The 1958 show catalogues have been printed and delivered to show officials to be distributed to interested parties in this county and throughout the state.

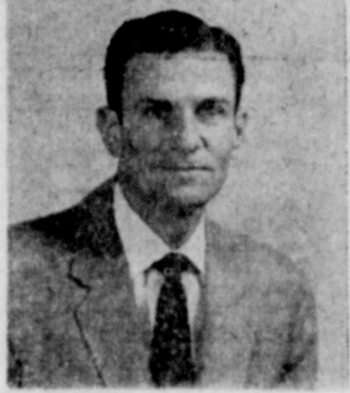

## Mail Early Theme Is Changed To "Mail Now" Says Local Postmaster

"The time has passed to talk about mailing early for Christmas," Postmaster Lucille Fairman said yesterday, but she added that "our local patrons still can help us avoid a last-minute pile-up of Christmas mail by sending the rest of their packages and cards now."

The Postmaster said the mail volume this year, no doubt, will break last year's all-time Christmas record. She expects to keep local mail moving without serious difficulty, but explained that many large transportation terminals and large post office terminals will be swamped with mail that will exceed their physical capacity in the last days before Christmas.

To avoid any such congestion, she urged that all out-of-town mail be placed in the post office this week-end so that it will be assured of delivery next week—the last week before Christmas. She recommended three-cent stamps for Christmas cards and air mail postage to those going to distant places.

In order to meet local service needs, Postmaster Fairman said the stamp and parcel post windows would stay open as late as practicable. "However," she added, "I hope that continued cooperation of local people will make it unnecessary for our employees to observe these

## State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, Tex.—Both special sessions of the Legislature passed all the bills for which Gov. Price Daniel called them. Mostly, by wide margins.

Even so, final days found everyone at sixes and sevens. House members and Senators wrangled among themselves. Each house sniped at the other. And numerous lawmakers found ways to show they were put out with the governor.

Both houses gave lip-sided approval to the two bills requested by the governor to bolster local control of schools. One allows closing of schools threatened with federal occupation. The other empowers the attorney general to assist local districts in fighting anti-segregation suits.

Then, another bill was proposed to allow county judges to require registration of organizations attempting to interfere with public school operations. Sponsors said it was aimed at the NAACP.

Though there seemed to be no large block of opposition to the measure itself, haggling technicalities stretched out the time table.

Some legislators accused others of deliberately prolonging the session to embarrass the governor. Each day (including weekends) made a \$11,600 bite into the governor's emergency fund. House members said Senators were sticking around to have the last word in their feud with the Insurance Department.

Whatever the cause, it seemed evident that the Texas Legislature can't be turned on and off like a faucet.

**HINDSIGHT**—Renewal of the contest over tidelands ownership brought criticism of Governor Daniel's role in the federal tidelands law.

Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of

San Angelo said he felt Daniel should have seen to it the 1953 law recognized specifically Texas' claim to lands 10 1/2 miles out.

Daniel, then a U.S. Senator, sponsored the federal law. At present a federal suit challenges Texas' claim to land beyond three miles.

Daniel retorted that if Hardeman would read the bill he would find it gives each state title to boundaries "as they existed at the time such state entered the union." Texas Congress fixed the coastal boundary.

**BE CAREFUL IN PLACING,  
DECORATING, CHRISTMAS TREES**

It is the night before Christmas. . .  
But not everyone sleeps.  
In fire stations there's an air of uneasy tension.

Fires at Christmas time are particularly tragic at this the happiest holiday of the year. On this most sentimental day thousands of homes and apartments are carelessly and unwittingly converted into dangerous fire traps—regardless of warnings by fire department officials and safety authorities.

Two years ago fires on Christmas eve killed 23 persons, most of them children, and in the four-day week-end last year took the lives of 54.

This year, for instance, the nation's fire losses may well be over a billion dollars, the death toll close to 10,800, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Over 300,000 fires, the National Board declares, were in the home.

