

## Two Goldthwaite Girls Attending Senior Scout Roundup In Colorado

Linda Yarborough of Goldthwaite left Dallas Tuesday afternoon on a special Girl Scout train for the long awaited Roundup, to be held on ranch land ten miles north of Colorado Springs, Colorado, from July 1 through July 13.

These two girls were selected to go in the Heart of Texas Patrol made up of eight girls from this area. They have spent the past eight months taking training and getting ready for the National Roundup, which is the climax of eight or nine years of Girl Scout work.

The Roundup will be the largest gathering of teen-age girls ever held in the United States and is the second to be sponsored by the Girl Scouts of USA. This Roundup is expected to be larger than the 1956 encampment held in Michigan.

Girl Scouts from 49 states, U. S. territories and from approximately 20 foreign countries will attend.

While in Dallas the girls will

be conducted on a sight seeing tour of the city before boarding their special train.

## Lifesaving And Water Safety Course

Announcement has been made by Howard B. Campbell that all interested persons who qualify in the Senior Lifesaving and Water Safety Course will meet at the Swimming pool Monday evening, July 13 at 8:00 o'clock for try-outs and registration.

Mr. Campbell states that he would like for everyone, who so desires, to take the course, but National regulations are very strict plus the fact that an instructor can only handle so many students. Consequently, if you cannot pass minimum requirements you will not be allowed to start the course. This is for your own safety and protection as well as protection of others involved, plus being spared the disappointment of not passing the course.

This, according to Campbell, is the hardest job an instructor has, should he have to inform a boy or girl that he or she did not pass, after having put in 17 hours of hard, strenuous work.

Following is a list of minimum requirements for Senior Lifesaving and Water Safety Course:

1. Must have passed 16th birthday.
  2. Must be in good sound physical condition.
  3. Must be able to do a standing front dive from bank or board (reasonably well).
  4. Swim 440 yards, continuously employing following strokes, hand-over-hand, side stroke using scissors stroke of legs. Swim on back using inverted breast stroke kick.
  5. Dive from surface of water to a depth of six feet and swim underwater 12 to 15 feet.
  6. Tread water one minute.
- There are other requirements of lesser importance.

## FFA Schedules Invitational Rodeo

Goldthwaite FFA Invitational Rodeo is scheduled to be held at the Jernigan Arena, two miles east of Goldthwaite, at 8 p. m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 23rd, through 25th. It was announced this morning by Thurman Head, vocation agriculture teacher for Goldthwaite schools.

Schools invited to participate are: Star, Priddy, Mullin, Zephyr, Blanket, Comanche, Potts, Hamilton, Evant, Lometa, San Saba and Goldthwaite.

Each school may enter a complete rodeo team which will consist of three persons in each event — one contestant from each school to participate in

each event each night. There can be only one contestant from each school in the cutting horse contest. A contestant may enter as many events as he chooses but he will not be permitted to enter the same event more than one night. Contestants will have only one attempt in each event — there will be no averages.

Contestants for the high school events must have been enrolled in the eighth grade through twelfth grades inclusive during the 1958-59 school term. Grade school events are open to boys and girls enrolled from the seventh grade down (including first grade 1959-60 term).

Points for the team scores will be awarded as follows: All first places—10 points. All second places—8 points. All third places—6 points. All fourth places—4 points. All fifth places—2 points.

There will be a street parade Thursday, July 23rd, at 5:30 p. m., beginning at the Goldthwaite High School. All schools are encouraged to have as many horseback riders in the parade and in each night's grand entrance as possible.

Chapter presidents and sweethearts are especially invited to ride in the parade and be introduced each night with the rodeo officials.

Interested persons should contact their local V. A. teacher for entry blanks and release forms. Goldthwaite contestants are asked to contact Thurman Head within the next few days to arrange for eliminations.

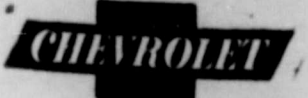

### PARENT PROBLEMS

#### When Your Child Sings Show Your Appreciation

MANY little children often go about singing. They may make up their own melodies or sing some they have liked and remembered.

When they go to Sunday school, kindergarten or early grades, they may enjoy singing with other children. They sing by imitation and by rote. They may be led by a teacher who plays the piano or a record.

