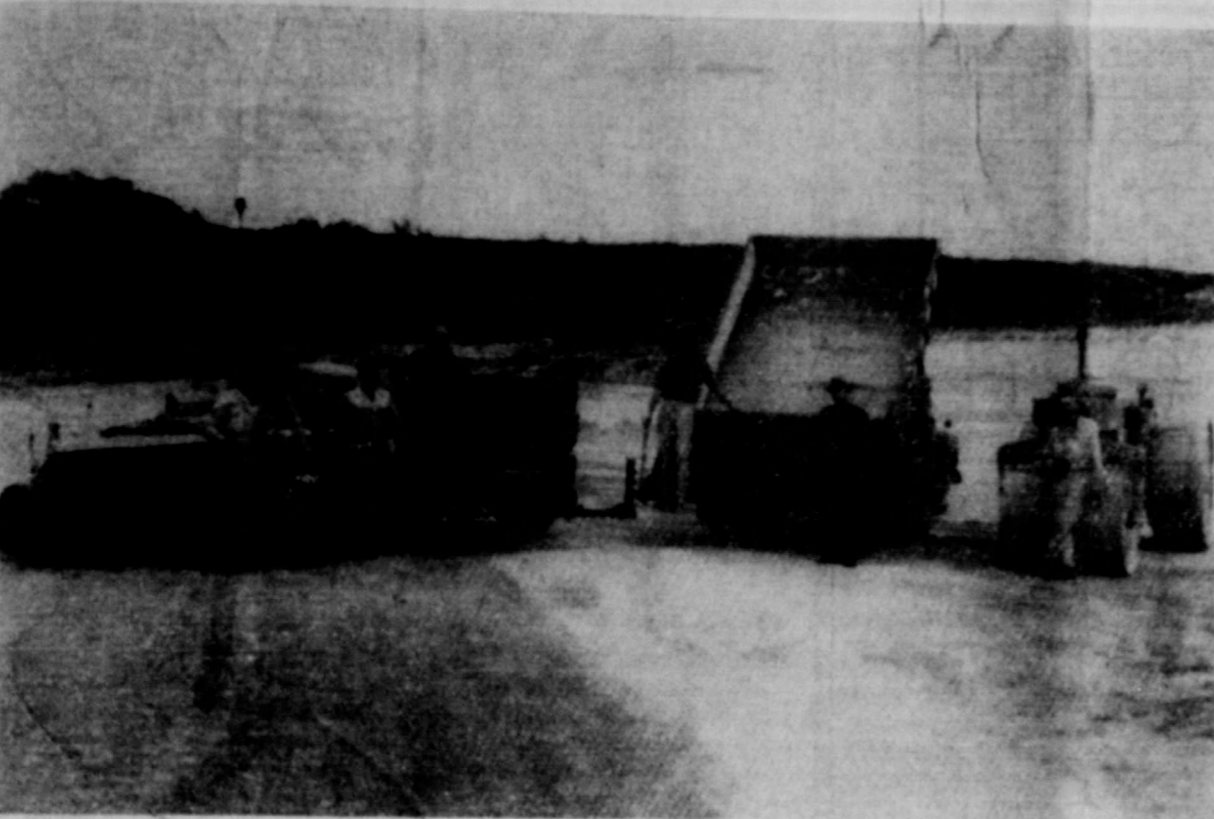

## Council Certifies Election Returns

The city council meeting last night certified election returns and took office for the year. V. A. Hudson took office on the council as a new member to fill a one year unexpired term. Members present were Mayor Y. B. Johnson, S. A. Edington, F. D. Lee, Joe S. Langford, V. A. Hudson and I. W. Mauney. Officers for the meeting were W. C. Barnett, city manager; Glynn Collier, secretary; and E. Koleber. A phase of a new power ladder for the electric plant was discussed and a vote of Hudson, Reynolds and Barnett was appointed to get detailed information and report at the next meeting. Mayor's report for the year was presented and also a statement for the month. The council discussed the proposed ordinance establishing rules and specifications for the street committee. Members of the council appointed to pay for aldermen, the city secretary for the year. Aldermen are paid \$5 per month and \$3 per called meeting. The mayor is paid \$15 per month and city salary is \$30 per month.

