But it has no validity in the case of at least one service-parcel post. Parcel post is not a basic postal service function -it did not come into existence until 1913. The law creating it specified that it should be self sustaining and that it should not unnecessarily compete wth private parcel or express organizations. But the fact is that it is in direct competition with such organizations, on a tax-subsidized basis-and that during much or most of its life it has operated at a deficit.

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley has announced that he will reappoint persons now holding notary public commissions but that such persons must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1957 and June

Steakley emphasized that noaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires the County Clerk to approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk now. Applications during this period will assure him horrible death. Secretary of State Steakley further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.


