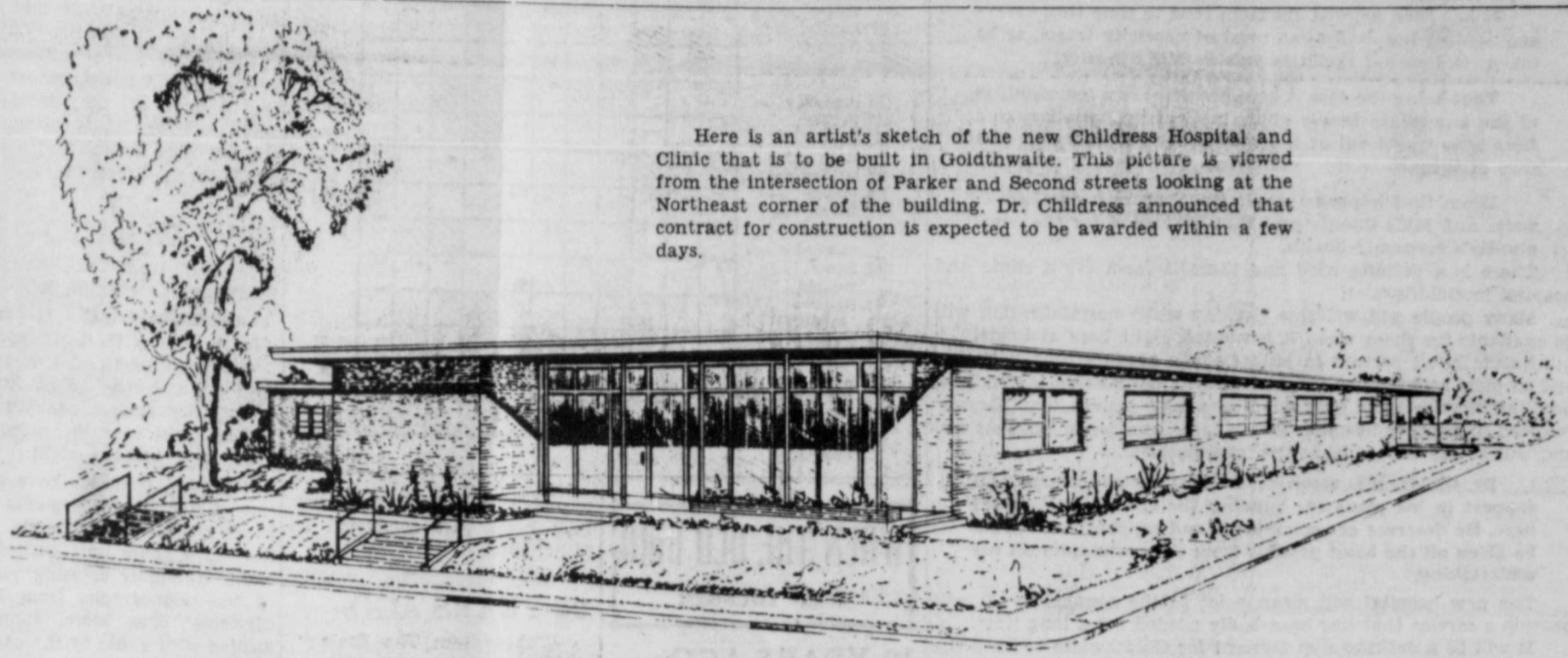
## New Decorations To Be Provided By Lions Club

## Bids For Hospital Are Opened; Contract To Be Awarded Soon

Construction bids for the Childress Hospital and Clinic were opened here on Tuesday, October 14, in the office of Childress Clinic. Bids ranged from \$69,942 to \$81,916, according to announcement by Dr. M. A. Childress and N. E. Wiedemann, of Wiedemann and Salmon, Architects, Waco, Texas.

Bids are being studied at this time and Dr. Childress stated that contract for construction is expected to be awarded within the next week.

The announcement by Dr. Childress two weeks ago of his plans for building a new hospital and clinic in Goldthwaite has been enthusiastically received by residents of Goldthwaite and the Mills County area.

Plans for the seven bed hospital and clinic have been in the making for several years. The 6,000 square foot structure will be erected at the corner of Parker and Second Streets facing east. It will be a one story building of cream color Roman brick construction completely air-conditioned and providing the very latest facilities as approved by the standards of the State Health Department.

The Clinic will provide space for two physicians and surgeons. The clinic and hospital will have separate entrances but will be operated on a combined set-up for economy of operation with respect to X-Ray and Laboratory facilities.