The City of Goldthwaite moved another step forward the past week when several pieces of street paving machinery and some materials were purchased and put into stock. Announcement of the purchase was made at the council meeting last Thursday night by City Manager W. C. Barnett and members of the street committee S. E. Edington and Joe S. Langford. The committee of three had been working for the past several weeks in locating the needed equipment after the council voted a month ago to go into street improvement program on a long range basis by purchasing additional equipment. The committee working on the project was assisted by Carl Letbetter of Letbetter Machine Shop in inspecting equipment and getting the needed items set up. Equipment and materials purchased, according to the announcement, include: 600 gallon asphalt distributor, rotary and drag brooms, 8,600 gallon asphalt storage tank equipped with pipe, valve and fittings, construction of a gravel spread-

IT'S SPRING—It's spring and we are in the season when the Bluebonnet is about to cover the countryside.

Where they have been getting rain the state flower is pretty well in full bloom. In Mills County it is a little late this year, but, with a little more rain we will still come in for our share.

Our friend Mr. Earl Clements handed me a copy of the record of our state flower being adopted, by the state Senate and House of Representatives in 1901. His father Phil H. Clements was a State Representative from here at that time. He took part in the discussion and final selection of the Bluebonnet as State Flower. After its selection, or adoption, he also wrote a poem, "The Bluebonnet," which has received wide publication over the state during the years.

Since this is Bluebonnet season I thought our readers may like to read something about the State Flower.

THE BLUEBONNET—On March 5, 1901, after a heated session of the legislators, at which time many flowers were presented for consideration, the Bluebonnet was declared the State Flower of Texas. The Colonial Dames of the State originated the idea and are due credit for the selection. The resolution was introduced in the Senate by Rep. Barry Miller of Dallas and gained immediate recognition. However, the House met it with opposition.

An impressive appeal was made for the Bluebonnet by John M. Green of Cuero. Phil H. Clements of Goldthwaite was very aggressive for the open cotton boll, which he termed "The White Rose of Commerce." John Nance Garner of Uvalde moved the adoption of the cactus bloom. The flower was so eloquently described by him that those present saw—Not thistle and thorn—but lily and daffodil.

Each, in turn, presented his favorite in such a manner that the Dames feared for their choice and began lobbying. They were surprised to find that many of those present did not know the Bluebonnet by name. Accordingly, a Bluebonnet picture was sent for. One painted by Miss Mode Waller of Austin was submitted for approval. Deep silence reigned for an instant. The deafening applause fairly shook the walls—the State Flower was selected.

Immediately John Kennedy of Houston, confusedly admitted that he was in favor of any kind of a Bonnet. Phil Clements, who made his brave fight for the open cotton boll, became inspired and wrote the poem, THE BLUEBONNET. This helped him out of an embarrassing situation.

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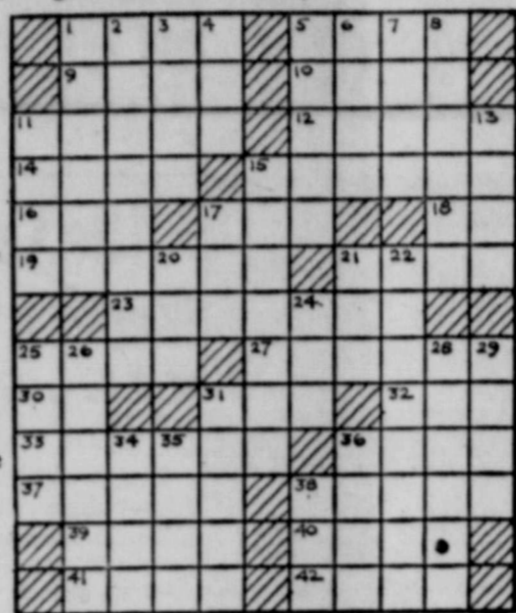

