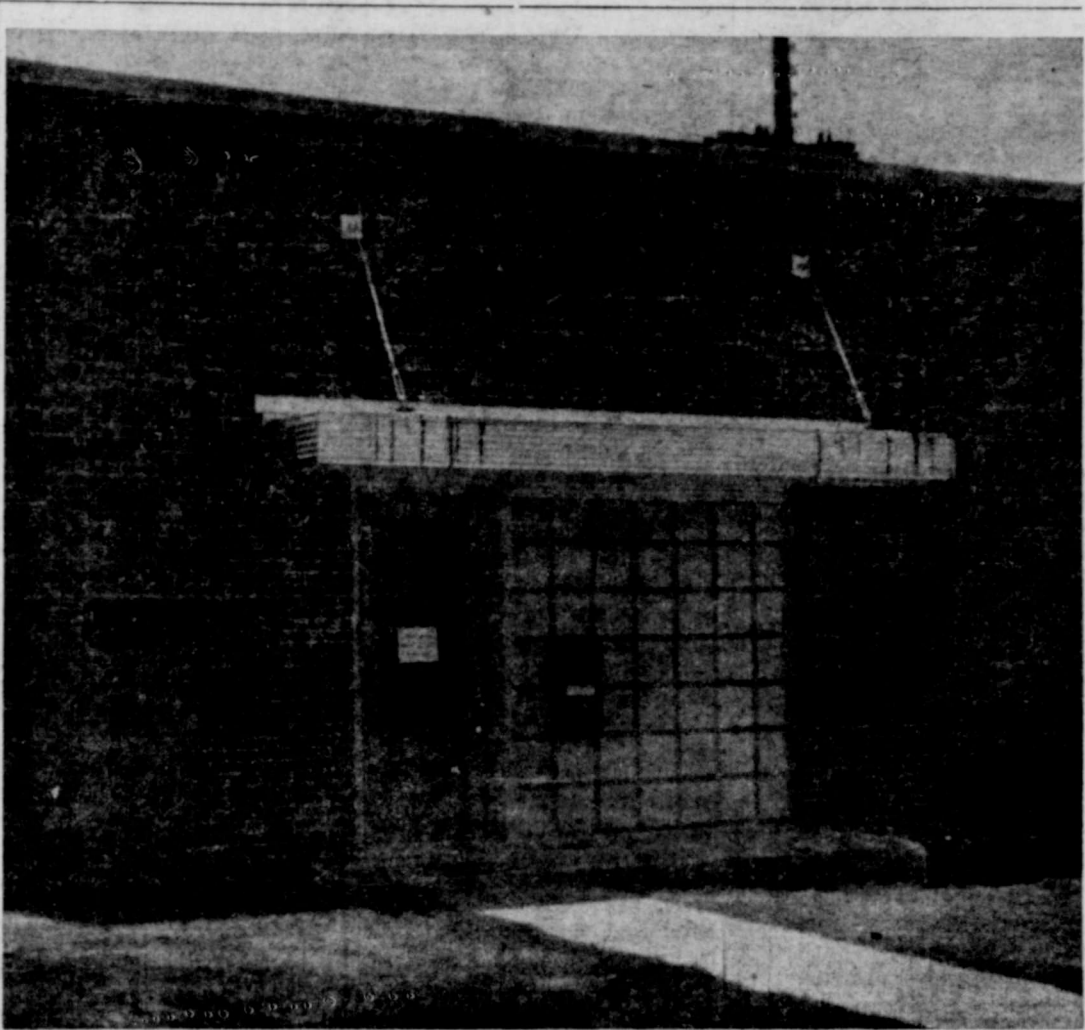
## M.Y.F. To Observe Fellowship Week

## McClung, The Exchange Repairman Tells How Automatic Dialing Works

Have you ever wondered how a telephone call gets through to the person you are calling, without the help of a switchboard operator?

Many people have, so we think you'll be interested in what this reporter found out when he asked Mr. Frank McClung, exchange repairman, to explain, for the benefit of The Goldthwaite Eagle readers just what happens.

### THE X-Y SWITCH

"The most important element in the automatic switching of a telephone call," Mr. McClung said, "is the X-Y Switch." Basically, this switch consists of the following:

"First there is a horizontal shaft carrying a set of connecting 'fingers' known as 'wipers.'"

