## Santa To Visit Goldthwaite Saturday

### Invitation Basketball Tournament To Be Held Here Next Weekend

The 4th annual Invitational Basketball Tournament will be held here next weekend, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, (December 12, 13, and 14) at the high school auditorium, according to an announcement by Goldthwaite High School coaches.

Every team eligible to compete in this tournament is invited to attend. There will be an all tournament team selected from both the boys and girls teams. There will be six trophies, plus the awards presented to the all tournament teams.

#### GIRLS' SCHEDULE

The girls begin their tournament play at 3:00 p.m., Thursday afternoon when Early meets San Saba; at 5:45; Goldthwaite meets Llano. Then at 8:05 p.m., Priddy meets Evant. Friday at 3:00 p.m., Mason meets Burnet; at 5:45 Friday the losers of the Early-San Saba and Goldthwaite-Llano games will play. The winners of the two games will meet at 8:05 a.m., Friday. Saturday morning the losers of the Priddy-Evant and Mason-Burnet games will play at 9:00 a.m., and the winners of these games will take the floor at 11:20 Saturday.

Final play-offs for the girls will start at 5:30 p.m., Saturday when the winners of the first elimination take the floor and the losers of the various teams play at 7:50 that same evening.

#### BOYS' SCHEDULE

Following is the schedule for the three days starting Thursday: Early VS San Saba at 4:10 p.m.; Goldthwaite VS Llano at 6:55 p.m.; Priddy VS Evant at 9:15. Friday afternoon at 4:10 the Mason boys meet the Burnet boys.

Beginning at 6:55 p.m., Friday the losers of the first two games will meet for the play-off games and the winners of these two games will play at 9:15.

Starting at 10:00 Saturday morning the losers of the Early-San Saba and Goldthwaite-Llano games will play and the winners of these two games will play at 12:30 p.m., Saturday.

Final games for the boys will begin at 6:40 p.m., Saturday when the winners of the various teams take the floor and the losers play at 9:00 p.m.

The all tournament teams will be selected from members of the various teams competing in this invitational tournament. There will be ten boys' and 12 girls' individual awards presented.

There will be separate charges for each session with a full charge for admission for any part of the session. Afternoon sessions begin at 3:00 o'clock and close about 5:00. ### Farmers Alerted To Soil Bank Requirements

Farmers with land in the Conservation Reserve, as well as those who are planning to place land in the 1958 program, should take note of the old and new regulations in order to avoid violation of their contracts and possible loss of payment. Mr. E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, declared today.

Mr. Burkett pointed out several basic regulations that a farmer must abide by in order to be eligible for payment under his Conservation Reserve contract. Among them are: No harvesting of acreage in excess of "permitted acreage," which is the Soil Bank base less the land-put in the Reserve programs; no harvesting or grazing of the land placed in the Conservation Reserve except under emergency conditions; no unauthorized use of water stored on the Conservation Reserve; failure to prevent spread of noxious weeds; failure to establish vegetative cover or other practices agreed to be carried out.

Mr. Burkett said that breaking out noncropland is also a violation of the Conservation Reserve Contract. If, at any time during the contract period, land on the farm which was not classified as cropland at the time the contract was entered into is broken out without approval by the County Committee as a good farming practice the opening up is considered a violation that could result in loss of payment. Where such a practice is approved by the County Committee, the identical acreage or an equal acreage of cropland on the farm (excluding the "reserved" acreage) must be restored to permanent vegetative cover.

Farmers are advised by Chairman Burdett to call at the County ASC Office for full information on these regulations, including the few exceptions to them.

## SYMBOLISM OF CHRISTMAS

From the dim ages of long ago have come many of the festive rites and customs of our Christmas season.

The symbolic use of a tree dates back at least 4,000 years, when Egyptians celebrated in honor of their Sun God, in the month corresponding to our December. They believed that the sun died every night and was born again in the morning, and that late December and January brought the turning point, when the sun remained with them a little bit longer each day. This was a season of rejoicing, and the palm trees became their symbol, as it put out a leaf every month and the twelve leaves symbolized the complete year.

A few thousand years later came the feast of Saturnalia, also held in December, but the tree the Romans used was a tall conifer, loaded with decorations. Roman legions carried this symbolism over the Alps into Gaul; and about 15 B. C. the tree was used in Yuletide celebrations of the Germans.