Congressmen Talk Economy | Lawmakers' Fringe Benefits  
While Gouging Taxpayers | Huge Drain on Public Payroll

WASHINGTON—Leaving through the Congressional Record you're likely to encounter plenty of speeches about the economy, for balancing the budget, for tightening the belt. This is the sort of thing that makes newsmen who observe the day-to-day workings of Congress, the kind of cynical fellows they are.

With the rarest possible exceptions, congressional bread-baking about economy is so much malarkey—put out to home town consumption, in the hope that the voters will believe it.

A much better check on what congressmen really believe about economy in government, to take a look at what they do, not what they say. This column has been doing a little digging into the benefits that members of Congress have voted themselves. The results are eye-opening. To begin with, members of Congress receive \$22,500 a year, plus a \$2,500 tax-free expense account. Congress is in session about 150 working days each year, so that comes to \$166.66 per day for every working day.

In addition Congressmen get many "fringe" benefits. Numerous "leaders" and one ex-leader, GOP Rep. Joe Martin of Massachusetts was given a Cadillac, usually costing in the neighborhood of \$11,000, plus free chauffeur and free gasoline.

Congressmen pay about seven per cent of their wages into pension fund, which can pay benefits up to \$30,000 a year for life upon retirement. "Retirement" can begin as early as 50 for lawmakers, depending upon the number of years they have served.

LAVISH ALLOWANCES for running congressional offices is another source of income for many lawmakers. It's easy to include friends and relatives on the payroll at handsome salaries. . . . witness the case of Rep. Steven V. Carter of Iowa, who put his 19-year-old son, a part-time college student, on the payroll \$11,873 a year. When this came to light he said he would cut the young man's salary to \$6,400.

Unless public protest is too strong another provision costing taxpayers \$6 million a year is likely to sneak through. This little gem would permit members of the House of Representatives, who are already allowed \$30,000 per year or more to pay their office bills to hire another administrative assistant at a salary of \$14,000 per year.

Many congressional offices are lavish to the point of ostentation. Wastebaskets in the new Senate Office building, for example, cost \$60 each. A senator may sit in a chair that has literally cost taxpayers several hundred dollars.

Both representatives and senators get Turkish baths and the use of a gymnasium for free! A lavish swimming pool in the new Senate Office building is for senators only. Representatives are unhappy because senators have a free refrigerator in their offices, while members of the lower house do not.

FOR ONLY \$10.83 A MONTH, a congressman gets a whopping big, \$20,000 life insurance policy. Taxpayers pay the rest of the premium. The lawmakers have restaurants where you can order a big meal for 90 cents. Naturally, these are run at a huge loss—by you, the taxpayer, picking up the tab, of course.

Travel allowances, lavish postal allowances, free mailing privileges, special studios on Capitol Hill where congressmen can make television films and radio news broadcasts at a fraction of their true cost; free medical care, free hospital care at Army or Navy hospitals, free or cut rate haircuts at barber shops subsidized by the taxpayers, low cost beauty shops for the lady members of Congress, and for congressional wives free flowers for congressional functions, "borrowed" from the Botanical Gardens, free trips to Europe—or anywhere else in the world—and plenty of free spending money in "counterpart" funds obtained from the U. S. embassies abroad—these are only a few of the "extras" your Congressman receives.

