



Many local folks talk about industry for our home town from time to time without realizing what is involved in securing an industry for a small town.

If the facts are faced it must be realized that the chances for the average little town to secure industrial payroll are few. In spite of that fact it is necessary for the industrial committees to keep on the alert and investigate every possibility.

When one checks up on the history of many of todays industrial glants we find that most of them started very small at one time. Many who start small stay small while others grow into really big business. Many times when a small business, such as factory, gets started by someone who has dreams and plans and puts them to work in a small way, there are dark moments. Yet history proves that with all the dark moments that go into developing an industry there is the hope that all will work out and the business will grow and flourish as many do

Goldthwaite has a small industry right now-which can well grow into a big business some day.

I am referring to the father-son team of M. F. 'Mac' and Herbert 'Hub' Horton who are now engaged in the manufacture of the Universal Underbench Saw on a beginning scale.

This business enterprise has been in the making for many years. Before they came to the point of where they are today there was planning, securing patents and more planning. After several years they got far enough along to build 12 sample, or demonstration, models. During the past year these have been sold and are now in use in various industries. Reports are coming back that all is well.

Since the demonstrators have been sold and put into operation the Hortons have done more planning and improving on their product and have assembled tools and equipment for further production of their saw. Their tooling was to a great extent designed by themselves and their small shop has been set up for production on a larger and faster scale.

They are now in the process of manufacturing machined parts and turning out parts for the production of their completed product.

The point I would like to make at this time is that while this is at present a small manufacturing business there is a keen possibility that one day it will grow into a sizeable manufacturing business that could employ a good number of people. That's exactly what Goldthwaite and Mills County are looking for.

A number of citizens have visited the Hortons in their factory which is located back of the Horton Lumber Company to see what is going on. It is interesting to watch the machined parts being turned out for assembling the complete product to go out on the market.

If you haven't visited Mac and Hub in their workship then we would suggest that you stop by and pay your respects. Our guess is that this is the beginning of something that can grow big.

A few weeks ago when we got the scores from one of the Little League games crossed up it didn't take long to hear from Butch Schuman and Pat Rudd. They called in to inform us that the Indians won the game by 24-4 instead of losing it as was indicated in the story.

Can't blame them for being right on the ball in calling it to our attention. After all it's those wins that count most when the score board is posted for the season. The story must have looked pretty good to the Giants tho, who actually lost the game to the tune of 24-4.



### THEY'RE YOUR DIMES

"A good thing to remember," says the Abilene, Kansas, Daily Reflector, "in these days of all kinds of 'federal aids' is that the federal government hasn't got a dime that it doesn't take away from the people, so it can't give anything to a school system, building program, county welfare, flood control, crop surpluses or anything else, without first having taken it away from the people."

In this gigantic federal process of taking and giving, a large chunk of the local taxpayer's dollar goes to support the bureaucracy which provides "give away" services that in most cases could be better handled locally in the first place. Moreover, the money that is taken from the people and returned in part under the guise of "federal aid" is to a large extent extracted from the taxpayers indirectly. The next time you hear the political cry for a higher tax on a business or an industry, you should remember that the latter are like government too, in one respect. They have no money except what they take from consumers in payment for products or services. Their profits are either regulated by law or by competition. When additional taxes are levied against them they are forced to become collection agencies for government. The taxes are passed along to their customers.

The old saying that you can't get something for nothing is still true, even though many of us act like we don't believe it.

On Health Issue Out

Special to Central Press Association

ASHINGTON-Democratic strategists are reluctant to hit too hard on the issue of President Eisenhower's health during the coming campaign for fear of antagonizing some voters.

The Democratic onslaught may well be limited to the accusation of "part-time President," and the theme will be that Ike isn't devotenough time to his duties, not that he is disabled. Ex-President Harry S. Truman set this pattern recently. Other

party leaders feel that the "part-time President" charge is the only way the health issue could be brought in by inference and in good taste.

The Democrats are aware of the public opinion polls which show that a large bloc of voters might resent an open attack on Ike on the health issue as being shady politics. They realize that Mr. Eisenhower is tremend-

ously popular and that all efforts must be made to prevent any personal attack on him that could boomerang against the Democrats.

