





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AUSTIN, Tex.-Education has added two more "urgent" items to the list of increased money demands awaiting the incoming Legislature

First report of the new Commission on Higher Education strongly recommends bringing college faculty salaries in line with other progressive states. Simultaneously, it suggested raising tuition fees, unchanged after 20 years of inflation.

Texas tuition charges of \$25 a semester for in-state students, \$150 for outsiders, lags far behind those in other states. But even substantial tuition increases would meet only a portion of salary raises, it was claimed.

Public school teachers also seek higher pay. They term the need an "immediate crisis" and ask that the Legislature treat it as an emergency measure.

Teacher salaries were last raised in 1953. State minimum wage for a beginning teacher with bachelor's degree is \$2,805 per year.



• NEWS BLACKOUT BEHIND CURTAIN-The Voice of America has discovered the people behind the Iron Curtain are still unaware of the extent of the revolt in Hungary and Poland. Communist restrictions on reporting news have kept people of one area from being encouraged by news of uprisings elsewhere. So the Voice has gone on an around-the-clock schedule to present the full facts in 14 foreign languages.

Under the Voice's regular schedule, listeners in Eastern Europe hear live broadcasts from about 6 p. m. until midnight, local times. These programs are recorded at the Voice's overseas relay bases and repeated at intervals during the following 18 hours. The new schedule, which started Oct. 26, provides live programs 24 hours a day.

The Voice staff members-writers, editors, announcers, transla-tors and producers-are working 16 to 20 hours a day to produce the shows. They are sending out 39 news programs.

All the programs, including those regularly scheduled, will be straight news and reports on world editorial reaction. The total of 67 daily broadcasts will be in Russian, Lithuanian, Estonian, Georgian, Armenian, Ukrainian, Latvian, Polish, Bulgarian, Hungarian, Czech, Slovak, Romanian and Albanian.

The Communist governments have released meager reports on the uprisings but the Voice intends the people in the other satellite countries and Russia will know how widespread is the courage of Poland and Hungary.