**Like His Singing**  
When the pre-school child finds that his mother and other adults like to hear his singing, he may sing still more often. If, however, they don't notice his singing or press him to carry a tune they like, he may sing less or not at all.

Suppose his teacher at school tells him he doesn't sing the way the other children do. Suppose she doesn't let him sing lest he spoil their singing!

Mother has written me pathetic accounts of the child in the primary grades who wants to sing at school but isn't allowed to sing because he is classified as a "monotone."

**Book on Subject**  
In his recent book, "Music with Children" (McGraw-Hill), Prof. Alfred Ellison of New York University writes:

"In group singing every child will be encouraged to sing along with the group. No child will be stigmatized by always being asked to listen while the others sing, merely because he may not be reproducing the song as well as some others in the class."

## Hound Chase Can Result In Fawn Loss

Austin, (Spec.)—Now is the time to keep dogs penned or at least prevent them from chasing deer, according to the director of wildlife restoration, Game and Fish Commission. Right now all over Texas does are preparing to drop their fawns. Possibly some fawns already are trotting along with their mothers. In either case, the does are in no condition to have foot races with energetic dogs.

Possibly each year many fawns are lost because of pregnant does being chased by dogs. Several reports already have been made of occasions where dogs were seen running does. Most of these dogs have not been trained to chase any one species of animal.

"When a doe is heavy with young," the director said, "she is slow on her feet. Fast dogs would have very little trouble catching many of them. When they do catch a doe, they kill her, destroying both her and her young."

These dogs usually do not eat the deer once they are caught. It is just a hunt for sport and the carcass is left for the tree-loading predators and buzzards.

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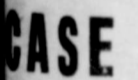

# TODAYS Menu

## Swedish Fish Soufflé For American Appetites

By ALICE DENHOFF

**WE dined with a Swedish friend and came away not only with memories of a delightful evening, but the recipe for a dish new to us, Swedish Fish Soufflé.**

If you've a hand with soufflés, we think you might like to try it and that you'll find it as intriguing and different as we did.

Heat 1½ c. top milk (or part top milk, part evaporated milk) with 2 tsp. butter or margarine.

**Make Smooth Paste**

Mix 2½ tsp. flour with enough cold water to make a smooth paste. Add to hot milk, stirring until mixture thickens.

Add 1½ c. boiled cod or halibut that has been skinned, boned and broken into small bits. Also add dash of cayenne, ¼ tsp. nutmeg and salt and pepper to taste.

Cool slightly, then add 4 egg yolks, beating in one at a time.

About 35 min. before dinner is to be served, beat 4 egg whites until they are very stiff; fold carefully into mixture.

**Into Baking Dish**

Pour into greased baking dish. Sprinkle with paprika.

Set in pan of hot water and bake for 20 to 30 min. at 350° F., or until soufflé has risen and is delicately brown.

Serve promptly with egg sauce, a delicate cheese sauce, or melted butter, or a mushroom sauce that is just a can of condensed mushroom soup, undiluted.

The same cunning cook parted with the secret of her marvelously flavored roast chicken.

**Mix Together**

Mix together ¼ tsp. each nutmeg, cinnamon, paprika, ½ tsp. garlic powder, ¼ tsp. each dry mustard and ginger, ¼ tsp. salt and tsp. drippings.

Rub over roasting chicken several hours before roasting, so flavor will permeate thoroughly.

While we're in the chicken department we might as well pass along a good recipe for leftover chicken.

**Make Cream Sauce**

Make a thick cream sauce with 4 tsp. butter (taken from 4½ tsp. butter), ½ c. flour, 1 c. chicken broth and ½ c. milk.

In the rest of the butter cook 1 tsp. chopped onion and 2 tsp. chopped green pepper.

Mix cream sauce, cooked vegetables, 3 c. soft bread crumbs, and 4 c. chopped, cooked chicken.

Season to taste with salt.

Put mixture in greased loaf pan and bake at 350° F. until loaf is well browned all over, from 1 to 1½ hr.

Serve hot or cold.

