## "BROTHER'S KEEPER"

Figures just made available to the Texas Safety Association, reveal that more than 1,500 American lives were saved in traffic during 1957. The number of fatalities, nationally, have totalled 38,500—as compared with 40,000 fatalities for the preceding year.

The downward trend in fatal traffic accidents actually began in December, 1956, the month in which the current national Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents campaign was launched, and has continued in an almost unbroken line for 13 months. The Attack program is conducted on a national scale by the National Safety Council and is coordinated throughout Texas by TSA.

This evidence that the traffic toll can be cut supports the premise that improved official traffic programs backed by an aroused public can eventually solve the growing problem of congestion and accidents. It also points up 1958 as really the "decisive year" in traffic safety.

The question that remains to be answered is, "Can these gains be fortified and improved?" J. O. Musick, TSA's General Manager, believes that they can, and supports his belief with the statement that: "A growing influence which may help provide a positive answer to this question is the recognition of the moral aspect of traffic responsibility. While many persons, including clergymen and lay religious leaders, have stressed the need for this concept in the past, these efforts are now being welded into a stronger, more persuasive voice for safety."

Perhaps, at last, man is beginning to realize that he is also his "brother's keeper" on streets and highways.

## THE ATOM IN POLITICS

Atomic power, as a source of electricity, has become a full-scale political issue.

That issue, basically, is simple. It is whether there shall be a government monopoly or near-monopoly of atomic power development, at a huge and unknown cost to the taxpayers, or whether private enterprise, working in cooperation with the interested government agencies, will be invited and allowed to make its full contribution to ultimate success.

The layman has every reason to be confused. Various members of Congress have charged that we are woefully lagging in this field, and that only a government crash program can save us. A bill to authorize such a program is on the Congressional agenda.

The layman, however, does not have to take these charges at face value. A man whose knowledge of what is being done is second to none—Admiral Lewis Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission—tells a very different story. In his words: "Today the United States leads the world in the scope of its program for the development of safe, efficient and competitive nuclear power."

Admiral Strauss went on to detail some facts. The partnership of AEC with private industry has so far created a half-billion dollar atomic power industry. To quote him again: "We have already built and operated 23 reactors in the U. S. for production of power, civilian and military. Another 44 are under construction and 21 are under development or in the planning stage."

"This total of 88 power reactors represents a program which, to our knowledge, is not approached by any other country either in performance or planning."

Why, in the light of this, should there be all the turmoil over atomic power? Here's one logical answer: those who seek a socialized federal power monopoly have seized eagerly on the atom in their search for new political controls over the people.

## THE COMMUNITY LIFE RECORDER

In honor of National Newspaper Week, the Putnam County Courier of Carmel, New York, sponsored an essay contest among high school students. The assigned topic was "What My Hometown Newspaper Means To Me." A distinguished panel of judges chose the winner. She is Estelle Duhrels, of Carmel, and her essay was devoted to what the hometown paper means to an average, busy teenager.

Miss Duhrels listed many features of the paper that helps her keep in contact with the community—vital statistics, social and church notes, news of sports and entertainment, the comings and goings of people, and so on. Then at the end she said: "The hometown newspaper is an essential part of the 'American Way of Life'. It stresses the importance of the everyday citizen in the modern world, and I am one of them!"

That is an interesting and accurate point of view. The hometown paper is a unique institution. Nothing duplicates it, nothing can take its place. It provides a running history of its community, and of the people whose lives influence the community in one fashion or another. It is the backbone of community life and progress.

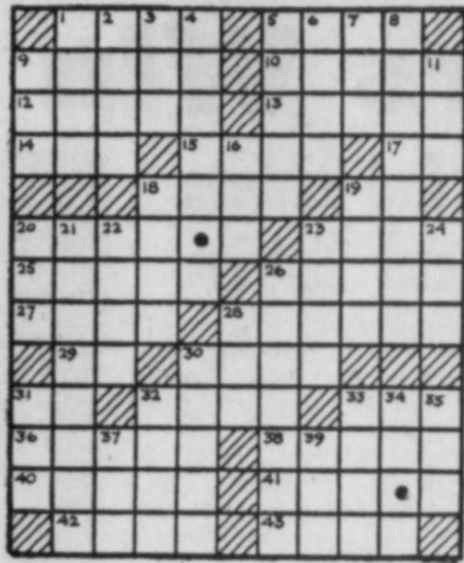

MARCH OF EVENTS

Fast-West Summit Meet Chances Grow Very Dim | Russ Chiefs Unresponsive To Agreement on Agenda

WASHINGTON—The chances that an East-West "summit" meeting will be held in the near future appear now to be very slim. The latest developments show that the Kremlin leaders have to respond, even in a small measure, to President Eisenhower's quest for agreement on an agenda.

Summing up the prospects of a high level parley, the Press said that, as of now, "you would just be playing at each other across the table."

Despite the obvious fact that the Russians still working their propaganda technique, the States policy-makers are not inclined to close door on the chances of holding some working talks. Students of Soviet foreign policy are aware that the Kremlin can change its mind whenever it feels that some advantage might be gained.

Since negotiations invariably are conducted from positions of strength, the Russian command undoubtedly believes that the United States now has more things in its favor and there is no use of making any immediate concessions.

Another development, however, should give Goldwater some ammunition. Committee Republicans hired John McGovern as a special investigator to look into the Kohler strike at Sheboygan, Wis. Reuther got into a fight with McGovern over statements that McGovern made in a speech in Detroit. The upshot was that Committee Chairman John L. McClellan (D), Arkansas, took personal command of the inquiry.

NEW ARAB THREAT—Diplomatic observers regard the union of Egypt and Syria as a gun pointed at Israel and as a threat to preservation of peace in the troubled Middle East. Experts can find few benefits accruing to the West in the merger. They can only see a long period of uncertainty. The new state, they believe, poses more problems than it solves.

Diplomats agree, however, that the special target is Israel, a principal land link between Egypt and Syria and the professed enemy of the Arab powers. Israel was born amid a strife of warfare and her life to date has been marked by frequent encounters with Egypt. In at least two major battles, Israel has soundly trounced the Egyptians, a fact that President Nasser cannot forget.

## Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I got a notice with social security check this month advising me that if I made over \$1200 in 1957, I must make a report to the Social Security Administration. I am self-employed and made over \$1200 last year. Since I file a return with income tax return with \$1200, do I need to make the report?

Answer: Yes. Since you made over \$1200 and you were not over 72 in all of 1957, you must file the report. The fact that you are self-employed does not alter the fact that you made over \$1200.

Question: I will be 65 years of

age in April 1963. I am self-employed. Is it true that two years of social security credit will entitle me to retirement payments at age 65?

Answer: No. You will need at least six years of credits to be eligible for retirement benefits.

Army, navy, air corps and civilian experts apparently are scrapping among themselves to see who gets there first.

Anyway, whether it is the Sputnik or the USNik, the costs so far have gone higher than the devices.

It's true that all of us want to know what's in outer space. We're not complaining about the costs, for all of us are interested in the rest of the universe.

Also there are a good many of us who want to know more about what's going on "down below." Fishermen in particular are interested in the creatures of the deep.

So, maybe you'd like to hear about a little experiment that is going on along the Texas coast. There, aquatic biologic scientists are trying to find ways to create an artificial snapper reef.

These bodies will be linked together with a piece of oil field cable and dropped into the Gulf of Mexico at the 10 fathom curve near the whistling buoy off Port Aransas.

Tentative coast guard approval already has been given. The old autos must be planted where they will be a little too

deep to affect navigation, and away from the range of shrimpers' nets.

This will be one of the most interesting experiments ever undertaken in Texas to increase off-shore fishing for red snapper, and other saltwater fishers. If it works, other artificial reefs will be created from time to time to improve fishing conditions along the Texas coast.