"Second, a 'contact bank' of 100 sets of metal contacts stacked in 10 vertical rows, each row having 10 sets of contacts. Each set of contacts represents the terminals of one line or trunk."

"Third, there is an electro-mechanical device that moves the wiper carriage horizontally any number of steps from one to 10, thus causing the wipers to connect to one particular set of contacts in the bank."

"Finally, there is a release mechanism by which the shaft may be permitted to return to its original position."

**WHAT THE X-Y SWITCH DOES**  
Mr. McClung then went on to point out that this basic X-Y mechanism can be set up to perform any one of the following functions:

**As a Linefinder:** In this case the bank contacts are the terminals of subscribers' lines, and the switch operates automatically when the calling subscriber lifts his handset to make a call. The wiper carriage moves horizontally until the wipers come to rest on the terminals of the calling line. This action takes place in a fraction of a second—before the subscriber has a chance to operate his dial.

**As a Connector:** This switch is the last in the train of switches used in setting up a connection, and both motions are controlled by operation of the dial. After the connector reaches the terminals of the called line, it tests that line for busy condition. If the called line is busy, the switch returns "busy tone" to the calling station. If the called line is idle, the switch sends out a ringing signal, and when the called station answers, the two stations are connected for conversation.

When receivers or handsets are placed back on the hook after a conversation, the shafts and wipers of all the switches in the train return to their original positions, and the same switches are then available to other subscribers.

### HOW A CALL IS SWITCHED

Mr. McClung explained step by step just how a telephone call actually is switched.

When you pick up your receiver, instead of an operator saying "Number, please" the linefinder switch locates the terminals of your own telephone, connects you with a selector switch, and you hear a dial tone.

Then you proceed to dial. Each office has its own designation, for example M1 (for Mission). In the central office designation MI-8, the letters "M" and "I", so far as the mechanics of dialing are concerned, are in reality the digits "6" and "4". Experience has shown that four or five digits are about all that people can store in their memories. Thus, letters of the alphabet are used for the first two digits as a remembering device.

Assume you are calling the Goldthwaite Eagle, whose number the automatic system will be MI8-2244.

When you dial the "M", the first selector steps up to the sixth level and then returns to normal. Next, you will dial the "I" and the next selector steps to the fourth level and returns

to normal. Then, you will dial the digit "8" and the selector will step to the eighth level and unlocks the equipment and returns to normal. The next digit to be dialed is the "2", and the first selector steps to the second level. The 10 terminals of this level lead to 10 other selectors serving lines in the 2000 group—that is 2000 to 2999. The selector, automatically steps until it finds an idle terminal, and you are then connected to the second selector. You dial the next digit "2" and the second selector switch steps to the second level. The 10 terminals on this level lead to 10 "connector" switches, each of which may have 100 telephones connected to it, those with numbers 2200 to 2299. This action resulted in the selection of the appropriate group of 100 telephones, from among all the other groups of 100. The selector steps until it locates an idle terminal, and you then become connected to an idle connector switch.

When you dial the next digit, "4", the connector switch steps across four levels. Then as you dial the last digit in the sequence, "4", the connector has located telephone 44, from among a total of 100, and you have been automatically switched to telephone number MI8-2244. The connector switch then tests whether the line is busy. If it is, the connector sends a busy tone back to the caller. If the called line is idle, the connector rings on the line, and the dial equipment has completed your call to the Goldthwaite Eagle—and without the aid of a switchboard operator.

Conversion of the Goldthwaite telephone exchange to dial operation on July 25 marked the completion of the improvement program which was begun with the breaking of ground for the new dial building in November, 1956. The building was completed in February and installation of equipment begun shortly after that.

Southwestern States officials said recently that total cost of the new building, dial equipment and new lines and cables necessary for placing the system in operation was approximately \$170,000.

The new system was placed into operation on the night of July 25 when Vic E. Koleber, Editor and Publisher of The Eagle, pushed a switch in the equipment room at the new building. Mayor William G. Yarborough officially inaugurated the new dial by placing the first long distance call. Mayor Yarborough's call was to Senator Ralph Yarborough in Washington, D. C.

