### Eagles Lose To San Saba 12-7; To Play Burnet Here Friday Night

The Goldthwaite Eagles lost to the San Saba Dillos last Friday night by a score of 12-7, on the local field. Last year the Eagles defeated the Dillos on their field by a score of 20-0. The single TD for the Eagles was an end zone pass for 20 yards from Kirby to Jones with Kirby carrying the ball over for the extra point.

The Eagles attempted 10 passes and completed five. They punted three times for a total of 38½ yards average; four penalties for 30 yards, no fumbles.

Kirby carried the ball 18 times for 82 yards; lost one for 4½ yard average. Edgington carried the ball 14 times for 52 yards,

lost eight for 3 1/7 yard average. Hammond carried the ball eight times for 38 yards, for an average of 4 3/4 yards. Prentiss Head carried the ball twice for nine yards for 4½ yard average. Graves carried the ball twice for nine yards for 4½ yard average.

The Eagles played good ball in the first and fourth quarters holding San Saba to eight yards the first quarter and 13 yards in the fourth. Eagles were driving deep in San Saba territory in the first quarter and scoring in the fourth quarter.

Relaxing their defenses enough the Eagles allowed San Saba to score in the second and third quarters. The Eagle line looked better in this game than they did at Hamilton. The blocking was better and sharper. Pete Dellis played his usual good game. Leo Reynolds, Johnny Wigley, Jackie Reynolds, Jerry Kight and Eddy Jones showed improvement from last week. Earl Oovington was handicapped by an injury received in practice. All of the backfield turned in a good game.

Dean Taff scored in the second quarter for the Dillos on a 33 yard run and Jerry Patton scored in the third quarter on a 26 yard run.

The Dillos attempted three passes, completing all of them, punted twice for an average of 32½ yards; had three penalties for 25 yards and two fumbles.

## NATIONAL CIVIL DEFENSE WEEK

During this second annual National Civil Defense Week, the attention of the American public is once again focused on the nation's disaster preparedness program.

We are an optimistic people—we do not expect a nuclear war any time soon nor do we ever expect a flood, tornado or hurricane to strike the particular town in which we live.

Yet, so long as these possibilities exist, we would be foolish not to guide ourselves accordingly.

This National Civil Defense Week therefore, let us make a special effort to evaluate our personal knowledge of disaster preparedness techniques as well as our community's emergency capabilities.

You cannot wish away or out-talk a flood or a bomb—you can, in some instances, out-think them.

We are thinking of the time a few months back when he accompanied his grandpa on a tour of the ranch. They were driving along in the pickup truck with Reggie standing on the front seat. They came to a gate and had to stop to open it.

Everett stopped the pickup and started to get out to open the gate. As he did so, his grandson spoke up and said: "Everett, you go open that gate and I'll drive 'er through."

## FORCED LABOR IN THE U. S.

General Douglas MacArthur warns that if the government's "lust for taxes" is not curbed this country may be taxed into socialistic slavery.

He cited the fact that in 70 years the average per capita tax rate has risen from \$1.98 to \$444.86—more than 200 times. He added: "The government takes in taxes over a third of the income of the average citizen each year. That means that he or she is required to work entirely for the government from January 1 until May 10. This begins to resemble the Soviet forced labor system. . ."

There are more ways to enslave a people than by bloody revolution and the violent seizure of power by dictators. Conspicuous taxation is one of those ways.

## CRUEL HOAX

J. Edgar Hoover ranks highway killings with major crimes such as kidnapping and armed robbery, and is convinced there should be an end to listing speeders and careless and reckless drivers as "petty offenders". Is a person crippled by an automobile less pitiable than a person permanently maimed by the gun of a robber?

He also finds that much of juvenile disrespect for law can often be traced to the "miserable examples" of adult motorists who "beat the law" on the highways and boast about out-witting traffic officers.

In concluding an editorial quoting Mr. Hoover, the Portland, Oregon, Journal states a plain fact. "There will be no safety on the roads until motorists obey the laws willingly are made to under sure and certain sentences to jail, if necessary. Fines and suspended sentences are a cruel hoax."

