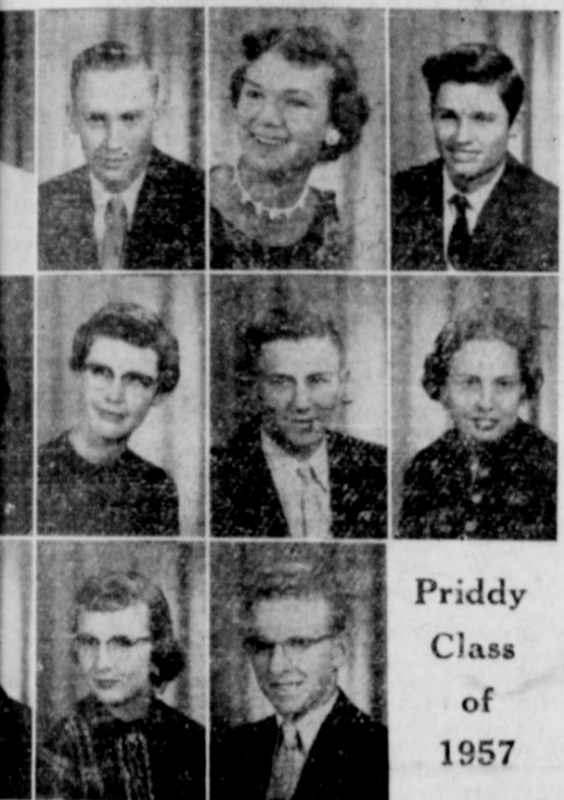

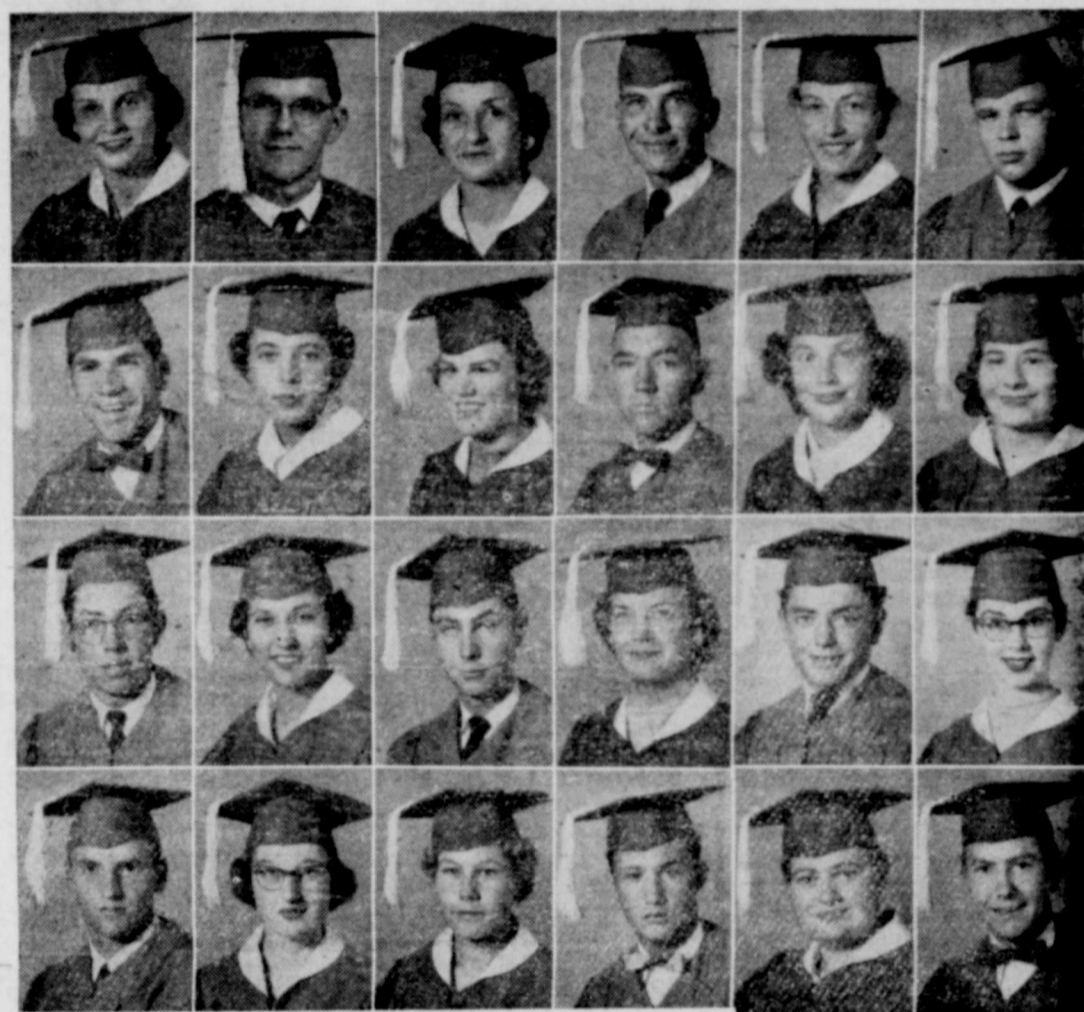

TODAY IS BLOOD DONOR DAY

Today is the day when the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Goldthwaite for the last trip this fiscal year.

