Registered Angora Goats Bring Top Prices At First Cen-Tex Sale Here

Officials Pleased With Demand As 108 Bucks And 16 Does Are Sold

The first annual Central Texas Registered Angora Goat sale and show was held here Saturday, August 31, at Mills County livestock show barn. It was very successful and interesting, according to officials of Central Texas Registered Angora Goat

Breeders' Association.

Judge for the show was Armor Earwood, Sonora, Texas. He placed the first 25 bucks out of 108, consigned by 16 breeders. The buck selected grand champion was consigned by Bob Kerby, Goldthwaite. It was sold to Dr. T. C. Graves for \$250.00. This was a fine buck in every respect and many goat breeders wanted him. Bidding was fast and Dr. Graves was the successful bidder.

Reserve champion buck was consigned by Col. V. Z. Cornelius and sold to Wallace Perkins, for \$105.00.

Third place buck was consigned by David Watters and sold to P. C. Langford, Ranger, for \$115.00.

Fourth place buck was consigned by Glenn Nickols and sold to Kenneth Adams, La Porte, for \$125.00.

Grand Champion doe was consigned by W. A. Elms, Mullin, and sold to Marvin Rush, Clarlitta, for \$100.00.

Reserve champion doe, consigned by Col. V. Z. Cornelius to S. D. Davis, Lometa, for \$75.00. Third place doe, consigned by W. A. Elms and sold to Marvin Rush for \$65.00.

Fourth place doe, consigned by David Watters sold to Dr. T. C. Graves, Goldthwaite, for \$60.00.

The 16 does were in demand and sold fast. Bidding was strong and they were a very select group of registered does. The first 10 does averaged \$63.00 with the total of 16 averaging \$58.75.

The top 25 bucks averaged \$106.80 and the 108 bucks consigned to the sale averaged \$72.00 per head. The bucks were all yearlings, large in size and carried a lot of quality.

Veteran Pete Gully of Texas Angora Goat Raisers' Association and Lem Jones did the auctioneering chores. Pete Gully, who has been secretary and the originator of the Texas Angora Goat Raisers' Association and pioneered the first registered goat sales in Texas, was well pleased with the sale. They are both authorities on quality goats and commented before the sale that the quality of these goats was excellent. The

Goldthwaite To Have Parallel Parking On Highways Within City

The city of Goldthwaite will have parallel parking on all federal, state and farm-to-market highways within the city limits beginning next Tuesday, September 17.

Parallel parking will go into effect as a result of the new highway maintenance contract that is being entered into between the city and the state highway department. The agreement provides for continuing of maintaining the highways within the city by the

highway department and part of the agreement also provides for parallel parking on all highways.

The matter had been under consideration by the council for the past three weeks after the highway department had made its request to the council for approving the new maintenance contract.

The council meeting in regular session Monday night, with representatives of the highway department, passed an ordinance whereby the city will enter into the new maintenance contract.

Parallel parking on all highways will go into effect as soon as streets are marked. Plans call for this marking of streets to be done next Tuesday.

The new contract between the city and highway department is a standard maintenance agreement which provides for parallel parking on highways in all incorporated cities.

Farmer First 1957 Of Cotton


Blopper of the Priddy county brought in the first bale of cotton for the season. The cotton was baled by Bill Shipp of San Juan and weighed 540 lbs.

OUR NEW STADIUM

When the Goldthwaite High School Eagles meet the San Saba "Dillos" for their first home game Friday night many football fans will have their first opportunity to see, and examine first hand, the new stadium on the north side of Eagle field.

This new improvement at the football field is one of the finest projects that has taken place in a long time, aside from the new school buildings.

Those who have been attending the games through the years have realized for some time the need for new seating, especially on the north side of the field. Now these fans can relax and enjoy the game while knowing Goldthwaite has one of the finest stadiums in the conference—or of any town the same size as ours.

This has solved a problem that had members of the board of education pulling their hair for several years.

Members of the school board and the superintendent of schools are to be commended for their efforts in behalf of this project.

Carl Letbetter and Horace Brooks are to be congratulated for the fine construction job they did on the stands.

We call this to the attention of our readers so that they may take out a few minutes while attending the game Friday night and look over the new stands and if they like the looks of things, then tell members of the school board and school officials that they do. Give them a pat on the back for a job well done.

PRESS BOX TOO

Then there is also the new press box which was added to the new stadium. Say man, that's a really fine job and we know that all members of the press from the entire district who have the opportunity to cover the games this season will really appreciate this new addition.