Fortune reports that "The appearance of a union of union organizers has caused some embarrassment among A. F. L.-C. I. O. officials." It is known as the Field Representatives Federation, and it wants recognition as a collective-bargaining agent. Officers of the big union are said to be regarding its demands with cold eyes.

## NARROW MARGIN

A continual war is being fought between those who believe in the responsibility of local government for local problems—and those who would forever extend the authority and duties of the federal government, at an almost unimaginable cost in money and in the infinitely more precious coin of lost liberty for the people. And, often, battles in this war are decided by the narrowest of margins.

An example is the federal school-aid bill which, in the view of many, would have been simply a prelude to sweeping federal control of local school systems. It was beaten in the House by only five votes—208 to 203.

An old and justly famous saying covers such matters—"Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty."

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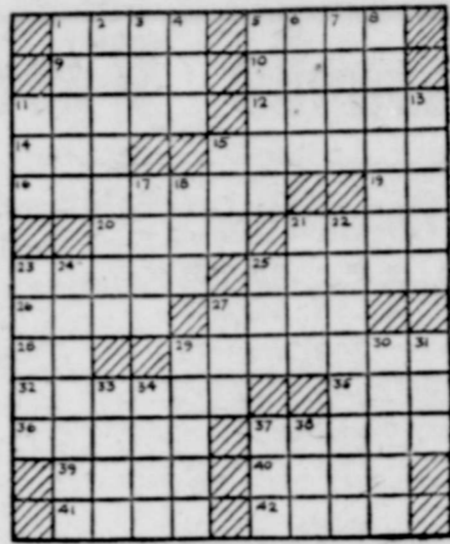

Fred Seaton Is Promoted Vice Presidential Pick

WASHINGTON—While there is no boom underway, a host of administration officials are quietly discussing the political potential of Interior Secretary Fred Seaton in 1960 after.

Seaton is warmly liked by President Eisenhower, key members of the White House family, senators and GOP state officials throughout the country.

He is still young and even though associated with "modern Republicanism" the one-time Nebraska senator is liked by conservative party.

Friends concede that if Vice President Richard M. Nixon gets the GOP presidential nomination in 1960, Seaton's chances for the vice-presidential spot will be lessened because of the geographic factor—both would be from west of the Mississippi.

However, astute political observers are counting him out for the nomination and are convinced he is a man to watch in the future.

General Herbert Brownell, Jr., said in London—where he attended the convention of the American Bar association—that he had many things wrong with the Justice department. He hit his critics for lax administration and failure to investigate or prosecute labor racketeers.

The actual targets of Brownell, however, were J. Howard McGraney and, by implication, Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark. Brownell's immediate predecessor, James P. McGranery, since he took office, has twice publicly praised McGranery for beginning to "clean up" the department.

In some sources, the London statement was interpreted as an attack on McGranery. But it may be recalled that when the Justice department was under sharp criticism, then-President Harry S. Truman brought in Newbold Morris from New York to investigate the handling of government affairs. Morris was fired by McGranery. Truman then demanded McGranery's resignation.

McGranery then came in, and, according to many experts, definite improvements during the nine months he was in office.

IKES' TACTICS—President Eisenhower reportedly is worried by Democratic charges that he has failed to show adequate leadership that he's almost sure to change his tactics toward Congress next year.

Administration sources say that, come next January, Ike will make a determined fight to push his legislative program through Congress and will put the pressure on any reluctant GOP members.

Mr. Eisenhower had felt, these sources explain, that his best hope of getting legislation enacted was to cooperate with the Democratic-controlled House and Senate. But the start of the 1957 session dispelled any such belief. They say, pointing out that only two or three major measures on the President's legislative list will be passed.

Before the next session convenes in January, the President again lay down his legislative proposals, including many measures that failed to make any progress this year. And this time White House will put up a fight to get them passed.