As has been pointed out the past two weeks, Mills county is far short of reaching the goal that was set for the county for this year.

Only 55 pints of blood were donated, during the two previous visits of the Bloodmobile this year, towards a quota of 180 pints.

If this is to be overcome, Mills county citizens will really have to turn out today in goodly numbers.

Red Cross officials have expressed real concern about the blood program and it is understood that unless this county, and some others as well, do come up closer to the quota set for the various counties the regional blood program may have to be discontinued or some counties may have to drop out.

If we are to come close to reaching our quota we will need a large number of walk-in donors today.

The Bloodmobile will be at the First Baptist Chapel from 1 to 5 p.m. when walk-in donors may report to donate that pint of blood.

Cut Taxes—But Spend More Money

In a report to constituents, a Congresswoman from Oregon says: "The Federal Budget for 1958 has brought a flood of letters to my office. Almost without exception, the letters urge cuts . . . Some letters . . . urge me to vote to repeal the income tax and to cut the Budget and also to vote for a pension to every citizen over 65."

This is simply an extreme example of a widely-held public attitude—that economy should be confined to "the other fellow." So long as it prevails, we will have grossly swollen budgets, confiscatory taxation, and we will face the specter of more inflation.

District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr. of the Internal Revenue Service in Dallas, has just sent us a letter of thanks which reads as follows:

Tax Collector Expresses Thanks

"We have just completed another income tax filing period at the Internal Revenue Service. Jimmie Cheatnam, Administrative Officer in Brownwood, has asked me to write you a special letter of thanks for the outstanding help that you have given our Brownwood office in carrying out the Taxpayer Education Program.

"We sincerely appreciate your help. The news stories that you carried have rendered a real public service to our taxpayers. We know that educated taxpayers prepare better returns that cost the government less money to process. Educated taxpayers also save themselves money by taking all the deductions to which they are entitled.

"Jimmie will be passing along news stories and press releases from time to time about local happenings and other information that our taxpayers need to know. It certainly gives us a good feeling to know that we can count on folks like you for help in doing our job."

As they stand on this new threshold looking into their bright and promising future we want to extend to each and everyone of them our sincere congratulations and good wishes for the future.

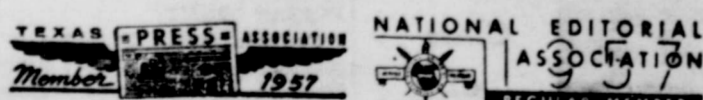

PARENT PROBLEMS

Meddlesome Little Ones Need Constant Watching

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

NO matter how good your little children are otherwise, they must learn not to get into your things about the home.

A Texas mother writes: "I am the mother of five children, the oldest a girl of fifteen and the four younger ones of pre-school age.

"We have a very happy home atmosphere, above-average income, with day-help three times a week.

"I have a pretty good system for getting the necessary work done and for caring for the children's needs. We have a set bedtime, with story reading, meals on time, etc.

Play Outdoors
"The children are required to play outside for part of every day, weather permitting, or in either of two children's rooms. We have two blackboards mounted on the kitchen wall, drawers for crayons and color books, and a cupboard in the kitchen for puzzles, small toys and so forth.

"But the younger children get into things. They go through drawers, pour out hair oil, perfume, mercurochrome, paint, wash with lipstick, try on my stockings, and mess things up generally. I seldom leave them, but when I do their father takes over.

Find the Cause
"I feel I must find the cause rather than punish them or try

to reason with them—and believe me, I've done plenty of both."

This was my reply in part: You have so many fine ways with those children that this one group of problems could easily be solved.

It's pretty obvious you have tried too hard to persuade and reason with them.

First Step

First, make it clear to them that there are a few places they must stay away from. Let other things go and be on hand when they are likely to disobey, so that you always catch each offender in the forbidden act. Don't try to reason with them then. Instead, spank them and make sure it hurts. Don't make any exceptions.

