

There is a healthy and growing awareness, however, that such material progress is not without it's troubles, that the exploitation of physical and emotional pleasures puts a strain on the intellectual, moral and spiritual values, that there is a high price on Utopia. It is a simple fact that a considerable number of retired persons-a recent survey says a majority-wish they had not chosen or had not been required to retire." In other words, we will need a full measure of wisdom if the enormous amount of leisure time the candidates envisage is to put to constructive useand is to contribute to human happiness and achievement.

There is one more point that should be stressed. Both Mr. Nixon and Mr. Stevenson, to their credit, have said that the promised gains should be brought about within the framework of our free enterprise system. Yet a great many of us think of such gains in terms of legislative acts of government-things which will be imposed by law. If that turns out to be the case, we will be trading freedom and independence and self-respect for sheer materialism. There could be no worse bargain.

Interest is at the rate of five percent, and these loans are repayable over periods up to seven years. The new law increased from \$7,000 to \$10,000 the amount of the initial loan; from \$10,000 to \$20,000 the limitation on the indebtedness.

Farm ownership loans,

These loans are made for the purchase, enlargement, or development of family-type farms, and to refinance existing debts for farmers who have adequate real estate security but who are unable to meet present credit obligations and need credit on more favorable terms. Payments are scheduled according to the ability of the borrower to repay, up to 40 years. Insured loans are made from funds provided by private lenders. The loans bear 31/2 percent interest, plus a one percent insurance charge. In the past, the agency has only refinanced existing real estate debts, and only then when the refinancing was incidental to the making of a real estate loan for purchase or improvement of family-type farms.

3. Farm Housing Loans, These are made for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water supplies. Interest is four percent on the outstanding principal, and repayments may be scheduled over periods up to 33 years, with the loan secured by a deed of trust on the borrower's farm. This loan program was reactivated in May of this year.

4. Soil and Water Conservation loans. Made to carry out measures for soil conservation, water development, conservation and use, and farm drainage. Individuals can borrow up to \$25,000 for these purposes. Interest and insurance charges are 41/2 percent with repayments uled according to the borrower's ability to pay, up to

The first dividend in 25 years will be paid in 1957 to policyholders of 5-year term US Government Life Insurance, Dr. George T. McMahan, Manager of Veterans Administration Center in Waco, said today.

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



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