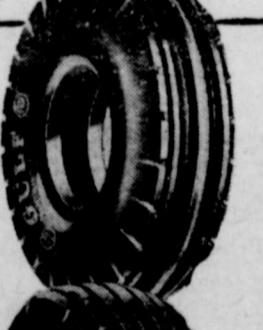
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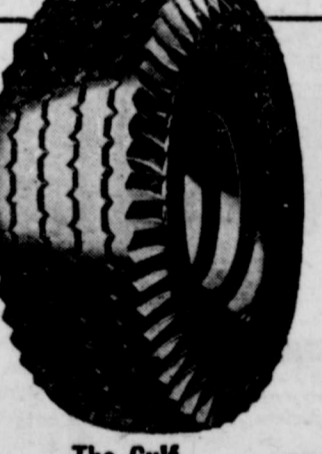

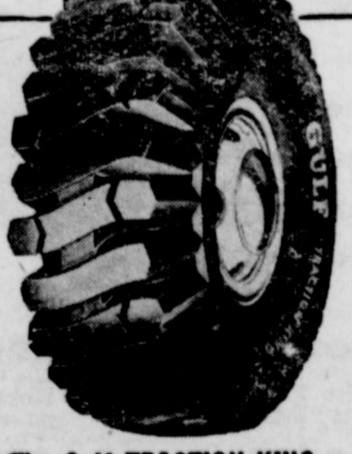

# ONE STAR Agriculture

## LEGAL PROTECTION FOR FARMERS

Texas farmers should beware of doing business with unknown or "traveling" fruit or vegetable buyers on a credit basis unless the buyer is licensed by the Department of Agriculture.

"Hot check" dealers and fly-by-night buying contractors of past seasons are experiencing a crack-down by the Department this year. An Agricultural Protective Act is now in force over the entire state requiring fruit and vegetable buyers to be licensed and bonded unless they operate on a cash basis.

Growers are urged to check an unknown buyer's TDA license before turning over their crops on a "pay-later" basis. Purchase agreements must be made in writing. A licensed buyer is a bonded buyer and the farmer is protected from bad checks or contract failures.

Penalties of up to \$1,000 fine and a year's jail sentence are provided to snuff out unscrupulous operators of years past.

## TEXAS CITRUS ENTERS FLORIDA

A quarantine of more than 20 years' standing against the movement of Texas citrus fruit into Florida has been lifted.

Negotiations by the Texas Department of Agriculture succeeded in removing the barriers which had shut off an important market for state products.

Florida citrus has been sold in Texas during most of the nearly three decades that our own fruit was barred there.

Rio Grande Valley fruit growers and the entire citrus industry will benefit from the new agreement.

## REGULATIONS AFFECTING OKRA

The constant battle against the destructive cotton pink bollworm has resulted in the placement of okra under insect control regulations. Okra, like cotton, provides excellent breeding, feeding and hibernating quarters for the pink bollworm. Many commercial fields of okra pose a threat to area control measures long after cotton has been plowed under as a preventive against insect build-ups.

This year, the Texas Legislature placed okra under the same controls that affects cotton and the Texas Department of Agriculture will provide supervisory measures to protect the cotton and okra crops.



Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has conducted tests at Spur station and operating ranches since an effort to develop economical methods of growing mesquite, which covering 70 million acres of in the United States. content that cottonseed hulls, but a slightly lower fat and carbohydrate content. Carotene (Vitamin A) also is in the mesquite meal, but this essential element is not present or is very low in quantity in many dry roughages.

Mesquite, to be used, should be green stems and branches 1 to 3 inches in diameter, and should be allowed to cure for 5 to 7 days before grinding. Curing will make grinding easier and will lower the moisture content, eliminating molding after grinding. The wood apparently may be harvested at any time of the year, but it usually has the highest nutritive value in the spring before leaf development begins.

After the wood is cured, the limbs are fed into a mechanical clipper and the chips are ground in a heavy duty hammer mill with 3/16 inch screen.

Many kinds of insects and insect-like pests damage lawns, but this damage can be greatly reduced by proper use of available chemicals.

Grubs of several kinds of beetles feed on the roots of grass, leaving bare spots where plants have been killed by their feeding.

Others, such as sod webworms, armyworms and cutworms feed on the leaves or stems. Still others, such as chinch bugs, false chinch bugs, Rhodesgrass scale and leafhoppers suck juices from the grass. Ants and earthworms dig holes in lawns and throw up mounds of earth, and ants may invade the house from their nests in the grass.

All of these pests can be controlled with insecticides such as chlordane, DDT, aldrin, dieldrin and heptachlor. For quicker results chemicals should be washed into the soil by watering after application. Insecticides may be applied whenever desired. Follow the application

rates on the container and observe all precautions on the label, because insecticides are poisons.