Among fires victims at Christmas time a year ago were a mother and four children in Meriden, Conn.; three brothers in Allagash Plantation, Me.; three sleeping children in Great Falls, Mont.; two small children in Phenix City, Ala.; a sleeping mother and five children in Ironwood, Mich.

You can save your life and your can prevent fires by observing the following suggestions offered at this time by the National Board:

- The Christmas tree is a potential fire hazard and caution should be taken in its selection, placement in the home, and maintenance.
- Play safe by choosing a small one. There will be 30 million on the market.
- Keep the tree outdoors until ready to set it up. While it's outdoors, occasionally throw water over it. This will keep it moist, fresh.
- When you bring the tree inside, cut the butt slantwise to open the pores, then stand it in a tub of water or moist earth.
- Be cautious of chemicals or other substances sold for "fireproofing" trees. In some cases this process is ineffective.
- In placing the tree, it's best to avoid "hot spots" such as those near the fireplace, stove, television set, radiator, or electric bulbs.
- Never use untreated paper ornaments or untreated cotton batting or gauze for decoration. Cotton and gauze can be made flame-resistive by dipping in a gallon of water mixed with nine ounces of borax and four ounces of boric acid.
- Use only electric lights, never candles. Be sure, too, that wires are in good condition and bear the UL mark denoting Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., which shows they have been tested for safety. Frayed electric cords are a fire hazard.
- The switch for burning on the tree lights should be placed some distance from the tree. Never use an outlet or plug under the tree or run electric trains around the base.
- If decorations are used about the house, do not permit them around or near chairs and other places where people may smoke. It is preferable to have them near the ceiling, well above the head of anyone standing up.
- Keep plenty of ash trays handy during the holiday season, as always.
- If lights are desired in windows, never use candles. Keep curtains and other flammable material pulled back at least six inches from any electric light.
- Use non-flammable decorations of glass or metal, and "fireproof" snow in decorating your tree for Christmas.
- After you have opened your Christmas presents, remove all the gift wrapping and packing materials from your living room and dispose of them.

**Canada's Niagara Power Project Nearly Complete** | **Work on U. S.'s Has Not Yet Begun**

WASHINGTON—Electric power at Niagara Falls and two world-circling Sputniks have one important feature in common: both were developed by foreign nations while Americans argued among themselves, played politics and allowed rivalries to hamstring action instead of developing our own power and our own successful space satellite.

During more than seven years since the States and Canada ratified the Niagara Treaty in 1950, some 63 billion kilowatts of electric energy have gone to waste on the American side of the Niagara river.

Canada went to work immediately under the treaty. Thirteen units of its 16-unit development are now in full operation, and 1955 all 16 units of its new Sir Adam Niagara generating station No. 2 are expected to be in service.

One of the most disillusioned power-brokers in American history has extended those same years on our side of the Niagara utility lobbies, big politics, big money, big personality clashes, big court battles, big arguments and big tactics have all been participants.

Consequently, nobody on the United States side has started to build Niagara power facilities under the 1950 treaty. Legally, legislative and legal hurdles are believed cleared. New York Power authority is ready to begin construction as the Federal Power commission grants it a license.

**CANADIANS ARE NOT DISTURBED** over our dilatory for under the diversion treaty Canada is authorized to use its share of the Niagara waters, but also the full United States share of those waters until the power facilities we have started are completed and ready to operate.

The Niagara river drains Lake Erie into Lake Ontario. It is 326 feet during its 35-mile course. Niagara Falls is 160 feet over the American and Canadian Horseshoe Falls. Remedial works to preserve the beauty of Niagara Falls equalize the flow of water over both falls have been completed. These required four years, and the \$17,500,000 cost was equally by Canada and the United States. This remedial work was the only part of the 1950 treaty thus far carried out by the States.

Canada's Horseshoe Falls has receded 865 feet in less than 100 years. The remedial work and diversion of water for power poses are expected to minimize further erosion.

**A MODEL OF THE NIAGARA RIVER** enabled the Federal Electric Power commission of Ontario to save more than \$5 million in construction costs, and this model helped solve numerous engineering problems.

