1956 Federal **Income Tax Forms** Are Now Available

Federal income tax forms for the preparation of 1956 returns are now available in reasonable quantities to accountants, attorneys and other professional personnel, Jim Cheatham, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood office of the Intrenal Revenue Service, said today. The Internal Revenue Service has provided order blanks to the 3500 North Texas tax practitioners who have, in most cases,

already submitted orders. Individual taxpayers on record will receive their forms and instruction booklets through the mails on the same schedule as last year, during late December or early January, Mr. Cheatham said.

There are very few changes in the form other than minor revisions for clarity and simplification. The instruction booklet which accompanies it has been changed, however, to provide a line-by-line series of explanations, keyed to the arrangement-of the form and its sequence of entries.

New type-faces have been used in both form and booklet, Mr. Cheatham said, and should, with the simplified treatment and explanations, make preparation of a return much easier than in past years.



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WASHINGTON-Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in sure to resign from President Eisenhower's cabinet the first of the year. While doctors termed the recent cancer operation on De

success, it left the 66-year-old cabinet member in a weak dition, and it's improbable that he will resume the arduous directing the nation's foreign policy.

The administration has no definite succ Dulles under consideration as yet. He distinct possibility is former Gov. The Dewey of New York.

Whether Dewey enters the cabinet, h hinges on his willingness to give up a han law practice in New York. In the past w been rumored to be in line for the job. If Dewey declines, the best bet is that the secretary of State Herbert Hoover, Jr. elevated to Dulles' post. Hoover has been secretary several times in Dulles' absence

If you are self-employed and covered by the law, you must pay a Social Security tax. Coverage is compulsory. This applies if you have at least \$400.00 of net income from covered employment. Included are most occupations of self-employed persons. If your net earnings are less than \$400.00 you pay nothing.

Much the same rules apply to the refund of deposits. Unless it is the policy of a store to refund deposits on articles, or at least apply the amount on the purchase of some other item, the buyer is obligated to go through with the terms of the contract, even though he has changed his mind about the purchase.

When one selects, orders, and deposits money on the purchase of an article, the store is under obligation to deliver the article in accordance with the terms of the sale. If the buyer refuses to accept the article or pay the price, the seller can take legal News About action against him, according to the terms of the contract. The same principles apply to
