the city got some streets ready there may not be a contracto avallable in the area who would be the least bit interested.

There are two main reasons why it would be best for the city to do the paving. Fint, is the fact that ine eob can at a time as the streets can be prepared and readied for paving. Secondly, is the faet that paving the streets isn't soing to
maintenance which will be from now on. That is something that will have to be taken care of by the city.
So one might say if the city goes into the street paving business, with the help of property owners, it will also have to stay
in the business and keep the streets maintained. Unless they are kept up they will soon be gone and have to be redone. When you look at it from that standpoint it is easy to see that