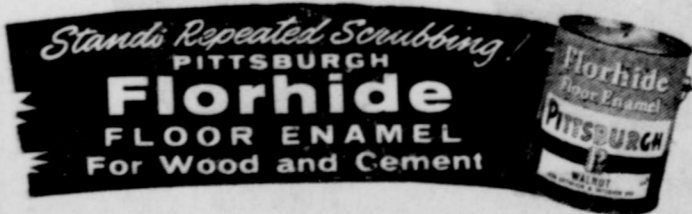
Once you get these youngsters well under control, you may be able to abandon spanking and have the offender, instead, sit unamused in a certain place for exactly 20 minutes.

Train Baby-Sitter

With this problem solved, you should be able to train a good baby-sitter to manage these children while you get away for needed recreation.

Don't be so foolish as to look for some hidden cause for their destructive ways. You already know the cause: they enjoy doing it. If punishment is consistent and painful, they will soon break this habit.

FINDERS KEEPERS?

"Finders keepers, losers weepers." Is this old rhyme true or false? Lawyers say it is not always strictly accurate under the law. It is sometimes rather difficult to define the rights of a finder in court.

There are some rather fine distinctions and exceptions to the "finders keepers" maxim that have plagued the courts—and finders—for generations. In the first place, the finder is not entitled to keep the property unless the original owner is not known and cannot be located. Neither may he keep it unless the object is truly "lost," and not merely "mis-laid."

In general, property is legally "lost" when parted with involuntarily—through accident, neglect, forgetfulness or any other unintentional circumstance. Property is not lost in the legal sense when voluntarily left by the owner, intending to pick it up later—even though he fails to do so. Such property is "mis-laid."

Thus, if one loses a watch on the street by having the clasp break, not knowing where or when it was dropped, it is legally "lost." The same is true of a fountain pen falling through a hole in one's pocket unobserved. In such cases, the finder owns what he has found against all but the true owner.

On the other hand, a package left on the seat of a bus in "mis-laid" rather than lost. In one southern state, a pocketbook left in a barbershop by a customer was held to have been "left," not "lost." The barber was arrested and convicted of larceny when he spent the money that was in it.

Under the law the finder of

either lost or mis-laid property should make a "reasonable effort" to find the real owner.

When articles are left on a train or bus, in a public hotel room, or even when dropped on a shop floor, under circumstances indicating that the true owner will later return to claim them, such items are not considered lost. The proper custodian to hold them for the owners return would be the proprietor or other person in charge.

Remaining unclaimed, the property sometimes goes to this custodian, sometimes to the finder. The distinction here appears to be whether the place it is found is private or semi-private, or a place used by the general public.

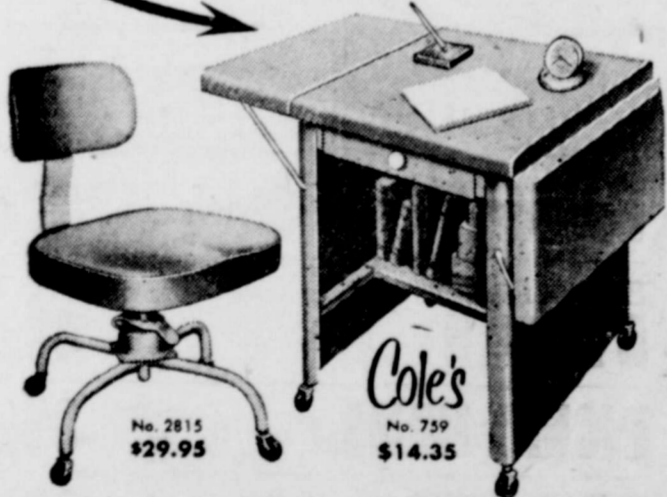

IMPORTED FIRE ANTS THREATEN TEXAS

Imported fire ants, native South America pests, have become a present problem and a serious threat to Texas farmers.

The ants now live in the Southern states in a line from Florida westward, infesting in their final course an area in Southeast Texas from the Louisiana border to Houston.

The imported fire ant is noted for the fierceness of its attack. Its painful sting can cause boil-like sores on humans and severely injure animals. They aggressively attack small animals in numbers and have killed new-born calves on the farm.

Their damage extends from poultry, livestock and wildlife to all types of plant life. Feeding both above and below ground, they seriously damage many vegetable crops. They injure pasture grasses, cereal and forage crops, nursery stock, and fruit trees.

Imported fire ants are very easy to detect by the mounds that they build—reaching up to two feet in height and three feet in diameter. The huge, hardcrusted mounds mar lawns, pasture lands and interfere with cultivating, mowing, and harvesting machinery.