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### Questions And Answers About Social Security

**Question:** My brother recently died, and my husband paid the burial expenses partly from his own funds and partly from my brother's funds. My brother had a life insurance policy with my mother as beneficiary. The family members would like for the lump-sum death payment from my brother's social security account to be made to our mother. Can she apply for this?

**Answer:** If your brother left a widow with whom he was living, only she would be entitled to the lump sum. Otherwise, the lump sum death payment must be divided between your husband and your brother's estate in proportion to the amount paid by each. Only your husband may apply for the per-

tion due him. The amount due the estate may be paid to any relative who agrees to distribute it to the persons legally entitled to it if the entitled relatives sign a statement of consent. Your mother may apply for the estate payment if she wishes. The fact that she was the beneficiary of your brother's life insurance would have no bearing on the lump sum payment unless she used part of the insurance money to pay the burial expenses.

**Question:** I am a partner in a business and make over \$2500 a year from it. However, my brother runs the entire business by himself. I keep house for him. I suppose my earnings are too great to receive social security benefits even though I am past age 65?

**Answer:** No. The fact that you do not engage in the business in any way (in other words, you are a silent partner) enables you to draw your social security benefits regardless of the amount of your income.

**Questions And  
Answers About  
Social Security**

**Question:** My brother recent-  
ly died, and my husband paid  
the burial expenses partly from  
his own funds and partly from  
my brother's funds. My brother  
had a life insurance policy with  
my mother as beneficiary. The  
family members would like for  
the lump-sum death payment  
from my brother's social secur-  
ity account to be made to our  
mother. Can she apply for this?  
**Answer:** If your brother left  
a widow with whom he was liv-  
ing, only she would be entitled  
to the lump sum. Otherwise, the  
lump sum death payment must  
be divided between your hus-  
band and your brother's estate  
in proportion to the amount  
paid by each. Only your hus-  
band may apply for the per-

tion due him. The amount due  
the estate may be paid to any  
relative who agrees to distribute  
it to the persons legally entitl-  
ed to it if the entitled relatives  
sign a statement of consent.  
Your mother may apply for the  
estate payment if she wishes.  
The fact that she was the bene-  
ficiary of your brother's life  
insurance would have no bear-  
ing on the lump sum payment  
unless she used part of the in-  
surance money to pay the bur-  
ial expenses.  
**Question:** I am a partner in  
a business and make over \$2500  
a year from it. However, my  
brother runs the entire busi-  
ness by himself. I keep house  
for him. I suppose my earnings  
are too great to receive social  
security benefits even though I  
am past age 65?  
**Answer:** No. The fact that you  
do not engage in the business  
in any way (in other words, you  
are a silent partner) enables  
you to draw your social security  
benefits regardless of the a-  
mount of your income.

### CROP DAMAGE FROM WEED KILLERS RUNNING HIGH

Early season reports of crop damage by careless handling or misuse of weed killing chemicals have already surpassed the number of complaints received in 1958.

Texas Department of Agriculture inspectors are working overtime checking out herbicide damage reports in Central and East Texas fields adjacent to sprayed areas. Most complaints thus far are on cotton damaged by hormone-type herbicides in Leon, Houston, Hayes, Caldwell, Travis, Bastrop, Dimmit and other counties.

No estimates of actual losses are available but the number of cases are higher than in any recent year.

Farmers using 2, 4-D or 2, 4, 5-T hormone-type herbicides for weed and brush control should use extreme caution, and especially in areas where highly-susceptible broad-leaved crop plants such as cotton are grown. These types of chemicals are beneficial to farmers when handled properly but they can be as destructive as dynamite without necessary precautions.

Use of herbicides is controlled

by law in many Texas counties, although other counties are specifically exempted by the Legislature. The law forbids spraying of land within certain distances of susceptible broad-leaved plants, and wind and other weather conditions must be within definite limitations due to the high drift factor of the plant killers.

In regulated areas, permits are required from the Texas Department of Agriculture and in some counties an inspector must be present for the protection of surrounding crops. Mechanical spraying devices must also meet safety standards. Much of the recent damage can be attributed to the anxiety of landowners to keep down weeds on idle or soil-banked land and to rid valuable rangeland of unwanted brush. Importance of cautions and skilled use of the chemical herbicides cannot be over-emphasized, both for their effective benefits and for their potential danger. Farmers planning a weed control program can get full information on the advisability of using herbicides by contacting the nearest TDA office, and they are urged and welcomed to do so.

