Jimmy Leonhard, local post office employee, has a wish to make. If it were possible for someone to grant him a wish and have it come true, it would be: "I wish folks would stop being so big hearted when it comes to 'dumping' cats and dogs along the highway near our home.'

The Leonhards live out on the main highway a few miles from town and as Jimmy puts it: "There is no telling how many stray or unwanted cats and dogs folks have let out of their car or truck, a short distance from our home since we have lived out here. And, of course, the first thing we know they are at our door looking for something to eat."

As little as folks may think about the matter it can create quite a problem. Stray cats and dogs must have food and when turned out on their own they will naturally look for it at the nearest place where someone lives.

In relating some of their experiences Jimmy told about one instance in particular. He noticed a nice, nearly new car stop along the road only a short distance from the house. One or two passengers got out for a moment. They got back in their car and started to drive off. As they passed the house they waved greetings to him as he was out in the front yard. He didn't know them and thought they were just friendly folks. He continued by saying: "Then not 20 minutes later here came some cats they had left along the road as they stopped."

Speaking about abandoned pets, the Dallas Morning News gave editorial space to the plea against releasing unwanted pets in rural areas a short while ago.

It stated: "These surplus animals often are hard put to forage for themselves, and they are much more likely to contract and spread rabies than are animals cared for by a family. Cats forced to go wild are seriously destructive of songbirds, quail and other game birds. Both they and the stray dogs become a nuisance to families living on farms or in small communities."

As Mr. Leonhard has found out, when you pass someone along the main highways and find they are waving at you, it doesn't always mean that they are doing so merely as a friendly gesture.







Employment Questions In Population Survey

Special questions will be ask ed in the November Current reliance, resourcefulness, Population Survey to determine ability to plan and work with if unemployed persons are seeking full-time or part-time work. according to Supervisor James W. Stroud of the U. S. Census

These special questions, asked four times a year, round out the labor force statistics provided by Current Population Survey monthly inquiries on employment and unemployment by furnishing information on the availability of part-time workers. In May of this year, around 11 per cent of the unemployed men were seeking part-time jobs while 17 per cent of the unemployed women were seeking part-time rather than fulltime jobs. Of the unemployed men seeking part-time jobs in May, 52 per cent were between 14 and 17 years of age while 11 per cent were 65 years of age and over. Thirty-seven per cent of the unemployed women seeking part-time work in May were in the 14-17 years age bracket.

The special part-time work questions, together with the usual inquiries on employment and unemployment, will be asked during the week of November 18 as part of the nationwide Current Population Survey which is conducted each month on a sample basis by the Census Bureau. Current Population Survey information is collected locally by Nella P. Casbeer of Lampasas.

1. Suit the menu to equipment available: ovens, steamers, refrigerators, working space, cooking utensils and serving

2. Balance food that takes : lot of work with those that need little time to prepare, so all may be ready on time.

3. Plan foods that will hold up if a delay in serving arises. 4. Consider the time of year and use what is plentiful.

5. Look over the amount of help available. Determine the speed of serving and decide if foods that take last minute dishing up and garnishing can be used.

If you serve large groups often, keep a card file of each occasion with the menu, recipes, amounts of food bought, cost per person served and comments on the success of the meal. Such a file can make quick work of planning. To add variety to future menus, include in the file copies of successful recipe: suitable for large groups.

Many family-size recipes are good to serve a crowd, but it is better to repeat the recipe several times rather than making twice or three times the quantity all at once. This is especially true for baked products, for in these recipes proportions may need to be altered when the quantity is increas-

Too many cooks won't spoil the broth if the work is arranged properly. So each person will know what to do, furnish her with her own copy of the menu, recipes and work schedule. Assign each person a job to do and a place to work.