Entomologists have said the ants are at their worst as a nuisance, hampering all types of farm operations. In heavily infested fields, it is difficult for cotton pickers and other farm labor to work.

The tiny fire ants at present have covered only a relatively small part of Texas, but the continued growth of their population since introduction into this country some 30 years ago gives cause for alarm.

Spread of infestation is high in the springtime when the queens scatter to start new colonies. It takes only 8 to 10 days for the queen's eggs to hatch into dirty white grubs and another 6 to 12 days for these larvae to become active workers. Queen larvae become active in 9 to 16 days. The entire life cycle is completed in about 30

days. At a recent meeting of the Southern Plant Board, the imported fire ant was termed a major pest of agriculture in the South and federal aid was asked for cooperative control work with states heaviest hit.

Eradication measures are expensive but effective and necessary if infested land is to remain of any value.

Persons desiring control and eradication recommendations should contact the Division of Plant Quarantine, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin 14, Texas.

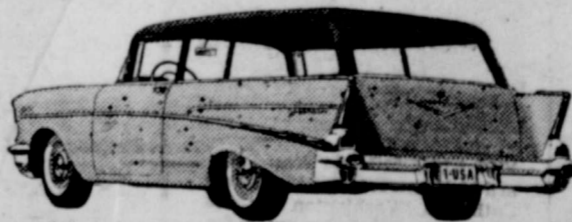

TODAY'S Menu

Magic With Meat Loaf

By ALICE DENHOFF

MEAT loaf is the Cinderella of menus when prepared in a dull, uninspired fashion. But dress it up, prepare it with ingenuity, and you have a delightful dish.

Leftovers can be used for lunch box sandwiches. Include slices of pickle for added flavor.

With Sour Cream

For our first meat loaf suggestion to serve 6, combine 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef chuck, 3/4 c. sour cream, 3/4 c. chopped green pepper, 3/4 tsp. salt and dash pepper. Mix well and press into a greased 9x5x3-in. pan.

Melt 3 tbsp. butter or margarine over low heat.

Add 3/4 c. chopped celery and sauté 5 min.

Other Ingredients

Add 2 1/4 c. soft bread crumbs, 1/2 c. sweet pickle relish, 3/4 tsp. sage and 1/2 c. chicken bouillon. Mix well, remove from heat.

Gradually add to 1 egg and blend. Spread over meat loaf. Bake at 350° F. 45 to 50 min. or until loaf is done.

For a tasty Pickle Lamb Loaf to serve 6-8, combine 1 1/2 lbs. ground lamb, 2 c. rolled oats, 3/4 c. chopped sweet fresh cucumber

pickles, 1/4 c. finely chopped onion, 1 can condensed tomato soup, 1 slightly beaten egg and tsp. salt, mixing thoroughly. Shape into loaf and place on rack in a shallow baking pan. Bake at 350° F. for 1 hr.

Place on oven-proof serving platter. Spread top and sides of loaf with 2 c. seasoned mashed potatoes. Brush with melted butter or margarine. Bake 15 min. or until potatoes are lightly browned. Sprinkle with 2 tbsp. chopped chives and paprika for pretty color contrast and taste appeal.

Clever Disguise

Here's a meat loaf in a clever disguise. To serve 4 to 6, combine 1 lb. beef chuck, 1 egg, 1/4 c. chopped dill pickles, tsp. grated onion, 1 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Mix thoroughly.

Place on waxed paper and pat out in a rectangle, about 8 by 10 in. Spread 1 c. seasoned mash potatoes over meat. Carefully roll up jelly-roll fashion.

Cut in slices and broil about 3-4 in. from source of heat, 10-15 min. or until browned. Serve with chili sauce.

BUESCHER STATE PARK, near Smithville, Texas, was selected for testing a new type of low cost overnight park housing, which has proven highly successful. The overnight shelters in Buescher State Park provide many of the conveniences of the usual park cabin without costly cabin installations, so that they can be rented at about a third of the usual charge made for full cabin facilities. The shelters are roofed and have a concrete floor. Each has a cooking and eating unit, running water and lights. Plugs make possible use of electric cooking utensils and electric shavers. Open sides assure ventilation without the expense of fans or air conditioners. Users bring their cots or sleeping bags and covers, eliminating the cost of expensive sleeping accommodations. Community wash rooms and restrooms take the place of costly individual plumbing.