Dr. Childress announced that when the clinic and hospital

### INTERESTED PARTIES INVESTING IN PROJECT

A number of interested parties have come forth and are investing in the project, after Dr. Childress announced two weeks ago that additional finances would be welcomed.

He announced at that time that aside from personal family financing of the project there would be an opportunity for county residents to invest in the hospital by either direct investment for interest or through pre-paid hospitalization credit in the hospital-clinic.

To date more than \$14,000 has been paid in for investment in the project and more is pledged. Those who earlier expressed their interest in investing in the hospital, with their investment bearing interest, are now urged to come in with their funds. Others who are interested in having the hospital built here and want to have a part in it may contribute to the building fund and receive in turn pre-paid hospitalization credit.

Everyone interested in taking part in the additional financing that is needed, is urged to contact Dr. Childress for additional information.

The announcement by Dr. M. A. Childress a few days ago that he plans to build a new Clinic and Hospital in Goldthwaite was welcome news to a good many residents of Goldthwaite and the Mills County area.

There has been talk for a long time about the need for a hospital in Goldthwaite and what it can mean to the community.

It has been pointed out from time to time that everyone needing hospitalization must of necessity travel, or be taken, to hospital facilities outside Mills County.

That being the case it becomes necessary for members of the immediate family of the patient and relatives and friends to travel out of the county to visit them, or take care of them.

When that happens people travel away from Goldthwaite and Mills County and that isn't good for the community's economic health.

There is a definite need and there is room for a clinic and hospital in Goldthwaite.

Many people will welcome the day when hospitalization will be available for them when it is needed, right here at home.

Naturally all persons in Mills County needing hospitalization and surgical attention will not necessarily be patients at the local hospital because their particular case may require that they be referred to another hospital. But, a large number of patients can and will be taken care of at the local hospital.

Dr. Childress is receiving a lot of encouragement and support in his plans for building the clinic and hospital here. He deserves encouragement and support and should be given all the boost possible from the community on his undertaking.

The new hospital will mean a lot to the community. It will provide a service that has been badly needed for a long time.

It will be a definite step forward for Goldthwaite to have the new Childress Clinic and Hospital.

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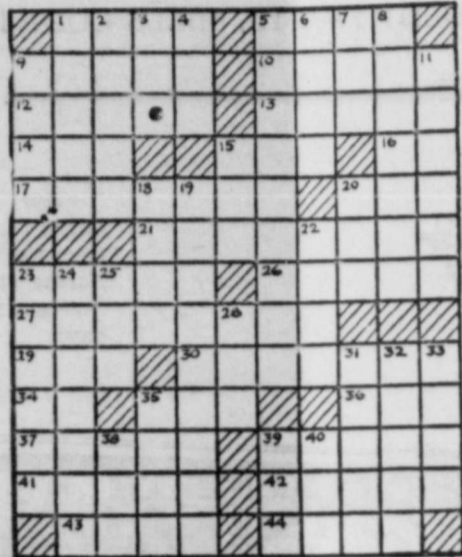

## Inside WASHINGTON

Administration Watches Economic Trend Closely

Sole of New Cars Big Factor in Recession

WASHINGTON—The administration is keeping a close watch on national economic developments as the fall season approaches to see if the trend confirms continuing recovery from the recession.

Factory employment and production are of particular concern as this has been the weak spot in the recovery picture.

Production of so-called "hard goods" is more than any other category during the recession which began last autumn and which some believe hit bottom in April.

Since then there have been some signs of pick-up in the volume of manufacturing. But the pick-up has been spotty. Washington is looking anxiously for the normal fall increase to materialize.

Reports of initial orders and the low position in most appliance lines indicate that production pick-up will occur. But there are some dark clouds on the horizon that are giving worrisome.

The auto industry is concerned even though the threat of a new three-year pact. The new pact is just about to begin to roll off assembly lines and acceptance is a big question mark. If the new auto pact they claim the national economy will be back to normal by spring. Should the new cars not sell in volume for any country into a deeper recession than any experienced in years.

Public Deeply Concerned Over Quemoy—Washington is getting a large volume of public reaction to the Formosa crisis, and some of it is deeply disturbing.

There is a heavier-than-expected opposition to the U. S. stand on the issue of the Chinese Communists.

Some senators' and congressmen's offices are becoming alarmed at the situation and are privately bemoaning the crisis connected with their election campaigns.