Since the conversion, residents of the Goldthwaite area have been enjoying the most modern in telephone facilities. Installation of the new Stromberg-Carlson dial system, along with the inauguration of the "two-five" or metropolitan dialing system, has placed Goldthwaite in readiness for the future operation of direct distance dialing. This system enables telephone users to make long distance calls without the aid of an operator. Operation of this system will depend, of course, upon installation of similar equipment in the surrounding area in order to tie into the nationwide system.

Southwestern States operates telephone facilities in some 170 towns in Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Texas. Company officials said that conversion of the Goldthwaite exchange is the latest step in the company's plans for dial operations for all their exchanges. With the local exchange the company's facilities are now 79 per cent dial operated.

## WHAT'S THE ANSWER

Looking across the American landscape, one held together by a vast network of superhighways, dotted with 300-horsepowered cars, it is hard to believe that within the memory of many of our citizens there is a vivid recollection of stagecoaches and prairie schooners.

In fact, just since World War II, the scene has changed with incredible rapidity. Eleven years ago, 34-million registered vehicles moved across 660,000 miles of surfaced roads. Today, with vehicle registrations nearly doubled at 62-million, we're making use of 996,000 miles of the same kinds of highways.

A second glance at the above figures reveals one interesting and challenging fact about our transportation system. While roads have increased a little more than 50 per cent, vehicles have zoomed a walloping 82.4 per cent.

This, then, leaves us with one of the most basic problems in traffic accident prevention. How, with these unbalanced increases, can we maintain a maximum of safety and, at the same time, improve transportation efficiency?

Here in Texas, we have been most fortunate in our road building program. Our Highway Department has built and maintains more than 55,000 miles of excellent highways. Our Highway Patrol is doing an outstanding job of law enforcement.

With these advantages, why is it that in 1956 we suffered 2,611 deaths and injured 111,501 persons on our Texas streets and highways? How can we attack this daily threat to our lives? What is the cause?

Public apathy, in regards to safety training, and absence of safety habits, have actually created the problem.

Engineering of good highways and enforcement of the laws are equally vital to the traffic safety program, but they are insufficient so long as an indifferent public remains blind to its own responsibilities.

Education is probably the weakest link of the traffic safety chain. Education in our schools and of the general public to develop the proper attitudes.

Take the Driver Education program, for example. It is sorely in need of expansion. At the present time, less than 400 schools are teaching D-E courses, and these reach a relatively few thousand boys and girls. A D-E Bill, sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, was defeated in the 55th Legislature. Why? Because of a lack of public support. Its failure to pass can only result in additional injury and loss of life to our adults of tomorrow. We cannot expect our youth to learn to drive a car safely without adequate training, anymore than we could expect them to pilot an airplane without proper instruction.

Among adult motorists of today's "hurry up" world, impatience for speed seems to be the principal cause of most accidents. It's a hard factor to overcome, because it is difficult to understand why a supposedly intelligent driver will jeopardize his own life, that of his family and a fellow motorist, merely to save a few seconds of time. Ignorance must be the answer—somehow or other, this type of driver has failed to learn the simple ratio of speed to death. We Texans are paying for this sort of ignorance too; at the rate of seven lives and 305 injuries each day, plus an interest rate of over \$150 million a year.

It looks as though the answer, to our highway accident ills, rests with the individual. As one sage has put it: "When the people tire of the present highway carnage they'll put a stop to it . . . and not before."

Frankly, I hope we tire of it soon.

## WASHINGTON HAS TAKEN OVER

Publisher Tom Anderson of Farm & Ranch magazine points out that "In 1914 state and local governments spent 70 per cent of all money spent by government. Now 70 per cent is spent by Washington bureaucrats." Then, to make a bad matter worse, "A big part of our tax money never comes back to us in services—but is lived up by the swarms of bureaucrats whose hands it goes through."

President Eisenhower has proposed that the states assume responsibility, in whole or in part, for many projects now handled on the federal level. If the states will do that, the taxpayers will find that they will get more and better service—and for less money.

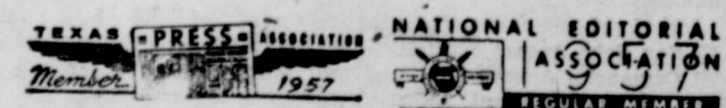

## Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Zhukov May Seek Meeting With President Eisenhower | Recent Upheavals Spark Marshal as a 'Strong Man'

WASHINGTON—Diplomats believe that President Eisenhower's wartime friend, Soviet Defense Minister Georgi Zhukov, soon suggest a personal meeting with the United States executive.