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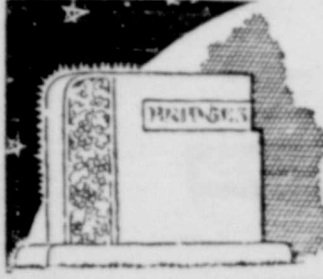

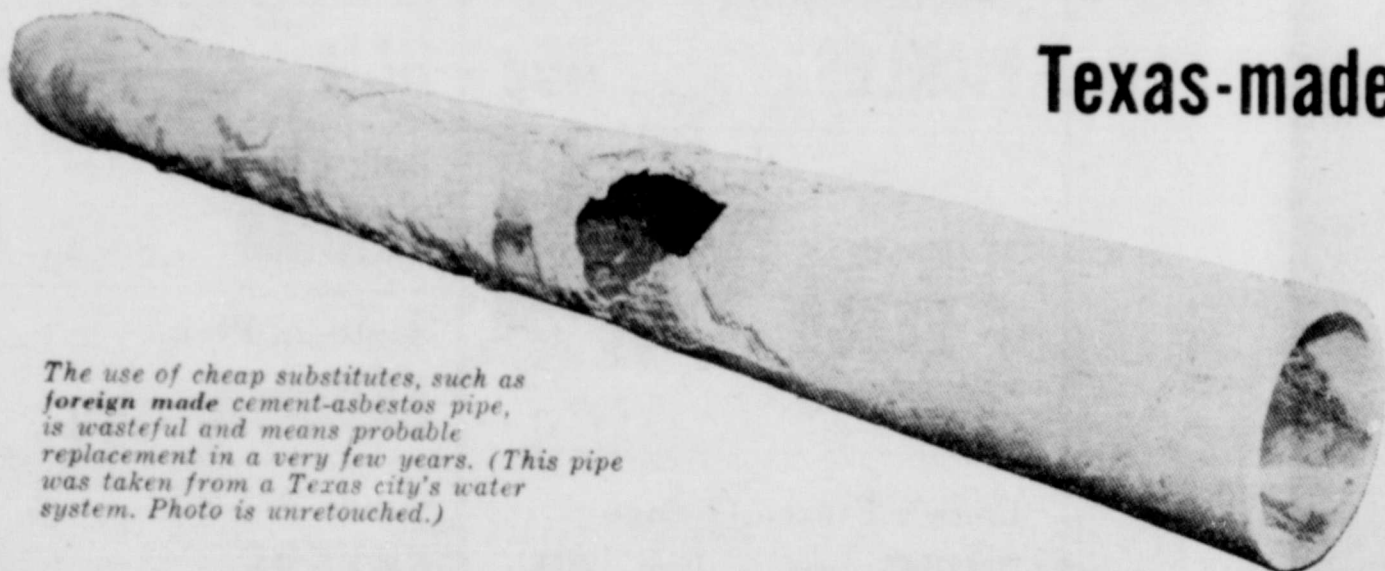

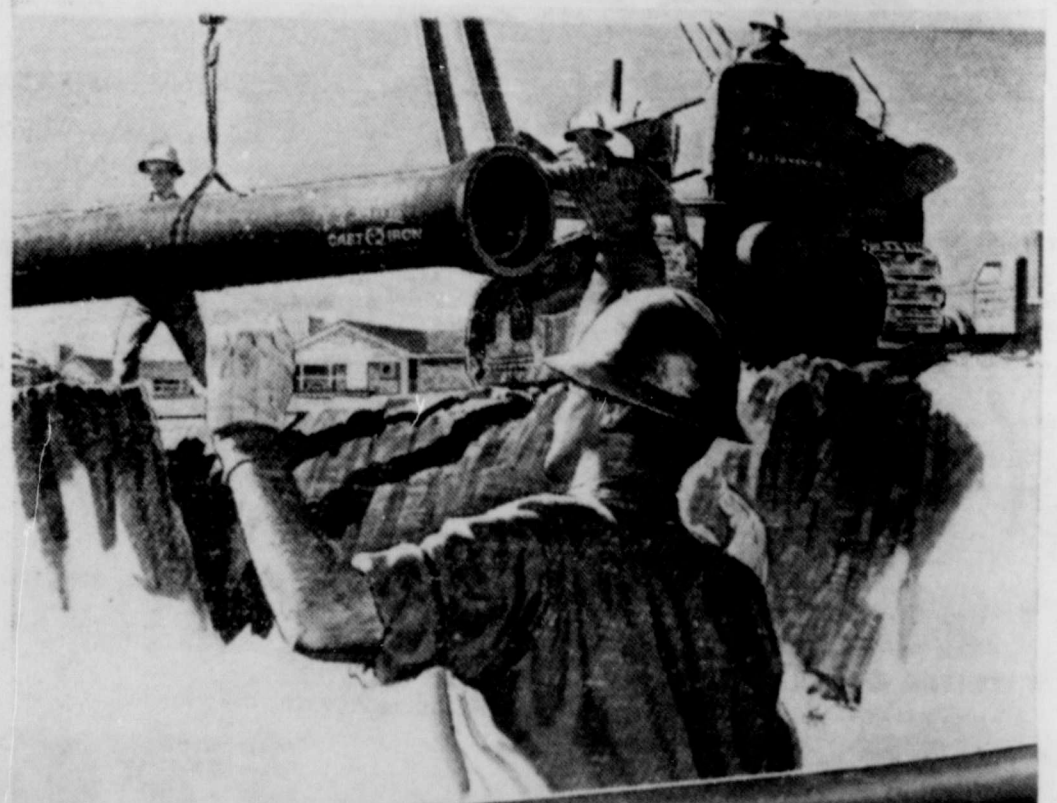

Drop a good popping bug alongside one of these logs. Let it rest a moment or two, and then yank it just a little so that it will cause a slight disturbance. Then just let it rest for a few minutes.

Then the perch will leave it just as quick as he hit it and by that time that bass has decided it wants the bug. If you are all ready to set the hook, you have a nice little fight coming on.

Even a 2-pounder will double your fly rod. It takes some adroit playing to bring him in. And when you get close to the boat, have your net ready. It's not a good idea to try to lift a bass into a boat with a fly rod or a light leader.

There's a lot of fun in taking pan fish with fly rods, too. You can use lures, minnows or worms. Any of them will do, depending, of course, upon how hungry the fish is, and how you present the meal.

It's a real education to watch an adept fly fisherman. Usually he is pretty thorough and works over his water well. If he knows how to handle his equipment he can really sack up whatever kind of fish he's seeking.

Now that you've talked me into it, I think I'll get out right away myself.

## OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

May, a fellow up Tulsa way the name of R. D. Hull observed the 10th anniversary of invention of the closed-faced fishing reel.

His name probably won't go in history along with the man who figures out a way to cannon on the moon. However, the man who gave the world a new fishing reel has made a great contribution to the contentment of the people who live on this earth.

He made the Zebco reel. He tested it out and made it work. Then, practically every manufacturer of fishing equipment has come along with the modification of it. The reel, however, continue to sell its own in sales.

The closed-faced spinning reel is a lot of kidding from fishermen who are addicted to the open-faced reels and conventional reels. Some of them use it as the reel with the bird's nest. One conventional reel fisherman even used it an ocean going coffee grinder.

Henry's Model-T had a lot of fun poked at it, too, but it was the forerunner of all good automobiles.

The closed-faced reel has spread in popularity. Today you'll see more of them in use than any other type of fishing reel. There are many others, but all built pretty much on the same principal.

You load them with 100 yards of 8 or 10 pound test line, set the tension just right and you are in the fishing business. They are especially liked by women, children and persons who didn't learn to cast first with the conventional reel. Many of the old-timers also have turned to the closed reel.

You'll find them everywhere a crowd fishes. This is particularly true on jetties and at fishing docks and floating fishing barns. They are ideal for having a lot of fun either with a bass in open water or a big old carp around a baited fishing dock.

For that reason there are millions of fishermen who unconsciously pay tribute to the inventive genius of Hull.

And since we are writing of fishing, we might as well suggest that this is a good time of year to do a little work with the fly rod.