Canada's \$343,742,000 river-harnessing project has progressed steadily. First units of its new power plant were opened in 1950. Twelve units were in service by 1955. All 16 will be operating by next summer.

Two separate intakes divert water from the river two miles above the falls. These are far enough below the surface that floating ice will not enter. Two parallel, concrete-lined tunnels with 45-foot diameters carry diverted water five and a half miles under Niagara Falls, Ont., and an open canal carries it to a forebay at the gorge above the powerhouse. Sixteen penstocks 19 feet diameter carry the water down the Niagara cliff to the powerhouses.

Meanwhile, as Canada's 1,370,000-kilowatt plant nears completion, Americans are hoping the time has come to start our badly-needed power development at Niagara.

**COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT**  
TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

The steer entries for Mills County 4-H club members were entered at the Major Livestock Shows of Texas, this week. There is a total of seven steers entered at the Sand Hills Hereford Show at Odessa; sixteen steer entries at San Antonio; eight entries at Fort Worth and twenty-five steer entries at the Houston Fat Stock Show.

These shows will start around the first of the year and end about the 5th of March.

All entries of livestock, for the Mills County Livestock Show, should be made by the 20th of December.

Farm and ranch families needing information on income and social security taxes are reminded by Extension Management Specialist C. H. Bates that the 1958 Farmers' Tax Guide is now available. Copies may be obtained from this office.

Bates says the 64-page reference publication is not materially changed from last year's popular edition. The booklet is provided by the Internal Revenue Service and is written in easy to understand language with the many income and social security tax items covered in detail. Also, a number of sample tax forms are shown for guidance of those seeking first hand information or "know-how."

Farm records are emphasized as a need for accurate tax reporting, points out Bates.

Farmers and ranchmen who keep a close watch on their business operations often find that they can do much better tax management job when records are kept, says the specialist. The new tax guide will also assist by pointing out helpful tax rights and options.

Plant breeders of the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station have for many years been developing and releasing improved varieties of small grains for use in Texas. These varieties have enabled Texas producers to increase both their grain and forage production from small grain crops.

The value of these new varieties to the agricultural economy of Texas is shown by a recent survey made by Extension Agronomist R. J. Hodges and Dr. I. M. Atkins, agronomist in charge of small grains for the Experiment Station. County agents reported to the agronomist that 70.5 percent of the Texas wheat acreage last year was planted to such improved varieties as Comanche, Wichita, Westar, Concho and Quanah. Only 3.3 percent of the acreage was seeded to the blackland group which is less desirable from a quality standpoint, but was once very popular in the state.

Hodges points out that a new variety is only of value when used by farmers. As an example of the value of a new variety, he says 559,000 acres last year were planted to Westar. For several years this variety, at Amarillo and Chillocothe, outyielded the once popular Turkey variety by at least two bushels an acre. This variety alone was responsible for increasing the total wheat yield in Texas last year by more than a million bushels.

Three Experiment Station oat variety releases, New Nor-tex in 1936, Mustang in 1950 and Alamo in 1954, accounted for more than half of last year's oat acreage of almost 3 million acres. These varieties were developed especially for Texas conditions and have resulted in both increased grain and forage yields.

Cordova barley, released a few years ago, occupied 49 percent of the 370,234 acres seeded to barley in Texas last year. It has outyielded Tennessee Winter by an average of 8.1 bushels an acre. Hodges says the plant breeders are working continuously to develop even better varieties in order to meet the needs of an ever-changing agriculture.

## TODAY'S Menu

### Apple-Season Recipes

By ALICE DENHOFF

COMES the fall of the year and apples really come into their own!

Call the roll for such beauties as Grimes Golden, for bright, deep red-cheeked Jonathan, for the unripe, green Wealthy for pies and sauce. Comes winter, and with it three favorites. Delicious, the McIntosh and the Winesap, the latter a good all-purpose apple that keeps well.

So now, into the kitchen to bake a batch of Apple and Blueberry Tarts!

