

"There will be no such thing as the 'farm states' in American politics by 1982," the Washington editor told an audience of southern businessmen, "The agricultural states will become increasingly industralized. This process has already begun. Last year, for example, farm families received one-third, or 6.7 billion dollars of their incomes from work done away from the farm. By 1982, we predict that fully half the income of farm families will come from non-farm work, from employment in light industry, service trades, and other jobs.

"Who will produce the food?

"The mechanization of farms has already enabled us to produce more with fewer farm workers. This process will continue. In 25 years, American farms will produce one-third more food and fiber with 40 per cent fewer farm workers," the editor told his audience

"The political effect of this economic change will be that the farm bloc will begin to share the viewpoint of the industrial states. We will see fewer and fewer of those classic legislative and political struggles between agricultural and industrial interests," the Washington editor said.

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

U. S. diplomats feel that the Soviets' recent call for a ban nuclear weapons tests was strictly a propaganda gambit aimed wooing the support of the uncommitted Asian bloc of nations. The only reason the U.S. agreed to try further disarmament talk was to appease the western European nations who were balking

allowing missile bases on their territory. The concession by the U. S., however, also resulted in an agreement in principle on a plan for placing American atomic stockpile





Personal use: Some expenses deductible. (But be careful not to duplicate amounts claimed as business expenses above.) If you plan to itemize your deductions on the long form (Form 1040), you may claim:

1. License tags. 2. State gasoline taxes. Determine the total number of miles driven last year, divide by your car's average mileage per gallon, and then multiply this figure by state tax, per gallon.

3. State or local taxes on the total purchase price of a car purchased during 1957. Federal excise taxes on new cars for personal use are not deductible.

4. Interest on automobile loans. If your are dinancing your car on the installment plan, you may deduct the interest portion paid on your contract. (See your Income Tax Instruction booklet for computation.)

5. Casualty and theft losses not compensated for by insurance. You can claim any loss resulting from an accident not caused by your willful negligence. Damage to your car from fire, lightning, storms, hail or flood is also deductible.