In that connection members of the Quarterback Club are due a word of praise for their part in helping to finance the press box.

The Quarterback Club voted to contribute \$360. toward the cost of the press box. At the time this was undertaken plans didn't call for as much press box as we finished up with. The project cost considerably more.

As the job got underway it was decided to do it up in grand fashion and it is indeed a press box that is worthy of inspection by not only members of the working press, but all football fans.

So, as you go to the game Friday night take a good look at these improvements.

COMMON-SENSE TAX REFORM

A federal law is proposed which, in the words of the Bremerton, Wash., Sun, ". . . would force government spending programs to compete with a tax reduction program for each year's newly-created income. Federal free spenders would have to justify their programs in the face of taxpayers' expectations of promised tax relief."

This law has been given a tremendous amount of support by groups and organizations of almost every kind. It is known as H. R. 6432, and has been introduced by Representative Sadlak of Connecticut. Over a five-year period, it would reduce the top individual income tax rate from its present peak of 91 per cent to 42 per cent, and the corporation rate from 52 per cent to 42 per cent. The rates in all brackets, including the very lowest, would be equitably cut. For instance, the existing base rate of 20 per cent would be lowered to 15 per cent.

The government would not be deprived of needed revenue. Mr. Sadlak has presented extremely well documented studies and tables which show that expected increase in federal income resulting from stimulated economic activity would more than offset losses due to the reduced tax rates.

Finally, the Sadlak bill is definitely not a "rich man's" tax measure. The greatest total of tax relief—60 per cent—would accrue to people with taxable incomes of \$6,000 a year or less. Only 17 per cent of total tax relief would fall in brackets of \$20,000 or more. To quote the Bremerton Sun again, "Small wonder that Sadlak's bill is called the first common-sense plan for tax reform in nearly 30 years."

Arnold Kelly, a navy veteran, of the Pleasant Grove community, is now employed by the Goldthwaite Eagle as an on the job trainee.



Hoffa's Rise to Power Hurts AFL-CIO Campaign

Meany's Clean-Up Efforts Threatened by Teamsters

WASHINGTON—The campaign of AFL-CIO President George Meany to rid unions of corruption and racketeering has run into a major setback as a result of the rise of Teamster Vice President James R. Hoffa to a position of prominence in the labor movement. Hoffa was recently acquitted in a federal court of a charge of bribery in connection with an alleged attempt to plant a spy in the Senate rackets committee. Government prosecutors were sure they had Hoffa cold on this charge, but the jury fooled them. Now Hoffa is headed for the presidency of the Teamsters' union, the largest in the country.

Hoffa has been accused before the Senate rackets committee of having a close tie with Johnny Dio, convicted New York racketeer. But this is not the first time that accusations of that nature have been leveled at Hoffa. In AFL-CIO circles, he is looked upon as an undesirable. One highly placed labor leader commented recently that, while the AFL-CIO top command disapproved strongly of retiring Teamster President Dave Beck, Hoffa is the name "they use to scare their children with." Hoffa has shown little sympathy for the Meany crusade to rid unions of corruption. He is the friend and adviser of certain labor leaders who have been accused of irregularities. He has openly challenged a code adopted by the AFL-CIO executive council stating that union officers who hide behind the Fifth amendment when questioned about union affairs are unfit to hold office. He looms, in short, as a rising challenge to Meany and his associates in their effort to establish ethical standards for the conduct of union affairs.

● BOY DIPLOMATS—Maybe the diplomats of the world ought to turn their problems over to the children for settlement. At least two boys have done more than their part to break the international ice. Everyone remembers the appeal of the little son of King Saud with the big soulful eyes. His picture, when he accompanied his father on a recent visit to this country, won many hearts.

Now Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D), Minnesota, has returned from a Middle East trip to report of the diplomatic role of a 3-year-old son of Egyptian President Gamal Nasser. Humphrey said that when he arrived at Nasser's home for a talk that lasted three hours, "a little boy of about three peeked out behind a door and his ways touched my heart. . . I'm sure it couldn't have been planned but, if it was, it couldn't have been planned better." As a result, the senator said, he and Nasser got off to a good start by talking of their families.

Possibly it was this human touch that enabled them to be frank with one another. For frank they were, according to Humphrey. Nasser admitted that he sat down and tried hard to think how he could hurt the United States after this country withdrew aid for the Aswan dam. Humphrey in turn frankly told Nasser instances of how he could have improved his public relations with the United States on occasion. It is frank exchanges such as these in which lies the best hope for an orderly world based on mutual sympathy and understanding.