Combine 1 1/2 c. water, 3/4 c. sugar and 1 1/2 tsp. fresh lemon juice in a saucepan. Boil 3 min. Add 2 1/2 c. sliced fresh apples. Cook, covered, until tender, about 5 min.

Remove mixture and divide equally into 4 baked tart shells. Sprinkle 1/2 c. blueberries over the tops.

#### Tart Shells

To make tart shells, sift together 1 1/2 c. sifted all-purpose flour and 3/4 tsp. salt. Cut in 1/2 c. shortening. Add 4 tbsp. cold water. Toss lightly, then shape dough into ball.

Roll pastry out on a 12-in. square of foil. Cut into 4 6-in. squares. Shape into tart shells, leaving foil attached to bottom and sides of tarts. Prick pastry on bottom and sides with a fork. Bake 5 min. at 425°.

Remove from oven and prick pastry again, then bake 7 to 10 min. more, or until brown.

If desired, bake pastry shells over the backs of custard cups or cupcake pans.

Baked Apple Rings make a deliciously unusual dessert.

To serve 6, core 3 unpeeled baking apples. Cut in crosswise halves. Place in a baking pan.

Make a sugar syrup, using 1/4 c. sugar and 1/2 c. water. Boil 2 min. Pour over apples.

Bake, covered, in medium oven 10 min. Baste and bake 15 min. more or until tender.

Fill centers of apple rings with whole currant, apple or mint jelly.

#### Quick Apple Betty

For a good Apple Betty that is quick to do, pare and slice 5 c. tart cooking apples about 1/4 in. thick. Cook with 1/2 c. water, 1/2 c. brown sugar and 1/4 tsp. salt in covered saucepan until just tender, but not until they lose their shape.

Place half the apples in a buttered 1-qt. casserole. Sprinkle with 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg and 1/2 tsp. lemon juice.

Melt 1/4 c. butter and mix with 1 1/2 c. soft bread crumbs, 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind and 1/4 c. sugar. Sprinkle half the crumb mixture over apples in casserole. Top with remaining apples and crumbs.

Bake at 425° 30 min. or until crumbs are brown. Serve plain or with whipped cream or hard sauce.

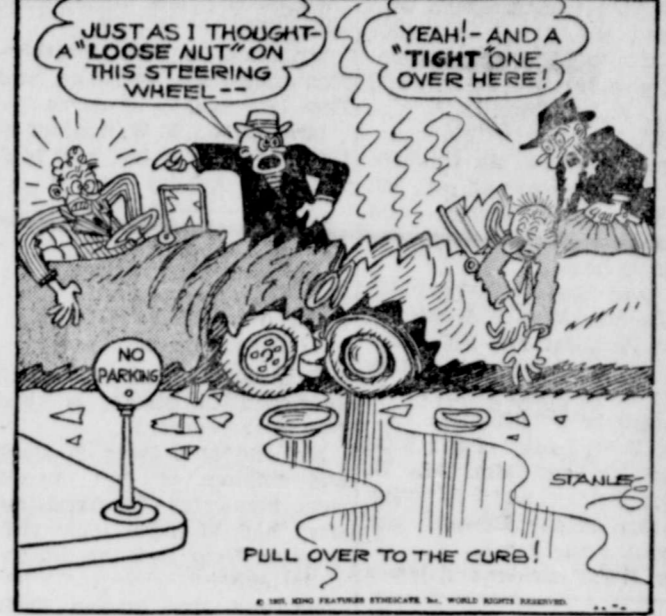

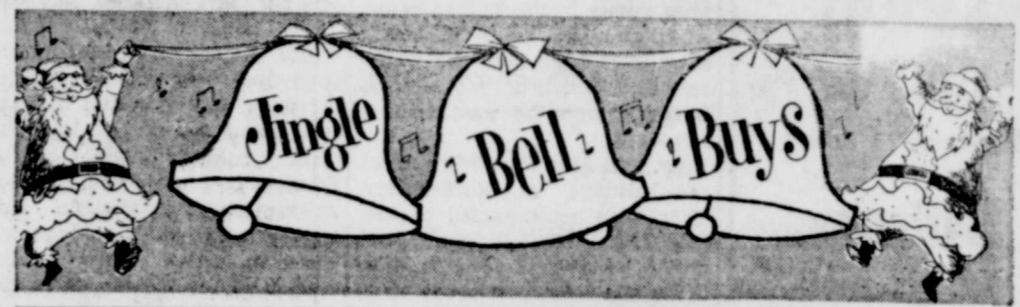

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### State Capitol News

dary at 10 1/2 miles into the Gulf, said the governor.