Hundreds of years passed, and a tree became the symbol of celebrations connected with the patron saint of Russia and of children—Saint Nicholas, who in his lifetime was Bishop of Myra, in Asia Minor.

An old legend tells us that the kindly St. Nicholas unintentionally originated the custom of hanging stockings by the fire at Christmas. St. Nicholas was rich, and loved to make mysterious journeys bearing secret gifts to the poor. For a long time his identity remained hidden but he was caught at last with his sack of gifts on his back.

St. Nicholas knew an old nobleman who was very poor and who did not want anyone to know of his poverty. Wishing to give him a gift of money St. Nicholas crept to a window of the house and saw the old gentleman asleep by the fire. The good Bishop climbed to the roof and dropped his gift down the chimney, thinking it would fall on the hearth at the nobleman's feet. However, it so happened that the gentleman's daughter had hung some stockings to dry by the fire and the money fell into one of them; and from the kindly deed of the good Bishop has grown the widespread custom of hanging stockings at Christmas time.

The anniversary of St. Nicholas' death in 1087 became a festival in the Russian church, and in time the name became corrupted to Santa Claus and associated with the festivities of the Christmas season, with its tree, its decorations, the holly and the mistletoe. These are the joyous symbols of Christmas.

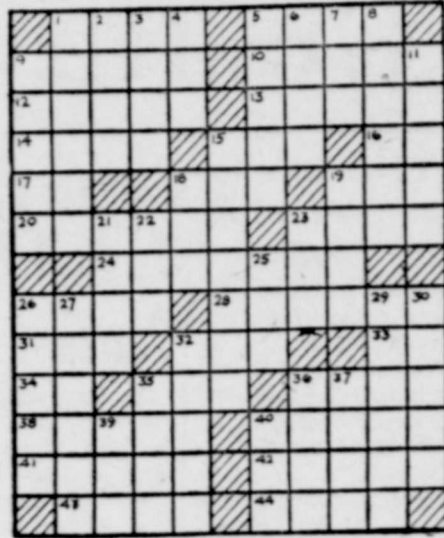

MARCH OF EVENTS

President Hopes to Visit France and West Germany

Great Britain Next Year Also on Projected Trip

WASHINGTON—It will be kept in the "top secret" category until both countries believe the time for an announcement is propitious, but barring unforeseen developments, President Eisenhower will return Queen Elizabeth's visit next year.

Persons close to the White House report that Ike, with the First Lady's enthusiastic approval, accepted the informal, warm, and personal invitation extended by Her Majesty during her stay in Washington.

The chief reason for keeping the President's projected trip to Britain quiet at this time is this: Mr. Eisenhower wants to visit other European countries as well as the United Kingdom, and arrangements must be made in accordance with the cumbersome processes of protocol that will take time.

Diplomats say that Ike and Mamie desire to go not only to the British isles but to France and West Germany, which are intimately associated with the President's wartime career as supreme commander of Allied forces in Europe.

If Mr. Eisenhower should visit France next year it would be his second visit there within a few months as he is scheduled to attend a North Atlantic Treaty Organization meeting in Paris on Dec. 15.

At the Paris NATO conference the President is to present an American-British proposal that the Free World combine its scientific and military resources, counteracting the new Russian missile menace.

MILITANT POOLING—American scientists look forward to the probable pooling of United States and British nuclear and missile knowledge as a stimulant to both their own thinking and more progressive government policies.

Scientific circles feel that they need "fresh talent" in the business of figuring out new missile shapes, fuels and armaments—fresh talent that does not know all the obstacles to solving a problem.

They figure that British scientists, who do not know all about United States research, and who, in some cases, have been working along different lines, can probably come up with some new answers.

They hope that the precedent of sharing United States secrets with Britain to achieve a goal will foster some government policy of sharing more needless secrets with the American scientific community.

There is also some feeling that such a pooling might prompt more government money for "pure research" that does not necessarily have any practical objective but could lead to important discoveries.

SCIENCE AND SEX—Some experts think they have the answer to the United States need for more trained scientific and technical manpower to fight the current "battle of the laboratories" with the Soviet Union. The answer: womanpower.