What you catch will depend upon what you are fishing for. For instance, if you just want to load up with pan fish, then a few small flies laid deftly under a willow tree at this time of the year are calculated to do the job.

On the other hand, if you want to have a little rough and tumble argument with a good bass, try your luck with a good popping bass bug.

A small bass on a fly rod gives you more fun than a big bass on a heavy casting rod. And since they are now rising to the lure, a good popping bug tossed into the right area can really produce some lunkers.

Since you may not use your fly rod too often, check it over carefully first. Chances are it hasn't been out of the case since you got back from a trout stream last summer. It could stand a good coat of light varnish. The reel will need oiling and your leader checked. Be sure knot is good.

You can use a fly rod from a boat, wade fishing, or by floating around on a rubber inner tube. Generally, unless you are an excellent caster, you'll need a little more casting space than with a casting rod.

There are many who like to wade the flats in the early morning and late evening. My own choice is to fish from a boat close around log jams. I just like the scenery.

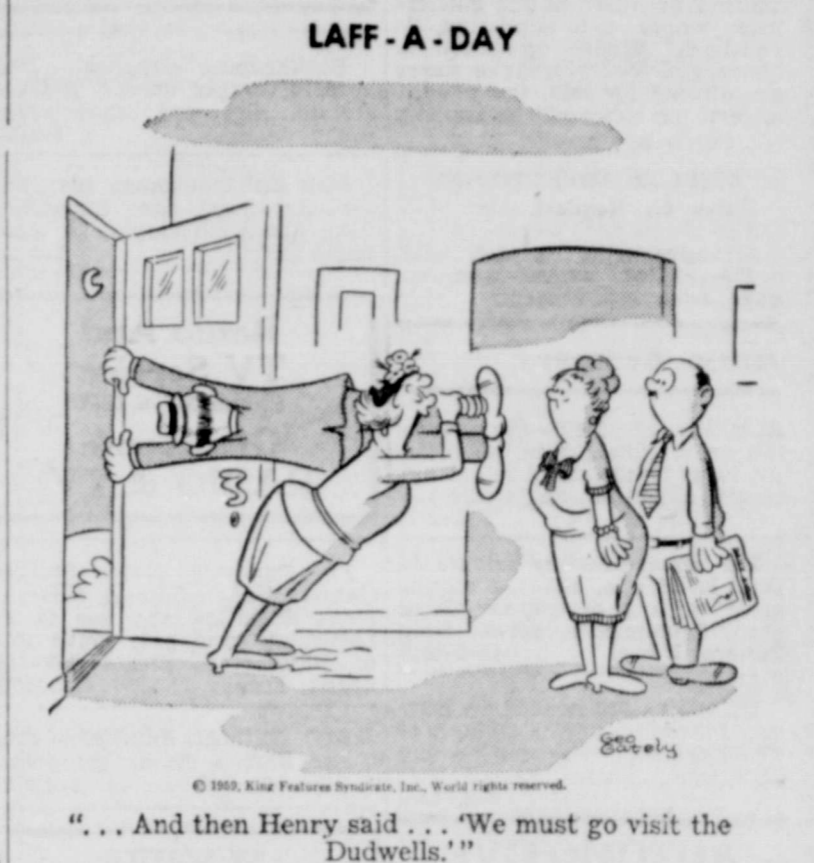

These lakes are Bridgeport, Amon Carter, Garza-Little Elm, Grapevine and Lavon Reservoir, Texoma, Crook, Lone Star, and Texarkana Reservoir. Nearly 5,000 fish were taken in netting collections during the survey. Nearly 5,000 of these were game fish and more than 1,000 of the game fish were crappie, according to the director of inland fisheries, Texas Game and Fish Commission. Nearly 600 of them were white bass and the remainder were blacks. Lavon Reservoir produced the most crappie but only one white bass was netted. Of 1,046 fish netted, 550 were crappie. A comparable catch was made on Lake Crook where out of 291 fish netted, 218 were crappie and only two were white bass. Amon Carter produced 61 crappie and no white bass. Texarkana netting produced 111 crappie and 100 white bass, while Texoma produced 178 whites and only 33 crappie. Lone Star nettings produced only 10 crappie and four whites. However, the nets caught 23 blacks, the largest number taken from any of the impoundments surveyed. Bridgeport and Garza-Little Elm broke fairly even with the first having 105 crappie and 76 white bass and the latter having 30 crappie and 35 whites. ## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas — Much more than just taxes is being written now at the State Capitol.