The diplomatic grapevine carries the word that Zhukov, who star is in the ascendancy in the Kremlin power struggle, has personal meeting with Mr. Eisenhower might do much toward easing East-West tensions.

Sources predicting such a move note that Zhukov has emerged from the recent upheavals in the Kremlin as a "strong man" of the Soviet Union's military set-up.

Intelligence experts report it was Zhukov's political ally, Nikita Khrushchev, who ousted M. Molotov, Lazar Kaganovich, Georgi Malenkov, Dmitri Shepilov and other top-Stalinists from the government hierarchy.

The President and the Red marshal's friendship began when they jointly ruled Germany immediately after World War II, during the Big Four conference at Geneva years ago and their personal relations have been cordial.

At the time of the Geneva talks, Zhukov's position of power he is now said to occupy in Russia.

White House sources, while declining to predict any meeting, do not rule it out as a possibility, particularly if the president is convinced it will help contribute to a true peace.

SPOTLIGHT ON JERSEY—The New Jersey gubernatorial race is already generating political steam even though the voters do not go to the polls until November. Both Republican and Democratic national strategists are eyeing the state battle as a strong vanguard for the 1958 congressional elections and one that could have a tremendous impact on political fortunes in 1960.

One sign of the importance being attached to the contest is President Eisenhower arranged a special White House conference this week with GOP gubernatorial nominee Malcolm Forbes as he could give a boost to his candidacy.

Opposing Forbes is incumbent two-term popular Democrat James Meyner.

These are the factors that make the race a key one in the parties: Meyner is a hopeful dark horse candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1960 and it is essential that he win and at the same time boost morale among Republicans throughout the country.

The Republicans on the other hand feel that they would potentially-strong Democratic presidential contender if Forbes win and at the same time boost morale among Republicans throughout the country.

In addition, President Eisenhower, barred from seeking a second term, could strengthen his political prestige in the Republican Party if his endorsement of Forbes swings New Jersey back into statehouse ranks.

COMPROMISE OR FILIBUSTER—There is growing concern in Senate cloakrooms that although the Southerners will go through with a token filibuster against the civil rights legislation, in the end they will accept compromises offered by the administration and let the bill pass.

One sign that the talkathon may not be as prolonged as forecast is the fact that a westerner, Senator James O'Mahoney (D), Wyoming, has come up with a compromise amendment on the heated jury trial issue which is proving acceptable to both the Southerners and the liberal Northerners.