Serious field infestations of grain sorghum with head smut in the Coastal Bend area and Medina county have been reported.

This disease destroys the entire grain sorghum head by transforming it into a mass of dark-brown spores. Seed treatment is effective only in fields where the fungus has not already been introduced into the soil. Seed treatment will control covered kernel smut and is a big aid in preventing the introduction of head smut into areas now free of the disease. Such fungicides as Arasan, Phygon, Spargon, Dow 9B or Delsan are recommended for the treating job.

Once fields are badly infested, sorghums should not be planted for as long a period as is possible or else resistant varieties should be used. Martin milo is not as susceptible as Combine 7078 and observations indicate that Hegari is resistant. RS 610 and the other Texas hybrids recently introduced are known to be susceptible to the disease.

Seed from infested fields should not be used as a source of planting seed, and farmers in free areas should treat all planting seed to prevent the introduction of head smut into their fields.

## Sheepmen Are Realizing Need For Promoting Lamb And Wool Products

and wool, two agricultural products that are not in vogue, are finding new markets, thanks to a program by sheepmen to promote and advertise their products.

A big change from green feedlots to advertising promotion, but sheepmen need for bolstering in their products if they need to increase production. Sheep numbers declined steadily since costs of operation, low and OPS restrictions the war years strapped shepherds with heavy burdens makes up only 3 percent of the total red meat while domestically grown provides only one-third of the consumed in the U. Funds paid into the program are actually deducted from an incentive payment sheep grower receives from the National Wool Growers Association of 1954. Money for the program is actually from duties on imported wool that foreign wool processors and retailers create interest in the wool. ## State Capitol NEWS

**AUSTIN, Tex.**—Ben Jack Cage has more invitations than a pretty girl with a rich papa.

Cage's "dates" are with some half-dozen groups who want to know what caused ICT Insurance Co. to go under with multimillion-dollar losses. Cage was ICT manager until a year before its collapse.

After a grand jury session and lie detector test in Dallas, Cage moved to Austin. At the head of the line of questioners here is the Travis County grand jury. Other questioners include:

1. House general investigating committee.
2. Senate general investigating committee.
3. Renne Allred, attorney for the state liquidator, handling what remains of ICT.
4. Federal agents—from the postal inspection service and Securities Exchange Commission.

**GOVERNOR SOUNDS OUT SOLONS**—Gov. Price Daniel has asked legislators for a "frank expression of their attitudes toward the proposed special session.

In an individual letter to each member, the governor outlined the session goals: (1) a lobby registration bill, (2) a bill requiring registration of those who represent others before state agencies, (3) a bill setting up a study on how to prevent spread of crime and (4) legislation to develop a state master water plan.

No new taxes will be needed to finance any of these projects, or the session itself, the governor's letter contended.

Best guesses are that, barring stringent opposition from the lawmakers themselves, the session will be called for Oct. 15.

**NAMED TO TAX COMMISSION**—Three business experts from over the state will join with lawmakers in making a thorough study of the state and local tax structure.

Named by Governor Daniel to the Texas Tax Study Commission are Dr. John R. Stockton, Austin, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research; John McKee of Dallas, executive in the Ford Motor Co.'s Dallas plant; Hugh Loewenstern Sr., Amarillo real estate dealer.

Three senators and three representatives also will serve on the Commission.

**NEW MAP AVAILABLE**—A new map, loaded with historical and geographic information about Texas, has just been published by the General Land Office.

Copies are available without charge. Schools are expected to find it particularly useful.

Markings include the lakes, mountains, rivers, dams, reservoirs, off-shore tidelands, state-owned lands, old cattle trails and stagecoach routes.

**RETAIL SALES UP**—Retail sales in Texas during July increased two per cent over June, nine per cent over July of last year.

Latest figures from the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research show Austin merchants out in front compared with other cities. Their increases: seven per cent over June, 12 per cent over a year ago.

Other leaders: San Antonio, up 10 per cent from '56; Dallas and Houston, each up nine per cent; El Paso, seven per cent; Fort Worth, two per cent.