Distributed over the park to give semi-privacy the shelters are concentrated enough to make long water mains and long electric power lines unnecessary. A daily hosing of the concrete floor and a check to see that the installations are in good working order, is the only maintenance required. A large field house in another

part of the park cares for groups. Indoor gatherings use a large red stone concessions building built by the C. C. C. This building has an outside dance terrace. Buescher State Park and Bastrop State Park are connected by an all-weather park road which runs along a high ridge generally parallel to State Highway 71 between Smithville and Bastrop. The park road affords several attractive views of the surrounding country. The transition from moss-draped oaks to the pine trees along the park road is particularly interesting. Main entrance to Buescher State Park is reached by turning off State Highway 71 about a mile northwest of Smithville.

AUSTIN, Tex.—In a final burst of energy, homesick Legislators broke the bottlenecks and started passing bills with machine-gun rapidity.

After days of delay, the Senate swept through most of the major bills still pending, in two days. It set a record for action this session and cleared the way for winding up money matters this week.

Report by the joint conference committee on the general appropriations bill was laid out for study. Approval of this plus two others designed to raise funds for teacher pay raises will be the signal for a fast finish.

Most observers feel certain that enough money will be found to give teachers a \$400 across-the-board increase.

TEXAS-SIZE MESS—Relief workers face multiplying problems as they wade into the multi-million-dollar mess spread over water-glutted Texas.

Preliminary estimates placed damage at \$25,000,000. This was before the Lower Brazos spread to a width of 13 miles in some places.

Federal Civil Defense Administration has an initial grant of \$1,000,000 to help restore community-owned facilities. More is being sought. One of PCDA's more pressing problems is helping rural residents decontaminate flooded wells and spray against insects that breed in

standing water. In all, some half-dozen state and federal agencies are working to salvage public buildings, roads, businesses and farms.

Farmers got a setback, however, when federal officials refused to let them switch flooded acreage for higher land in the soil bank program. It means some will have usable land they can't cultivate because it was previously allotted to the soil bank and other land, not in the soil bank, they can't plant either, because of flooding.

Even so, encouraging reports continue to come in from rural areas. First post-drought sales show grass-fattened cattle bringing higher prices. Small town bankers and businessmen report people are daring to spend again in anticipation of good crops.

NAACP PROGRAM LIMITED—NAACP can continue to operate in Texas, but with clipped wings. Unless a higher court reverses a Tyler district judge's ruling, NAACP will henceforth be permanently barred from all but "educational and charitable activities."

Suit to outlaw the organization in Texas was begun last year by former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd. It has been carried on by the present staff under Atty. Gen. Will Wilson.

A temporary injunction issued by the Tyler court last fall halted all NAACP activity in the state. Present permanent injunction bans solicitation of lawsuits, and lobbying, in violation of state law. Court also ordered payment of back franchise taxes plus interest.

NAACP attorneys filed immediate notice of appeal. WATER BILL FILIBUSTERED—A water storage buying proposal was down, and maybe out, after a 13-hour "discussion" by Sen. Otis Lock of Lufkin.

Lock's determined opposition meant several days delay on the measure at a time when delay often means death. Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas, sponsor, was so disgruntled he threatened to junk the whole water conservation program.

Proposal, if approved by the voters, would allow the state to issue bonds to purchase water storage space in federal reservoirs. Lock contended the plan would be so unpopular with voters it would sink the whole water program at the polls. He objected on grounds it would be non-self-liquidating and would bring in federal controls.

ENOUGH SAID—Senate apparently wants no more long talks on the segregation bills.

First such bill to come up brought on a record-breaking 36-hour filibuster. But the second one was shoved through in minutes after a vote to shut off debate.

Passed was a bill to require local elections before schools can be integrated.

Last apparent hope of the segregation opponents now is that the bills will be referred to the attorney general and ruled unconstitutional. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson said he has made

preparations to handle the bills promptly, if asked. Governor Daniel he plans a thorough staff study of each bill before deciding whether to seek a ruling.

BETTER PAY APPROVED—If voters consent, future legislators may avoid some of the financial pinch many complain of now.

Senate approved a House constitutional amendment providing for annual sessions and more pay. But it upped the House-suggested salary of \$4,800 to \$7,500 a year.

Present arrangement is \$25 a day for 120 days. It totals \$3,000 for two years unless a special session crops up. Since May 7, when the 120 days ran out, lawmakers have been on their own moneywise.

Legislators' wives have been heard to speak bitterly of "going more in the hole every session." They cite cost of campaigns, two moves, high expenses in Austin, plus payments on house back home and "constant" telephone calls and trips to Austin between sessions to handle constituents' requests.

Concluded one wife from an extreme north Texas district: "I've put my foot down. This is our last term."

SCHOOL LAW STUDY—A searching examination of Texas school problems, such as preceded the Gilmer-Alkin laws, has been proposed.

Resolutions introduced in both House and Senate said many districts are unable to provide teachers and buildings to keep up with the rapid increase in