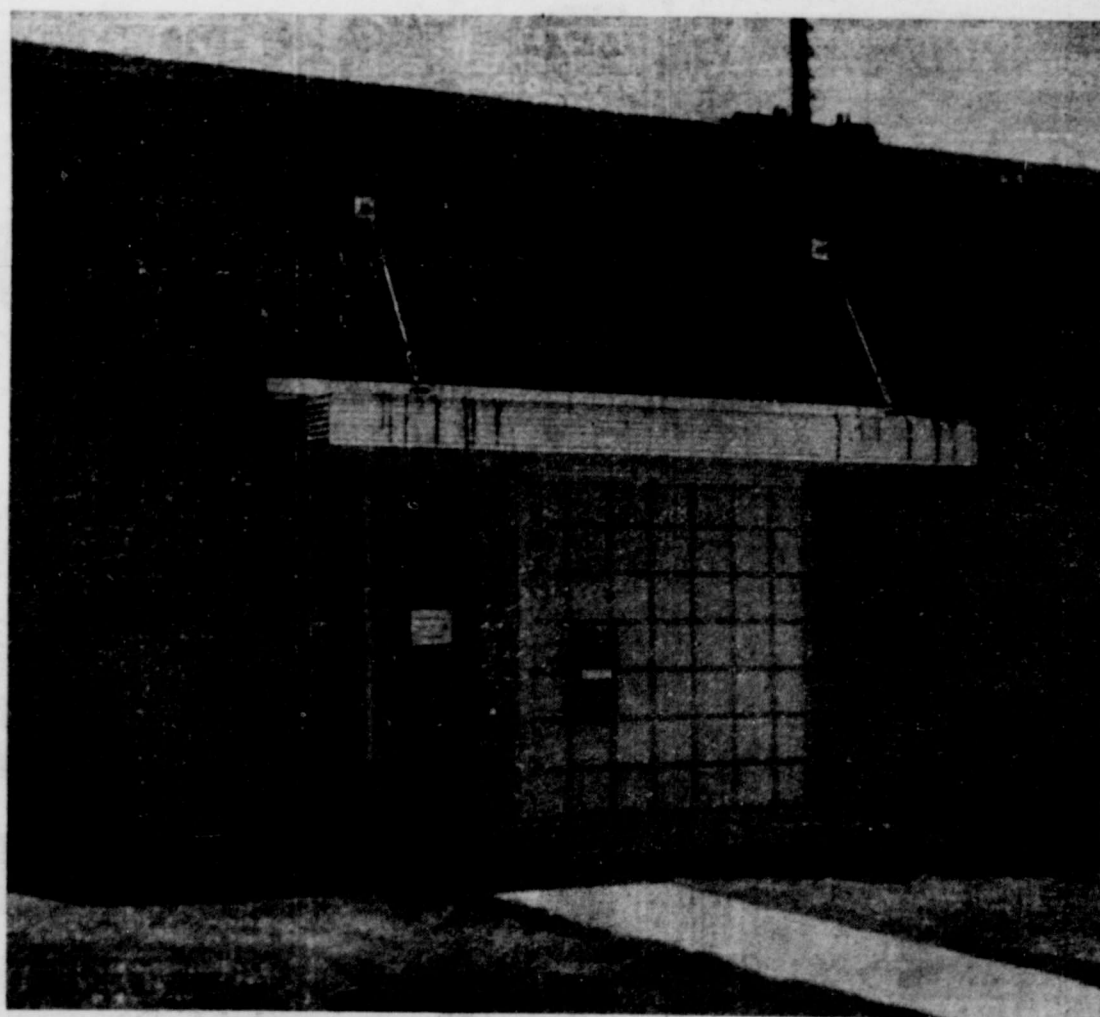

PARK OF THE WEEK—Meridian State Park on State Highway 22 returned this year to its high popularity among Texas fishermen. Restrictions that had been in force during the drouth period were lifted and fishing is again permitted on all days of the week. Water level of the park lake had dropped 21 feet through the years of dry weather. During April and May of this year the lake level rose rapidly and early in May water was again running over the dam spillway for the first time since September of 1951.

During the low water stage the opportunity to remove choking vegetation was utilized and a clear 80-acre lake was restored. Rough fish were taken out and the lake restocked. Fishing was limited to specified days keeping the fish population at a recommended density for the quantity of water. In the same period of low water the swimming beach was improved.

Because of its reputation for good fishing, other attractive features of Meridian State Park as a recreation area in Bosque County are overlooked by many people.

While the lake is the central theme of the park, it offers much more. There are 5.3 miles of scenic roads in the park, mostly hard surfaced. The roads lead to well placed picnicking areas and there is plenty of room for hiking, nature study and riding.

The central concessions building, overlooking the lake, is constructed of native limestone. It provides rest rooms, dressing rooms for swimmers, a dance pavilion and an indoor gathering place for park visitors.

Cabins and fishing barracks supply limited overnight facilities.

Meridian State Park was started by Bosque County residents in 1933 by the purchase of 465 acres of land for donation to the State. The dam and other park improvements were installed between 1933 and 1935 by Civilian Conservation Corps and Public Works Administration units. A local sportsmen's organization has continued interest in the park and helped supply facilities.

The park entrance is on State Highway 22, three miles southwest of Meridian.