● FOREIGN AID CHIEF—President Eisenhower reportedly is having some difficulty finding a man to replace Foreign Aid Chief John B. Hollister, who plans to resign. Mr. Eisenhower said at a recent news conference that he has someone in mind for the job but he gave no indication that this individual is willing to accept the position. The chief executive is believed to be trying to persuade a prominent businessman to take over direction of the multi-billion-dollar program for helping friendly foreign nations. But he is running into the usual problem of talking a high-paid private citizen into taking a lower-salaried government post as well as subjecting him to the fire of Congress each year. Opposition to the aid program has been steadily increasing in the House and Senate, and the new foreign aid director would have the annual problem of "selling" the money request to the legislators.

**TEXAS MESQUITE—
CURSE OR CURE?**

One of the most astounding developments to come of agricultural research in recent years has been the discovery that common Texas mesquite wood can be made useful as an edible roughage for cattle.

During the past two decades, Texas farmers and ranchers have been fighting a common enemy in the die-hard mesquite which has spread in abundant

growth from the Rio Grande Valley northward.

In an effort to reclaim the countless acres of grassland all but lost to dense undergrowths of mesquite brush, a number of eradication measures have been applied, varying from oil treatment to mechanical uprooting.

Then, just a few years ago, someone got the idea of grinding some tender mesquite into meal and analyzing the product chemically to determine its food value. The analysis showed that mesquite meal had a higher protein, fiber and calcium content than cottonseed hulls. Another essential nutrient not present in many dry roughages, Vitamin A, was also found in the mesquite meal. Fat and carbohydrates content was slightly lower than in usual roughage.

In subsequent feeding tests at the Spur, Texas, Agricultural Experiment Station, the mesquite meal was mixed with other concentrates plus the important addition of molasses which served to give the feed moisture, sweetness, and a more desirable odor. In every instance, cattle fed on mesquite meal not only suffered no ill effects but gained weight in similar ratio to cattle fed on other roughages.

This does not mean that all other meals and roughages should be thrown out in favor of mesquite, but it does mean that mesquite may prove to be a dependable source of rough feed during time of drought when feeds are scarce and high in price.

In the trial feeding periods, it was found that branches and stems with slick bark provided better feed than larger, dryer tree parts. Also, freshly-ground wood proved more palatable than dry wood and fresh supplies were ground weekly.

In order to prepare mesquite meal as a cattle roughage, a wood chipping machine costing about \$1,200 delivered in Texas, a heavy-duty hammer mill, and a molasses mixer are needed.

DEAD SPOTS IN HEDGES**

I fear that we are inclined to blame the "drought" for all dead spots in our plantings when more often the dead spots are caused by insect enemies. There are five enemies of privet and ligustrum that cause dead spots.

WHITE PEACH SCALE, sometimes known as West Indian peach scale, may cause twigs, limbs, or entire plants to die. Scales are usually less than 1/10 inch in diameter and lie flat against the bark. They may be mistaken for natural roughness of bark. Where infestation is heavy, pure white clusters of male scales can be seen along the stems. At a distance they look like bits of cotton lint.

SPIDER MITES make leaves

pale and dry. Heavy infestations kill plants. Almost invisible, these tiny insects usually work underneath leaves. They are apt to increase during hot weather.

THE WHITE FLY draws sap from the plant and stimulates the formation of black mold on leaves. This weakens plants so they may die, especially during unfavorable weather. **MEALY BUGS** also kill by sapping plants. They gather under bark and in rough places on trunk and limbs. Where infestation is heavy, clusters of bugs may be found up and down the stems.

The above four pests may be controlled with 4 percent malathion, used as a spray. Apply every 10 days or two weeks.

THE LILAC BORER griddles stems or enters branches causing leaves to wilt and die. Look for signs of boring dust or scars on stems, or split and examine for boring caterpillar or hollow stem caused by them. Cut and burn all infested limbs. Most DDT plant sprays will kill the young caterpillars if contacted before they enter the limb.

Be sure to examine shrubs in hedges from time to time to prevent damage from insect enemies.

If you want to use your empty perfume atomizer for a new fragrance, make certain all the old scent is removed. To do this, fill the emptied container with rubbing alcohol and let it stand for an hour. Then fill it with hot soap or detergent suds.

After soaking, rinse thoroughly, not forgetting to wash the cap. When bottle is dry, pour in the new fragrance with no worry about contamination.

**ACP Funds Are
Still Available**

"We still have funds for Federal cost-sharing for needed conservation practices under the Mills county agricultural conservation program," E. L. Burkett, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee said today.