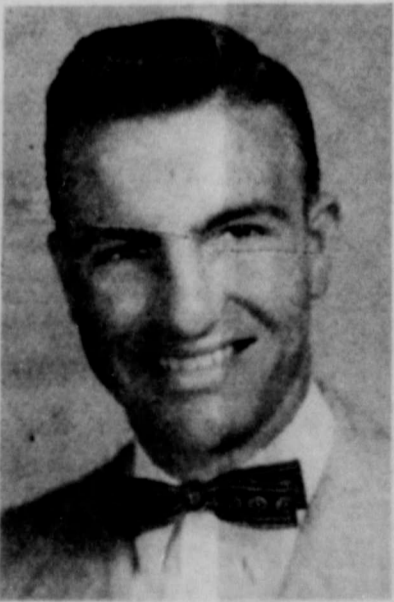

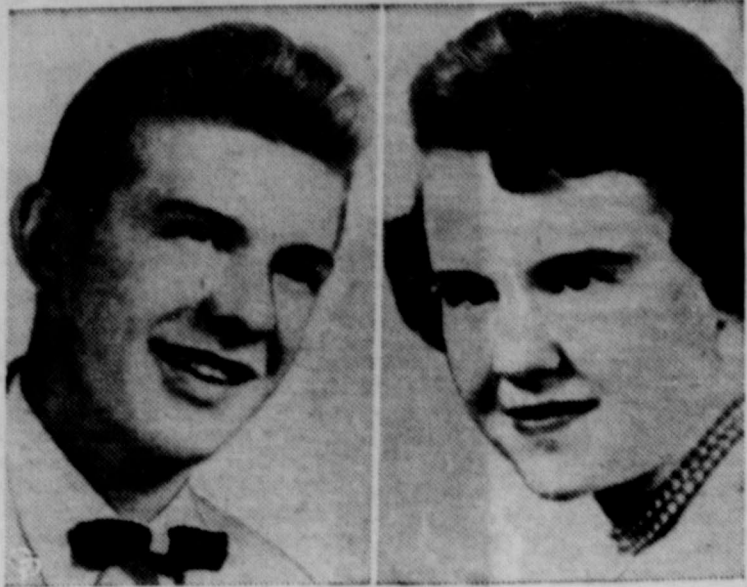
### Gospel Meeting At Church Of Christ, Mullin, April 19

**Answer:** Your applications should be filed immediately with your social security office. The first month for which benefits could be paid is September 1958. No benefits will be lost as long as you apply by September 30, 1959.

**Question:** I expect to retire within the next few years, when I reach age 65. About how much could I expect to receive from social security payments?

**Answer:** The amount you will receive is based upon your average monthly wage earned over a certain period of years of employment or self-employment, dropping out the five lowest years. To help you arrive at the approximate amount of your benefit, we are sending you our latest pamphlet, "How to Estimate Your Social Security Payments." Our representative will be in Goldthwaite at the Department of Public Welfare at 8:30 a. m., Friday, April 24. If you will contact him, he will give you more detailed information about the method used to figure your benefit.

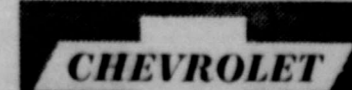

Austin, Texas — Whichever way the ball bounces, Texans can look forward to a hefty increase in state taxes for 1960-61.

House of Representatives passed a general appropriations bill calling for spending of \$332,000,000 from general revenue. Senators took a more economical approach, began their work with a bill calling for \$30,000,000 less than the House measure.

Even so, the Senate proposal would put spending some \$21,000,000 above the present level and require an estimated \$117,000,000 in new tax money.

House bill includes longevity pay raises for long-time state employees and increases in welfare checks to the aged, blind and dependent, all added during floor debate. House also accepted committee recommendations for boosts in the appropriations for higher education, state hospitals and special schools and the prison system.

**Gasoline Tax Viewed — Gov.** Price Daniel says he's ready to support a 1-cent hike in the state gasoline tax if it will be used to improve public schools, raise teacher salaries.

Neither the House nor Senate appropriations bill included public school teacher raises. Lawmakers seemed to think this, if it were to be done, should be handled in a separate bill.

Texas still would have a lower gasoline tax than other states, said Daniel, even after the 1-cent raise. He said he felt sure service station operators would

"go along" with it if it were for the purpose of better schools.