Most of them believe that President Eisenhower's chosen course of firmness against armed aggression by the Reds is correct. The concern rests with the degree of public understanding and acceptance of his reasoning.

One candidate for the Senate, Rep. Kenneth B. Keating of New York, has solved this dilemma by taking the position that in the perilous times the question of what to do about keeping the Kai-shek's domain out of Communist hands is not properly a political issue. In speeches he takes the stand that this should be left in the hands of the responsible authorities—meaning the Eisenhower administration.

So far the approach has worked. He usually gets applause when he makes the statement, coupling it with expressions of respect for the recognition of Red China.

Presidential Campaigning — There is ever-increasing pressure from the grass roots for President Eisenhower to take a more active role in the campaigns than he originally planned.

Public reports from across the nation tell of up-hill fights being faced by GOP Senate and House candidates.

The Republican National committee is receiving almost daily requests from virtually every state outside the "solid south" for Presidential appearances to bolster state and local candidates.

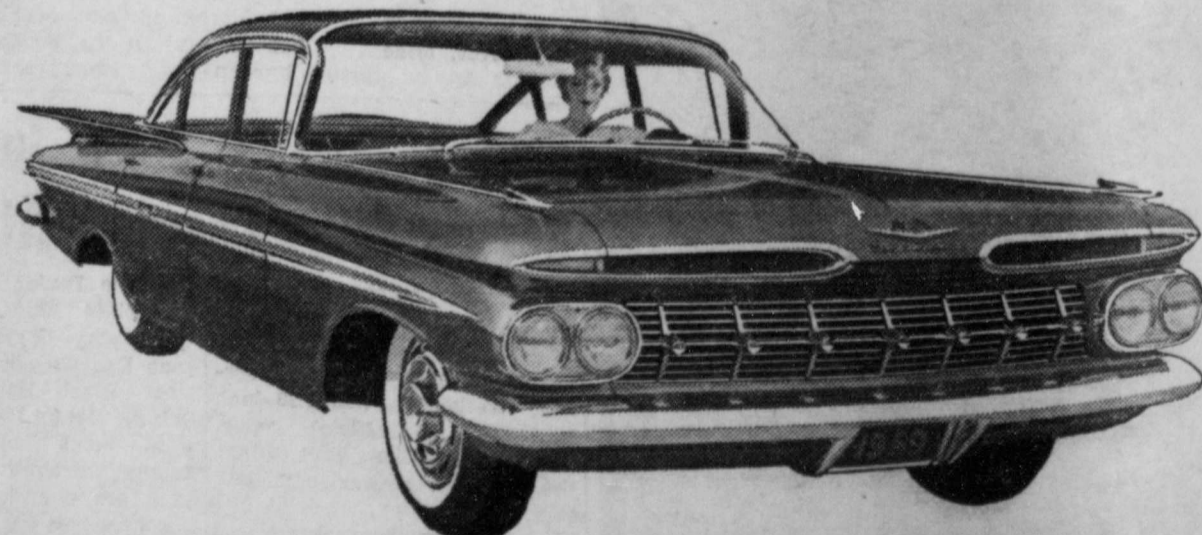
It was Ike's original intention to confine his campaign support to a few major speeches over nationwide radio-TV hook-ups, leaving the rugged personal campaigning to Vice President Nixon.

There are reliable indications, however, that this strategy is being reviewed, and the President is being persuaded to take a more active part this fall.

