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



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority rote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) rears for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) rears; provided, however, that tenure inder Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of bailot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. FIT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XI of the constitution of the State of Texas be mended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II. 



ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:




