

So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your

A brief digest of the nine different amendments follows.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1)-Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)-Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 30)-Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)-Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 48)-Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4)-Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows. 京 京

Take the shrimp out of our Texas bays and we no longer have trout, red fish and many others that we now take on rod

Take the shrimp out and commercial netting also is shot, in the coastal waters, and millions will not have fish on their tables.

I know practically nothing about shrimping, but there are many others who have lived on the coast all their lives who'll also admit there is still a great deal to be learned. Even the men in the shrimping business admit they are in the dark about many of the fundamental problems affecting the shrimp increment or its disappearance.

These men in the industry also are in violent disagreement over some aspects. A few of them would close shrimping in baywaters for a year. Others think the bay waters should be closed from January to July. They point out that the big shrimp caught during the months of January, February and March contain thousands of eggs. They apparently are on their way to inshore waters to breed. When they are caught they are removed from productivity and the shrimp population decreases.

There are laws now limiting the size of trawls and the size of shrimp, and also the amount in possession in some areas. They are more or less a hodgepodge, depending on what local legislation might be passed un-




