When Mr. Duren introduced us and told Mrs. Dix that I was the editor of the Goldthwaite paper, she immediately said: "I guess this is where I must be diplomatic." After we assured her that this was one place where we all just expressed ourselves freely she proved a most interesting subject for an interview.





FALL DEFERMENT

The early fall rains which have been followed by mild, cloudy weather have given a tremendous boost to grass growth. This condition is ideal for fall deferment of native

If best results are to be obtained from this range improving practice, it should be started at once. By deferring grazing of native grass pastures now, food reserves in the grass roots will be restored, and an early vigorous growth can be expected during the next growing season. Research work indicates that a grass plant deferred from grazproduces approximately four times as many roots as a

closely and often grazed one. Another advantage of fall deferment this year is seed production. Many grasses failed to produce an abundant seed crop earlier due to the dry summer. These grasses are now producing a good seed crop. Deferment will allow the seed crop to mature and this in turn will speed up the natural reseeding of native pastures. Too, when grasses are grazed continuously during seed head production, livestock eat the seed stalks and the plants may not be able to pro-

duce early forage next spring. The forage now being produced can be utilized during the winter months after the food reserve in the roots has been restored and the seed crop has matured and fallen to the ground. Good grass forage on the ground for winter use is the feed reserve needed for cutting overhead ranching costs.



Falling Leaves Can Be Of Value

College Station, (Spec.) -Leaves which are now falling and cluttering yards and gardens can give a boost to next year's flower or vegetable garden if properly handled, says lime to the fertilizer. Bennett, extension

Burning the leaves may be easier but the extra time required to put them in a compost pile will return big dividends, explains Bennett. The compost can be used next year to increase soil organic matter or for mulching flowers, shrubs or vegetables.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation, points out the chemist. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts will take care of the enclosure. Then start with a six inch layer of leaves. For every four square feet of enclosure, dissolve a cup of commercial fer-



How many mental patients were previously known to local community health and welfare agencies? Have certain types of agencies been in touch with certain kinds of patients before they are admitted to the State Hospital? How many of their families have had these previous contacts?

These and related questions about 148 residents of Travis County admitted to the Austin State Hospital during a single vear, were answered by the

The study concerned patients who were admitted for care for the first time

Dr. Wallace Mandell, research consultant directed the study, assisted by Isabel Cromack.

By checking the records of 11 agencies ranging from the City-County Hospital to the Salvation Army, they found that 46 per cent of the newly hospitalized patients had direct or indirect contact (through their families) with one or more

In addition several other facts were discovered opening new vistas of study in mental illness prevention. For instance, it was found that half of the 148 first admissions to the State Hospital had eight years of schooling or less. However, only one-fifth of all Travis County residents had eight years or less of formal schooling.







In these days of high production costs, you don't need a crystal ball to know that a grower who has to sell his poultry at 15c a pound isn't making any profit.

Neither is the buyer or processor who buys these birds and then must compete with lower priced poultry from other states on the dressed market. So the Texas poultry industry is faced with that old agricultural buga-boo-overproduction in the South, coupled with a decreased demand for poultry.