**INDIAN BATTLE**

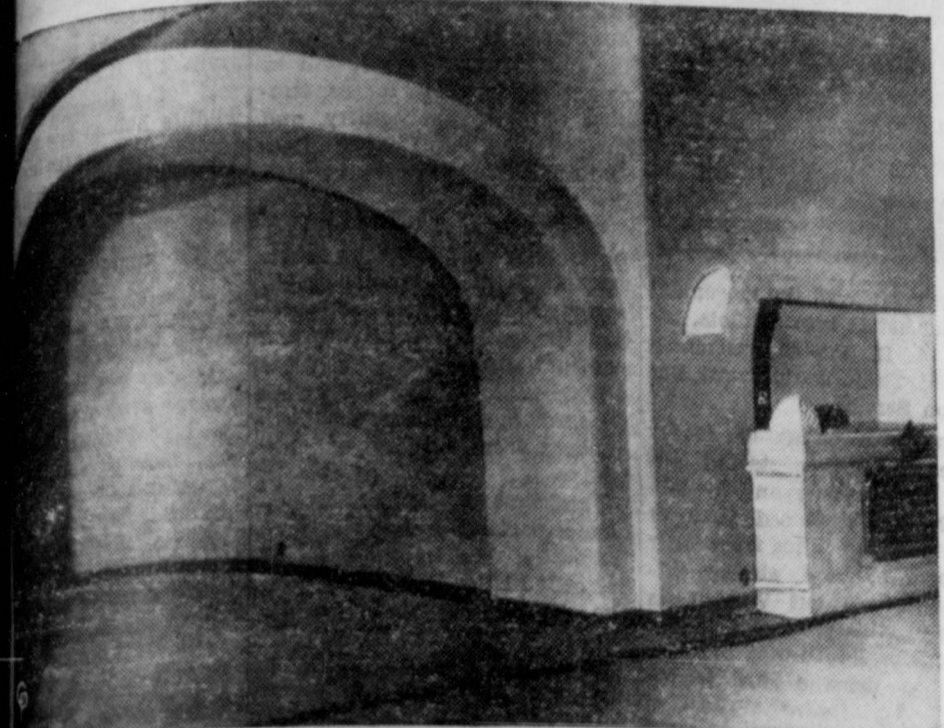
We condense the official report of Major Van Doren which we find in the San Antonio Herald.

We think the contingency has arrived when the President ought to take the responsibility of calling out a Texas Regiment.

On the 29th, two Indian spies came in, and reported a large Comanche camp, near the Wichita Village about 90 miles due East from the Depot. On receipt of this, all the stores, draught mules, and extra horses, were put within the stockades, and four companies of cavalry, with the Indian allies, made a forced march of ninety odd miles in thirty-eight hours, and arrived at the villages on the 1st inst. The enemies' camp was

charged a little after daylight.

The number of Indians is variously estimated, probably there were about 400. Lt. Van Camp fell with an arrow through his heart. Three privates were killed, one missing — supposed to be dead — another has since died of his wounds. Among those dangerously wounded are Maj. Carl Van Doren, Capt. S. Ross, and Corporal Taylor. Mr. J. T. Ward, sutler to the company, and several others, eight or nine in number, are slightly hurt. Lt. Major killed three Indians in a hand to hand fight, and Capt. Evans and Lts. Harrison and Phifer,

**FARM STORED GRAIN**  
Reports have been received that insects are in some of the farm stored grain in the county.

A good control for insects in stored grain is one part of carbon tetrachloride to three parts ethylene dichloride used at the rate of three gallons per 1,000 bu. of stored grain. Spray this over the grain in the bin, be sure and do not use a fine mist but a coarse spray.

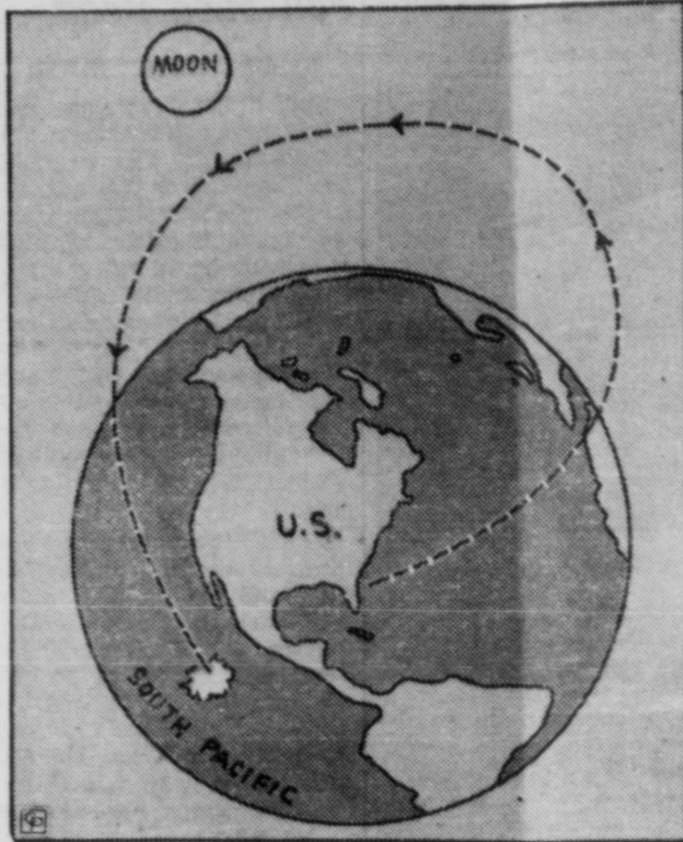

**Questions And Answers About Social Security**

**Question:** How long must a person have worked under social security to qualify for disability benefits under the 1958 Amendments?

