CENSORSHIP THROUGH TAXATION

Ask anyone what the Internal Revenue Service is and you'll get some such answer as this: "It's a Federal administrative agency, whose duty is to collect taxes as provided in revenue laws passed by Congress."

But the Internal Revenue Service is going far afield from its proper and established function. It is, in effect, setting itself up as a censor of what enterprises and organizations may say in their advertising, on pain of heavy tax penalties. It is also making decisions that are purely within the province of business man-

Here is the remarkable and menacing story.

Internal Revenue Service has ruled that electric utility companies cannot regard the cost of institutional advertising, which presents their side of the public-vs-private power controversary, as a legitimate business expense, deductible in income tax returns.

Internal Revenue Service has also ruled that the cost of literature opposing socialism issued by one of the country's most respected professional organizations, the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons, is not exempt from tax.

Internal Revenue Service has also disallowed public relations advertising placed over a four-year period by the Timken Roller Bearing Company. This advertising discussed the Bill of Rights, Capitalism vs. Socialism, principals of taxation, and other such matter.

In other words, Internal Revenue Service holds that advertising designed to sell products or services is a legitimate business deduction-but that advertising designed to maintain an economic and political climate in which private enterprise may successfully produce those products and services is not. It is attempting to muzzle the right of people to speak their minds freely and without penalty-and, in doing that, to prevent other people from knowing and weighing both sides of controversies.

If Internal Revenue Service's incredible stand is maintained, no one will be immune. Anyone may be faced with the choice of accepting bureaucratic censorship-or of paying a heavy penalty for exerting absolutely basic rights which are supposed to be guaranteed by the Bill of Rights. Standing on a dock in Lake Travis late one recent afternoon we saw several pound-size black bass surface to feed on food particles that had collected on the oil drums that supported the dock.

We got almost within touching distance of them and still didn't scare them away. Perhaps they were so intent on feeding that our presence didn't matter. Or maybey they just couldn't see us. If they saw us they certainly didn't scare. On | the other hand a loud noise that vibrated through the water did cause them to dive deep.

Anyway, the zoologist's claim that fish have taste buds on much of the exterior of their bodies is a new one to us. Had you heard that before?

To Keep Minnows Alive

Have trouble keeping your minnows alive until you reach the old fishing hole and can drop your minnow bucket into the water? Well, here's a trick that may help.

Next time you buy your minnows ask the minnow man to give you a tray full of ice from his refrigerator. Drop about five squares of the ice into the minnow bucket. It will keep the water.

soil bank, under which acreages allotted for cotton, wheat and other crops were taken out of production for one-year periods,

contract receives notification that his 'bid" is acceptable, a representative of the county ASC committee will visit the farm, check the land to determine whether it meets all the soil bank requirements and measure the acreage. Then the contract may be signed.

Farmers who place all their cropland in the soil bank for ther five or 10 years will be paid 110 per cent of the approved annual payment rates for their farms. This additional 10 per cent will not be paid on three-year contracts. Total annual payments under the new program are limited to \$5,000 per person, regardless of the

number of farms he may own. In addition to the annual rental payments for land placed in the conservation reserve, the federal government will provide financial assistance for establishment of vegetative cover on the "reserve" land.

Tabor said he expects most of the soil bank contracts for periods beginning Jan. 1, 1959 to be signed by Dec. 1.