This little experiment may make the world a better place in which to live—rather than one to get out of.

At the present time snapper fishing is done mostly from party boats at ranges from 15 to 100 miles out in the Gulf of Mexico. There has been a little snapper fishing around the oil derricks in the offshore waters. These derricks are indicative that snapper can be caught around the artificial reefs.

It is hoped that the old automobile bodies will work like a brush shelter and serve as a hideaway for red snapper, ling, pompano, barracuda and other smaller fish. That of course means that the big ones will be lurking nearby. Result: good fishing for everyone.

Alabama has tried the idea with some success. If it works in Texas our coastal fishing will be much better, because these artificial reefs will afford cover not only for snapper, but for many other good fighting fish.

It might also be a place to get rid of thousands of old automobile bodies—which can't be shipped to the moon.

It has been suggested by some that old auto bodies might be used in fresh water lakes to

provide cover for fish.

This would be very dangerous. Our lakes in Texas are not large enough. Even a few old automobile bodies dumped into Texas lakes would produce navigation hazards we don't need. Let's keep them clean.

If there is any tendency to dump auto bodies in the lakes in your area, then it would be wise for municipalities to pass ordinances, as soon as possible, to stop it.

Speaking of ordinances, what about asking your city to provide safe boat launching ramps in waters controlled by it? The City of Austin has just completed a new one within the city limits, on Lake Austin. It will help relieve the situation greatly.

Question: I got a notice with social security check this month advising me that if I made over \$1200 in 1957, I must make a report to the Social Security Administration. I am self-employed and made \$1200 last year. Since I file a income tax return with the same, do I need to make the report?

Answer: Yes. Since you made \$1200 and you were not age 72 in all of 1957, you must file the report. The fact that you file a tax return with Texas is a community property state and you file joint tax returns with your husband does not alter the fact that you made over \$1200.

Austin, Texas—State's fiscal cupboard is bare at the moment. By the end of the month it'll probably be about \$20,000,000 short, says State Treasurer Jesse James.

Texas' treasury has been running in the red during spring months for several years. Situation corrects itself sometime after April when sizable state tax payments come in. For more than a decade the state has come out solidly in the black by the end of each fiscal period.

This year Treasurer James predicts incoming revenue will

wipe out the deficit by June.

But there's a difference next year. Lagging oil revenues choked off a sizable amount of expected tax income. Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, the official income estimator, another—and worse—deficit next fall. By the end of present budget period, August, 1959, he estimates state will have spent \$2.2 billion "on the cuff."

This estimate holds oil production picks up. See STATE NEWS, Page

 Meanwhile, state banks are cashing the state's war bonds and holding them until state gets money in to pay them.  
**Penny Saved**—With an eye on the state's depleted coffers, the Legislative Budget Board is asking state departments to find ways to pare expenses. The board's letter calls on department heads to "review . . . each item in your organization to determine if there is anything that can be eliminated without detriment to the citizens of the state."  
**Defense Need Cited**—It won't be long before Texas will suffer from the same economic conditions that are afflicting other states, says the board's chairman, C. Culberson. In an Austin speech to members of the Texas Service Stations Association, Culberson took the "swat" at imports for drainage water at \$1,000,000 a day from

Texas economy.  
 But above this, he said, is the danger to national security if the domestic oil industry is strangled and the country becomes dependent on oil fields "half a world away."  
 "It's suicidal," said Culberson. He doesn't see prospect of cheaper gasoline from imports, said the Railroad Commissioner. Europeans, who get all their oil from the Middle East, pay from 80 cents to \$1.10 per gallon, he said.  
**No Trend Yet**—Texas Employment Commission's latest report showed a slight drop in number of jobless—from 79,604 to 79,079.  
 But the change was not enough to indicate a "turning point," the hoped-for spring upswing in job activities. TEC's figures include only those unemployed persons covered by unemployment insurance.  
**Difference in View**—Texas Supreme Court is considering