Hardeman replied Daniel should have attached a map to the bill.

**NOT HAPPY**—Dissatisfaction of a number of Senators with the Insurance Department seems unlikely to simmer down.

Senate investigating committee indicated it is still not through with its inquiry into the Department's delay in action on an unfavorable report on Preferred Life. It recessed after hearing two assistant state auditors confirm the examiner's finding of irregularities in the company.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood stressed the committee's findings in a speech explaining why the Senate had turned down the Insurance Board's appointment of William A. Harrison as commissioner. He said the Senate felt Harrison had been remiss in not taking immediate action against the company.

Senate finance committee turned critical questions on the three board members for having questioned the Senate's right to pass on Harrison's appointment. Board appeared to ask a bill authorizing the department to reduce the number of examiners and raise salaries.

**LAND BUY OKAYED**—Legislature moved forward another step the plan for a consolidated state government center in the heart of Austin.

Both houses passed a bill authorizing purchase of two blocks northeast of the Capitol for a Texas Employment Commission Building.

Overall plan is to ring the Capitol on three sides with five new buildings. Included will be the State Courts Building, state office building, Insurance office building, TEC Building and library and archives building. Cost is estimated at \$20,000,000, all to come from various special funds rather than general revenue.

**OIL LEASING HELD UP**—Excessive importing of foreign oil was blamed for the Texas School Land Board's decision not to hold an oil and gas lease sale in February.

Board members said the market is so depressed to make a sale worthwhile. "There's no use putting up our school lands at a cheap price to let the oil companies profit still more because of their excess imports," said Governor Daniel.

At least one large oil company has informed the state it may pay rentals on present leases of submerged land under protest pending outcome of a

federal suit contesting state ownership of a portion of the tidelands.

**A CHANCE TO SPEAK**—Citizens in every country will be given a chance to say what kind of schooling is needed to equip Texas youngsters to live in a space age.

A school study committee set up by the last Legislature plans to ask local county committee to submit ideas. Called the Hale-Aiken Committee, the 24-member panel is made up of legislators and private citizens.

They've promised to heed the wants of interested citizens in the report they're to make to the next session. Already there's been a large response.

Suggestions range from a "crash" program in science to cutting new building needs by using facilities 12 months a year.

Broad areas being explored in the study are (1) what to teach and for how long, (2) how to get teachers, (3) how to build buildings and (4) how to pay for it all.

**MONEY READY**—State Liquidator J. D. Wheeler repeated an earlier statement that he is ready to start making payments of about 33 cents on the dollar to US Trust and Guaranty Co. creditors.

He's been ready since September, said Wheeler, but a court fight among creditors has blocked action. His statement apparently was prompted by legislative criticism of "too slow" liquidation proceedings.

**SHORT SNORTS**—Texas' January draft quota will be 497 men, highest call since August, according to State Selective Service Headquarters. This compares with a call of 340 for December. Also in January, local draft boards are to send some 2,000 men for re-induction examinations.

Travis County Judge Tom Johnson is making another try at getting the state to pay cost of returning criminals from other states. Previous Legislature and governor cold-shouldered his pleas. Records show extraditions cost Travis County \$1,117 in 1956. A 14-member citizens advisory committee named by Governor Daniel will assist the Texas Employment commission in sorting out the various jobs of state employees. Last regular legislative session authorized formation of the committee "to develop an orderly classification plan based on actual duties and responsibilities."