**THERE'LL BE A WAIT**—Owners of land in the path of new state highways face a delay before getting their money for it.

Under new law state pays half the cost of right of way for state roads. But since the money is to come from higher automobile license fees, the state won't have it until next year after people buy new plates.

In the most recent group of road building projects authorized by the State Highway Commission, it was expressly stated that money for land buying

would not be available until after March, 1958.

**NO LENIENCY FOR DWIS**—Motorists who lose their drivers licenses for drunken driving needn't expect to get them back before the suspension period is over.

State Board of Pardons and Paroles said it is no longer even making recommendations for early return for licenses. Governor Daniel, who must approve the recommendations, has made it clear, said the board, that he doesn't favor leniency for DWI cases.

Law takes away licenses for six months on first conviction, a year on second conviction.

**MORE MONEY FOR SCHOOLS**—State aid to Texas public schools has been raised \$2 per pupil. It's now at a record-breaking \$80 per child.

State Board of Education upped the allocation after State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported a revenue estimated nearly \$4 million higher than his previous estimate.

Present outlook is that the state's bill for educating its 1,923,849 pupils will be a whopping \$336,116,108.

**SHORT SNORTS**—Most of Texas' farmers and ranchers will go into the winter with the best supply of hay and feed in years, reports the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Surge of back-to-school activities may push the number of Texas jobholders to the three million mark, says the Texas Employment Commission. July total was 2,998,000. School payrolls are expected to add 20,000 more and provide more business for retail and service industries.

Leon R. Graham, member of the Texas Education Agency staff, has been advanced to the post assistant commissioner of education for administration. He replaces Bascom B. Hayes who resigned to become superintendent of the Brazosport School District.

Choosing a site of the new archives building has been delayed, reports Rep. Vernon J. Stewart, chairman of the selection committee. Legislature authorized the building last session, but provided no money to serve property for a site.

Watson Wise of Tyler will serve as chairman for Texas' observance of United Nations Day, the governor's office announced.

## Time Is Here To Inspect And Adjust Heating Equipment

Now is the time for home-makers to have their gas heating equipment inspected and adjusted for winter use, it was pointed out today by L. J. Ward, Lone Star Gas Company manager. He urged people not to depend on the first cold day to remind them to call for such service.

"Heating service companies and Lone Star," he said, "receive hundreds of calls for service within a period of a few hours on the day cold weather makes its first appearance. This means a considerable delay in filing many individual service orders."

He suggested that users of gas floor furnaces, wall heaters, unit heaters, central heating plants and other gas heating equipment arrange now to have them inspected and adjusted by calling their heating equipment company or Lone Star Gas Company.

