28 Pints of Blood Are Donated Here Last Wednesday

A total of 28 pints of blood were donated here Wednesday of last week when the Red Cross Bloodmobile made its first official visit to Mills County during this fiscal year.

This was short 42 pints of the quota set for this visit, Norman Duren, local Red Cross blood chairman, announced. Mr. Duren expressed disappointment from officials for the poor showing on the part of Mills County citizens in support of the program.

Local blood donor records show that 35 persons donate a pint of blood three times a year, or each time the bloodmobile comes here, and 40 to 50 donate a pint of blood each year. This reflects that the same persons are responsible for keeping the blood program going.

From indications there is a keen probability that the blood program may be discontinued unless more interest is forthcoming from the citizenry in general. As it stands at present the cost to the county chapter is high and the response is low.

Priddy Gin Is Destroyed By Fire

The Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Department was called out Monday night at 11:00 o'clock on an emergency call to Priddy. The Priddy Gin, owned and operated by W. R. (Bill) Shipp, was totally destroyed by fire. Several bales of cotton were also destroyed by the fire. The fire was so far advanced when firemen arrived that it was impossible to save the building or contents. A few minutes after the Goldthwaite firemen arrived the Comanche Fire Department also arrived on the scene.

There was a small fire at the gin Monday afternoon, which was thought to have been extinguished. Mr. and Mrs. Shipp checked on the place several times during the evening before the fire broke out again. This was the only gin in Mills County and the loss of it will be quite a blow to the entire county.

Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield, who accompanied the fire department to Priddy, stated that the people of Priddy expressed their thanks and appreciation over and over to the Goldthwaite Volunteer Firemen and to the Comanche Fire Department for answering their call so promptly and helping in every way that they could.

WHAT GOVERNMENT DOES TO YOU

Life magazine vividly restates what it termed an "old truth" in these words: ". . . The more a government does for you the more is has to do to you."

Before government can provide you with any service, it must first take the money from the pockets of you and all the rest of the taxpayers. And it always takes more than it returns, inasmuch as the administrative costs run high.

That isn't all—or even the worst of it. Any welfare state eventually turns to a cheap money policy and lets loose the tides of inflation. Every dollar then buys less and less. The result is a murderous combination of sky-high taxes and depreciated money.

IT'S TIME TO FACE FACTS

We shouldn't have to keep reminding adults of their responsibility for keeping children safe in traffic — but we do.

The need is obvious when the National Safety Council reports more than 2,000 children killed and 140,000 injured each year in motor vehicle accidents.

Admittedly, the heedless actions of many child traffic victims thrust them into dangerous situations. But even in such cases, adults must accept the blame.

By their very nature, children are excitable, heedless and unthinking. We, as adults, know this. Yet, somehow, we expect every child to realize instantly that an automobile is a deadly monster if he strays into its path. We expect the child to know more about stopping distances and speed than most drivers know themselves.

If you think that's stretching a point, think back how many times the excuse is used, "I couldn't stop in time" or "I didn't see him soon enough."

Any driver who has run down a child knows the "ifs" that are on his conscience. IF I had been going a little slower! "IF I had been more wide awake." "IF"

It's time for all adults to face up to their full responsibility for our shamefully high child pedestrian toll. It's time for all adults to adjust their driving, increase their alertness when driving in any area where children may be walking or playing. It's time for all drivers to keep a sharp look-out for children and to be ready to protect them from their heedless behavior when necessary.

It's time for every parent to try harder than ever before to prepare his child for the dangers of traffic . . . by his own teachings and his own example.

Half way measures are not enough; and we still haven't done enough.

We as adults must accept fully and without reservation the fact that we must "be our brother's keeper" when it comes to children in traffic.

The Texas Safety Association says that's not just a high minded goal to strive for. It's an absolute minimum requirement for every adult who wants to be able to live with himself!

ALICE—IN—TAXLAND

There is an Alice-In-Wonderland quality about our federal income tax laws, with their extremely high upper-bracket rates. U. S. News & World Report gives an example.

The magazine says: "A baseball player's angry gesture, during a ball game, may cost the Federal Government \$4,200 in income taxes. It also may bring the athlete a personal profit of \$4,200."

Does that sound absurd? Well, here's the true story. The world's highest-salaried ballplayer (\$100,000 a year) was fined \$5,000 by his club for a display of temper toward the fans. This is considered a business expense, for the reason that the fine must be paid if the player is to keep in practicing his profession. Thus, his taxable income is reduced by the \$5,000.

After deductions, the top rate on this player's income is 84 per cent. So the fine gives him a tax reduction of \$4,200, leaving him only \$800 out of pocket.

But that isn't all. Admirers of the player are reported to be making up a fund to pay the fine. U. S. News says: "If they give him \$5,000, that amount is not taxable at all. In that case, the ballplayer would stand an \$800 loss and a \$5,000 gain, for a net profit of \$4,200."

Very few of us have any personal experience with either \$100,000 incomes or \$5,000 fines. But this factual illustration indicates just how confused, inequitable and generally unsound our tax laws are. Like Topsy, they just grew—and grew into a crazy-quilt. That's why sentiment for a complete overhaul has been snowballing.

RIGHT—TO—WORK IN KANSAS

The Republican gubernatorial primary in Kansas was hard fought. A dominant issue was the right-to-work law—the law which provides that a man can join or not join a union if he so chooses, and that he shall have the right to work at his trade in either case.

In this Kansas primary, the incumbent governor opposed the law. He was beaten by a man who supported it.

Long ago, the indefensible practice followed by some employers of blackballing union members was outlawed. The practice of making a man join a union in order to support himself and his family is blackballing in principle and equally indefensible.

dressing, remove the craw and intestines. Chill promptly.

Plucking the birds is preferable to skinning them, as skinning causes dryness and some loss of flavor. Wash birds thoroughly before packaging.

Wrap individually in moisture vapor proof material. If desired, several small birds such as doves could be packaged together after first being wrapped separately. Cellophane, aluminum foil, piliofilm and different kinds of laminated wrapping paper are satisfactory. Seal with freezer tape. Label with name and date.

To maintain top quality, store birds at zero degree F. or below. From six to nine months is recommended storage period.

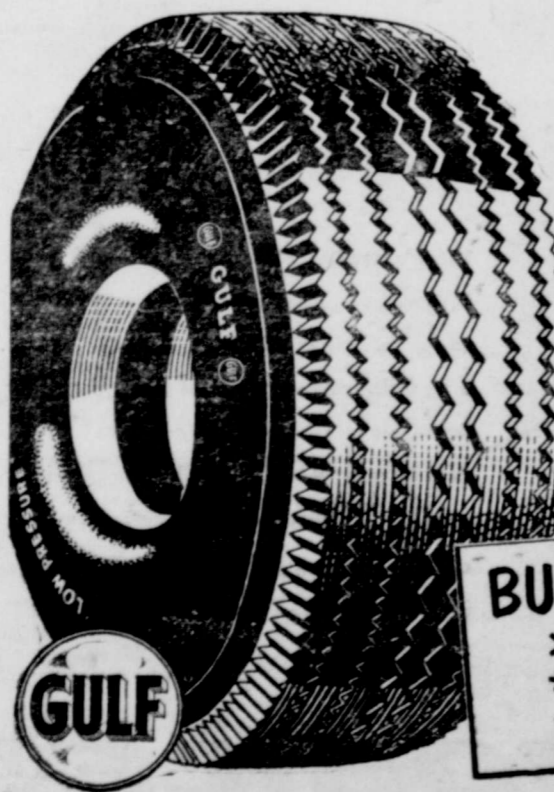