the arguments of rival groups of optometrists who don't see eye to eye on advertising.  
 One group, associated with Texas State Optical, contends a law passed by the last Legislature prohibits eye glass advertisements mentioning price. Opponents from Lee Optical declare the section of the law limiting advertising is unconstitutional because it wasn't mentioned in the caption of the bill.  
 Suit is part of a long history of legal maneuvering between competing optometry firms.  
**Loan Study Set**—Small loan study group of the Legislative Council will hold a series of fact-finding hearings over the state. First will be April 4 in Houston.  
 Numerous organizations and officials ave, for some years, called for an overhaul of loan laws, charging that small borrowers have been exploited. State Junior Bar of Texas set the "loan shark problem" as its principle target at its recent

meeting in Austin.  
 Sen. Abraham Kazen, chair-said any interested person with information or recommendations is invited to appear before the committee.  
**Annual Sessions Urged**—House Speaker Waggoner Carr of Lubbock wants Texas voters to approve a proposed constitutional amendment to provide annual sessions of the Legislature.  
 Carr is campaigning over the state for re-election to the speakership. Voter approval of annual sessions also is being urged.  
 Budgeting on an annual basis would be much more business-like and efficient, he said, than on the present two-year plan.  
**Salary Squabble Flares**—Plans to supplement the \$15,000 salary to get a qualified executive director for the state hospitals and special schools has bumped into a lawmaker's indignation.  
 Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria said the supplement would viol-

ate the appropriation bill he helped to write. He said the \$15,000 salary was purposely set below that of several other staff members to reflect that the executive director was "serving" and not "over" the higher paid staff members.  
 Six applicants for one of the higher paid jobs reportedly turned it down because of the "unworkable" situation.  
**Taint That Tainted**—No point in throwing away money, says the GOP, even is it's "tainted" oil money.  
 Texas Republican State Committee, meeting in Austin, voted to use \$100,000 raised by National Committeeman Jack Porter for its state budget. National GOP wouldn't touch the money after Eastern newspapers headlined Porter's fund-seeking letter which reminded Texas oil and gas men they needed GOP support to pass the natural gas bill.  
 State committee gave Porter a vote of confidence in a resolution saying that New Dealers had distorted his intent.  
**Short Snorts**—Texans' driving habits seem to have improved

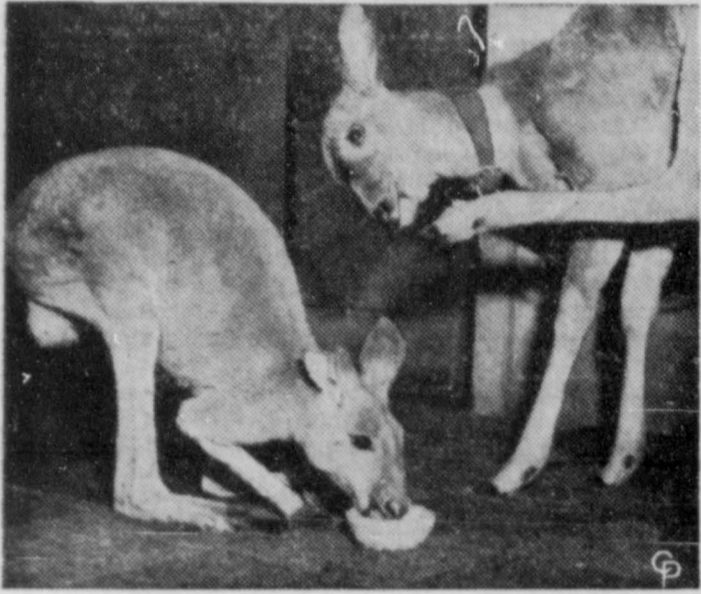

Agriculture in Texas and the nation is going through an dramatic evolution.