**Answer:** At least 5 years (or 20 quarters).

**Question:** Does this work have to be in any particular period of time?

**Answer:** Yes, the 5 years' work (or 20 quarters) must have been within the 10 years (or 40 quarters) just before the date of onset of the disability.

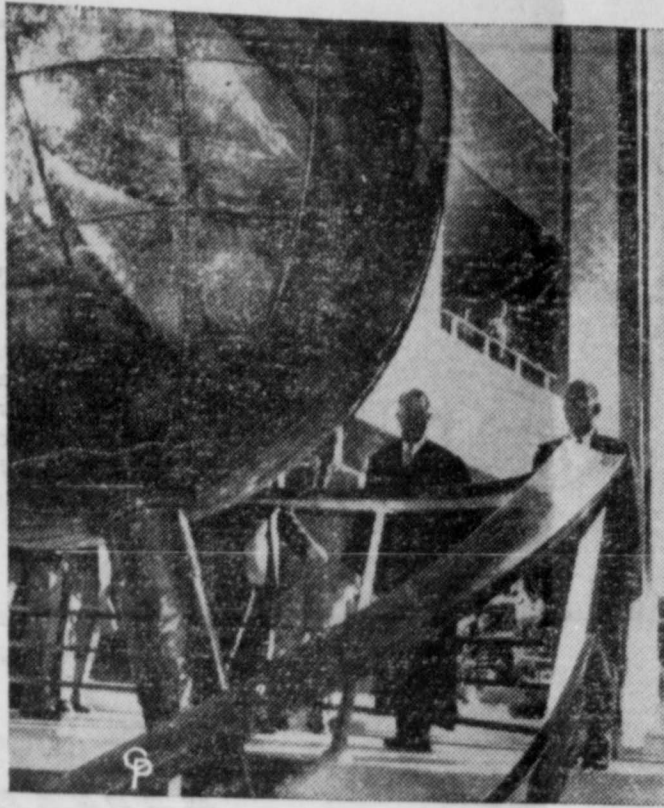
**Question:** Do the 20 quarters (5 years) have to be consecutive?

**Answer:** No. The time worked may be intermittent, spasmodic, or continuous, just so it totals at least 5 years (or 20 quarters). The provision that at least 1 1/2 years of this work be in the 3 years just before the establishment of the disability is no longer in the law.

**Question:** When did this change in the law become effective?

**Answer:** September 1, 1958.

After allowing the panic to make seed, he placed eight head of cows back on the temporary pasture around September 10. The same cows are still grazing the grass and will probably remain there until frost.

In summing up the benefits derived from this grass, Mr. Parker said that this was an average of over two animal units per acre for approximately 100 days. He is looking forward to the end of his Soil Bank contract so he can graze all of his Blue Panic grass which he feels cannot be surpassed in quality as a grazing crop.