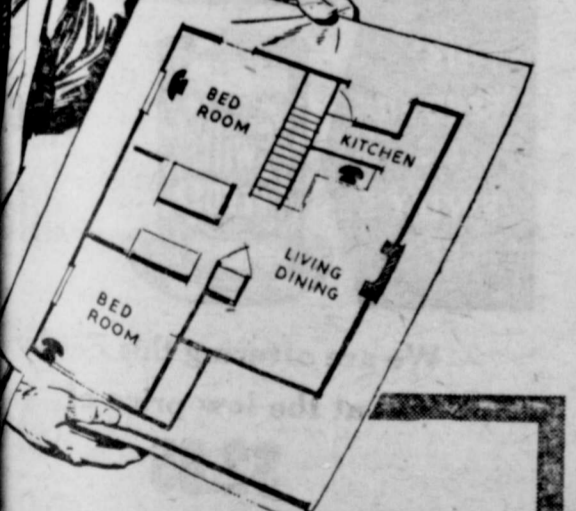

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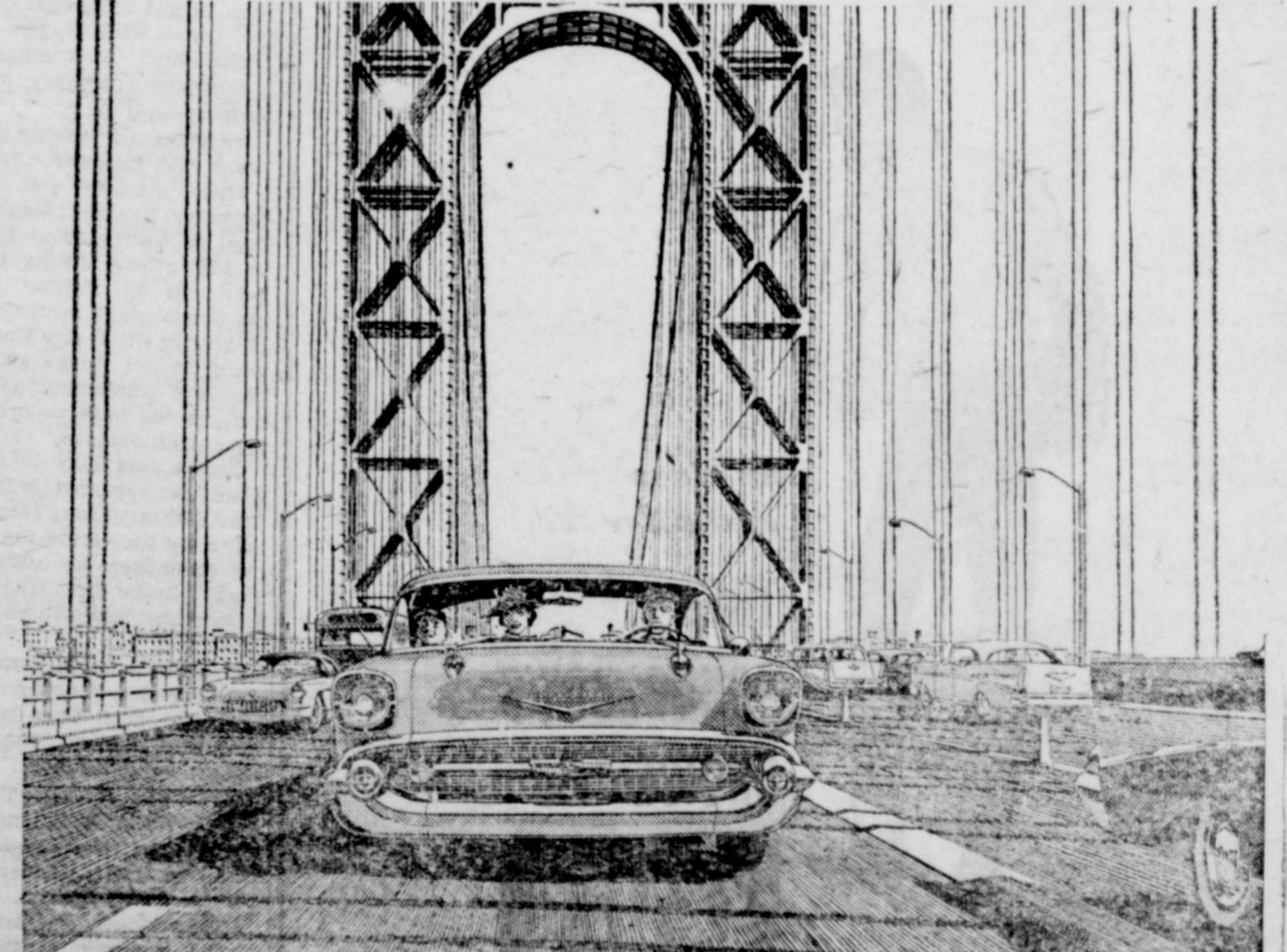

AUSTIN, Tex.—For the 72nd time in Texas, the Legislature will convene in special session Oct. 14.

Throughout the summer there was lively debate as to whether such a step should be taken. Gov. Price Daniel put an end to speculation by setting the date. Purpose: to enact laws in regard to lobby control, representation before state agencies, crime study and water development.

Calling special sessions has been more the custom of Texas governors than not. Of the 71 previously called since Texas became a state, 41 have fallen in the 46 year period since 1911—almost one a year.

Almost all Governor Daniel's predecessors in the past 30 years called lawmakers back at least once. (exceptions: Beauford Jester and W. Lee O'Daniel.) Gov. Dan Moody holds the record for keeping the Legislature busy. In 10 months of 1929 and 1930 he called five special sessions.

Runner-up Gov. Miriam Ferguson, who called four in 1933 and 1934, and Gov. Ross Sterling, who called four in 1931 and '32. Gov. James V. Allred called three in 1935-36 and two more in 1936 and '37.

In those days a legislator had to keep his bag packed.

What were the issues that kept the lawmakers so busy in those days? Mostly, the same ones they're working on today. In the day of Governor

Moody's five calls, regular sessions were only 60 days, so a lot of routine business overflowed. But he also called their attention to special problems. Many sound familiar—improvement of the Prison System "along modern and scientific lines," regulation of securities sales, investigation of charges against a state official. At one time Governor Moody vetoed all the appropriation bills and told the Legislature to try again—within the budget.

Governor Sterling asked legislators to enact a program to conserve natural resources, particularly oil and gas, and to help farmers, hard hit by sagging cotton prices. Sterling also had a states rights vs. federal courts problem in that the U. S. Supreme Court had negated Texas' oil proration laws.

Mrs. Ferguson had to call lawmakers back again and again to wrestle with the "hard times" of the thirties. Relief bonds to help the unemployed and destitute were passed. In one of her calls, Mrs. Ferguson, with an eye for housewifely problems, called on lawmakers "to make needed appropriation for refrigeration in the Governor's Mansion."

Governor Allred's special sessions dealt with some of the most stirring issues of the thirties. He asked for liquor selling regulations following the repeal of Prohibition and for a law banning pari-mutuel betting at race tracks. He also asked for money for old age pensions (\$15 a month in those days) and for more taxes to get the general revenue fund out of the red.

In most cases, the governors got the laws they wanted passed—sometimes by calling one session on the end of another, sometimes in a session as short as nine days.

**WATER PROGRAM OKAYED**  
—In one area—water development—legislators have their work cut out for them.

A 150-member statewide water committee approved a three-point program proposed by the governor. It calls for:

1. Appropriating \$1,024,000 to set up a planning division under the State Water Board.
2. Laws enabling the state to contract for water storage space in federal reservoirs.
3. An all-out push to rally support for passage of the \$200,000,000 water bond amendment to be voted on Nov. 5. Harry Provence, Waco editor, is chairman of the campaign committee. Lon C. Hill, Corpus Christi businessman, is co-chairman.

**WINDOW-JUMPING DEFERRED**—Several people in Austin have suggested forming an "I'm bored with BenJack" Club.

Their attitude stems from Promoter BenJack Cage's refusal to testify about his part in ICT affairs during his appearances in Austin. During his flamboyant return to Texas several weeks ago Cage promised to tell things about the bankrupt companies' affairs that "would have people jumping out of windows."

Cage stayed only 10 minutes when he appeared before the Travis County grand jury. When called by the House investigating committee, he invoked the Texas brand of the Fifth Amendment and refused to testify.

If sensational information is to be revealed, it apparently will not come until Cage comes to trial in Dallas on charges of embezzling ICT funds.

**OFFICER HITS TRAFFIC LAWS**—Texas is behind other states in traffic regulations and ahead on traffic accidents, says a Texas safety official.

C. G. Conner, assistant chief of the Highway Patrol, said Texas has one of the highest traffic death tolls in the nation. It's as much as three times as safe to drive in some other states where more up-to-date laws are being enforced, he said. Texas had 250,000 accidents last year, Conner reported. He suggested more driver education courses for teen-agers, more traffic courts, more arresting of drunk drivers.

**OFFICER LICENSING PROPOSED**—Serving as a peace officer should be a profession, like law, medicine and teaching, says Atty. Gen. Will Wilson.

Wilson suggested a state licensing program whereby would be peace officers would have to meet certain requirements. It would be slow getting es-

**COTTON CROP UP**—Good farming plus early spring rains are paying off for Texas cotton growers. U. S. Dept. of Agriculture predicts the state's 1957 crop will be well above average—4,050,000 bales. Average for 1946-55 is 3,742,000.

If the crop comes out as expected, it will mean yield-per acre has almost doubled in the past few years. Texans put only about half as much acreage in cotton this year as in previous years when crops of similar volume were harvested.

**SHORT SNOTS**—State Health Department reports 71.8 per cent of all Texans under 20 have received one or more polio shots. About 20 per cent have had three inoculations. Durwood Manford, Smiley chicken farmer and one time speaker of the Texas House, will take office as member of the Industrial Accident Board within the next month.