If the changes we are experiencing in farming and farm life were just a bit more physically violent—it could be properly called a "Revolution." No previous era in Agriculture has seen such an emphatic shift in emphasis and techniques as we have since World War II.

Old farm concepts have been outmoded by new and dynamic production and marketing. As a result, laws passed 20 and 30 years ago have, in some instances, not met the needs of this new period.

This is particularly true in Texas. Some of our old laws are impractical. And even some of our legislation that is less than 2 years old already need amending.

A goal of the Texas Department of Agriculture during the next Legislative session will be to emphasize changes in the following fields:

1. Revision of the nursery law.
2. A marketing enabling act.
3. A new general warehouse law.
4. Dressed poultry inspection law.
5. Amending the recently-enacted egg law.
6. Amendments to the weights and measures law.

A new nursery law is needed to set up some basis of standards and to control movement of inferior nursery stock into Texas.

The marketing enabling act is necessary because our selling and transportation methods are not kept up with the giant strides made in farm production. The state farm agency needs to enlarge its work to provide data to growers and handlers of volumes of commodity movement, planting, harvesting and grading services. At present, the TDA has no authority to participate in these types of programs except that which is rendered in the language of the current appropriation bill.

The present general warehouse law provides that all warehouse storage space for hire shall be bonded by the Agriculture Department. However, the penalty provision is weak and inadequate.

On poultry inspection, the federal government has made inspection compulsory for poultry moving in interstate commerce. The same type of service is needed within the state to

protect Texas consumers against inferior and low quality poultry.

The new Texas egg law already needs amending because financing of the statute is insufficient. This program should and could be self-supporting without the necessity of any use of tax money.

A fee system of checking scales and enforcing the weights and measures law is also advocated. This is practiced in other states and would place financing of the act on a solid footing in Texas.

These changes by law are necessary if our state government is to keep pace of modern agriculture.