This doesn't mean the Democrats won't wage a heated campaign. They will open up with heavy fire on the administration's record and Ike's delegation of work to his subordinates.

The theme, as Truman put it, probably will be President "I like Ike, but-." Eisenhower

COUNTER-PLAN-The Republicans have developed a counterplan to frustrate the effect of the "part-time" charges. One indication of the GOP strategy came when the White House announced that Mr. Eisenhower would not take a vacation before the Republican national convention.

Previously, the chief executive had planned to go to New England for a fishing trip, a less strenuous form of exercise than his favorite pastime, golf, which his physicians have forbidden him to play until about mid-August.

However, GOP National Chairman Leonard W. Hall is said to have counseled that it would be "better psychology" if the Presi-dent remained at his White House desk, with week-end trips to his Gettysburg farm to provide the necessary relaxation from his duties.

Regardless of Mr. Eisenhower's great popularity, the Republican strategists considered these factors:

-He was on vacation last Sept. 24 when he was stricken with his heart attack in Denver. He spent the rest of the year convalescing

2-After returning to the White House in January, he took a Georgia vacation in February; and after announcing his decision to run again, he went south for a golfing holiday in April.

3-His ileitis operation kept him away from the White House from June 8 until July 15.

To Poultrymen College Station, (Spec)-Texas

grade basis are finding that onthe-farm egg cooling equipment when used with frequent deliveries to the egg grading station is both economical and profitable. Kermit F. Schlamb, extension poultry marketing specialist, says a 30 dozen case of eggs can be cooled for about 10 cents.

Research done at Texas A & M College, he adds, established this figure and also showed that producer returns could be materially increased. He cites the record of a producer who used adequate cooling facilities and delivered his eggs to the grading station five times plus each week. This producer, according to Schlamb, received 2.39 cents a dozen more than the average producer selling through the same program That is almost 72 cents more for every case of eggs delivered.

The specialist emphasizes that during hot weather eggs should be gathered three or more times each day and then immediately cooled. The temperature of an egg when it is laid is above 105 degrees and unless it is cooled quickly, quality goes down. The egg, as designed by nature, contain self - destroying enzymes which work rapidly at temperatures above 55 degrees. The thick white and yolk membranes of the egg are broken down and the higher the temperature the faster the action of the enzymes.

Quality breakdown can be re duced to a low level by cooling eggs to about 30 degrees but the cost becomes too great. Therefore, says Schlamb, a cooling temperature of 55 degrees or lower is recommended. But, he warns, quick cooling and proper holding temperature are not a substitute for frequent delivery of the eggs to the grading station for age is also a factory in quality.

AUSTIN, Tex. - The eyes of Texas are on Chicago this week. And, politically speaking, the state nestles in one man's pocket. Sen. Lyndon Johnson heads the

Thereafter they will vote under the unit rule, probably for whatever candidate is favored quiry. by Sen. Johnson. All delegates and the 70 alternates were selected by the May convention with the senator's approval.

Another Texan, Speaker Sam Rayburn, figures prominently in his own court. convention affairs. He will be presiding over a presidential convention for the third time.

SEPTEMBER CONVENTION IN DOUBT - Who will win and how at the September State Democratic Convention is a subject of heated debate.

Actual outcome will not be known until the meeting gets under way in Fort Worth. Rival conservative and liberal delegations will struggle for nearly 600 seats. Convention control hinges on these places.

Precinct and county conventions named some 577 definitely liberal delegates, about 224 conservatives. But neither side can control the 1900-vote convention without the contested seats.

Mrs. Kathleen Voigt of San Antonio, liberal leader, charged last week the conservatives executive committee planned to "steal" the convention. She asked that the May state convention, which was recessed rather than adjourned, be reconvened to take charge of the situation.

Executive Committee Chairman George Sandlin dismissed Mrs. Voigt's charges as "the same old thing, every two years."



He promissed the committee would give all contesting delegations a fair hearing and seat those legally entitled to places. He predicted the convention would be made up of middle-ofthe-road conservatives "with no ax to grind."

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