Mr. Burkett invited farmers to submit requests to the County ASC Office in Goldthwaite for cost-sharing on conservation practices they can complete before the end of this year.

Practices, for which cost-sharing of 50 to 70 percent of the cost is available in this county, are: Improvement of An Established Vegetative Cover for Soil and Watershed Protection, Controlling Competitive Shrubs, Constructing Wells for Livestock Water, Constructing Dams, Pits, or Ponds for Livestock Water, Installing Pipelines for Livestock Water, Construction of Permanent Cross Fences or Drift Fences, Initial Establishment of Permanent Sod Waterways, Constructing Terraces, Constructing Diversion Terraces, Reorganizing Farm Irrigation Systems, Leveling Land for More Efficient Use of Irrigation Water, Establishing Winter Legumes, and Deferred Grazing.

The 1958 ACP has been authorized by Congress, approved by the Secretary of Agriculture and is now developed by the Texas ACP Development Group. The County ACP Development Group will meet soon to select practices and set rates for the county program. The 1958 program will differ only slightly from the 1957 program. It will be offered to farmers about January 1, 1958.

Farmers planning to do conservation work this fall and receive cost sharing assistance should file their request just previous to carrying out the practice, Mr. Burkett pointed out.

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



 Internal Parasites in livestock should be controlled. Profits that have been made had it been for internal parasites pay any bills!
 These parasites can take a slice out of farmers' profits. Dr. C. N. Patterson, extension veterinarian. Not do they cause damage by stock unthrifty, but also lower the resistance to infectious diseases. These parasites damage the internal organs of animals, Patterson says. They often cause blood and failure to use efficiently, leaving the animals with less strength to off diseases.

Ranchers don't have to this parasitic theft sitting. Something can be done. Sheep should be given at least one drenching with piperazine in the spring and in the fall. One ounce per grown sheep and one-ounce for lambs over 40 lbs in weight will be satisfactory. In addition to the specific dose, feeding should be on a low level throughout the year.

The best method is to mix one part of phenothiazine to nine parts of common salt. Patterson also advises treating all pigs for worms just after weaning.

Pigs raised on contaminated ground or where older hogs are raised should be given a second treatment four to six weeks later.
Feeding one percent Sodium Fluoride for a 24 hour period is the most economical method. The feed should be ground and fed dry. A series of piperazine compounds have recently appeared on the market which are as effective as Sodium Fluoride and are safer to use. They are more expensive, however, costing approximately ten cents per 50 pound hog.

A perennial sweet sudan grass has been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station after 15 years of breeding and selection.

This tetraploid, Perennial Sudan grass, was obtained by doubling the chromosomes of common sudan grass by treatment with colchicine and crossing it with Johnsongrass. It has good forage qualities with sweet and juicy stalks, good fertility and seed production qualities, and a perennial root growth habit intermediate between Johnsongrass and Sudangrass. Its roots do not penetrate as deeply as those of Johnsongrass, so it is unlikely to become a pest.

A leaflet just released by the Experiment Station, "Perennial Sweet Sudangrass," gives pertinent information on this new grass. Included in the leaflet are sections on growth habits, palatability and productivity, forage qualities, seeding habits, its capabilities as a cover crop and sources of seed. Seed should be available for planting from commercial seed companies in the summer of 1958. Copies of this leaflet are available at my office.

Blame it on the weather! If your hens show a lack of vim, vigor and vitality, it's not because they are lazy—they're just hot!
 Some symptoms of this "hot

and bothered" condition are low egg production, less feed consumption and some death losses.

Now, these symptoms cause unfavorable and undesirable changes in an egg producer's paycheck. But fortunately something can be done about it. Birds have no sweat glands to keep cool, but a few management practices can aid in keeping the birds cooler.

Open the house at every place possible and keep the weeds around the houses cut so that air can circulate more freely. The bare ground reflects heat, so try to grow grass around the poultry house. A little sprinkling now and then will also cool off the hot ground.

If the roof is sheet metal, it can be painted with aluminum paint. This will help reflect the heat.

Spacing is also important. Take out the cull birds to give added floor space and eliminate the free boarders. Allow one nest for each four birds so they will not crowd up to lay and increase the water space during the summer months.

Use a shallow litter during summer months. Deep litter tends to heat. Many producers are also using mechanical cooling systems to keep the temperature down. Each poultryman should check his operations with respect to the heat situation. A few simple practices can mean more "money in the pocket" for you producers.