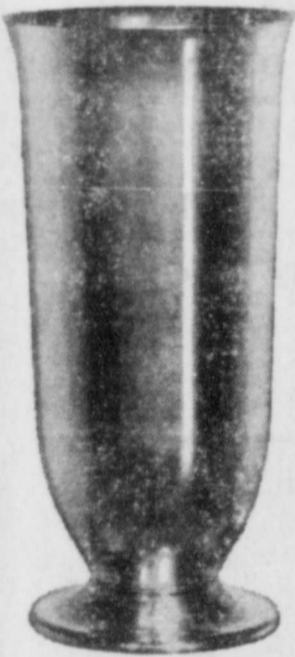

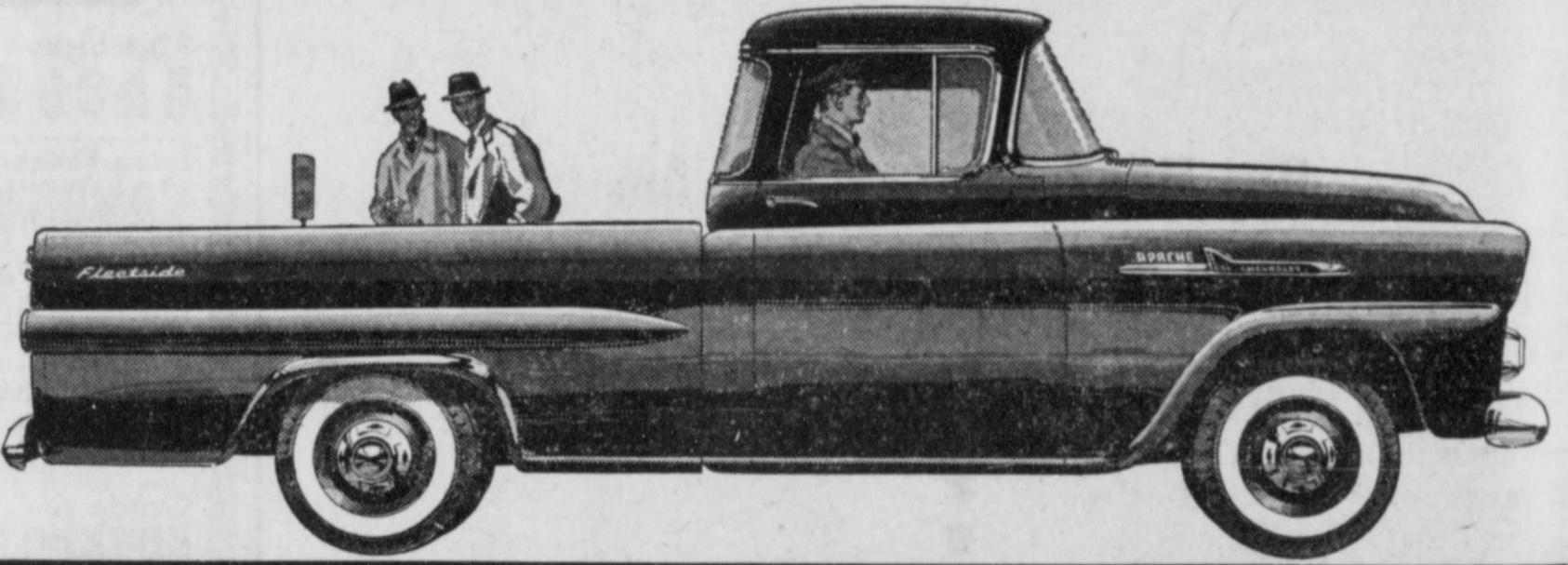

### News From Your COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENCY

BY LUCY MAY BURRUS and fewer fitting patterns give a more professional appearance to your finished garment. Use your bust measurements as a first key in deciding the pattern you should buy. Hips are large in proportion to the bust, it is better to buy a pattern according to the bust. Usually the pattern is easier to alter than the bust. You will also need to measure your waist, hips and back length.

Write down your measurements and compare them to a standard measurement. A new leaflet, "Choose Patterns Wisely," written by clothing specialists, gives standard measurements for patterns. Also includes suggestions for selecting pattern styles for different body types. Copies are available in my office.

Watch your pruning technique! Make clean cuts, flat or flush with the main limb or trunk. Stubs left by improper cutting may cause rotting of the heart wood. You may need to treat cuts on large limbs by painting with a pruning compound, such as orange shellac, to hasten healing. Most trees make oils to cover small cuts. Generally, horticulturists advise putting nothing at all on a cut 2 inches or less in diameter.

If pruning is done now, spring growth will soon hide the cuts.

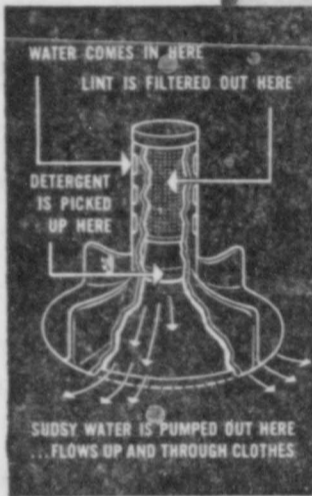
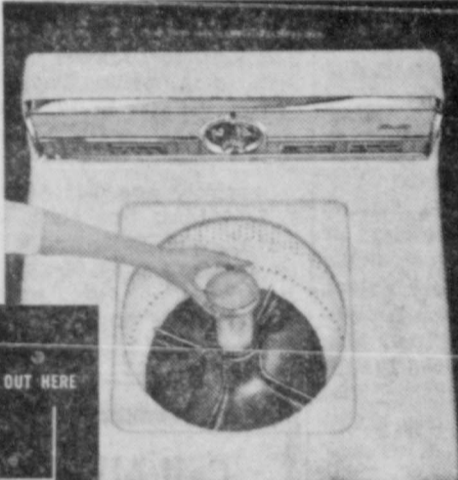