Opponents say that, with practically everyone having to use a car these days, the gasoline levy is about as "general as a sales tax can get."

**Health Chief Resigns —** Recent target of lawmakers is the State Health Department, where Commissioner A. Holle stepped out of his \$16,000-a-year post under the glare of legislative disapproval.

Dr. Holle said he felt the department would be better off with another commissioner who could get more support in the way of legislative appropriations.

Meanwhile, both House and Senate launched inquiries into Health Department spending practices.

**Flexible Rating Off —** State regulation of Texas auto insurance rates apparently will continue for at least another two years.

State Insurance Committee refused to approve a flexible rating plan, sent it to the subcommittee "graveyard."

Backers of the bill, mostly large out-of-state companies, claimed it would save Texas auto owners millions. Careful drivers would be rewarded with lower insurance, they said.

Opponents, including most Texas companies, fought the bill, said it would "take the lid off" rates. They said a merit rating plan, being considered by the State Board of Insurance, would take care of rewarding safe drivers.

**Lending Bill Filibustered —** Senate disagreement over how to improve loan shark regulation brought on the first filibuster of the session.

Sen. Abraham Kazen of Laredo sponsored the House-passed measure which would, if approved by a vote of the people, amend the constitution. It would allow the Legislature to license lenders and set maximum interest rates. Present 10 per cent ceiling, widely ignored, would be abolished.

Sen. Frank Owen III of El Paso led a long-winded assault on the measure. He and other senators insisted such regulation should be limited to loans under \$500 to \$600.

Senate gave Kazen's measure preliminary approval, despite all the opposition.

**Party In-Fighting Begins —** Fifteen months ahead of convention time is not too soon for Texas Democrats to start haggling over who'll receive their presidential nominating votes.

U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson is the focal point of controversy. Recent developments:

Young Democrats of Texas, currently controlled by left-wingers, declared the senator should pay more attention to the party platform. J. Ed Connally, chairman of the state executive committee, quickly announced the Young Demos did not speak for the party. He called them "immature extremists."

Democrats of Texas, unofficial liberal organization, announced it would have a convention in Austin in May. DOT, also, has "fallen out" with Sen. Johnson.

In the Legislature, the House elections committee approved a bill that would allow Senator Johnson to run for president and re-election as senator in the same general election.

**Investment Board Urged —** A bill by Sen. Hubert Hudson of Brownsville would create a new board to handle investments of three large state trust funds. board would be the governor.

Making up the nine-member attorney general, comptroller, chairman of the State Board of Education and three bank presidents.

Investment in corporate stocks and bonds would be permitted by Hudson's measure. Altogether, the three funds total \$820,000,000.

Hey, Mr. Fisherman! If you like to try out the new, see a huge expanse of water, and rough it a bit at the same time, we know the very spot for you.

It is Falcon Lake, fifty miles south of Laredo. Here a lake some 30 miles long and about five miles wide straddles the international boundary line between the United States and Mexico.

Falcon is a primitive lake, with fishing conditions unusual in every respect.

This lake was created when the International Boundary Commission built a dam across the Rio Grande. International boundary monuments were placed down the middle of the lake so that the boundary between the two countries might be well marked.

Brush, which consisted of mesquite, cats claw, huisache and cactus was left in the bottom of the lake. Two towns were moved from the banks of the river to higher ground, but many of the old buildings remain standing. Today the old town of Zapata is almost completely inundated, while Old Guerrero on the Mexican side stands about half out of water.

Some of the rock walls have tumbled down, and these old buildings now afford wonderful habitat for big bass.

At first it was feared there would be no bass in the lake. Commercial fishermen hit it heavy and hauled out thousands of pounds of rough fish. Then suddenly there was an explosion of bass, both blacks and whites.

Last year they were barely keepers. This year plenty of them run from two to four pounds, and quite a few six and eight pound lunkers are being taken. Also, many young bass are hooked. Sometime you get one that isn't as big as the lure it hits.