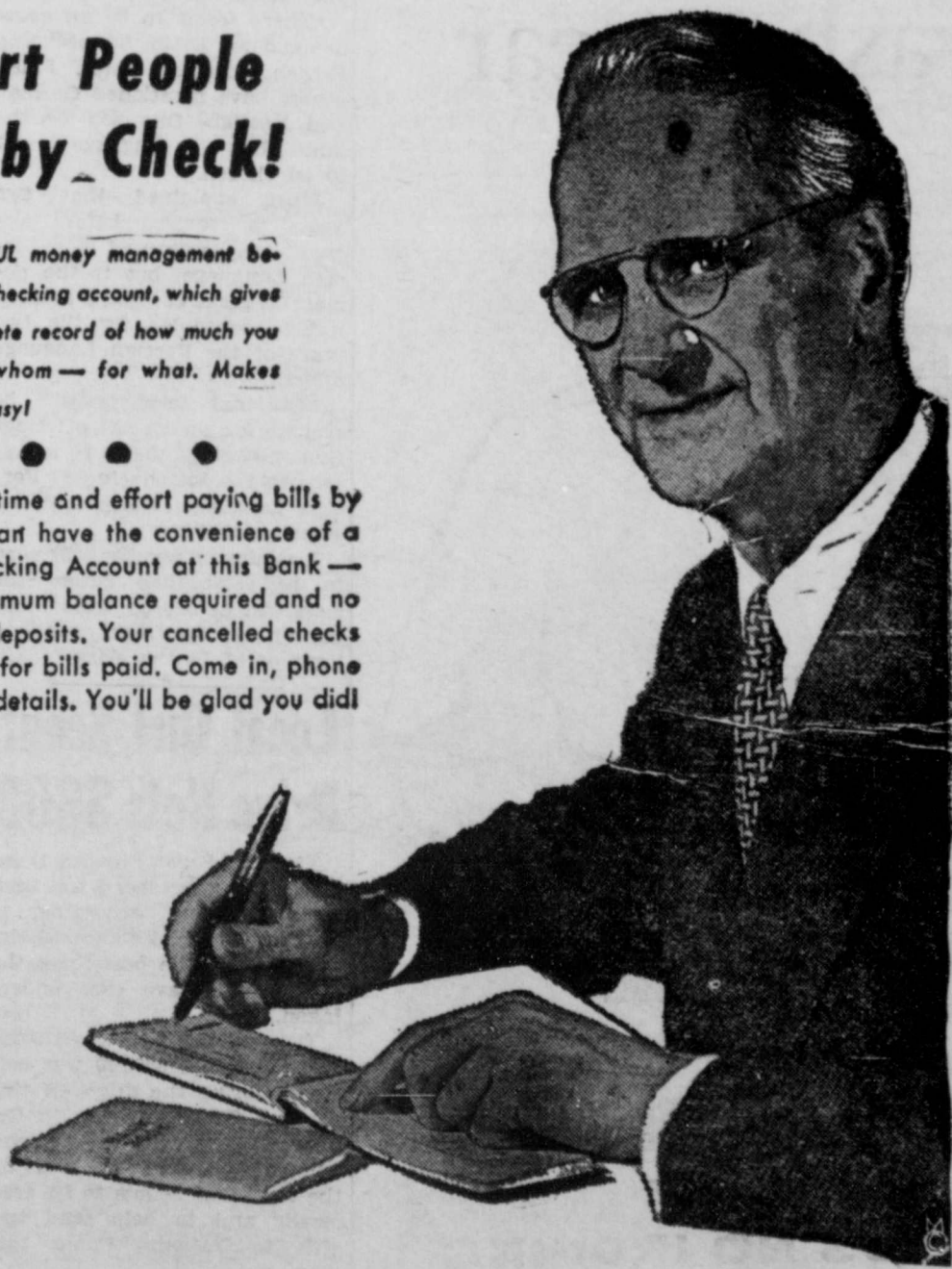

first we have to finish the for Scouts and Mariner Membership requirements. We can wear our uniforms.

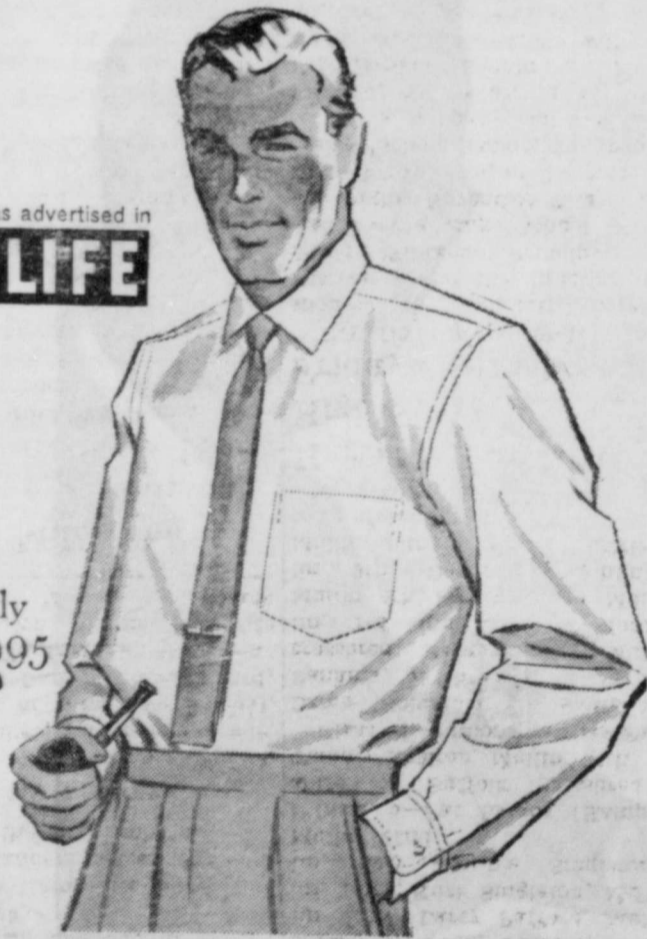