Although many female students from grammar school right through college consistently do better than males in the sciences, very few of these bright young ladies are able to go for higher degrees.

Some prefer the kitchen sink to the test tube and those staying in science are made to feel out of character when they assume "masculine" jobs. To solve this problem, some United States officials are considering an "educational program" designed to ease more women into science jobs.

## TODAY'S Menu

### Meals That Are Easy For The Working Wife

By ALICE DENHOFF

NO time for taking it too easy these days, as the fall pace accelerates and the holiday season looms ahead!

Doubly difficult it is for the working wife who must prepare a meal upon her return from work.

**Specially for Her**  
Especially for the career wife is the following recipe for glazed pork and apples.

The smoked pork butt may be cooked in water one evening, then refrigerated overnight until ready for heating through with the tangy glaze.

Here is the recipe for 5 servings. Place a 2-lb. smoked pork shoulder butt in deep kettle; cover with water. Add a halved garlic clove, 6 whole cloves and one bay leaf. Cover pan and simmer over low heat 1 1/2 hrs. or until meat is tender.

**Place in Pan**  
Remove meat and place in shallow baking pan.  
Core 3 apples and cut in cross-wise halves. Place apple halves around meat.

Blend 1/2 c. cherry or cranberry jelly and 1/4 c. horseradish and spread over meat and apples.  
Bake 25 min. at 325° (longer for meat refrigerated overnight before glazing).

**Hearty Casserole**  
Folks who like sweet potatoes with rich cream gravy should enjoy a meat-and-vegetable casserole consisting of dried beef and sweet potatoes baked with a slightly seasoned cream sauce.

For 6 servings, cook 1/4 c. minced onion in 2 tsp. butter over low heat for 5 min. Blend in 2 tsp. flour and add 2 1/2 c. milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened.

Cut 6 cooked, medium-sized sweet potatoes into 1/2-in. slices and place in alternate layers with dried beef in greased 3-qt. casserole, using 1/2 lb. dried beef in all. Pour sauce over potatoes and meat.

Toss 1 c. fine dry bread crumbs with 1 tsp. butter and sprinkle over casserole.  
Bake at 350° for 30 min.

**NEEDY DISABLED MAY NOW RECEIVE STATE AID**

Until recently Texas made no provision for taking care of needy physically disabled persons, other than the needy blind. But now, under a bill passed by the Regular Session of the Fifty-fifth Legislature (H. B. 78) other disabled persons may obtain public welfare assistance.

To become eligible for assistance, the needy person must first establish by competent and qualified medical examination that he meets certain standards of disability. Generally speaking, he must be disabled through some physical or mental impairment, disease or loss, or a combination of both physical and mental impairment.

His condition must be not likely to change, or be progressive and not responsive to treatment, or require treatment that is continuous, extremely hazardous or of questionable benefit. The condition must make him an invalid or necessitate considerable help from others in getting about.

Persons who meet the above requirements are considered to be permanently and totally disabled. The same holds true if a person's physical and mental impairment is such that he requires close and constant supervision or personal care by others, or if he is not a likely subject for vocational rehabilitation.

Needy persons who can thus prove themselves permanently and totally disabled are eligible to receive Public Welfare assistance under the following circumstances:

1. If 18 years of age or older but less than 65 years of age.
2. If a citizen of the United States with residence in Texas for five (5) years or more within the last nine (9) years preceding the date of his application for assistance, and has resided in the State of Texas continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding the application.
3. If such applicant is not at the time of receiving assistance an inmate in a public institution (except as a patient in a medical institution) or is not a patient in an institution for tuberculosis or mental disease, or has not been diagnosed as having tuberculosis or psychosis and is a patient in a medical institution as a result thereof.
4. If he is not receiving Old Age assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children.
5. If he has not disposed of property, either personal or real, for the purpose of qual-

ifying or increasing need for assistance.

The State Department of Public Welfare determines whether or not a person is in need by the application of reasonable rules and regulations. The purpose of the act is to provide reasonable financial aid compatible with health and decency to those without resources of their own for such purpose. The amount so determined cannot exceed the amount of Federal aid for that purpose.

forces, so if you plan to work, and if you do not have an account number, you should apply for one now." Chastain advises, "if you have had a card which has been lost, you should apply for a duplicate."

For this area the numbers are assigned by the Social Security Administration, Suite 415 First National Bank Building, Temple, Texas. Application blanks may be obtained from that office or from your local post office. The completed forms may be filed with the social security

office by mail or in person.

Thursday afternoon was mild and sunny and John and I worked out in the yard. The day before we got that load of fertilizer we had been wanting so long. It was powdered and dry and light and piled in a large, neat, pointed mound. It was just what Johnny wanted to work with. At first I thought I would try to keep him off the mound and not let him scatter it, but I finally decided it would be denying him too much to keep him off it.

On Thursday afternoon Bill plays golf. He comes home for an early supper. Then goes back to the store to keep open till 8:30. We got through with the supper dishes by 7 o'clock. I thought, "Now I'll get a lot of writing and studying done tonight." But usually before I can get down to real hard work, I have to do something relaxing. Like reading the paper, or reading for pleasure in my Bible. The Christmas number of the Ladies' Home Journal had come that afternoon. I haven't had time to read the Journal since we got back to El Paso last fall. But there it was looking so Christmasy and inviting. I picked it up and began to look through. When I came to the Christmas story about Holly and Ivy, I began to read. I couldn't quit till I had finished. It was juicy and good and it made me quite happy. Billy and Johnny came into the kitchen, and I told the story to them.

It made them happy too.

John said he believed it was sleeting. I thought he must be mistaken. The day had been fair and mild and there was no forecast of unusual weather. 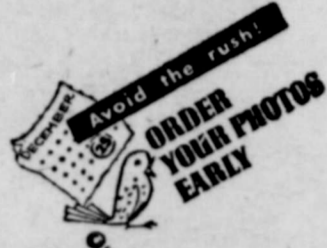

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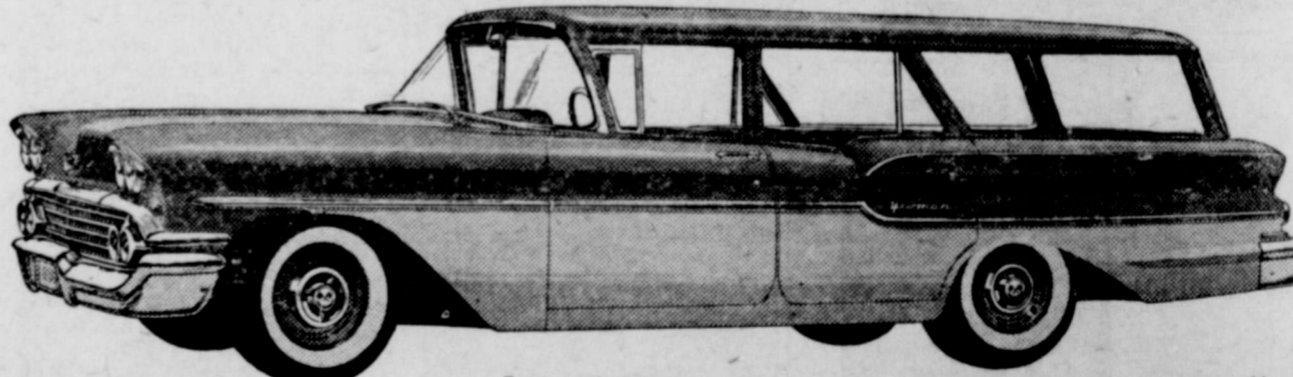

Paint is helpful to the life of a boat, as well as to its appearance.

You may want to dry-dock your boat for the winter, but this isn't necessary in Texas. There'll be plenty of week-ends during the winter months when you can get in some good fishing or boating.

While you're at it, check your trailer.

See that the bearings have plenty of grease and that the tires are in good condition.

**CRAPPIE ARE PLENTIFUL**

Most of the fish being caught now are crappie and sand bass. Every lake and stream in Texas is producing plenty of crappie. Most of them are on the small size, but they are big enough to make a good meal.

**BOAT CARE**

Have you checked your boat lately? Most of us have been too busy with our hunting in recent weeks, that we've neglected our boats.

A visit to any boat dock area will reveal many boats with six inches of water in the bottoms. The recent rains have almost filled others.