This is direct evidence that there are at least two spawns a year in this, the southernmost Texas lake. At that rate it will continue to be a hot fishing spot despite the heavy pressure.

Up until now most of the big bass have been caught on three types of lures — Jiggin' Eels, Hawk Extractors and Bombers.

However, the time is here when the bass will begin hitting top water lures. With a few days of warm weather, and provided there are no disturbing floods, the next 30 days will produce some terrific catches.

There is a perfect highway to Falcon Lake. The two towns where accommodations can be had are Zapata and Falcon Heights. Neither of these towns, however, can begin to take care of the heavy influx of fishermen. Sportsmen are going there by airplane, automobile and bus.

Motor accommodations in the towns are very limited. If you plan to make a trip to Falcon Lake, you'd better begin right now to make your reservations. And it is almost impossible to get in on a weekend even with a month's advance notice.

There also is scarcity of boats. Many fishermen take their own boats and motors, and it's a wise procedure unless you want to fish from the banks.

Frankly, it is a lake for big motors. Unfortunately, access is very limited. Some of the planners didn't use a recreational yardstick in measuring its values. Also, when the State Highway Department built bridges across arms of the lake, it failed to do enough bulldozer work in making launching ramps alongside the bridges.

Although there is plenty of fishing water on the United States side, approximately two-thirds of the lake is in Mexico. A thirty-day Mexican license costs only 80 cents, however.

One good thing in favor of Lake Falcon is that prices haven't gone sky-high, as yet. Room rent and meals are well in line.

This time next year there will be more accommodations at the lake. So many fishermen will go there this year that capital is certain to move into and provide ample facilities.

It will be interesting to watch the results for a few years. Chances are very good that Falcon Lake will produce bass equal to Florida and in numbers beyond the fondest dream of the ordinary fisherman.

**Covers for Treble Hooks** — Ever try to untangle a jumbled up mess of fishing lures? Fun, isn't it?

Man, there's nothing more disgusting. And that's not all. It's almost impossible to separate even a few lures without barb-marking the finger a few times.

Then too, if you've ever stuck a treble-hook lure in your pocket, and later on tried to remove it—oh, boy!

Anyway, Jack Braniff is your friend in need. Jack, who works at Mercy Hospital in Pleasanton, Texas, has come up with a simple solution that makes one wonder why he hadn't thought of it himself years ago.

Jack has invented an aluminum, triangular shaped cap that fits snugly over the treble hook. You squeeze the aluminum cap just enough to make it fit over the hook—and there you are.

He calls them Jak-etts. And he points out that they not only eliminate the messy tackle box and make lures safe to carry in the pocket, but they also clean, sharpen and straighten the

### Time Of Year To Be Careful About Snakes

Austin, (Spec.)—This is the time of the year when poisonous reptiles, such as the very unpopular but wellknown rattlesnake, are coming out. According to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary, Texas Game and Fish Commission, March is the month when the weather is just cool enough to keep the snakes in their dens and just warm enough to make it nice for an outing.

"This situation will not last long," declares the executive secretary. "Once the warm

weather arrives in force, the rattlers will leave these dens and begin to slip through the brushlands or just lie behind rocks and drowse in the sun."

Dodgen described the large catches made recently at Sweetwater as proof enough that there will be plenty of snakes in Texas when hot weather comes. Some four thousand rattlesnakes were captured during the two day snake hunt held in that ranching area.

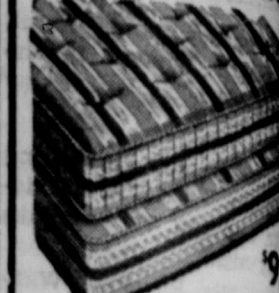
"Be extra careful when on an outing," he warned. "These killers usually hide in places where you'd least expect them to be. Don't reach behind a rock or a stump until you've checked for snakes. When lifting wood from a pile, jab it a few times to make sure there are no rattlers there. Know all the precautions and remember them when you're in the country or even in your own back yard."

