

Fire Chief Jack Reid has asked us to again remind folks that it is dangerous business to follow the fire truck in your automobile.

To bring out his point Chief Reid told about the traffic problem that was created last Tuesday night when firemen answered a fire call out on the San Saba highway when a truck caught fire. He said that there must have been 200 cars making the run out the highway and that if there had been a bad fire it would have been impossible for fimemen to get through.

He said further: "It's strange how so many people can get in their cars and go to a fire-Many even getting there before the fire truck and equipment in such short order.'

It may be well for some of us to stop and consider the fact that when we take part in such practices we are endangering our own lives and that of others, as well. As long as all works out well it is hard for us to see how we could be a problem, in that respect. But, just suppose 200 cars make a run to the fire along with firemen and fire fighting equipment and it happened to turn out a real bad or explosive fire. The picture could be very serious and very fast, too.

#### BAD BUSINESS

The following is from National Review: "The New Jersey Taxpayers Association says New Jersey wants no help from the federal government for school construction. Testifying before the House Education and Labor Committee, the group pointed out that New Jersey would have to pay out \$2.33 for every dollar received under one proposed bill and \$1.41 under the second."



#### Vaccination or re-vaccination for smallpox.

Despite constant work and vigilance on the part of public health officials, physicians say that complacency and laxity about immunization prorams-on the part of parents-can create potentially-dangerous situations throughout the country.

In Detroit, for example, a recent outbreak of diphtheria-the disease everybody thought was completely under control-struck down 168 children, five of whom died. Last year, more than 2,000 cases occurred in the United States . . . and most of all this suffering and heartbreak could have been prevented, if parents had made sure their children were protected by adequate immunization

The same is true of whooping cough, another childhood disease that is particularly serious with children less than one year of age. An initial series of shots in the first few months of infancy . . . with the prescribed subsequent booster shots . ; . will modify or prevent the disease in most instances.

Tetanus (lockjaw) — a dangerous and frightening disease that frequently follows injuries occurring in childhood — can be prevented with a series of initial injections and subsequent booster shots.

As a matter of fact, three-way protection against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus is now provided in a triple immunizing agent, which reduces the number of necessary injections

Polio, of course, is a disease almost everybody knows about, but not nearly everybody has taken full advantage of the vaccine that prevents occurrence of the dread disease in most people. The doctors say three shots-not just one-are needed to provide maximum immunization, a fact that too many parents . : . perhaps you . . . are overlooking.

And don't forget that a smallpox vaccination will not last forever. Your vaccination, or your child's, may not be fully effective now.

The main point of mine was the making of Apricot-Coconut Balls, a delicious candy and one that has more food value than does chocolate.

Mix thoroughly 11/2 cups dried apricots, ground; 2 cups shredded coconut; and 2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk. Form into balls about 1 inch in diameter. Roll in powdered sugar if desired. From this candy we not only

Maurice M. Chastain, district manager of the Temple Social Security Office, said today that some persons who received monthly social security benefits in 1956 are required to file a special report for that year.

Chastain explained that any social security beneficiary who had earnings over \$1200 during 1956 must file an annual report with the Social Security Administration no later than April 15, 1957. Those beneficiaries who had already advised the Social Security Administration that they expected to earn over \$1200 in 1956 will have the reporting form mailed to them automatically.
