22 through 28 as National Farm Safety Week.

The risk of the farm are both physical and financial. In one year about 15,000 U.S. farm residents are killed in agricultural accidents. Another 1,300,000 or more are injured.

Each farm is a separate sphere of management and operation which involves a wide variety of activities and working conditions. The heavy toll of accidents caused each year by these different farm tasks wipes out some 17 million man days of labor.

In some areas, Texas farmers may face one of the major accident creating situations—

labor shortages. When hired help is scarce, the farmer takes on more of the work load. He toils longer hours and becomes tired long before the job is done. As a result, he is tempted to take risky short cuts or postpone needed repairs on machinery and buildings. This sets the stage for crippling accidents.

Farm machinery is the big killer. Careless handling of equipment causes many mishaps but even a careful operator may be hurt if he is running broken or worn machines. A good maintenance program for machinery could do much to keep down farm tragedies.

Another common cause of injury is farm animals. Some accidents with animals are unavoidable. Still, many result from impatience on the farmer's part or an underestimation of the animals' dangerous traits.

Fires are a greater hazard on the farm than in the city. They cause some 3,500 of the 15,000 farm deaths each year. These fires occur at the rate of 300 per day, and most can be traced to defective heating units, flammable roofing materials, overloaded electrical wires and lack of protection from lightning.

But the farmer and city dweller share equal risks right in the home. Four thousand farm residents die each year from accidents inside the house. Thus, home safety is a prime starting point in eliminating accidents which rob families of their livelihood.

Now that another crop season is underway, a little more caution and advance planning may help assure you of being around when the time comes to reap the harvest from seeds you are planting today.

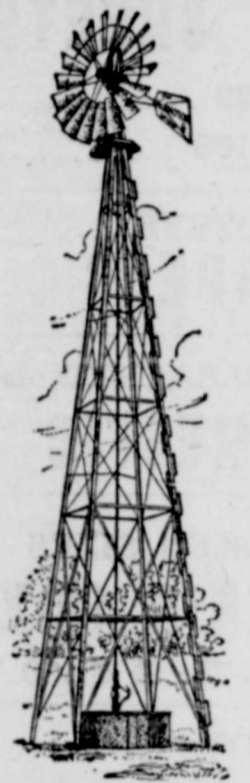

**News About
Social Security**

Mr. James B. Marley, manager of the Austin District Office, urges all workers to check their social security record to see that all their 1955 wages have been reported and credited to their account. He especially urges all farm workers who were paid cash wages of as much as \$100.00 from one employer in 1955 to check to see that each of their employers reported their wages. Because valuable retirement and insurance protection is based on covered earnings, every worker should know the status of his account and what he and his family can expect from this protection. Mr. Marley further advises that a special printed postcard, used to request the earnings statement, may be obtained from the nearest office, located at Austin.

When your earnings statement is received from the social security accounting office in Baltimore, Md., check it against your personal records. If the statement is not complete or correct, contact the social security office so that immediate action can be taken toward correcting your account. Failure to take this action may reduce the amount of monthly benefits payable to you or your survivors since all benefits are based on your "average" earnings.

Mr. Marley states that the social security office has pamphlets which will help you estimate the amount you and your survivors will receive. Other in-

formational material of interest to farmers and farm workers, household workers, employees of state and local governments, the self-employed, and many others are also available.

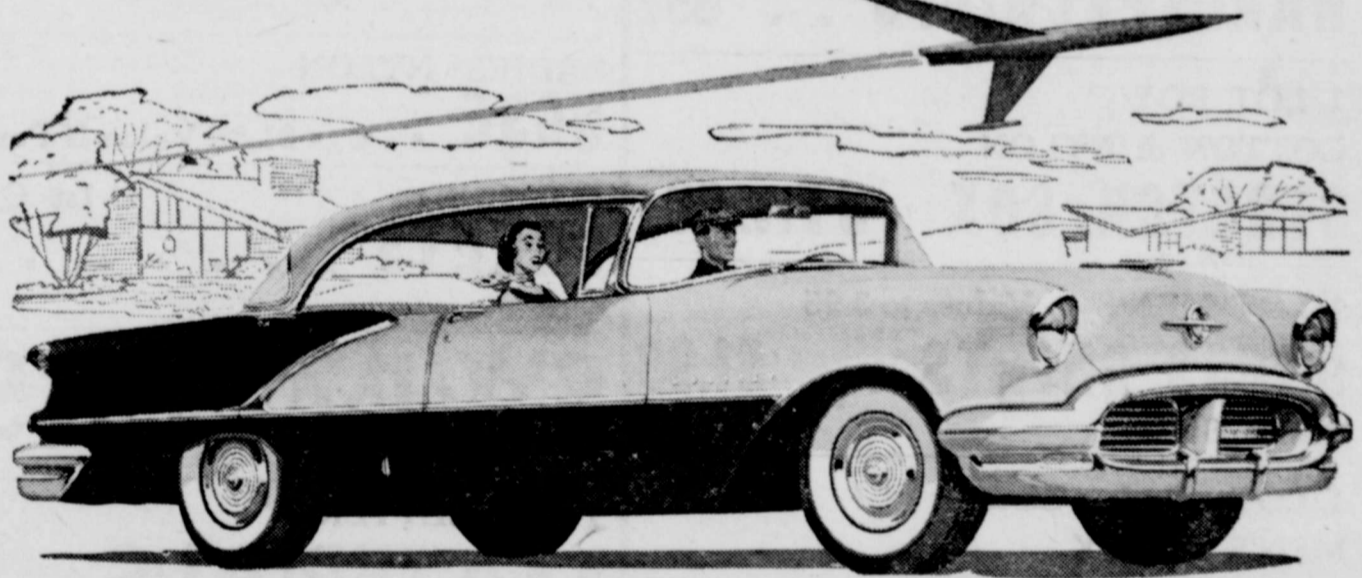