He stressed the importance of at least one in a group knowing the first-aid for snake bites. "If you're going into the woods, know how to doctor a snake bite. There are all kinds of pamphlets out on this subject. Knowing it may save a life."

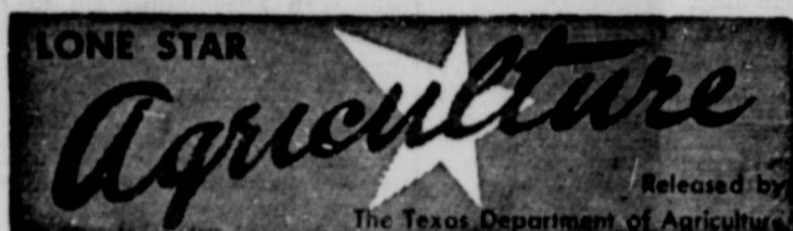

Scouting officials urge the parents and friends to encourage the boys and their leaders by securing tickets and attending the Exposition.

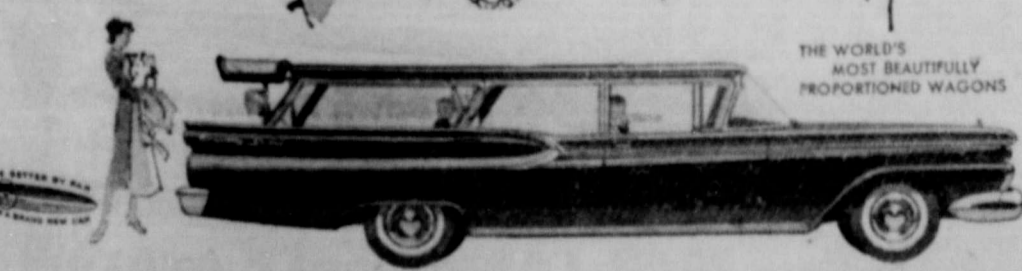

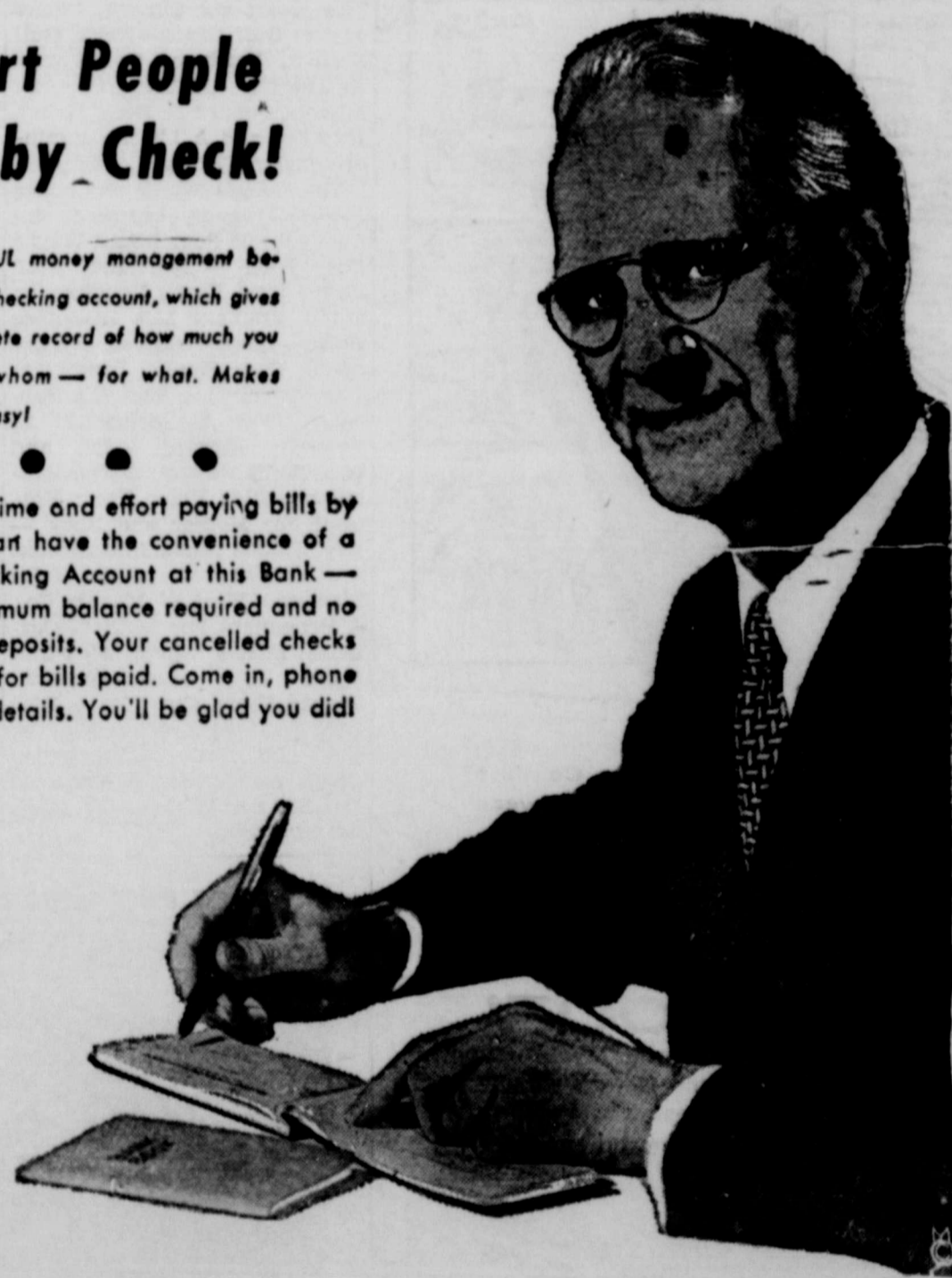

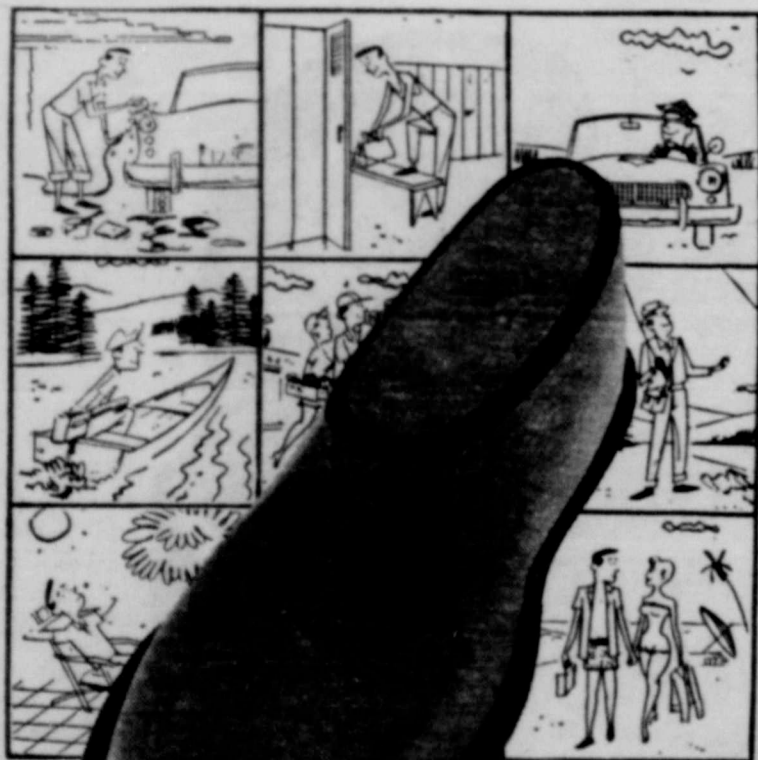