Political careers are being shaped—or broken. Climate is being determined for business development—or freeze. Cost of living for every Texan is involved.

Seldom, if ever before, have lawmakers been so sensitive to criticism—from governor, from press, from public.

For the first time in years, the House met on a Saturday (June 20) to work on the long overdue tax bill. Knuckling down had come reluctantly—but surely—after governor and press had chided lawmakers for long Thursday-to-Monday recesses during the short 30-day special sessions. Lawmakers fussed back earlier in that week—but they stayed late.

For the most part, the fussing was all bark and little bite. House members who threatened to evict Capitol news reporters from their Capitol quarters and House floor press table in reprisal weren't taken seriously. Reporting of legislative affairs is fundamental to the democratic processes—and no one realizes it better than do law-

makers.

In brief: pressures mounted... a safety valve blew... and work was resumed in earnest.

**New Tax Proposal**—A 2 per cent "luxury tax" on items costing more than \$50 is the principal new feature of a House committee - approved revenue bill.

Tax committee voted 12-to-6 to send the bill by Rep. Frates Seeligson of San Antonio to the House floor.

Like several previous bills, it was an attempt to compromise the conflicts between the "sales taxers" and "business taxers." It would raise an estimated \$170,000,000 for the biennium.

About \$36,000,000 would come from the luxury sales tax. About \$6,100,000 would come from a one per cent severance beneficiary tax on natural gas, and about \$13,000,000 from increased franchise taxes on corporations.

Rest would come from increase levies on gross receipts of utilities and sales of automobiles, tobacco, wine and liquor.

In the showdown on taxes last session, the House refused to approve a bill heavy on sales taxes. Some committee members voted against this bill on

grounds that a 2 per cent sales tax, even though it was only on \$50 or more items, would be ruinously unpopular.

A majority of the Senate, however, has shown definite disapproval of loading too much of the new burden on business. They feel heavy business taxes would shut out industry and cut off the source of new prosperity.

**Spending Bills Re-Passed** — Both houses re-passed the appropriation bills that went through the first special session. They went to same conference committee that worked before to adjust the differences. House bill was some \$20,000,000 higher.

Conference committee reportedly did most of the routine work on the bills and set them aside until a tax bill could be passed to make spending possibilities more definite.

Rep. James Bates of Edinburg, sponsor, told the House tax committee the bill wouldn't change the escheat laws that have been on the statute books for years. He declared it would make the old law more workable.

Bates' bill, as introduced this session, would require banks and others holding money or property unclaimed for seven years, to report it to the state within 60 days after passage of the bill.

It also would give state agencies authority to examine the books and records of businesses to see if they are holding such property.

Bankers labeled it a "free hunting license into all bank accounts" and "unconstitutional search and seizure."

Bill was sent to subcommittee.

**Student Fee Bill Moves** — Making progress in its second legislative round is a bill that would allow state colleges to require students to pay an activity fee.

Similar bill died in the first special session.

It would allow the colleges to make mandatory a student fee of \$30 a semester. This would pay for such campus services as hospital and medical care, book rentals, student publications and tickets to athletic and cultural events.

College presidents are supporting the bill. Those from smaller schools, particularly, say they need the extra revenue to stay in the black on these activities.

Spokesmen for student groups opposed. They said poorer students would rather do without these services than pay the fees.

Senate Finance committee leaned toward the president's view, voted the bill out by a 2-to-1 majority.

New bill says that no one shall get in the way of the public's right to go to and from public beaches. It leaves to the courts the job of defining where the line is between public and private ownership along the coast.

It would not, according to its Senate sponsors, cloud the title of privately owned land next to the beaches. Sponsors are Sens. Jep Fuller of Port Arthur, Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, Culp Krueger of El Campo and Robert Baker of Houston.

At the House committee hearing on the Eckhardt bill, many came to testify for and against. Supporters of the bill said the only opposition was from "selfish land owners." Opponents called it an effort to "take land without just compensation."