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



### OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

It has been said that when the roosters start crowing on the farms of the United States, they start in motion one of the greatest industries in the world—that of farming and ranching. The steel industry, the oil companies and the railroads do not compare in size with this great farm factory. It has also been said that all of the gold and silver mined since Columbus discovered America would not buy all the farms in this country. One worker in five is a farmer or rancher and there is more money invested in agriculture than in all other industries combined.

The farming and ranching industry in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District has taken a terrific beating during the drought period because of the very limited rainfall. Low crop

yields, dry grasses on ranges and short feed harvests have resulted in financial losses to some, and a source of discouragement to others; none have escaped some effects; but it has failed to break the spirit of all. As you talk to farmers and ranchers in the various communities throughout the district, you will find that they are accenting their losses and laying plans for next year. This spirit is what makes farming and ranching the greatest industry.

They are making plans to seed grasses, defer pastures, plant soil improving crops, handle crop residues to their advantage, set up crop rotations, improve wildlife areas, and improve management of fish ponds.

An increasing number of farmers and ranchers are working toward completion of a basic conservation plan on their places. The conservation plan is worked out with the landowner or operator as a means of getting conservation working on his place, so that he can reap the benefits over a planned period of time. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service are available to assist farmers and ranchers develop their basic conservation plan. With the adequate moisture supply, many feel that it is a good time to start making plans in this direction.

The supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District urge those who do not have basic conservation plans on their places (owned or leased) to come by the 2nd floor of the Courthouse and make arrangements for technicians of the Soil Conservation Service to help them on this all important job.

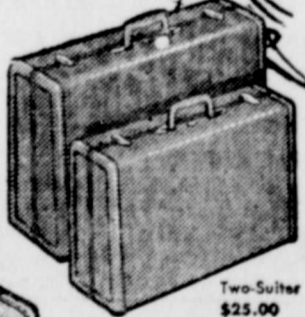

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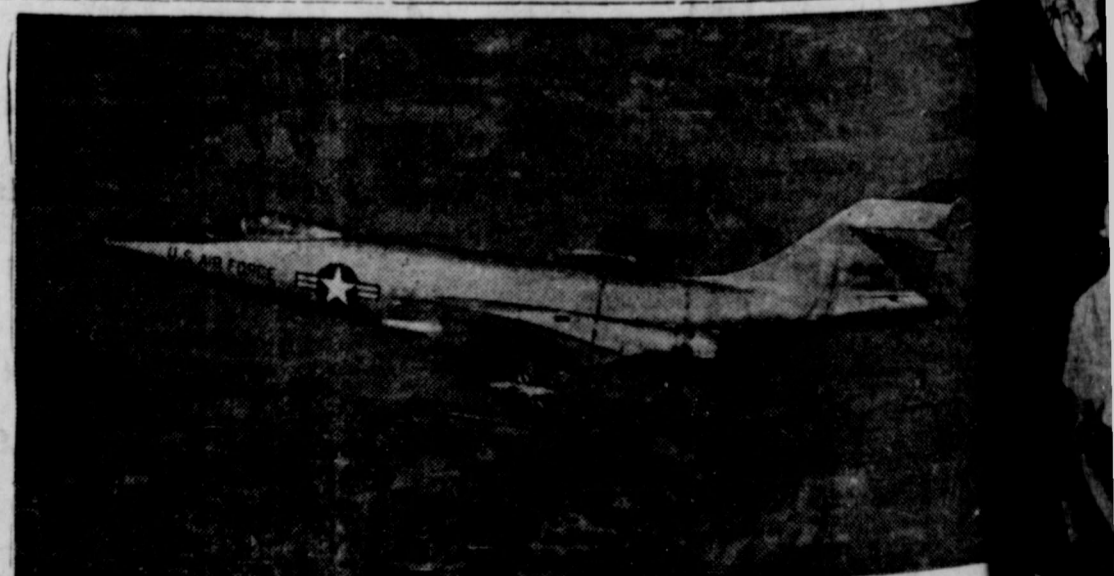


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
