1. Must have passed 16th birthday.

2. Must be in good sound physical condition.

3. Must be able to do a standing front dive from bank or board (reasonably well). 4. Swim 440 yards, continu-

ously employing following strokes, hand-over-hand, side stroke using scissors stroke of legs. Swim on back using inverted breast stroke kick. 5. Dive from surface of water

to a depth of six feet and swim underwater 12 to 15 feet. 6. Tread water one minute.

OUR WATER PROBLEM-As this is being written, Friday morning at 9:15 when it's pouring down rain and has rained enough during the past 48 hours to more than overflow the rain gauge, it seems almost out of line to write a word about our city water shortage and the problem facing us.

Nevertheless we do have a city water problem that is facing us and it might be well for all citizens of the community to give more serious thought to that problem, not only when it's dry but while it is raining also.

It is only natural for us to think about it more seriously when the supply gets low and the city asks for curtailment of water use.

Sorta like the old saying, "When it rains I can't fix the roof and when it doesn't rain the roof doesn't leak."

Our city water problem is an enormous problem and must be considered from a long term standpoint. It's a bigger problem than a little city such as ours can undertake without heavy obli-

The past few years have demonstrated that additional wells won't do it and it has been pointed out that additional storage facilities will not solve the problem.

Additional wells don't provide sufficient capacity to supply the demand during dry hot summer months when there is demand for nearly a million gallons per day.

Storage capacity that would hold enough water to carry the city through the hot summer months when it doesn't rain would cost more than the city could under-

So it appears there are only two sources left to explore. One is getting water from Lake Brownwood and the other is going to the Bayou or the Colorado River.

When you start to think and talk of a project of this size you must think in terms of spending from a quarter to a half million

One thing is certain, if a project of this size and proportion was undertaken it would solve the water problem.

In the matter of finance there is this to consider.

The city has a tax limit of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. That is the present tax rate and it is the legal limit

Without some drastic changes in the tax structure of the city it would be impossible to finance any sizable water project.

To solve the problem there would have to be created, or Roy Simpson wese hostesses at organized, a water district with the necessary authority to assess a shower honoring Mrs. Mau- Prairie last Saturday night, taxes for such a program.

Before that can be undertaken there must be much preliminary work done.

The most important need before any sizable water project can be undertake is for the city to have some definite facts about what to do and where to go for a really sufficient water supply.

This information can only be secured by having necessary surveys made by a recognized and competent engineering firm that specializes in water development surveys. An organization of this type can make a survey and thorough study of the water needs of the city for a long time to come and a survey of a potential supply and then let the city know what course or alternate course that can be followed to get that water supply.

With this information the city will be in position to know before going into the matter what is involved, where to go for water and what it will cost to get it. The taxpayers can be informed with facts and figures on what needs to be done and how much it will cost to do it.

Then it will be up to the citizens of the community to make up their mind whether they want a sufficient water supply to take care of our present domestic needs and provide for future growth and possible new industry.

It will cost some money to have a thorough study and survey years, passed away Tuesday made. But without it we'll not get to first base.

Going up and down the street "beefing" about the city asking us to cut down on lawn watering isn't going to get us anywhere. It will not solve a thing,

If we want water we are going to have to pay for it.

Question: I have been getting social security disability checks since July 1957. The social security office recently had me apply for benefits for my son who is 9 years old. His first check included benefits back to September 1958; why are not his benefits payable retroactive to July 1957?

Answer: When Congress changed the social security law in August 1958 to provide payments for the dependents of disabled workers, it stated that those payments could not begin before September 1958.