If boats are to last a long time and give good service, they need care. Mark it on your calendar to dedicate the next pretty week-end, or at least a portion of it, to checking your boat. Perhaps it might need

One of the favorite lures is the Dixie Jet, which, by-the-way, is made at Houston. It is a spoon of exactly the right weight to get these sandies.

There is one good trick to remember, if you've never fished this way before. A light rig is very important. Say a 6½ foot light action rod with a 6 to 9 pound test line. Let your lure go to the bottom, take two or three turns on the reel, quiver the rod very slightly by moving the tip slowly up and down.

The sandies hit almost invariably on the down motion. For that reason they usually are on the hook when you start the upward movement. If you aren't careful you can yank the hook out of its mouth before it has been set.

A couple of good fishermen with a little practice and a few of these Dixie Jets can fill the bottom of the boat in a few minutes of hot fishing. Try it.

**ARE YOU READY?**

If you haven't made arrangements yet for a place to hunt quail, you'd better hurry. Every indication points to the very best season in years. There was a tremendous hatch and survival this year, of the native birds. In addition thousands of birds from hatcheries were released throughout the state.

There'll be a new quail for Texas shooters this season. It is the Coturnix. It's an Asiatic bird recently brought to this country. Several thousand were released in Texas during the late summer. They were hatched at the Game & Fish

## \$100 MILLION COTTON LOSS

The long awaited rains came to Texas this year—and came again, and again, and again.

Now that blessing has become a kind of curse in many cotton areas of Texas. Ill-timed fall rains on the unharvested cotton have caused a crop quality loss conservatively estimated over \$100 million.

Cotton farmers in the rain-soaked areas are suffering economically now almost as much as they did during the drought—particularly in central and East Texas. Many of them made their first cotton crop in several years, only to see it slowly ruin in the rain.

In early November, an estimated 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 million bales remained unpicked in Texas fields. The pickers could not get in the muddy rows to gather the cotton.

These unpicked bales represented a current value of somewhere between \$150 to \$250 million, depending on its grade. But the fiber quality and value dropped more each day as the rains continued.

In some areas, the farmers had to begin thinking in terms of Commission farm at Tyler.

of 'salvaging' his cotton, rather than harvesting it. This is a real blow to the growers who had early prospects of the best cotton crop in many years.

On the brighter side, prospects for winter grains were considerably increased by the fall moisture. But this is poor consolation to a vast number of farmers whose main cash crop is still cotton.

Most of the cotton still unpicked will eventually be harvested, even though the grade is poor. In this respect, Texas joins Mississippi this year where rains also damaged one of the best crops of a decade.

that his reputation as a comedian had caused the audience to expect, for he kept the audience roaring with his jokes and antics.

Awards of appreciation were presented to: Mrs. Pauline Dalton Dunn, missionary to the Philippines, received an award for having traveled the greatest distance. R. G. Hollingsworth of Coleman, Texas, superintendent of the Goldthwaite Schools in 1902-03, received an award for having taught here the most years ago. He responded with stories of his years of superintendency in Goldthwaite and with reading Oliver Wendell Holmes' "The Boys." He later sent in a note of appreciation which read in part, "since that day in 1902, more than fifty-five years ago, when I was entrusted with the responsibility of heading the public school system of your fair city for the year, I have had an affectionate feeling for the people of Goldthwaite and Mills County, but not until last night, November 30, 1957, have I been bereft of my speech in contemplation of that affection. I had accepted an invitation to the convention of the Ex-Students and Ex-Teachers of the Goldthwaite Public Schools which convened last evening. I knew that there was some insistence that I should be present, but I thought nothing of it. I merely anticipated a pleasant evening, meeting old friends, contemplating old scenes and affections. But to be singled out as one "who has rendered a renewing lifetime of service to mankind during which he has taken the fresh clay of youth and moulded a large part of his integrity, understanding and kindness into their lives," I have realized the impact of that year's work upon my life and possibly upon the lives of those with whom I was associated. It took my speech away and I here apologize, most humbly, for my inability to express at the moment, my deep appreciation for your sentiments."

Eugene Thompson of Dallas was presented an award for having attended school in Goldthwaite the longest ago—1886. Mr. Thompson is a charming fellow and adds a touch of spice to any program he attends.