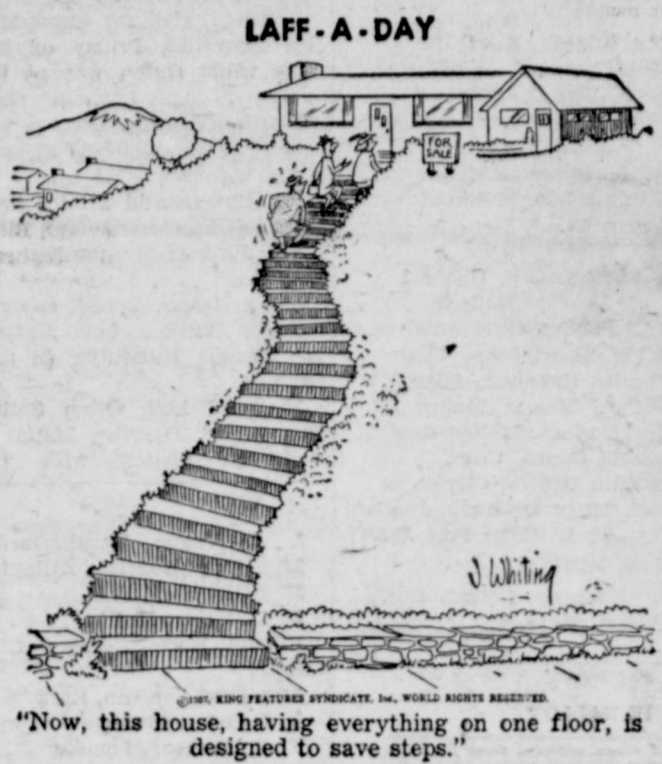

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds...

SECTION 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions hereinafter contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by law, for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on behalf of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

not inconsistent with restrictions hereinafter set forth, provided that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds, and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year. The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957, and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance; One Million, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,750,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following issues:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT INCREASING THE LIMIT ON THE MAXIMUM MONTHLY PAYMENT TO NEEDY AGED PERSONS FROM STATE FUNDS FROM TWENTY DOLLARS (\$20) PER MONTH TO TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$25) PER MONTH SUBJECT TO CERTAIN CONDITIONS FOR PAYMENT IN EXCESS OF TWENTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$21) PER MONTH AND ON THE TOTAL YEARLY EXPENDITURE OUT OF STATE FUNDS FOR ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY AGED, NEEDY BLIND, AND NEEDY CHILDREN FROM FORTY-TWO MILLION DOLLARS (\$42,000,000) PER YEAR TO FORTY-SEVEN MILLION DOLLARS (\$47,000,000) PER YEAR; AND ALLOCATING AND APPROPRIATING ADDITIONAL SUMS, SUPPLEMENTING CURRENT LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS, FOR PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE GRANTS."

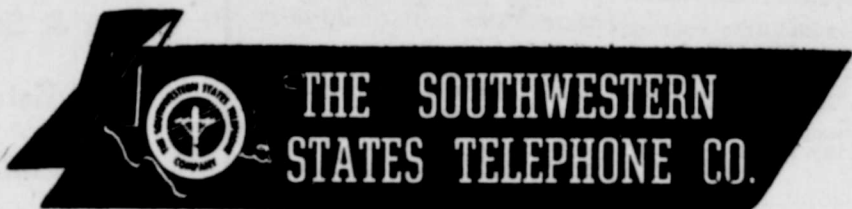

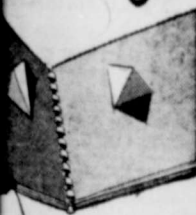

Summer time is vacation for small children goes up. These injuries are varied, but usually they are abrasions, cuts or punctures. Prompt action and a hurried trip to the doctor or first aid kit is usually all that is required to set things right. But oftentimes there is a hidden spectre waiting to complicate what may appear to be a simple little glass cut or nail puncture. This spectre is tetanus, commonly called lockjaw. Lockjaw is an acute disease of the nervous system caused by poisons from wounds infected with tetanus bacteria. These organisms, Clostridium tetani, are found in the soil, especially in the feces of domesticated animals. Contrary to popular belief, tetanus is not restricted to farm areas. Any domesticated animal, including cats and dogs, are capable of carrying the organisms. The tetanus bacteria cannot survive well in open air, but thrive in closed wounds, which they enter through breaks in the skins, establishing themselves in dirty wounds resulting from all sorts of accidents from highway accidents to the most trivial penetrating wound. The incubation period ranges from two to 50 days after contact with the germ. The first signs are often stiffness in the neck and jaw, sometimes preceded by chills, fever and stiffness of the muscles near the original wound. In time, if left unchecked, tetanus causes severe spasms involving the entire body and may result in death. Fortunately serious damage from the infection may be avoided through immunization with tetanus toxoid and should be included in the routine vaccinations of children, with an occasional "booster" to insure immunity. 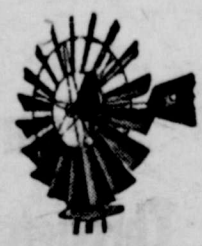
