At a planning session with top-level outdoorsmen Governor Price Daniel told of his desire to bring about a safety program to cut to a minimum accidental aths in outdoor pursuits. Governor Daniel called the meeting with the support of the Sportsmen's Club of Texas. George Whittington of Amarillo, president of the National Rifle Association, was made chairman of the program for the May 5 meeting. NRA has been keeping records on shooting accidents for many years and has some very interesting figures.
